Convention success spurs future Commission actions

The NCAA Presidents Commission, successful in seeing all of its legislative proposals adopted overwhelmingly at the fifth special NCAA Convention, has agreed to deal with other concerns of chief executive officers and to maintain a high level of CEO involvement in athletics policy matters.

Meeting June 21 immediately after adjournment of the special NCAA Convention—which almost unanimously supported each of the Com-

mission's initiatives—the Commission agreed to take steps to sustain the involvement of institutional presidents and chancellors, emphasizing issues for the annual NCAA Convention in January 1986.

Commission Chair John W. Ryan, president of Indiana University, Bloomington, noted that the Commission has a number of significant items on the agenda for its October 1-2 meeting in Denver, including, among others, initial eligibility standards in Division

I [NCAA Bylaw 5-1-(j)], the overall issue of freshman eligibility, drug testing, controls on coaches' income and responsibilities of governing boards in athletics matters.

"I believe we should examine our priorities again in October," Ryan told the Commission, "and identify one, two or three items relevant to presidents' interests."

Otis A. Singletary, president of the University of Kentucky and chair of the Commission's Division I subcom-

mittee, expressed satisfaction with the results of the special Convention, calling it "an historic meeting."

"The Commission's basic thrust has been significant," he said. "The functioning of the Presidents Commission has proved that if CEOs want to be an influence in the NCAA, they can be."

The special Convention supported the Presidents Commission's eight proposals, approving each of the eight with affirmative votes ranging from

96.79 percent (on No. 7, requiring external audits of athletics expenditures) to 100 percent (on No. 5, a resolution regarding the accountability of student-athletes who violate rules). The closest vote—on Proposal No. 7—was 422 to 14.

Summaries of the voting on all proposals at the special Convention appear on pages 1, 4 and 5.

Ryan laid the groundwork for the Convention's actions in his remarks at the opening of the business session June 21: "I do not believe I can overstate the level of concern that presidents and chancellors feel regarding the 'integrity crisis' in college athletics," he said. "We are deeply concerned that there be sufficient institutional control of athletics programs, [with] apparent lack of such control in many instances leading to problems for academic values in higher education."

"Presidents are heartsick about the serious violations of rules which are

A summary of actions at Convention

Following is a listing of the legislative actions taken by the delegates attending the fifth special NCAA Convention June 20-21 in New Orleans.

This report is designed to provide a complete review of the Convention's decisions. It presents the specific action taken on each numbered proposal and on each amendment to an amendment and other proposals during the Convention. The numbers of the proposals (1 through 12) are the same as those in the Convention Official Notice and Program, and the numbers of the amendments to amendments and other proposals (e.g., No. 2—1) are those used in the compilation of those proposals that was distributed at the Convention.

All approved proposals, unless amended, are effective on the dates indicated in the Official Notice and Convention Program. They will be printed in a special booklet of NCAA Manual revisions that will be mailed to the membership later in July. They also will be incorporated in the 1986-87 Manual, which will be distributed next March.

Amendments to amendments are listed with the proposals they were to amend. Each includes a statement of the basic intent for those who do not have a set of amendments and other proposals distributed at the Convention. Proposals finally approved are in bold type and are indicated further by an asterisk before the proposal number.

*No. 1—Approved (418-6). *No. 2—Approved by Division I (283-4) as amended by No. 2—1. *No. 2—1—Approved by Division I. [Amendment to No. 2 to specify that the academic data to be reported in subparagraph (3) of the proposal are from the academic year that began two years before (i.e., 1984-85 for the October 1, 1986, reporting deadline).] No. 2—2—Withdrawn. [Amendment to No. 2 to change the reporting deadline from October 1

Nominations open for committee positions

The NCAA Nominating Committee for the 1986 Convention is accepting nominations for 15 Council positions that expire in January 1986.

Five of the 15 Council members whose terms expire are eligible for reelection. Four of the nine Division I members and one of the three members in Division II are eligible. In Division III, none of the three members can be reelected.

Vacancies include Division I vice-president, occupied by Arliss L. Roaden, formerly of Tennessee Technological University; Division II vice-president, Ade L. Sponberg, North Dakota State University, who continues as a Council member, and Elizabeth A. Kruczek, Fitchburg State College. None of the three is eligible

for reelection as an officer.

The deadline for submitting nominations is September 3. Nominations may be sent to Jack V. Doland, McNeese State University, chair of the Nominating Committee, or to any member of the committee. Nominations may sent directly to Fannie B. Vaughan, administrative assistant, at the NCAA national office, P.O. Box 1906, Mission, Kansas 66201.

In Division I, those eligible for reelection are Don J. DiJulia, Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference; Kathleen M. Wear, La Salle College; Della Durant, Pennsylvania State University, and Cecil W. Ingram, Florida State University. Those not eligible for reelection are William H. Baughn, University of Colorado; Richard W.

Burns, University of Texas, El Paso; Thomas J. Frericks, University of Dayton; Andrew T. Mooradian, University of New Hampshire, and Roaden.

Three of the Division I representatives elected or reelected must be from Region I (Districts 1 and 2), one must be a chief executive officer and two must be women. In addition, one must represent Division I-A South independents, three must represent Division I-AAA and one may be elected at large. New representatives must be elected from two Division I-A conferences—Big Eight (Region 3) and Western Athletic (Region 4). One new representative must be elected from I-AA East (replacing Mooradian). See Nominations, page 3

Davis gives views at U.S. hearing

The integrity of major college sports programs is threatened if the combined use of gambling and drugs by college students is left unchecked, John R. Davis, Oregon State University, testified at a Federal hearing on organized crime and gambling.

Davis, NCAA president, testified that drug use and gambling come together when bookmakers—possibly representing organized crime syndicates—offer drugs and money as bribes to have players affect the outcome of games.

"We at the NCAA have no hard information that there is a direct link between organized crime, on the one hand, and drugs and gambling on the college scene," Davis said. "But, from our conversations with Federal law enforcement authorities, we believe this is simply a possibility that cannot be ignored."

The testimony came during a three-day hearing by the President's Commission on Organized Crime June 24-26 in New York City.

Davis said the NCAA has conducted

Drug tests at NCAA championships proposed

The NCAA Special Committee on National Drug-Testing Policy has recommended that student-athletes be tested for banned drugs at all NCAA championships and has formulated a list of those championships that would be involved in the drug-testing program during the 1986-87 season.

The NCAA Council will consider the special committee's recommendations at the Council's August 14-16 meeting in Boston; and if the Council elects to sponsor the drug-testing program, the plan would have to be approved by the NCAA membership at the 1986 Convention.

During the 1986-87 season, the

special committee has recommended that at least the following Division I men's and women's championships be involved in the drug-testing program: cross country, indoor track, outdoor track, baseball, basketball, wrestling and Division I-AA football.

In addition, the recommendation calls for drug testing to be conducted at postseason football bowl games.

Although the focus would be on Division I during the first year, the committee is recommending that testing be conducted at one Division II and one Division III championship.

Testing would be conducted on a random basis and at varying times,

depending upon the championship. In track and field, the committee has suggested that medal winners (first, second or third) be tested for drugs, as well as other athletes on a random basis.

If a student-athlete tested positively for a banned drug, he or she automatically would be ineligible for the championship and for the ensuing 90 days from that date.

John L. Toner, former NCAA president and chair of the special committee, said that a student-athlete who tested positively would be required to enter a rehabilitation and education program. After that time, the student-

athlete could apply for restoration of eligibility.

A student-athlete who tested positively for drugs a second time would be ineligible for NCAA championship competition for one year.

"A drug-testing program is needed because of the integrity of the sport involved and the safety of the student-athlete," Toner said. "It has become more and more apparent that the safety of student-athletes is a very important issue in the use of many, if not most, of the banned drugs."

Student-athletes would be tested for all drugs, including the street

Entrance requirements need to be tackled next

NCAA presidents, awakening from innocent slumber, voted June 21 to put stronger teeth in the rules book. Time will tell if they'll use them to bite at the bad guys in college athletes—or simply bark loudly.

Walter Byers, the NCAA executive director, said the presidents will not tolerate "the minority and cynical element which deliberately violates the rules and brings discredit to all higher education."

Many NCAA members admit the need for stricter enforcement and more stringent penalties for the cheats and crooks. The overwhelming support given a number of get-tough proposals proves that.

There is, however, a feeling that the NCAA faces an even more serious problem: entrance requirements.

How is a high school kid who can slam-dunk, dribble and shoot like hell admitted to a university even though he reads on a fifth-grade level?

Or what of the swift, muscular linebacker type who is admitted, but has to enroll in Remedial Everything 101 because his grades are disgraceful?

They are admitted not because of their academic promise, but because they might carry a university to the Final Four or to a bowl game.

Rule 5-1-(j), usually referred to as Proposal 48, which becomes law in August 1986, is supposed to end such admission abuses.

But there are educators who are attempting to water down

Proposal 48. Some claim it discriminates against minorities.

Just what is Proposal 48?

It is an educational yardstick that will set eligibility for first-year collegians. It says a student-athlete must have a combined 700 score on verbal and quantitative Scholastic Aptitude Tests (SAT) and a 2.000 grade-point average in a prescribed curriculum to be allowed to compete in an intercollegiate sport.

"It really is quite a low score," said Stanford athletics director Andy Geiger.

Geiger said he has seen transcripts of students whose high

qualified youngsters.

"People have had a three-year lead time and they should have been gearing up for it," suggests Southeastern Conference Commissioner H. Boyd McWhorter. "I guess like a lot of us, they don't believe it is going to come about until it does; then it is too late."

McWhorter denies that the rule is racially discriminating.

"I don't think about race when I think of the rule," he said. "I don't attempt to question motivations, but personally, to me, it is not a racial issue."

Byers believes Proposal 48 will not be crippled at the NCAA's January Convention.

"I don't think either the NCAA Presidents Commission or the NCAA Council will sponsor any amendment to weaken it," he said. "If there are amendments to weaken it from other sources, I don't believe the NCAA Division I membership will vote for them."

In other words, the NCAA, in all probability, will remain resolute.

If a youngster wants to go to college on an athletics grant-in-aid, he or she better prepare to be a better student.

What a shame if kids have held off trying to improve their grades because some educators have yelled "foul" and have fought to weaken Proposal 48.

Actually a 700 SAT and a 2.000 GPA really aren't that hard to achieve.

Let's shoot for excellence in education, not mediocrity.

Educators should want to accelerate, not retard or keep on hold, a student's progress.

school curriculum, over a four-year period, had only two solid academic subjects.

"It is a tragic situation," Geiger said, adding he knows of universities that look the other way, admit the youngster and "put him back in a bunch of remedial classes."

Geiger fears that some educators will "whittle away" at Proposal 48 via amendments at a January meeting.

"I think it is the most important piece of legislation and we simply must protect it," he said.

Geiger said there are those who see the SAT "examinations as being racially prejudiced against minorities."

If there is validity to such fears, it only goes to show a need for getting to the evil's roots.

To me, Proposal 48 gave high schools the message in 1983: Improve the curriculum and teaching and send us more

dian) and one from I-AA Central, to complete the unexpired term of Roaden.

In Division II, only Louise Albrecht, Southern Connecticut State University, is eligible for reelection. Those not eligible are Judith M. Brame, California State University, Northridge, and Bob Moorman, Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association. One of the Division II representatives must be from Region 2, with the others to be elected at large. Of the three to be elected or reelected, at least two must be women.

Division III representatives not eligible for reelection are Kruczek; Robert T. Shields, Fairleigh Dickinson University, Madison, and Elmer W. Yoest, Otterbein College. One of the new representatives must be from Region 1 and another from Region 2, with the third elected at large.

Division I-AA East football region members, who must select a representative to replace Mooradian, include members of the Ivy League and the Yankee Conference plus Bucknell University, Colgate University, the University of Delaware, Holy Cross College, James Madison University, Lafayette College, Lehigh University, Northeastern University, the University of Richmond, and the College of William and Mary.

Members of the Division I-AA Central football region, who must select a new member to complete Roaden's unexpired term, include members of the Ohio Valley Conference plus Eastern Illinois University; Illinois State University; Indiana State University, Terre Haute; Southern Illinois University, Carbondale; Tennessee State University; Western Illinois University, and Western Kentucky University.

Members of the 1986 NCAA Nominating Committee, including region and district, in Division I are Edward Leland, Dartmouth College (Region I-District 1); Nelson E. Townsend, Delaware State College (I-2); Joan Cronan, University of Tennessee, Knoxville (2-3); Francis W. Bonner, Furman University (2-3); Edward J. Manetta Jr., DePaul University (3-4); June B. Davis, University of Nebraska, Lincoln (3-5); Doland, McNeese State University (4-6), and Fred Jacoby, Southwest Athletic Conference (4-6).

Division II members are Edward P. Markey, St. Michael's College (1-1); Sandra T. Shuler, North Carolina Central University (2-3); James R. Spalding, Bellarmine College (3-3); and Robert J. Hiebert, California State University, Northridge (4-8).

Division III members are Charles Luce, Connecticut College (1-1); Patricia A. Rogers, State University of New York, Albany (2-2); Milton E. Reece, Greensboro College (3-3); and Russell J. Poel, North Central College (4-4).

Those wishing to nominate persons for any of the vacant Council positions should refer to Constitution 5-5-(c), which lists the Association's geographical regions for purposes of Council representation.

A brief paragraph describing the qualifications of the candidate should accompany the nomination form, which appears below.

Certification program for officials in men's basketball is recommended

The NCAA Special Committee on Basketball Officiating has submitted a proposal to the Executive Committee to create a position for a national coordinator of men's basketball officiating and a certification system.

The committee, meeting June 17-18 in Chicago, recommended a staff position in the national office for the coordinator, who would administer a program designed to enhance basketball officiating at all levels of NCAA competition. The coordinator's primary duty would be to develop and implement a plan to certify the officiating programs of all Division I conferences that are granted automatic qualification for the NCAA tournament.

Certification would be administered annually through information supplied to the NCAA national office. Any conference not complying with the certification process would be subject to the loss of automatic qualification for the tournament, a financial penalty or losing the assignment of some of its officials to the tournament.

To obtain certification, each conference would agree to the following at least:

- To assist in the planning and coordinating of regional clinics to review interpretations, mechanics and the philosophy of officiating. Each conference's supervisor of officials would be required to attend the annual clinic.

- To eliminate any ongoing practice of allowing coaches to scratch or "blackball" game officials in relationship to their individual game assignments and retention as a working official in the conference.

- To enforce bench conduct and decorum rules.

- To develop programs to identify and train officials who desire to work NCAA games.

- To develop and maintain written principles for proper game management.

- To require all officials assigned to work regular-season games to attend and participate in the annual off-season development program.

In addition to administering the certification program, the national coordinator also would:

- Serve as national office staff liaison to the NCAA Men's Basketball

Rules Committee;

- Provide officiating staff support to the NCAA Divisions I, II and III Men's Basketball Committees;

- Develop an officials' enhancement program, including public relations;

- Be responsible for the interpretations and editing of the NCAA men's basketball rules;

- Develop an officials' recruiting program in cooperation with allied conferences, and

- Administer requests for officiating-program developmental grants from member conferences.

Members of the special committee include David R. Gavitt, Big East Conference, chair; B. Gene Bartow, University of Alabama, Birmingham; Gary Cunningham, University of Wyoming; James E. Delany, Ohio Valley Conference; James Dutcher, University of Minnesota, Twin Cities; C. M. Newton, Vanderbilt University, and Dean Smith, University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill.

New Basketball Hall of Fame dedicated amid much fanfare

With brass bands, Boy Scouts and bagpipers, the city where the game began dedicated a new high-tech Basketball Hall of Fame June 30.

The three-story, \$11.4 million building officially opened to the public following the dedication ceremonies. Within minutes, the sounds of bouncing basketballs echoed through the building as youngsters rushed to try their hand at the shooting gallery, where visitors can ride a moving sidewalk past a line of 14 baskets, illustrating every backboard and shot used in the game from grammar school through the pros.

There's still a replica of the peach basket that James Naismith hung in a Springfield College gym back in 1891 to start it all.

But the new hall also contains more than a dozen video screens where visitors can watch replays of some of the greatest pro, Olympic and college games and a host of other high-tech effects.

"It's the only sports hall of fame that represents every facet of the game from high school, college, the international amateur game and the pros," said Hall of Fame President Curt Gowdy. "It's still about 30 percent incomplete, but we should have all the exhibits up by the end of July."

More than 6,000 people jammed the courtyard outside the new building for the dedication ceremonies, and thousands more lined the streets for a gala two-hour parade, featuring more than two dozen hall of famers, the Associated Press reported.

Championships Corner

Sponsorship Requirements

1. An all-female rifle team can be counted as one of an institution's sports for purposes of meeting the Division I or II women's sports sponsorship requirement, provided the institution enters not more than one team in the NCAA Men's and Women's Rifle Championships and assures that a women's rifle team used to meet the sports sponsorship requirements meets all of the Bylaw 11-4 criteria for that purpose.

Qualifying

1. Although the 1986 Division I Men's Swimming and Diving Championships have been changed to the first Thursday through Saturday in April (April 3-5), the dates for qualifying for the championships have not changed. They remain September 1 to midnight on March 16, 18 days prior to the start of the championships. Conference meets should be scheduled accordingly.

The Division I zone diving meets will remain in the same period as last year, taking place March 14-16. Divisions II and III will hold one-day qualifying meets for diving on the day preceding the men's and women's championships.

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drugs that were omitted from Proposal No. 75 at the 1985 Convention. It is estimated that each test will cost \$200, and the overall plan for the 1986-87 season probably will cost in excess of \$500,000.

Although tentative plans call for the costs to be split between the general operating budget and championships receipts, efforts are being made to find outside resources to cover costs of the drug-testing program. It is anticipated that corporate sponsorship funds would help offset program costs.

Toner said the special committee is committed to maintaining the high standard of NCAA championships and keeping banned drugs from being used by student-athletes in championships competition.

Although the plan does not involve

on-campus testing, the special committee has recommended that a consent statement be included in the student-athlete statement that would acknowledge the right of the student's institution, if it so elects, to conduct regular drug testing on its campus for its student-athletes.

The special committee will meet August 21-22 to discuss the possibility of varying penalties for different drugs. It also will review the report on drug use recently completed by Michigan State University.

Besides Toner, members of the Special Committee for National Drug-Testing Policy are William D. Bradford, M.D., Duke University; Daniel F. Hanley, M.D., Dartmouth College; Roy Kramer, Vanderbilt University; Jackie Sherrill, Texas A&M University, and George Raveling, University of Iowa.

Postgraduate scholarships go to 20 women in 'other' sports

Postgraduate scholarships of \$2,000 each have been awarded by the NCAA to 45 student-athletes (25 men, 20 women) in sports other than football and basketball.

The Association annually awards 90 postgraduate scholarships to student-athletes who have excelled on the field and in the classroom. In addition to the 45 awards given to student-athletes in "other" sports, 20 awards are presented to men and women who participate in basketball, and 25 scholarships are awarded in football.

Selection of the 45 winners was made by the NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship Committee, which is chaired by Fred Jacoby, commissioner of the Southwest Athletic Conference.

Following are the 1985 women's scholarship winners in sports other than basketball. (The men's recipients were listed in the June 19 issue of The NCAA News):

Women's Division I

Marcella Ballard (swimming, Ohio State University, 3.460 grade-point average in English)—A four-year letter winner, she captained the squad during the 1984-85 season. Ballard earned all-America recognition in 1982, 1983 and 1985 and holds 14 Big Ten Conference titles. She was captain of the U.S. Sports Festival North Team in 1983. Ballard was a four-year scholar-athlete and dean's list honoree. She was named to the Big Ten academic team and CoSIDA academic all-America team in 1984. She will enter California's Hastings College of Law in August.

Susan Jane Habernigg (swimming, University of Southern California, 3.440 in public relations)—She won the 1983 and 1985 NCAA championships in the 200-yard freestyle, was named all-America four years and captured 13 Western Collegiate Athletic Association titles. Habernigg was a silver medalist in the 1982 World Championships in Guayaquil, Ecuador. She was one of only two students to serve on the president's athletic advisory council and was the women's swimming representative on

the athletics department's advisory council in 1983, 1984 and 1985. She won the outstanding senior award. She plans to use her scholarship to obtain an MBA.

Kathryn Lynn Hayes (track and cross country, University of Oregon, 3.860 in biology)—She helped Oregon capture the team title at the 1985 Division I Women's Outdoor Track Championships with a third-place finish in the 5,000 meters and a fifth-place finish in the 10,000 meters. She placed third in the 1983 cross country championships, helping her team to another national title. She is a four-time all-America in track and a three-time honoree in cross country. She was named first-team academic all-America in 1983 and 1984 and earned Oregon scholar-athlete recognition three times. Hayes served as a member of the Oregon student-athlete drug education committee. She would like to continue her studies in biology.

Barbara Anne Mack (gymnastics, University of Alabama, Tuscaloosa, 3.819 in political science)—She served as captain of the gymnastics team for three years and was named an all-America in 1984. She was a member of the all-Southeastern Conference gymnastics team and all-regional team from 1982 through 1985.

In 1985, she won the regional bar and beam championships. Mack served as student director of the NCAA Volunteers for Youth program from 1981 to 1985. Her academic honors include CoSIDA academic all-America, Phi Beta Kappa, Dean's Award of Merit (1985), Mortar Board senior honor society, Omicron Delta Kappa honorary society, and the Pi Sigma Alpha political science honorary society. She also was a Rhodes scholarship finalist. She will study law at Georgetown University.

Linda Felicia Spent (track, University of Maryland, College Park, 3.808 in zoology)—She won the 1985 Atlantic Coast Conference heptathlon championship, setting an ACC record and qualifying for the NCAA championships. She was third in the 1984 Canadian Olympic trials in the heptathlon, serving as team captain. Spent was named to the ACC honor roll and the academics honors list at Maryland. She was a member of the Phi Beta Phi honor society and was a Rhodes scholarship finalist in 1983. She served as manager and coach of a youth track and field club and participated in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and NCAA Volunteers for Youth. She will pursue a master's degree in kinesiology.

Divisions II and III

Lynnora Ann Achterberg (swimming, Kalamazoo College, 3.970 in art)—An all-America in 1984 and 1985, Achterberg won the Division III three-meter diving title in 1985. She was undefeated in dual-meet competition in her junior and senior years at Kalamazoo and won the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Conference titles in the one-meter and three-meter diving events in 1984 and 1985. She also was named a CoSIDA academic all-America both years. Other honors include membership in Phi Eta Sigma honor society and Phi Beta Kappa. She was named the education department's outstanding student and graduated magna cum laude. She will seek a master's degree in fine arts.

Stefani Green (track and cross country, U.S. Naval Academy, 3.400 in English)—Named all-America in 1983, 1984 and 1985, Green holds four Navy individual track records and contributed to nine relay records. In the 1985 NCAA Division II Women's Outdoor Track Championships, she was third in the 800 meters and fourth in the 400-meter hurdles. She was named to the national dean's list and Who's Who Among Students in American Universities and Colleges. She is a member of the English honor society, Churchill Society and French Club. She plans to pursue a graduate degree in political science or international affairs after her first tour of duty.

Kathleen Marie Halle (volleyball, University of Tennessee, Martin, 3.850 in management)—As a middle blocker/hitter, Halle led Tennessee-Martin to the regional tournament. She was an all-Gulf South Conference selection in 1984 and 1985 and twice was named a CoSIDA academic all-America. She won the Lady Pacer academic award in 1982, 1983 and 1984 and received the Bettye Giles Award for most valuable female athlete at Tennessee-Martin in 1985. She was a member of numerous honor societies, including Phi Eta Sigma freshman honor society, Phi Chi Theta business fraternity and Phi Kappa Phi honor society. She plans to pursue a master's degree in management.

Catherine Ann Hughes (softball, Molloy College, 3.940 in English and business management)—She played second base and shortstop for Molloy, earning most valuable player honors in 1983 and 1985. She also lettered and captained the Molloy volleyball and basketball teams. She is a member of the Molloy College Honor Society and National Scholastic Honor Society for Catholic Colleges. She also served as a staff writer for The Forum, the school newspaper. She will enter Drew University's graduate school of English.

Krissann Mueller (track, Kenyon College, 3.890 in biology)—An all-America in 1985, Mueller was Kenyon's top scorer in 1983, 1984 and 1985, participating in the long jump, triple jump, 100-meter hurdles, 100 meters, and 400-meter and 1,600-meter relays. She won the most valuable player award in 1984 and 1985, and was presented the Jess Willard Falkenstein Award for outstanding academic and athletic ability in 1985. She served as an upperclass counselor for the Fellowship of Christian Athletes. She will seek a graduate science degree at Beaver College.

At large

Jennifer Acheson Blekley (field hockey, Stanford University, 3.600 in history/international relations)—She started every varsity game since her freshman year and ranked among the team's top three scorers. Blekley was selected to the "A" camp national field hockey squad. She will serve as an assistant coach for Stanford during the 1985-86 season, while finishing a degree in international relations. She was a member of the Stanford Arms Control and Disarmament Forum and Stanford in Government organization. After graduation, Blekley plans to pursue a master's in international security.

Sabrina Louise Dornhoefer (track and cross country, University of Missouri, Columbia, 3.490 in psychology)—Dornhoefer captured the 5,000 meters title at the 1985 NCAA Division I Women's Outdoor Track Championships. She was named all-America eight times, including three in cross country, three in indoor track and two in outdoor track. A member of the U.S. national cross country team, which won a gold medal in 1984 world competition, Dornhoefer also was a 1984 Olympic trials finalist in the 3,000 meters and a Big Eight Conference champion nine times. She served as secretary of the Mystical 7 honorary organization and has been on the dean's list seven semesters. She plans to pursue a graduate degree in clinical psychology.

Carol Ann Frost (swimming, University of Virginia, 3.512 in speech pathology and audiology)—She earned all-America honors nine times and is the school and state record-holder in the 50-, 100- and 200-yard breaststroke events. Frost served as team captain in 1983-84 and 1984-85 and, besides being named team most valuable player in 1985, she was selected University of Virginia female athlete of the year, University of Virginia Scholar-Athlete Award winner and leadership award winner. She was a dean's list student her entire collegiate career. Frost was named an academic all-America in 1984 and won the Atlantic Coast Conference Scholar-Athlete Award in 1985. She will enter Vanderbilt University's graduate program in speech pathology.

Sharon Gail Leidy (track and field hockey, Southern Illinois University, Carbondale, 4.000 in recreation and business administration)—Her numerous honors in field hockey include all-conference and most valuable player in 1983 and Midwest regional all-America in 1984. She was the top scorer in 1983 and 1984. In track, Leidy competed in the heptathlon and several individual events. She holds school records in the 100-meter hurdles, high jump,

pentathlon and heptathlon. She was the 1985 Illinois collegiate long jump and high jump champion. Her numerous awards include the Virginia Gordon Scholar-Athlete Award in 1984 and 1985, the outstanding leadership athlete award, the alumnae scholar-athlete award, and university scholar. Leidy will attend Penn State in the fall in the community/outdoor recreation graduate program.

Wendy Ann Markham (track, Florida State University, 3.915 in dietetics)—Markham holds the school record in the indoor high jump (6-0) and outdoor high jump (6-1½) and also holds the top 10 all-time performances at Florida State in the high jump. She participated in the 1980 and 1984 Olympic trials. Markham was a member of the Pilot Scholarship House, Omicron Nu honor society, Omicron Delta Kappa leadership society and Phi Kappa Phi honor society. She won the Florida State athletics academic award in 1984 and 1985. She hopes to pursue graduate studies in nutrition.

Lisa Ann Piazza (fencing, Columbia University-Barnard College, 3.140 in sociology)—She was a four-year letter winner and served as captain in the 1983-85 seasons. She was named all-America in 1982, 1984 and 1985. Piazza also was a member of the U.S. national junior fencing team in 1985 and a member of the U.S. world championship team in 1985. Currently, she is ranked fifth in the United States. She served on the undergraduate athletic council from 1983 to 1985 and as a student representative to the college committee on intercollegiate athletics. Piazza hopes to attend medical school.

Kathlene Ann Romsa (track, University of Wyoming, 3.680 in elementary education)—She holds school records in the indoor 60-yard hurdles and outdoor 100-meter hurdles and heptathlon. She won the High Country Athletic Conference heptathlon championship twice and was an all-conference academic team selection. Romsa was a member of Phi Kappa Phi honor society, Delta Kappa Pi honor society, and the dean's and president's honor rolls. She plans to pursue a master's degree in reading education.

MaryJean Elizabeth Wallace (softball, Adelphi University, 3.955 in earth science and elementary education)—She was chosen first-team all-region as a catcher. In 1984, she batted .457 to place second nationally. Wallace's career batting average is .357. She was a member of the geo-science club, education organization, Delta Tau Alpha honor society, Kappa Delta Pi education honor society and the dean's list. Her awards include the trustees' academic achievement award and one for academic excellence in earth science. In addition, Wallace taught emotionally disturbed and mentally retarded children to swim, and she worked as a softball clinic counselor at the Special Olympics. Pamela Joann Yates (tennis, University of Tennessee, Chattanooga, 3.300 in psychology)—She compiled an overall record of 66-31 in regular-season play for four years to aid the Lady Moccasins in winning three NCAA Division II Women's Tennis Championships. She was named all-America in doubles in 1983 and 1984 and also claimed the Tennessee-Chattanooga most valuable player award those two years. She was an all-Southern Conference selection in 1984 and 1985. She was on the dean's list seven out of eight semesters and graduated cum laude. She was a member of the International Student Organization and the psychology club. In addition, she helped arrange community functions for the elderly and handicapped at St. Barnabas Nursing Home. She plans to attend law school.

Lauri Ann Young (track, Northeast Louisiana University, 3.640 in radio/TV/film management)—Young won the 1985 NCAA Division I women's heptathlon title with 5,723 points. She was named all-America in 1984 and 1985 and currently holds school records in the heptathlon, high jump and javelin. She is a member of the Phi Kappa Phi honor society and Alpha Lambda Delta honor society and received several awards, including the George T. Walker Award for outstanding character, leadership qualities and proficiency in the classroom and on the athletics field. She was a member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and assisted the children's choir at Memorial Baptist Church. Young plans to pursue a master's degree in business administration.

Dooley considers race for Senate

University of Georgia Director of Athletics Vincent J. Dooley announced June 29 that he was considering a race for the U.S. Senate in 1986. Dooley made the announcement and then departed Atlanta for a two-week Scandinavian vacation.

He said he would run as a conservative Southern Democrat for the party's nomination to oppose incumbent Republican Senator Mack Mattingly.

Dooley, who has been head football coach at Georgia for 21 seasons, said that if he runs, he will resign immediately as football coach but try to stay on as athletics director for a few more months before taking a leave of absence.

Heck, Girardi repeat on CoSIDA's academic all-America baseball team

College sports information directors have selected Evansville's Pat Heck and Northwestern's Joe Girardi to their academic all-America baseball team for the second consecutive year.

Heck, a pitcher with a 3.920 grade-point average (4.000 scale) in computer science, and Girardi, a catcher with a 3.440 average in industrial engineering, formed the battery in the university division in balloting by the College Sports Information Directors of America.

Designated hitter Dave Otto of Missouri, however, had the most votes on the university division's first team. Otto, a 3.830 student in accounting, hit .484 this past season for the Tigers, with 15 home runs and 54 runs batted in.

Otto was followed in the voting by Notre Dame third baseman Rich Vanthournout, a .397 hitter with a 3.310 grade-point average in math and computer science.

Missouri was the only school with more than one player on the first team. In addition to Otto, second baseman Nick Ballo was selected to the team. Ballo, an economics major, compiled a 3.500 grade-point average.

In the college division, two players were named to the first team for the second straight year—David Banks of Troy State and Brian Bachmeier of North Dakota State. Todd Sutphen, a designated hitter from Central (Iowa), received the most votes among college division honorees.

Under the provisions of NCAA Constitution 3-9-(b)-(1), a male or female student-athlete with intercollegiate basketball eligibility remaining may participate between June 15 and August 31 in a basketball league approved by the Council.

USOC plans drug tests

The U.S. Olympic Committee has inaugurated a new program to control use of banned drugs by athletes vying for spots on the 1988 U.S. Olympic team, Secretary General George D. Miller said.

The USOC has set aside more than \$800,000 for the drug control program, which will begin with testing of athletes at the National Sports Festival in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, July 24 through August 4.

In a statement reported by the Associated Press, Miller said 20 of the 38 sports governing boards in the United States have agreed to go along with the drug control program.

Committee recommends power-rating system

Increasing the number of regular-season games and the implementation of a power-rating system to enhance the selection process for the championship tournament were recommendations by the NCAA Division III Women's Basketball Committee at its June 17-20 meeting in Hilton Head, South Carolina.

If approved by the NCAA Executive Committee, institutions would have to play a minimum of 18 games, beginning with the 1987-88 season, against four-year institutions within the U.S. to qualify as a candidate for championship tournament selection. The 18-game minimum is in effect for Division III men's programs.

As an aid to team evaluation in the tournament-selection process, the committee recommended the adoption of a power-rating system to help determine a team's strength of schedule.

The system includes the following point-award system: A road victory

against an opponent with a .500 record—six points; a home victory against an opponent with a .500 record—five points; a road victory against an opponent below .500—four points; a home victory against an opponent below .500—three points; a road loss against an opponent with a .500 record—two points, and a home loss against an opponent with a .500 record— one point.

One point would be added in each category if a victory is against a Division I or II team or a National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics member.

In other action requiring Executive Committee approval, the committee:

- Recommended that the following conferences be granted automatic qualification for the 1986 tournament: Chicago Metro Conference, Dixie Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, Iowa Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, Jersey Athletic Conference, Mas-

sachusetts State College Athletic Conference, Middle Atlantic States Collegiate Athletic Conference, Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, Ohio Athletic Conference, North Coast Athletic Conference, Southern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference and State University of New York Athletic Conference.

- Recommended regional realignments that would move Allegheny College from the Mid-Atlantic to the Atlantic region and move Carroll College and Carthage College from the Great Lakes to the Central region.

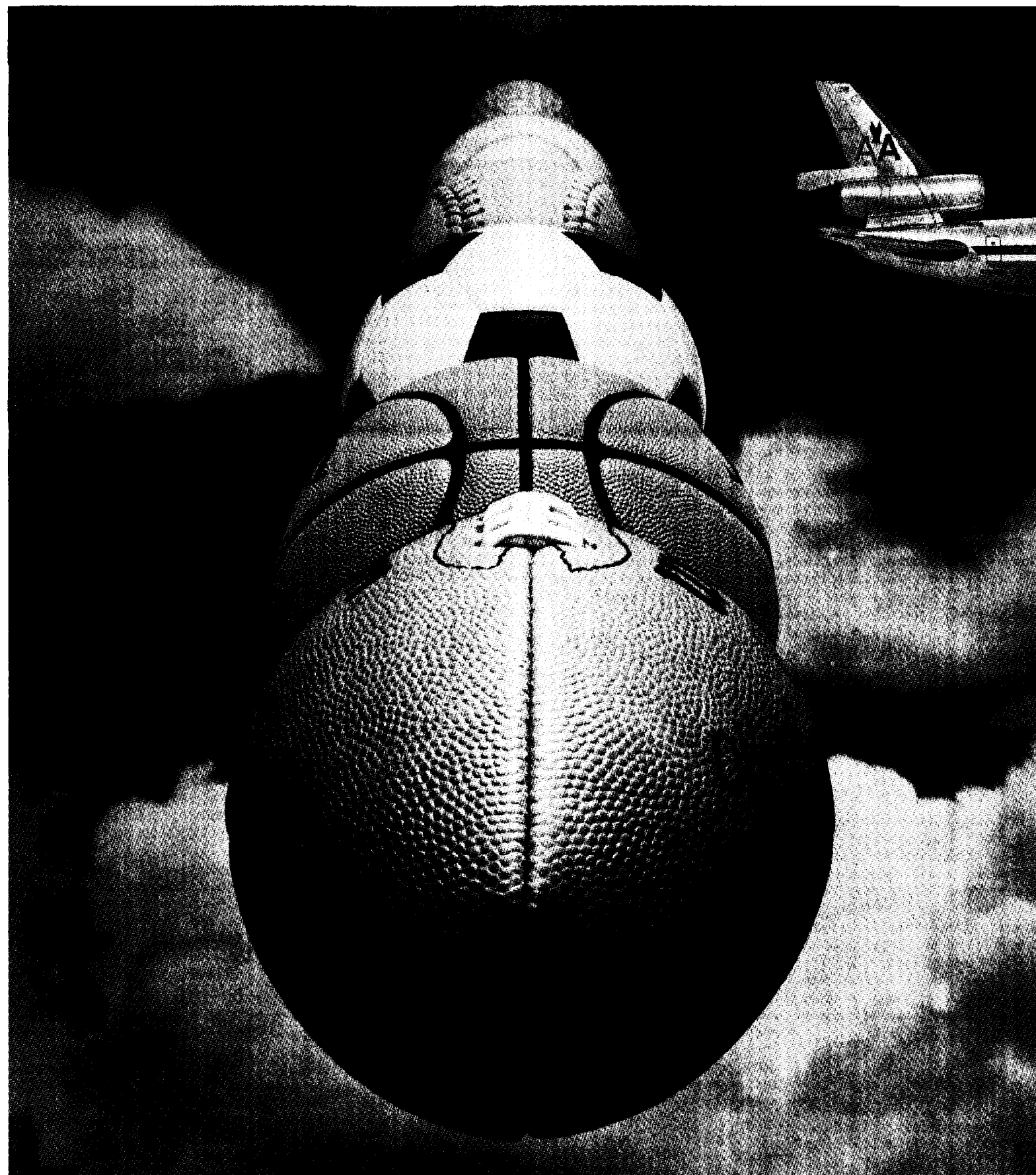
- Recommended that minimum ticket prices for single tournament games be \$3 and \$4.50 for two-game sessions.

- Recommended that, if necessary, two of the four officials assigned to the on-campus finals be flown to the

site from adjoining regions. This is an attempt to keep the same officials from working several games in the tournament involving the same teams.

In other business, the committee voted to set a deadline of 5 p.m. February 19, 1986, for receiving proposed budgets from institutions interested in hosting regional, quarterfinal and/or championship rounds of the tournament. Any institution submitting a budget for the finals could modify its proposals up to Wednesday, March 5.

The committee also set the dates for the 1986 Division III women's basketball poll. The conference calls will be conducted on the following Tuesdays: January 7, 14, 21 and 28; February 4, 11 and 18. Tournament selection will take place Sunday, February 23, with quarterfinal site selection set for Sunday, March 2, and site selection for the finals set for Sunday, March 9.

Discipline of members-Convention Proposal No. 3

At the recent special NCAA Convention, Proposal No. 3 (as amended by Proposal No. 3—1) was adopted, effective September 1, 1985, to establish distinctions between "major" and "secondary" violations of NCAA rules and regulations, to establish specific penalties for certain categories of violations (including repeated violations), to authorize specific disciplinary or corrective actions for institutional staff members found in violation of NCAA regulations and to authorize the assistant executive director for enforcement (upon approval by the chair or another member of the Committee on Infractions designated by the chair) to impose penalties for secondary violations subject to an appeal to the full Committee on Infractions.

The Council determined and announced to the Convention that the provisions of this legislation generally will apply to each case in which an official inquiry under the NCAA enforcement procedures is issued to the involved institution subsequent to September 1, 1985.

After the discussion in the general round table at the special Convention, the Council determined that the provisions of amended Enforcement Procedure 7-(d) (repeat-violator provisions) would apply under certain circumstances to a member institution that had been involved in a major case prior to the special Convention (i.e., a case that resulted in a penalty involving at least a one-year probationary period and sanctions prohibiting either television or postseason appearances). That case would be countable toward the repeat-violator penalty if another major infractions case, this one involving violations that occurred after September 1, 1985, is processed to completion by the Committee on Infractions within five years of the date the penalty started in the first case.

For example, any institution that received a major penalty in November 1981 could fall into the repeat-violator category if a second major case involving the institution was processed to completion by the Committee on Infractions by November 1986, and the violations in the second case occurred after September 1, 1985.

An appeal of an infractions case to the NCAA Council would not set aside the timing element in this interpretation unless the Council determined not to uphold the findings and penalty proposed by the Committee on Infractions.

In summary, for an institution in a previous major case to be considered as a repeat violator, the second major offense must be one that occurs after September 1, 1985, and within five years of the starting date of the initial major penalty.

In addition, a question was raised at the Convention regarding the penalties set forth in Enforcement Procedure 7-(d)-(1) for a repeat violator. It is the intent of this legislation that the first penalty (a prohibition on some or all outside competition in the sport involved in the latest violation for up to two sports seasons) be considered on a consistent basis with the second penalty cited in that paragraph (a prohibition of all coaching staff members in the sport involved in the latest violation from coaching activities for up to two years). Specifically, the length of the prohibition against involvement in outside competition by an institution's team in a sport should be consistent with the length of overall prohibition of all coaching staff members from involvement in coaching activities during that same period. This would not preclude the Committee on Infractions from imposing appropriate penalties on involved coaches on an individual basis.

Coaches involved in violations-Convention Proposal No. 4

The provisions of Convention Proposal No. 4 (effective immediately) require that restrictions imposed upon an institution's coaching staff member by the Committee on Infractions or as a result of the show-cause provision of the enforcement procedure be applied to the coach even if he or she is employed by an institution other than the one at which the violations occurred. The provisions of this legislation apply to any case in which an official inquiry under the NCAA enforcement procedures is issued subsequent to the conclusion of the special NCAA Convention (June 21).

Lingering issues are settled by final three amendments

While they did not rise to the significance of the other nine proposals adopted at the June 20-21 special Convention in New Orleans—and certainly did not receive the attention of the news media—the final three amendments approved by the Convention settled three lingering issues facing the membership:

- There will be no Division I-A or I-AA summer legislative meetings this year, due to approval of Proposal

UMKC considers move to NCAA

The University of Missouri, Kansas City, is considering moving from the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics to Division I in the NCAA, officials said last month.

Vic Swyden, chair of the Kansas City-UMKC joint task force on intercollegiate athletics, said the group could make a recommendation on the application by September. A final decision would be made by Chancellor George Russell.

The change would require the addition of at least two sports each for men and women, said Gary Widmar, vice-chancellor for student affairs.

No. 10. The meetings had been scheduled tentatively for August 7-9, 1985, in Chicago. In the future, the Divisions I-A and I-AA members of the NCAA Council will decide each year whether or not to conduct those meetings.

- Division I-A institutions that do not sponsor eight women's sports currently will be required to do so in the 1987-88 academic year (and thereafter), rather than in 1986-87. Proposal No. 11 resolved that question. Division I-A members now must sponsor at least six women's sports in 1985-86 and at least seven in 1986-87 before reaching the eight-sport minimum for women in 1987-88.

- Except in football and men's and women's basketball, member institutions in all divisions will not be required to conduct all of their intercollegiate contests in 1985-86 under NCAA playing rules in the sports in which the NCAA develops those rules. Adoption of Proposal No. 12 delayed implementation of that requirement until August 1, 1986, to provide time for the appropriate rules-making committees to allow for exceptions in cases of rules that are considered administrative rather than affecting competition itself.

occurring by coaches, alumni and other boosters and are determined to stop them. Presidents believe we must have stronger enforcement procedures and more stringent penalties, that there must be no question of institutional control of athletics programs....

"Colleagues, let me reemphasize that this package of legislative proposals is only the first step by the presidents of NCAA institutions. We must all anticipate a continuing effort, and your Presidents Commission pledges itself to this task—to do as much as legislation can do to eliminate corruption in intercollegiate athletics, to strengthen institutional control of athletics programs, and to enhance the efforts of institutions to provide for academic progress and success of student-athletes. This package will be followed by additional proposals in NCAA Conventions, beginning next January....

"We can make it very clear by our actions here today," Ryan concluded, "that the nation's presidents and chancellors are going to determine the direction and the major policies of college athletics, and that we are not going to condone any failure to comply with those policies."

After the delegates acted on the eight Commission proposals—including approval of two procedural amendments offered by the NCAA Council and referral to the Commission of a resolution offered by seven member institutions—they approved another "integrity" proposal. By a vote of 406 to 27, with four abstentions, they adopted an NCAA Council resolution (No. 9) calling for a one-time affidavit program to determine current compliance with financial aid legislation by student-athletes and head coaches at all member institutions.

I-A CEOs to rely on Commission

A suggestion that a 22-member Division I-A Board of Presidents be established was rejected soundly by Division I-A chief executive officers attending a special meeting held in conjunction with the NCAA's special Convention in New Orleans.

Instead, the Division I-A CEOs voted to rely on the 12 Division I-A representatives on the NCAA Presidents Commission for any necessary organization and planning involving presidential interests in that subdivision.

The proposed board—almost identical to the Board of Presidents concept that was rejected by the NCAA membership at the 1984 annual Convention—had been sent to all Division I-A CEOs by Edward M. Foote II, president of the University of Miami (Florida). It included the authority for such a board to veto or suspend Convention actions taken by the Division I-A membership.

Stating that he was "not wedded to that concept," Foote asked those attending the Division I-A presidents' meeting June 20 if he should pursue alternative structures for I-A presidential leadership.

Foote told news media representatives after the meeting that he was satisfied with the presidents' decision.

Presidents Commission Chair John W. Ryan, president of Indiana University, Bloomington, said the Division I-A Commission members would discuss in the October Commission meeting the current status of voting autonomy in Division I-A and means by which that segment of the Commission could provide the desired leadership for their colleagues.

Ryan said Otis A. Singletary, president of the University of Kentucky and chair of the Commission's Division I subcommittee, had agreed to serve also as chair of the Division I-A subunit.

lasted only three hours and five minutes—and only two hours, 28 minutes of that was devoted to presenting and voting on the actual proposals.

Unofficially, a total of 944 persons attended the Convention, including 199 chief executive officers. That was the largest CEO turnout ever, while the total attendance fell just short of

the 982 in attendance at the third special Convention in January 1976.

Judge denies media access to Georgia athletics records

A Georgia judge has ruled that the Georgia Athletic Association, which conducts the athletics program at the University of Georgia, is not subject to the state's open records law. Macon newspapers had sought access to financial records and documents of the association, which the judge said was a private corporation. The Midwestern City Conference has changed its name to the Midwestern Collegiate Conference, and the seven-member league announced it would play its postseason basketball tournament in Market Square Arena in Indianapolis February 27 to March 2, 1986. Also, members have voted to adopt a revolving three-year membership plan.

The University of Texas, El Paso, which just completed its best baseball season, has announced it will drop the sport to save money because the state legislature has forced an increase in tuition at state schools. By dropping baseball and adding men's tennis, the school said it would save \$90,000 a year. The board of trustees at Temple University has given unanimous approval for a mandatory drug-testing program of the school's student-athletes. President Peter J. Liacouras said, "Temple's program will be the model for the NCAA before it's all over."

Boston College has received a check for \$2,003,181 from the Cotton Bowl Athletic Association for its participation in the 1985 classic. The University of

Houston, the loser in the 1985 game, received the same amount but will share the money with other members of the Southwest Athletic Conference. The take-home pay is a record purse for the bowl.

Syracuse University has purchased a \$50,000 portable wooden floor for basketball games in the Carrier Dome. The Orangemen have used a polyurethane floor the past five seasons, and several players complained that the floor does not allow the foot to slide, causing knee and ankle problems. The Missouri Valley Conference has voted to return to two-man officiating teams for conference basketball games next season. Three-man crews were used during the past three seasons to improve the coverage and quality of the game. The conference said the three-man crews had not achieved those goals and a return to two-man teams would not have any negative effect.

The University of Kentucky athletics association has cut the number of passes to athletics events given to school officials and limited the inheritance of prized seats when a ticket holder dies. "Our allotment to coaches was too high and needed some attention," said Clifford O. Hagan, athletics director. The new guidelines emphasize that no complimentary tickets be resold, especially for more than face value, and that the ticket office issue all game passes. Veteran Bucknell University lacrosse coach Sid Jamieson has received the Gen. George M. Gelston Award, which is presented annually at the Hero's Lacrosse Banquet in Baltimore. The award is given "to that person who represents the symbol of the game of lacrosse, that person who has demonstrated outstanding individual character in the fostering of the game."

Pointing to his starting defensive unit, which has a cumulative grade-point average of 3.000 (4.000 scale), Central Michigan University football coach Herb Deromedi said, "In a day and age where athletics is being criticized in its academic pursuits, this shows that it is possible to compete in the classroom and on the field with distinction." The Chippewas (8-2-1) led the Mid-American Conference in defense last season. Forty-five of the University of Georgia's women student-athletes earned grade-point averages of 3.000 or higher (4.000 scale) for the spring quarter. Seven had 4.000 GPAs and eight others were on the dean's list.

It took only six weeks for athletics boosters of Upper Iowa University to raise \$17,000 for new uniforms for the Peacocks, who will be wearing Columbia blue and white uniforms with navy blue trim in all sports next season. A goal of \$15,000 had been set.

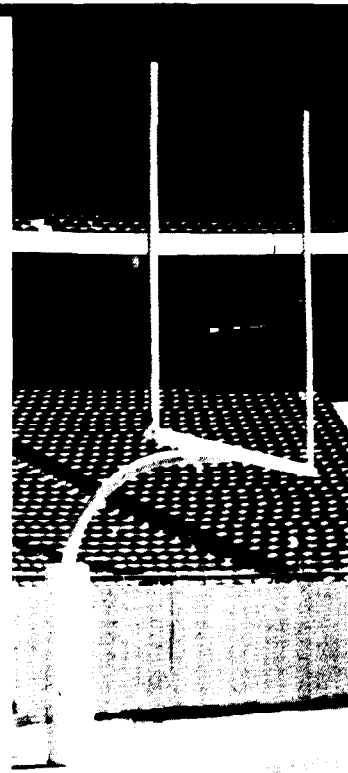

ed "intense discussions" on the problem with the FBI and the Federal Drug Enforcement Administration. He said the NCAA would embark on a "program of cooperation" including drug and gambling education clinics for students and athletics staff members.

Davis also testified that the NCAA would favor a law prohibiting newspapers from printing point spreads "were it not for apparent constitutional limitations" protecting the press from censorship.

His comment came in response to a statement by Vince Doria, assistant

managing editor for sports at the Boston Globe, who testified that newspapers publish point spreads on sporting events as a service to gamblers. "I think most newspapers have come to the conclusion that gamblers are readers, too," Doria said. "In fact, they are extremely avid readers of the sports pages. I think most of us believe that those readers deserve to be served."

Asked by a member of the commission if the Globe was printing point spreads as a tool for illegal gambling, Doria said, "I admit that in my statement, yes."

Doria called on the government to

legalize and regulate college sports gambling.

"The guy who wants to place a bet is going to find a place to do it," he said. He said that legalization would "take sports gambling away from organized crime."

Missouri cuts budgets by 20 percent in nonrevenue sports

Citing its poorest season for football attendance in 13 years, in addition to other factors, the University of Missouri, Columbia, has cut the budgets for nonrevenue sports by as much as 20 percent.

The Big Eight Conference champion women's basketball team is included in the 20 percent category. Football is being cut four percent and men's basketball 10 percent.

Athletics committee chair M. Joseph Bojrab, a professor of veterinary medicine, says he believes the women's basketball team and others with reduced budgets will remain competitive.

"We've got excellent coaches... these coaches will make these programs competitive. I know they will."

All-sports champs

The University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, men's athletics program and the University of California, Los Angeles, women's program were awarded best-all-around honors in the Knoxville Journal's annual national collegiate all-sports review for 1984-85.

The Razorbacks, winners of three NCAA team championships in 1984-85, topped the University of Texas, Austin, by 15 points.

The UCLA women edged Stanford for the top spot by one point in the newspaper's first review of the women's collegiate sports year. The newspaper has been ranking men's programs for 15 years.

Rounding out the top 10 men's programs were the University of California, Los Angeles; Oklahoma State University; the University of Florida; Stanford University; the University of Michigan, and Brigham Young University.

Other top-10 women's programs were the University of Texas, Austin; the University of Florida; the University of Nebraska, Lincoln; the University of Southern California; the University of Georgia; Arizona State University; the University of Alabama, Tuscaloosa, and Pennsylvania State University.

Investigation set

A former FBI agent now employed by Memphis State University will direct an investigation into published reports that athletes at the school have been given money and special favors, a state official says.

Roy Nicks, chancellor of the state board of regents, says a report on the investigation will be sent to the Metropolitan Collegiate Athletic Conference and the NCAA if it turns up evidence to support the allegations, the Associated Press reported.

The investigation reportedly will include reports by the Memphis Commercial Appeal and Sports Illustrated magazine that Memphis State basketball coach Dana Kirk offered \$10,000 to relatives of all-America Keith Lee while recruiting the 6-foot-10 forward four years ago.

Kirk has denied offering money to any athletes.

Lee led the Tigers to the semifinal round of the NCAA play-offs last year and is preparing to join the Cleveland Cavaliers of the National Basketball Association.

The Memphis newspaper and Sports Illustrated also have reported allegations that boosters of Memphis State athletics provided money and favors to student-athletes.

Memphis State officials have denied any knowledge of such gifts, which would violate NCAA regulations.

Nicks said the Memphis State investigation will be directed by Ben Hale, a retired FBI agent hired earlier this year to teach athletes how to stay away from drug dealers and gamblers.

On probation

Creighton University's basketball program has been placed on a one-year probation without sanctions for alleged violations of NCAA rules, the

Missouri Valley Conference said July 2.

League spokesman Jeff Hurd said the conference found that a "student-athlete was provided an extra benefit

a one-year probation with sanctions against the Southern Illinois University, Carbondale, basketball program, prohibiting Southern Illinois from participating in postseason play or

maximum of 2½ years in prison and a \$5,000 fine on each count.

Still accused: basketball players John "Hot Rod" Williams and David Dominique, student Gary Kranz and, in a separate but related case, convicted bookie Roland Ruiz and alleged courier Craig Bourgeois. All have pleaded innocent, as Olensky did before striking his bargain with prosecutors.

They are accused of conspiracy and bribery by shaving points against the University of Southern Mississippi and Memphis State University and of plotting to fix the Virginia Polytechnic Institute game.

Equal-pay ruling

A Federal judge ruled June 27 that the Madison School District in Illinois was discriminating against women coaches by paying them less than men

who coach.

U.S. District Judge William L. Beatty of Alton said he was convinced that discrimination had occurred, although finding specific instances was difficult.

The suit was filed by the Federal Equal Employment Opportunity Commission and alleged that the school district violated the Equal Pay Act of 1963 by paying lower salaries to the women.

The suit was filed in 1983 for Carol Cole and Luvenia Long, who later hired their own lawyers and amended the suit last year to include two other women coaches. The suit sought back pay, which could amount to \$10,000 for each woman. In addition, Cole and Long sought \$20,000 each in punitive damages.

Cole coaches girls' basketball, softball and volleyball. Long coaches girls' track and tennis. Last year, Cole got \$965 for coaching basketball, while the boys' basketball coach got \$1,900.

Mark Olensky, identified as one of the early planners of a basketball point-shaving scheme at Tulane University, pleaded guilty June 28 to two conspiracy counts in an agreement to testify for the prosecution.

In return, prosecutors dropped 11 other conspiracy and sports bribery charges against Olensky, 21, of Fair Lawn, New Jersey.

Judge Alvin Oser set sentencing October 11 for Olensky, who faces a
