### October opening set for Visitors Center

The NCAA Visitors Center, a visual showcase of intercollegiate athletics, will officially open its doors to the public October 27 and 28 with grand-opening ceremonies.

The 12,000-square-foot center, located in Overland Park, Kansas, at the new NCAA national office building, will capture the great moments in college athletics with a photographics and multimedia salute to the NCAA championships of the past and present.

Occupying the first floor of the

building, the center has been under construction for the last 18 months. Installation of the specialized exhibit displays and technical equipment is being completed this month with a series of NCAA-associated previews scheduled for early October.

"The opening of the Visitors Center is going to be, personally, a very satisfying and exciting time for me," said Richard D. Schultz, NCAA executive director, who spearheaded the idea for the center in 1988 when See October, page 11

# Complete legislation package will be mailed September 15

The Second Publication of Proposed Legislation, containing all 112 proposals submitted for consideration at the January 1991 NCAA Convention, will be mailed to the membership September 15.

Included in the booklet are all of the proposals being sponsored by the NCAA Presidents Commission and the NCAA Council, as well as all changes in the 59 proposals submitted by the membership that were published August 1 in the Initial Publication of Proposed Legislation.

The publication will be mailed to all members, including the chief executive officer, faculty athletics representative, director of athletics and senior woman administrator at each active member institution.

From now until October 15, the Commission, the Council and any eight active member institutions may submit amendments to the 112 proposals. Amendments-to-amend-

ments at this stage of the legislative calendar must adhere to the traditional Association limitation—they are not permitted to increase the change proposed in the circularized proposals. For example, the printed proposals include one to reduce from 70 to 56 the number of baseball contests permitted in a year. An

The survey is asking all NCAA student-athletes to indicate their opinions about the recruiting process, financial support and a number of other athletics issues. acceptable amendment to that proposal would have to propose a number between 56 and 70.

Amendments-to-amendments must be received in the national office on or before October 15. No amendments-to-amendments may be submitted after that date, except that the Council has the authority to submit such proposals, if necessary, at the Convention itself.

#### **Official Notice**

All of the 112 proposals (none can be withdrawn at this point) and all amendments-to-amendments submitted by October 15 will be printed in the Official Notice of the 1991 Convention, which will be mailed from the national office November 15.

The officers of the Presidents Commission will determine the order of the major proposals in mid-October. They undoubtedly will focus much of their attention on the See Complete, page 11

### NCAA to observe women's 10th year

The NCAA and its member institutions will celebrate a decade of women's sports championships beginning this fall.

Overall, female student-athletes participate in 16 NCAA intercollegiate sports. Twelve of those will be reaching their 10th anniversary during this 1990-91 academic year.

A number of recognition and anniversary celebration events and projects are being planned by the national office to salute the first decade of women's athletics in the NCAA.

The celebration activities will involve National Collegiate Championships in fencing, golf, gymnastics and rifle, plus nine additional women's championships in basketball, cross country, field hockey, softball, swimming, tennis, volleyball, outdoor track and lacrosse. All of these sports included women's participation in the 1981-82 academic year. The first Men's and Women's Rifle Championships were held in 1980.

Championships in women's indoor track and soccer and men's and women's skiing did not begin competition until the 1982-83 aca-



demic year, but those championships will be included in most of the celebration activities.

Anniversary programs will include distribution of a nationwide 10th anniversary logo, shown with this article, to be featured on all women's championship awards and trophies, plus a line of NCAAlicensed merchandise.

Several special events are currently in the planning stages. Included are special multimedia salutes at the women's 10th Final Four in New Orleans and at the annual NCAA Convention, scheduled for January in Nashville, Tennessee.

The celebration activities will include recognition in Divisions I, II and III.

More details of specific events, activities and promotions will be announced later this month in time for the first women's fall championships—Divisions I, II and III cross country November 10.

Every student-athlete participating in a 10th anniversary championship will receive a commemorative pin during the academic year.

The new total of 1,035 members represents a 1.6 percent increase in the past year —the largest increase since 1984. It also is the fourth consecutive year the total has exceeded 1,000.

Active membership rose by a total of 24 institutions, with the largest increase coming in Division II. There was a net increase of 16 new Division II institutions (8.3 percent increase). Division I increased by two, and Division III went up by six new members.

The only decrease in any of the categories is in corresponding members, where there is a net loss of 13 members due largely to a change in definition of that category.

New active members include Division II institutions Chadron State College, Emporia State University, College of Saint Rose, Shepherd College, Erskine College, Georgia College, Lincoln Memorial University, Newberry College, Queens College (North Carolina), University of South Carolina at Aiken, Adams State College, University of Colorado at Colorado Springs, Colorado Christian University, Fort Lewis College, Grand Canyon University, Mesa State College, University of Southern Colorado, Western State College and Oakland City College.

New active members in Division III are Albertus Magnus College; Waynesburg College (Pennsylvania); State University of New York and Wilmington College (Ohio).

There are four new conference members in the past year. They are the St. Louis Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, the Colorado Athletic Conference, the Midwest Intercollegiate Football Conference and the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference.

Affiliated members that are new in the past year are the Kansas Special Olympics and the Midwestern Independent Collegiate Officials Association.

The only new corresponding member is the Peach Belt Athletic Conference.

## nother group of interns begins stay at NCAA

A third group of NCAA interns began work last week at the national office under a program to enhance career opportunities in intercollegiate athletics for ethnic minorities and women.

The length of service for each of the interns will be approximately one year, during which on-the-job learning experiences will be provided for ethnic minority and female college graduates who have expressed an interest in pursuing a career in the administration of intercollegiate athletics.

The interns are assigned to work in specific departments. Also, they have been assigned mentors who will assist in their supervision, guidance and development. Interns also will receive training complementary to their academic and career backgrounds.

### Opening is set

Opening ceremonies for the State University of New York at Stony Brook indoor sports complex will be October 11.

The sports complex will seat 4,100 for basketball and volleyball and 5,000 for special events such as concerts and graduation making the facility the largest in Suffolk County. The complex also contains six squash courts, a five-lane indoor track, and improved locker-room and training-room areas.

Next week, the interns will participate in orientation sessions to learn about the functions and responsibilities of each NCAA department.

Following are the individuals (with undergraduate institution and assigned NCAA department) who received internships under the ethnic minority and women's enhancement programs:

Tracy Marie Ellis (University of Missouri, Columbia, publishing)-Ellis is a former basketball cocaptain and two-time all-Big Eight Conference player at Missouri, where she earned a bachelor of arts degree in art. She currently is enrolled as a graduate student in the university's school of journalism. Ellis' career interests include public relations, newspaper design and advertising. She is the mother of a 2-year-old daughter and has been active in the Columbia, Missouri, alumnae chapter of Delta Sigma Theta sorority, serving as parliamentarian, chaplain and custodian.

Terry Lynn Lynch (Texas Tech Interns arrive University, administration)—Lynch is a 1988 graduate of Texas Tech, where he earned a bachelor of arts degree in journalism, and he currently is working on a master of arts in sports administration at the school. ### Ruling is delayed on Vandy player's injunction request

A Federal judge has delayed ruling on a request by Brad Gaines that he be allowed to rejoin the Vanderbilt University football team while a lawsuit challenging an NCAA rule is heard.

U.S. District Judge Thomas Wiseman said he probably will make a decision on the request for a temporary injunction sometime during the week of September 10, when he plans to schedule a hearing on the lawsuit.

Gaines' attorneys filed suit in Federal court August 31 challenging the NCAA's right to ban Gaines from his final year of play at Vanderbilt because he submitted his name for the NFL draft.

Gaines was not drafted but under NCAA rules is ineligible to play his final year of intercollegiate football.

"The rule is not only unreasonable, it is unreasonably applied. It is not applied equally to baseball players and soccer players as it is to football and basketball players," said Roger May, one of Gaines' attorneys.

But NCAA lawyer William C. Branard called that "hogwash."

"These rules have been around 15 years or more and had never been challenged until two weeks ago," Branard said. He was referring to a similar suit filed by former Uni sity of Notre Dame running back Braxston Banks. His request for a



temporary injunction was denied. Gaines is one of 38 undergradu-

ates who declared for the draft this year. Half went undrafted.

Branard said Gaines made an

economic judgment and lost. Wiseman said Gaines knew the rule up front.

"Now, he's coming back after the fact and trying to repair the damage. He's not a kid—he's a 23-year-old young man," Wiseman said.

Paul Alexis, another attorney for Gaines, argued tht no one would be harmed if Gaines returned to the team, but Wiseman said he was not sure that was true.

"If he comes back, does he not

knock somebody else out of a chance to play, someone who did not choose to enter the NFL draft?" Wiseman asked.

### Legislative Assistance

1990 Column No. 31

NCAA Bylaw 14.1.2—validity of academic credentials

Member institutions should note that as a condition and an obligation of membership, it is the responsibility of a member institution to determine the validity of the information on which the eligibility of a student-athlete is based. Therefore, it is the responsibility of a member institution to determine whether a transcript is valid for the purposes of applying appropriate NCAA legislation to the eligibility of a student-athlete when the institution receives notification, or otherwise has cause to believe, that a student-athlete's high school, preparatory school or two-year college transcript is not valid.

#### NCAA Bylaws 14.1.3 and 30.9— Student-Athlete Statement

Member institutions should note that prior to participation in intercollegiate competition each academic year, a student-athlete must sign a statement in a form prescribed by the NCAA Council in which the studentathlete submits information related to eligibility, recruitment, financial aid, amateur status and involvement in organized gambling activities related to intercollegiate athletics competition under the Association's governing legislation, and in which the individual consents to be tested for the use of drugs prohibited by NCAA legislation. Failure to complete and sign the statement will result in the student-athlete's ineligibility for participation in all intercollegiate competition.

Member institutions also should note that there is a separate Student-Athlete Statement to be administered for each membership division. Accordingly, an institution with multidivision sport participants must utilize the Student-Athlete Statement applicable to the division in which each student-athlete's sport is classified.

#### NCAA Bylaw 18.4.1.5—use of banned drugs

At the 1990 NCAA Convention, the membership adopted regulations governing the eligibility of a student-athlete found to have utilized a substance on the list of banned drugs set forth in Bylaw 31.2.3.1. In accordance with Bylaw 18.4.1.5, the individual must be declared ineligible for further participation in regular-season and postseason competition in accordance with the ineligibility provisions set forth in Bylaw 18.4.1.5.1. The certifying institution may appeal to the NCAA Eligibility Committee

### Mailing cancelled

The planned distribution of a complete participant list from the series of NCAA compliance seminars held earlier this year will not take place as announced at the seminars and in coverage published in The NCAA News.

"In light of the bulk of the 1990 seminar participant listing, copies will not be sent to each attendee" said Kevin C. Lennon, NCAA director of compliance.

Those interested in receiving a copy of the list should contact Barbara J. Gregg in the compliance services department at the Association's national office.

In accordance with Bylaw 30.9, the following procedures must be used in administering the Student-Athlete Statement:

1. The statement must be administered individually to each studentathlete by the athletics director or the athletics director's designee prior to the student's participation in intercollegiate competition each academic year;

2. The athletics director and head coach in the sport in which the studentathlete participates must sign each statement as required by the prescribed form, and

3. The statement must be kept on file by the athletics director and must be available for examination upon request by an authorized representative of the NCAA.

for restoration of the student-athlete's eligibility if the institution concludes that circumstances warrant restoration.

Under Bylaw 18.4.1.5.1, a student-athlete who tests positive (in accordance with the testing methods authorized by the NCAA Executive Committee) must remain ineligible for all regular-season and postseason competition during the time period ending one calendar year after the student-athlete's positive drug test, and until the student-athlete retests negative (in accordance with the testing methods authorized by the Executive Committee) and the student-athlete's eligibility is restored by the Eligibility Committee. If the student-athlete tests positive for the use of any drug, other than a "street" drug as defined in Bylaw 31.2.3.1, after being restored to eligibility, he or she will lose all remaining regular-season and postseason eligibility in all sports. If the student tests positive for the use of a "street" drug after being restored to eligibility, he or she must be charged with the lose of one season of competition in all sports and must remain ineligible for regular-season and postseason competition at least through the next calendar vear.

The Executive Committee has the responsibility to adopt a list of banned drugs and to authorize methods for drug testing of student-athletes on a yearround basis. The list of banned drugs and the procedure for informing member institutions about authorized methods for drug testing are set forth in Bylaws 31.2.3.1 and 31.2.3.3, respectively.









## A proposal to make '90s decade of student-athlete

A common theme underlying the current college athletics reform movement is that today's big-business, high-television-exposure world of intercollegiate athletics has forgotten the very group for whom college athletics exists - the studentathletes.

Increasingly, the belief that student-athletes are not getting a fair exchange for their athletics efforts in gaining momentum. In the past, allowing student-athletes to "bask in the glory" of participating in college athletics and giving them a "shot at going pro" were considered adequate and appropriate benefits. If the athlete could squeeze in getting a education, that was an additional benefit.

Today, the media have focused on the disheartening situations of many successful college athletes of yesterday who did not conclude their athletics experiences with earning a degree. Sentiment is growing



that it is the university's duty to educate and graduate the studentathlete so as to better prepare him for life after eligibility.

Stated another way, encouraging the starry-eyed 18-year-old to invest all of his efforts in that elusive goal of becoming a professional athlete may, in fact, exploit his youthful naivete.

#### Signs of progress

Establishing the academic and

social welfare of the student-athlete as a primary concern is being addressed in a variety of ways. Obviously, reducing athletically related time demands presents the studentathlete a greater opportunity to focus on academics. By all indications, there appears to be widespread consensus to impose a limit (most likely, 20 hours per week) on required athletically related activities. Further, student-athletes are gaining a voice in the policy-making process at the campus, conference and NCAA levels. Some schools currently have student-athlete committees, and the NCAA recently formed a Student-Athlete Advisory Committee. It is expected that similar committees will be formed at the conference and institutional levels in the future.

Beyond these movements to reduce athletically related time demands and to give them a "voice," a more proactive stance seems appropriate. Specifically, student-athlete support programs must be more comprehensive in nature, and the directors of those support programs should be recognized as important and welcome contributors to relevant policy-making processes. Expanding support programs and encouraging their administrators to play an active role in the management of athletics programs should result in the 1990s being remembered as the "Decade of the Student-Athlete.

#### Mandatory study hall, tutors no longer enough

If the academic and social welfare of student-athletes is to improve, the support programs offered them must increase in quality and scope. This is especially important in light of the fact that an increasing number of student-athletes, particularly in the sports of football and basketball, are from socioeconomically and academically deficient backgrounds. The failure of our institutions to meet the individual

needs of these particularly visible student-athletes is tarnishing the reputation of intercollegiate athletics and higher education as a whole. Those schools that fail to adequately address the problem will suffer.

Instituting a mandatory studyhall policy and providing tutors no longer will be considered as having met an athletics department's offthe-field support responsibilities. To meet that obligation, athletics departments will be expected to offer comprehensive student-athlete support programs that include diagnostic-testing services, orientation programs, personal and academics enhancement programs (e.g., time management, goal setting, personality-assessment testing, study-skills enhancement), counseling (both academic and psychological), tutoring, and exit seminars (resume writing, interview skills, career identification, job placement).

### Looking Back

#### Five years ago

A survey of chief executive officers of Division I institutions showed very little interest in declaring freshmen ineligible for college athletics in any sport. Less than 20 percent of the 222 CEOs responding favored freshman ineligibility in any form. The survey was conducted for the Division I subcommittee of the NCAA Presidents Commission. #### Ten years ago

A total of 27 selected chief executive officers of Division I institutions attended the first NCAA-sponsored meeting of CEOs September 29-30, 1980, in Kansas City, Missouri. #### Twenty years ago

On September 18, 1950, the NCAA Executive Committee authorized the solicitation of funds from member institutions to enable the NCAA to participate with the television industry in a survey to measure the effect of live television on football attendance. "The hunch here is that the NCAA football death penalty, regardless of infractions, will never be applied again.

"Reason: The ban does not only suspend the sport for one year, it hamstrings the program for 10 years, maybe more. With basketball, a few ace recruits could bring the program back much quicker."

#### Tom Osborne, head football coach University of Nebraska, Lincoln The Kansas City Star

"The first time we had technology for drug testing came in 1984, and we put drug testing into place that year. And I know that college athletics has been using drug testing for five or six years and yet we continually get rapped on the head.

"The image nationally is not very good concerning college athletics. Quite frankly, I just don't see much of a drug problem anymore in college athletics. If there are instances of steroid abuse, it is very minute, I believe.

"The biggest problem by far is alcohol abuse on today's campuses. Every sporting event you see is being associated with alcohol advertising and sponsorship. I think we're sending today's youths a mixed message."

#### Edward G. Robinson, head football coach, director of athletics Grambling State University USA Today

"Because a guy is a football player doesn't mean he has to be a dummy. I want him to be a proud person, to work up to what he can be. You want them to be good family men and good citizens.

"You can be anything you want to be if you're willing to pay the price. One of those men could be the president of the United States. They have the right to think that way, and we have the right to coach that way."

figure if they go to the NFL, they're not as restricted as they are in college.

"Especially if you're in a money-crunch situation. There may be more of a reason to go out and jump the gun, whether you're ready or not. I don't think we should get any special privileges, but I think the NCAA should take into account what players go through."

#### Glen Mason, head football coach University of Kansas

CFA Sidelines

"You might think that I've got a great kicker at the University of Kansas (as a reason for his opposition to narrowing the goal posts), and I'm worried about taking away some of our scoring; but that's not the case.

"I guess that if I was just looking out for my best interests, I'd say let's make it as tough as possible, because we're not good at kicking field goals anyway.



They could widen the goal posts and put us in the middle of the hashmarks, and we'd still have a tough time, the way we've been kicking lately.

In that comment, you made light of the fact that it would not be difficult to get tickets for this game because of the lack of talent of the teams involved.

This sort of comment is particularly bothersome to me. I read sports pages from across the country every day, and I am continually amazed at the number of writers who on one hand demand that colleges and universities establish academic and athletics credibility and then turn around and make fun of the very people who do it right because they don't win games. It seems a bit games, but everything was done to try to win without compromising the academic credibility of the place or the student-athletes who played football.

Finally, I would say to you that the Northwestern vs. Rice game, or the Bucknell vs. Lehigh game, is just as important to the young people who play the game as is Penn State vs. Pitt. There is no difference in what it means to kids.

The media make these events more important than they really are. We are playing games, and that gets lost in all of this. It is play for the sake of enhancing the experiences for young people.

assist student-athletes financially in completing their degrees after eligibility is exhausted is necessary. If the athletics department does not provide such services directly, it will be responsible for incorporating student-athletes into campus-wide services in these areas.

Obviously, such increased services will cost money, making them a difficult sell in light of today's emphasis on cost containment. However, the alternative is to continue to be vulnerable to growing criticism and concern that student-athletes are being exploited by not receiving a "fair share" for their efforts. By improving such services, the athletics community will more effectively meet its end of its bargain with the student-athlete.

Although increased spending in this area may be a bitter pill to swallow, the ever-increasing media attention to college athletics reform is producing student-athletes and parents who are more informed regarding the realities of intercollegiate athletics experience. As a result, recruits are increasingly likely to ask, "What is your commitment to my academic and social development? What services do you provide to ensure that my life will be better by attending (and playing for) your institution?" These are good questions, and all prospects should ask them. Not being able to answer them may cost schools good players in the not-so-distant future.

The good news regarding such increased services is that some financial assistance is expected from revenues generated from the \$1 billion television contract for the Division 1 Men's Basketball championship. Specifically, the NCAA Special Advisory Committee to Review Recommendations Regarding the Distribution of Revenues recommended that a significant amount of that money be appropriated specifically for academics enhancement. At the institutional level, such a commitment may best be approached within the framework of reallocating existing resources rather than generating new resources.

For example, rather than building a \$6 million indoor practice facility, consideration may be given to building a \$5.5 million facility, while allocating the remaining \$0.5 million to enhancing the academics support program. The cost of doing otherwise — continued loss of credibility with the media, faculty, general public and the student-athletes themselves — may be far greater.

### Those being held more accountable

The core issue of the current reform movement is that athletics departments should be held more accountable for the academic performance and social adjustment of their student-athletes. Specifically, three groups will be held more accountable: athletics directors, as heads of athletics departments; coaches, because they have the most direct influence over student-athletes (they control playing time), and, finally, the directors of studentathlete support programs, because they deal most directly with studentathletes in the areas of academic progress and social adjustment.

Directors of student-athlete support services are more commonly known as academic advisers, although the scope of their responsibilities involves significantly more than academic advising. (In reality, academic advisers generally work under the director of student-athlete support programs, and academics advising is only one component of a comprehensive student-athlete support program.)

Although student-athletes themselves must be held accountable regarding their efforts to earn degrees, the above-mentioned groups will be held increasingly responsible for establishing an atmosphere that promotes academic and social performance and for providing the necessary support programs and services to meet student-athletes' special academic, personal and social needs. Additionally, these groups will be charged with the responsibility of mainstreaming student-athletes into campus life. Academic support personnel an important resource

Because of their daily and very direct contact with student-athletes, directors of student-athlete support programs can be an important resource to the athletics community. With the exception of coaches, no group has more contact with student-athletes than the student-athlete support personnel.

To attract competent professionals, schools are going to find it necessary to give these individuals title, status and salary commensurate with the importance of the position. To truly move the interests of the student-athlete to the forcfront of decision-makers' objectives, these people have to become a key part of the decision-making process—they should be a part of appropriate committees and policymaking boards.

In short, these are the people who deal most intimately with studentathletes in regard to their academic, social and personal development and adjustment, and thus they should be included in the dialogue and decision-making process at the institutional, conference and national levels.

Historically, academic advisers have not been considered vital components of athletics departments and were seen by coaches and athletics administrators as "the brain coaches" whose responsibility was to keep student-athletes eligible for competition. Academic advisers were viewed as representing academic interests, which, in the eyes of the athletics community, were often in direct conflict with the athletics interests.

Today, however, to meet the challenge of providing a well-balanced academic and athletics experience for the student-athlete, coaches and athletics administrators will need to rely upon and work more closely with student-athlete support staffs. **Athletics community** regaining focus

Although the college athletics community may have lost sight of its obligation to provide studentathletes with a legitimate opportunity to earn a meaningful college degree, most in the college athletics community sincerely believe that earning a degree is clearly in the long-term best interests of studentathletes and should be emphasized as their primary goal. To that end, the college athletics community has begun to take a few steps to reestablish the academic and social welfare of the student-athlete as its primary purpose by addressing issues of time demands and by opening lines of communication with studentathletes.

These initial efforts, however, must be supplemented by a reallocation of existing resources to develop more comprehensive studentathlete support programs and by including in the communication and decision-making process, in a meaningful way, those individuals who have more hands-on, day-today experience with student-athletes in the areas of academic and social adjustment --- the directors of student-athlete support programs. Addressing these areas in a comprehensive, aggressive and committed fashion will help assure that the 1990s will be remembered as the "Decade of the Student-Athlete".

### More funds won't buy good schools

Education Secretary Lauro Cavazos says Americans will invest a record \$384 billion in education this year, but "money alone will not buy us superior schools."

Cavazos released the Department of Education's annual "back-toschool" statistical forecast for the 1990-91 school year August 22 and noted that the spending projection is a 6.9 percent jump from last year's estimate of \$359 billion. The total includes local, state and Federal expenditures, as well as dollars from private sources.

"We must keep our attention focused on results," Cavazos said.

Higher education spending at public and private colleges and universities will total an estimated \$152.5 billion, 6.5 percent above last year. For each full-time student, the expenditure is projected at \$15,596, \$833 more per student than a year ago.

The report said 13.6 million students are expected to enroll in public and private colleges and universities,

Other highlights of the report were:

•The high school graduating class of 1991 is expected to total about 2.5 million, nearly 200,000 fewer students than in 1990, reflecting a decline in the 17- and 18-yearold population. ple will be employed in the nation's schools and colleges—about 100,000 more than a year ago. Nearly 2.8 million will be classroom teachers at the elementary and secondary levels, an increase of some 50,000; 760,000 will work as instructional faculty in colleges and universities, and 3.8 million will be employed in other professional administrative and support positions.

## Treat athletes same as other students, Illinois panel says

A panel studying undergraduate education in Illinois has issued a rebuke to the attention devoted to intercollegiate athletics and it has recommended that student-athletes be treated just like other students, the Chicago Tribune reported.

The panel of 23 faculty members, administrators and students representing public and private colleges and universities also urged schools to make available to potential athletics recruits the scholastic success rate of its student-athletes.

"Intercollegiate athletics has produced more dubious behavior by higher-education institutions and their constituents than any other area of academic behavior," the panel said in a report prepared for the Illinois Board of Higher Education "The academic performance and graduation pace and rate of intercollegiate athletes should be comparable to the performance and graduation pace and rate of other undergraduates in the same academic programs." The unusually sharp criticism of intercollegiate athletics comes as the University of Illinois, Champaign, awaits word whether it will face sanctions from the NCAA as a result of the alleged recruiting violations in its basketball program. Panel member Charles P. Wolff, a member of the Illinois board of trustees, said the committee's language was not motivated by problems at the school. And committee member Earl Lazerson, president

of Southern Illinois University, Edwardsville, said the criticism was a result of a loss of public confidence. "There's no question that... there's been a sense among the general public that there's some Mickey Mouse stuff going on with university athletics," he said. "We simply have to make sure that the first responsibility of the university and the student-athlete is to the athlete's academics work."



## Schools to commemorate long football histories

Nine NCAA colleges are entering their 100th season of varsity football this fall, but some may not celebrate that fact until next year.

They are Kentucky, Missouri and North Carolina in Division I-A; Colgate, Columbia and Virginia Military in I-AA, and Beloit, Earlham and Grinnell in Division III.

Starting this fall, the 100-season club included 60 NCAA colleges-23 in Division I-A, 13 in Division I-AA, just one (Butler) in Division II and 23 in Division III.

It is important to note the distinction between "seasons" and "years." More than 68 percent of the 100season club --- 41 colleges, to be exact-did not play football at least one year due to wars, epidemics or for other reasons. Only 19 played every single year.

A prime example is Columbia, the third college in history to take up the game when it met Rutgers in 1870 (Rutgers won, 6-3). The first two were Rutgers and Princeton, foes in the first game, November 6, 1869 (Rutgers won, 6-4). No games were played in 1871.

But Columbia played no games in 21 different years all before 1915, including a nine-year span, 1906 through 1914, when football was banned on the Columbia campus due to the many deaths in the game.

The death toll led a group of reformers to form the NCAA in 1906, at the insistence of President Theodore Roosevelt. Thus, Columbia has played 99 seasons in its history.

#### **Celebrations tricky**

The timing of 100-year football celebrations gets tricky. There are three routes to take, and it is easy to become confused.

For instance, Pittsburgh this fall is celebrating the playing of 100 seasons of football. The 1989 season was its 100th.

By contrast, Kansas last year celebrated its 100th season, and Missouri is celebrating its 100th this fall. The third route is to celebrate 100 years after the first game, even though the college may have played games in, say, 95 seasons, with no games played the other five seasons.

In this fall's group of inductees into the 100-season club, only one college-Virginia Military-has played games every year since its first game in 1891. Kentucky started in 1881 but played no games in 10 seasons. Missouri started in 1890 and did not play in 1918, and North Carolina started in 1888 but did not play three years. The others are in the following chart, which is a complete list of all NCAA teams that have completed at least 99 seasons of football entering this fall the first such list ever published by the

#### Faurot and Missouri

One of most noteworthy of the centennial football celebrations this fall comes at Missouri, where 88year-old Don Faurot, inventor of the Split-T option formation, is the central figure.

brought back (in 1935) the 33-yearold coach, bronzed, jut-jawed and as lean as the times in the Drouth-and-Depression 1930s, he had reeled off 26 consecutive victories at Kirksville (Northeast Missouri State). His nineseason record there was 63-13-3.

"The trim, ramrod-straight Faurot, a born leader as his mother said, was paid \$4,500. Years later, he said, 'Heck, I'd have come for nothing.' A brisk, take-charge, do-it-yourself guy, a straight shooter and excellent teacher, Faurot paid off the stadium debt with a long series of season openers at Ohio State's huge stadium. He refused to cut players from his squad, saying, 'Heck, I didn't become a starter until my fourth year."

At a dinner September 7, the honored included Faurot and former coaches Frank Broyles, Dan Devine (both hired by Faurot as AD), Al Onofrio and Warren Powers. The game the next day at Faurot Field was perfect for the Tigers until Texas Christian rallied for a last-minute victory, 20-19.

#### Detmer's big day

A 406-yard passing effort by Brigham Young's Ty Detmer in that 28-21 upset over defending national champion Miami (Florida) September 7 is not the Division I-A season high to date, but third behind the 443 yards by Oregon's Bill Musgrave (vs. San Diego State) and the 426 by Houston's David Klingler (vs. Nevada-Las Vegas) the same Saturday.

But it is the most passing yards against Miami's outstanding defense since Doug Flutie threw for 472 to nail down the Heisman Trophy in 1984. That was capped by his amazing "Hail Mary" pass (64 yards in the air with time running out) to Gerald Phelan, who outjumped three defenders in the end zone to win the game, 47-45. It was one of the most memorable games of the 1980s, and Detmer's big day is a good candidate for 1990.

#### **Back-to-back blocks**

Louisville defensive lineman Ted Washington blocked back-to-back field-goal attempts by San Jose State's Raul De La Flor, the second after time had expired, to preserve a 10-10 tie September 1.

The first attempt was a 32-yarder with just two seconds on the clock. During a wild scramble, Louisville linebacker Pat Fitzgerald tackled the kicker, and since a game cannot end on a penalty, De La Flor had another chance, this time from 17 yards.

Once again, Washington, a 6-5, 300-pound senior from Tampa, Florida, barged in for the block. Consecutive game-ending blocked field goals by the same player—has that ever been done before in the game's 120year history? Probably, but we have no record of it and no single-game individual record.

The single-game Division I-A individual record for blocked punts is three by Indiana tackle Tom Moorhead in 1942. (Kenny Klein, Louisville SID)

The list illustrates how football started in the East, spread to the Midwest and then the Midlands before reaching the South, with few exceptions.

Note that on the Division I-A and I-AA list, 12 of the top 15 are I-AA teams, dominated by the Ivy Group, with the Patriot League and Yankee Conference close behind. The Big Ten Conference and Big Eight Conference dominate the I-A leaders

#### Earliest teams

The list of the earliest teams presents a little different picture, with Columbia jumping to third and others like Centre, which had no teams for a number of years, showing up.

still a big part of the college scene in various formations, points out Bill Callahan, former Missouri sports information director. In wartime Navy football, he taught his option game to Bud Wilkinson, who won national titles with it.

Faurot posted a 164-92-13 career record with four bowl teams, topped by the 1941 Sugar Bowl team. Among his big victories with a 20-14 upset of Doak Walker and Southern Methodist in 1948. Just as importantly, he wiped out a half-milliondollar stadium and field-house debt and did it by recruiting only in-state talent. The smiling, thin man with the iron-grip handshake, who banned smoking and drinking, personified Missouri football.

Wrote Bob Broeg of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch: "When Ol' Mizzou

It was just the third Miami loss in its last 55 regular-season games. The others were at Notre Dame in 1988 and at Florida State last year (Miami was 3-2 in bowl games in the same span).

An elusive, 6-foot, 175-pound junior from San Antonio, Texas, Detmer frustrated Miami defenders with his remarkable escapes to complete 38 of 54 passes for three touchdowns. His only interception bounced out of the receiver's hands. Last season, he set all-time I-A records with 11.07 yards per attmpted pass and 8.92 per total-offensive play, breaking the national marks held since 1980 by BYU's Jim McMahon. His winning 175.6 in passing efficiency just missed the record 176.9 by McMahon the same year, and his 4,560 passing was No. 3 in history.

#### 97-yard fumble run

Georgia Southern cornerback Rodney Oglesby may have been the first player this season to take advantage of the new rule permitting the defense to run with a fumble beyond the offense's line of scrimmage when he dashed 97 yards to break a 7-7 tie in his team's 17-10 victory over Valdosta State September 1. His eighth career interception preserved the victory. (Matt Rogers, Georgia Southern SID)





following:

• The "Conference of Conferences" package, publicized often in previous issues of The NCAA News. That package also is sponsored by the Presidents Commission and by the Council, except for an academiccounseling amendment that the Council did not support.

 Recommendations by the Special Committee on Cost Reduction, several of which have been meshed with "Conference of Conferences" proposals. All cost-reduction proposals are sponsored by the Council, and a number-those that wound up being identical to "Conference of Conferences" offerings also are sponsored by the Presidents Commission.

• The proposals developed by the

publications-emphasize recruiting, eligibility and financial aid. Nearly 40 percent of the 112 fall in those categories, with 20 aimed at the recruiting legislation.

Here is a breakdown of the topics involved in the 112 proposals and some of the major proposals in each topic:

• Constitution: Eight amendments, including one to eliminate the conference voting privilege at Conventions.

 Personnel limitations: Six proposals, including one of the major reform-agenda amendments: to redefine coaching categories and reduce the number of coaches in each sport.

• Amateurism: Four proposals. including one that would make a professional in any sport ineligible for college athletics in all sports. • Recruiting: 20 proposals, including limitations on telephone recruiting, a recruiting "dead period" surrounding the National Letter of Intent signing dates, and limitations on off-campus recruiting contacts (three at any site) and evaluations (four in a year).

• Championships and special events: Four amendments, including one that would eliminate the dates for issuing and accepting invitations to participate in football bowl games.

Continued from page 1 the NCAA Final Four celebrated its 50th anniversary in Kansas City. "I am sure it is going to be very exciting for the general public as well," said Schultz. "I think the center will really help people understand what college athletics is all about."

The photographics displays will feature the 76 championships the NCAA conducts each year, with an emphasis on the current and most recent national championships.

In addition, the center will salute Division I-A college football, postchampionships merchandise and

licensed products. A special photographics exhibit,

entitled Game Day USA, will be on display when the center opens, and it is scheduled to be on display throughout the college football season

The project, which spotlights the pageantry of college football around the country, includes a coffee-table book produced jointly by Thomasson and Grant Publishers and the professional photography division of Eastman Kodak. A specially produced multiimage show about Game Day USA has been created for the Visitors Center and will be shown daily in the theater. The book is being distributed nationally and is available at the Visitors Center gift shop. The grand-opening plans will include a civic ceremony Friday, October 26, at the Visitors Center site at 6201 College Boulevard in Overland Park. Admission to the center for the weekend will be free, and the center will be open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday and Sunday. Scheduled to be open 362 days a year, the center will carry an admission charge of \$2 for adults and \$1 for students. Group rates are available for companies and tours. The center will be closed Christmas, New Year's Day and Thanksgiving.

### Georgia 'family' doing its homework

Editor's Note: This story is adapted from an article written by editor Jeff Hundley of Georgia Bulldog magazine.

Problem children at an Athens, Georgia, grade school — many from troubled families — recently prompted the wife of a University of Georgia coach to recruit guiding hands from a family of her own — the Bulldog football team.

When administrators at Oglethorpe Elementary School needed volunteers for the school's Homework Assistance Program (HAP), they sought help from Carole Hollis, who is married to Bulldog football assistant Joe Hollis. In turn, she called on members of the football team and other Georgia students, many of whom responded enthusiastically to an opportunity to work with children.

From that point, the effort blossomed to where representatives of the Georgia Athletic Association are involved not only in HAP, but in a mentor program that allows the volunteers to spend time with schoolchildren in activities outside of school.

"Putting forth the effort is definitely worthwhile," said Hollis, who spends many hours a day herself helping at the school. "We're talking about kids who run the risk of failing in the classroom or falling through the cracks. Once a kid fails, he's labeled. We're trying to help so that doesn't happen as much.

"We wanted to take the stress off the teachers who were trying to deal with these problem kids while at the same time trying to teach the other students," she said. "The need for these programs was definitely there."

To offer an example, there was a third-grader named William who frequently was expelled from school for fighting. Along came Bulldog flanker Kevin Maxwell, who spent hours with William as a mentor.

"William has done a 360-degree turnaround," said Joann Fine, his teacher. "He's now reaching his potential, if not going beyond it. He's really a super, great kid with a bright future. I see him someday doing something really wonderful for a lot of people." Credit Maxwell, who quickly

developed a rapport with William, for the change. "Kevin has been absolutely remarkable with William," Fine said. "He has to be a big reason behind the transformation William has made. Kevin has taken the time to show him that someone cares and that he understands exactly what William is going through."

"We hit it off right away," Maxwell said. "William had been waiting to talk to me for almost a week before I finally had the time to come to the school and meet him. When I got there, we walked off to the playground and talked for an hour and a half, mostly about sports. Ever since then, he's been like a little brother to me."

Said William, who has turned his attention from fighting to improving his reading skills and scoring high marks on arithmetic speed tests: "It's been pretty cool to hang out with Kevin. I've learned football plays from him, and he taught me the easy way to do math. Kevin is a nice person."

There are other success stories. Combative kindergartner Travis, a victim of fetal alcohol syndrome, was paired with two mentors— Doug Hubbard, a Bulldog offensive lineman, and Tonya Andrews, a member of the Georgia Girls, an organization of students who serve as hosts for visiting high school football prospects.

"Travis really needed a lot of attention," Hollis recalls, "and Doug and Tonya have done a great job supplying that. Travis now knows how to sit still in the classroom, and he can do the things that are asked of him. He's not Einstein yet, but he's making progress."

And then, there is Yvonne, whose lack of interest in school was documented with Ds and Fs on her report card. Through HAP, which is designed to encourage children to hit the books but to have a little fun in the process, she has begun making As and Bs.

"The Georgia athletics department has provided the backbone for these programs," says an appreciative Libby Godwin, assistant principal at Oglethorpe. "We've got football players and Georgia Girls helping out and may even get some basketball players involved. They've been a big force behind what we think we're accomplishing here."

Hollis has been involved in the effort from the beginning. Working with assistant principal Godwin and Oglethorpe principal Robert Bluett, Hollis assumed responsibility for serving as head of the Homework Assistance Program, which convenes after classes Monday through Thursday.

"We really felt the time had come for a program of this sort," Bluett said. "We had identified some specific problem areas and felt this was the best way to approach them."

As HAP grew, so did the need for volunteers. Utilizing her connections to Georgia athletics, Hollis quickly rounded up football players for the effort. She also enlisted the help of Linda Ford-Howell, volunteer adviser to the Georgia Girls.

"I thought it was a great idea, so we gave the girls the option of helping out," Ford-Howell said. "Going into the community to help others allows these girls, as well as the athletes, to have a well-rounded college experience. It also tells the community we care.

"By helping, we can tear down any barriers that may exist between the athletics department and the community, between blacks and whites, and even between the haves and have-nots," she said.

As HAP grew, it became apparent that a program was needed to help the children emotionally as well as academically. Thus, the mentor program was born.

At the end of the 1989-90 school year, more than 60 Oglethorpe students regularly were spending time with mentors. The majority of the mentors came from the Georgia Athletic Association.

Both programs enjoy enthusiastic support from the student-athletes and Georgia Girls, including several who sought out Hollins to volunteer.

"I had just transferred from North Carolina," said Bulldog offensive lineman Alex Millen. "I had a room-

mate up there who got involved in a similar program. When I came down here and heard some of the players talking about it, I decided to find out more about the program. I contacted Mrs. Hollis, and she got me involved."

Others, when asked, jumped at the opportunity to work with children. "When Mrs. Hollis first asked me if I could help out, I was gung ho! I knew it would be great to work with little kids, and I haven't been disappointed," said offensive lineman LeMonte Tellis.

Clearly, the schoolchildren are excited about getting to spend time with the football players and others affiliated with the high-profile Georgia athletics program.

"You can almost see the light bulbs come on in their heads," said Georgia Girl Tanya Dixon, who works with HAP. "That's what keeps you coming back to try again the next day. We work hard to help these kids, and they're working hard to improve themselves."

From all of this, a feeling of family has developed around children who sometimes come from less-than-desirable environs at home.

"I was talking with parents of one of our football recruits one time," recalls Georgia Girl adviser Ford-Howell, "and she commented on how our athletics program resembles a family. I thought that said a lot about the Georgia Athletic Association.

"When Carole needed help with her programs, she turned to us because she knew she could get the help she needed right here. Hopefully, people can appreciate the fact that we're working hard and that we do care."



### Renovations continuing at Northern Illinois

Work has been completed on the first two of four phases in Northern Illinois University's west campus athletics complex expansion and renovation plan, according to Gerald K. O'Dell, director of athletics.

Summer projects at Huskie Stadium and Huskie soccer field are finished, while work on the new softball diamond and renovation of the baseball field continues. Construction is being funded through a combination of university and donor dollars and is a part of a five-year master plan, O'Dell said.

Replacement of the 10-year-old surface in Huskie Stadium was completed in June. The multiuse artificial surface has newly painted football and field hockey boundary markings, plus red-lettered "Huskies" in both end zones.

Expansion of the strength and conditioning complex in the stadium's north gymnasium was the second project completed at the facility. Used by student-athletes in all 16 varsity sports, the complex was increased to 4,500 square feet, doubling its former size. New weight equipment for strength and conditioning work also was purchased.

Huskie soccer field was enclosed by a chain-link fence. The fence is the middle project of a three-year plan begun with last summer's construction of the playing field on Stadium Drive West. Future work will include construction of permanent press box and television filming platforms, additional bleachers, and landscaping.

Construction of a new softball field and stadium area began in early July. Plans call for converting the corner lot directly west of the Campus Recreation Center (Stadium Drives East and North) into a complete softball park.

Northern Illinois plans to have a top-of-the-line intercollegiate softball facility to go with its nationally recognized softball program, O'Dell said.

Conrad Miller Jr., administration and support-service project manager, is coordinating the softball field project, with the majority of the construction work being done by university crews. Field work, including placement of a drainage system and skinning of infield turf, is expected to be finished by early August. Construction of two dugouts and a batting cage, and landscaping and fencing of the entire complex, will follow the completion of the diamond.

Conversion of the baseball field from a softball facility is the last NIU west campus athletics complex project of the summer. First priority will involve moving outfield fences back to at least 390 feet. General field and stadium landscaping is planned.

"One of the goals for the reinstated baseball program is to qualify for the NCAA tournament. A quality facility for our players is one step toward accomplishing that goal," O'Dell stated.





### Elliott awards go to Burrell, Favor

Leroy Burrell of the University of Houston and Suzy Favor of the University of Wisconsin, Madison, who combined to claim six NCAA individual track championships last year, have been named winners of the 1990 Jumbo Elliott Awards, given annually since 1985 to honor the nation's top track and field athletes.

Burrell and Favor will receive the awards October 25 during a dinner at the Overbrook Golf Club in Radnor, Pennsylvania, near Villanova University. The awards were established in 1984 to honor the memory of the late James "Jumbo" Elliott, who coached Villanova track teams from 1934 to 1981. His Wildcats claimed eight NCAA team championships and 86 individual titles.


Burrell is the 1990 NCAA Division I champion at 100 meters. Earlier this year, Burrell won the Division I indoor long jump title



with a personal best of 27-0.

Burrell won the 100-meter title at the 1989 and 1990 Penn Relays, and his wind-aided 19.61 for 200 meters at the 1990 Southwest Conference championships is the fastest time ever recorded for that distance.

Favor's 1990 Division 1 championship at 1,500 meters made her the first woman to win the event four straight years. In addition to

### Nevada-Keno project started

A drive to raise \$2.5 million to expand the football stadium has started at the University of Nevada, Reno, which is considering leaving the Big Sky Conference.

Chris Ault, director of athletics, said a study had been completed on joining the Big West Conference. But he added, "It's in our best interest now to be patient.

"I would like to put the university in a position to be ready when the time arrives," he said.

The university needs a 30,000seat football stadium and an average 17,000 spectators a game to qualify for the Big West, which already includes the University of Nevada, Las Vegas. Ault said there will be many changes in intercollegiate athletics. Next January, he said, the NCAA will vote on new criteria for teams to be classified in Division I. He said these would include the requirement that the school finance seven men's and seven women's sports, which would cost the Reno school an extra \$500,000 a year.

That money probably would not come from the Nevada Legislature but would have to be generated by the department of athletics.

Ault said his study showed the community is interested in upgrading the sports program, United Press International reported.



Marshall's new football stadium will look a lot like this artist's conception

Marshall University has broken ground for its new 30,000-seat, oncampus football stadium, although construction of the horseshoeshaped complex had already begun in order to meet the 1991 football season deadline.

The \$30 million stadium will replace Fairfield Stadium as Marshall's home field. Fairfield, built in 1928, seats only 17,000. The new facility is modeled after the stadiums at West Virginia University and the University of Kentucky and can be expanded to 55,000 seats to meet

future demands.

The facility has 19 luxury sky boxes and a 75-seat press box, along with new locker rooms, a weight room and an exercise room.

The ground-breaking ceremony brought several state and local officials to help turn over the soil, including Southern Conference Commissioner Dave Hart, state scnate President Keith Burdette and state Sen. Ned Jones.

"Athletics is one aspect of this university. The people here do not have a loyalty only to football, but to Marshall University," Burdette said.

Sen. Jones represented Gov. Gaston Caperton.

"This is an opportunity, and you have to grab opportunities," Jones said. "As Marshall grows, so will its ability to generate funds (for the community)."

The stadium puts Marshall on track for a move to Division I-A. William Lee Moon Sr., director of athletics, made official his intentions of taking Marshall to that level of competition as soon as 1995.

## Briefly question was not trivial to some News readers

Rarely has nothing apparently meant so much to so many.

Specifically, you are referred to the trivia question that appeared in this column in the August 15, 1990, issue of The NCAA News, which asked if any college football team had gone through a regular season without giving up a point. The answer was yes that Duke University's 1938 team and the 1939 Volunteers from the University of Tennessee, Knoxville, had not given up a single point.

It should have been mentioned that these teams are recognized in the Division I-A section of 1990 NCAA Football, the Association's annual records publication (page 31). Because, in fact, one other nonscored-upon team appears in the book — on page 157, under Division II. Albany State College (Georgia) completed its nine-game 1960 campaign without giving up a point.

As this is being written, however, it is strange that nobody has contacted the News to point out Albany State's (Georgia) exclusion. But, we have heard about others.

Most memorable was Colgate University's 1932 team, which was referred to by three men who contacted the News—Colgate alumnus Brad Tufts, retired Syracuse, New York, sportswriter Arnie Burdick. and Joe Owens of the College Football Hall of Fame.

Owens, by the way, also noted that DePauw University's 1933 team did not give up a point.

And Tufts, now on Bucknell Uni-

versity's athletics department staff, suggested that the News staff "get your minds out of the South." Almost made it, Brad, but Colin Killian of Texas A&M University's sports information staff wouldn't let that happen.

He also wrote to point out that the Aggies' 1917 and 1919 teams completed eight- and 10-game seasons, respectively, without giving up a point.

Have we missed anybody else?

Trivia Time: Although many believe Colgate's 1932 team should have been invited to that year's Rose Bowl, it was not. What Eastern team was? Answer later.

Student-athletes at Philadelphia College of Textiles and Science graduated in big numbers during the 1980s, according to a survey recently completed by the school's athletics department. It revealed that 82 percent of the school's student-athletes graduated during the 1980s, compared to 52 percent of the school's nonathletes.

From the University of Missouri, Columbia, come the following academic notes on student-athletes:

•The freshman retention rate among student-athletes from the fall of 1988 to the fall of 1989 was 86 percent, as compared to the overall university rate of 79 percent.

• The four-year average graduation rate for student-athletes was almost 47.5 percent, compared to 46.6 percent for the general student body.

• During the 1989-90 academic year, Missouri's freshman studentathletes had the highest average ACT (22) and SAT (980) scores in the Big Eight Conference.

• Last year, 140 student-athletes earned grade-point averages of at least 3.000 -- and 21 earned 4.000s for at least one semester.

More Report Cards: Of the 81 student-athletes who made the dean's list at Bentley College last semester, 31 earned grade-point averages of at least 3.500 (4.000 scale)-and 13 of them exceeded 3.700.

The University of Michigan's women's athletics department has announced that 79 women studentathletes earned GPAs of at least 3.000 during the winter term, including 21 who had GPAs of at least 3.500.

Northeast Missouri State University officials recently announced that 54 student-athletes earned spring-semester GPAs of at least 3.500, including 19 who earned 4.000s.

Six student-athletes with GPAs of at least 3.800 were among a group of 89 who qualified for the spring-semester all-academic team recently announced by State University of New York Athletic Conference Commissioner Patrick R. Damore. All of those honored carry GPAs of at least 3.300 for the past three semesters.



## FTC files complaint against CFA's TV contract

The Federal Trade Commission has filed an administrative complaint against the College Football Association and Capital Cities-ABC Inc., saying their national television contracts are anticompetitive.

"We want to have the marketplace...determine what games are shown and when," Kevin Arquit, chief of the FTC Bureau of Competition, said at a news conference in Washington, D.C., September 6.

A CFA representative in Washington, former FTC chair Lew Engman, said the group would fight the action. He called the FTC complaint "a royal waste of taxpayers' money. I'm not aware of anyone complaining that there's not enough football on television."

### Baseball sets record for attendance

Good weather and increased promotion are two reasons cited for an all-time attendance record in college baseball last spring.

The annual survey by Collegiate Baseball newspaper showed 1990 attendance of 14,568,198, a two percent increase over last year's total of 14,282,547. The previous high mark of 14,383,152 was set in 1987.

Attendance at the nation's colleges and junior colleges, which totaled 5,231,371 when the first national compilation was made in 1979, has increased 280 percent over the past 12 years.

California State University, Fresno, set a season attendance record for a single school with 179,666 over 41 dates. Fresno State also led the nation in average per game at 4,382.

University of Hawaii, 118,305; 6. University of Texas, Austin, 115,752; 7. Florida State University, 106,081; 8. Texas A&M University, 74,507; 9. Stanford University, 62,763; 10. Louisiana State University, 50,644.

### Big Ten has TV pact for its play-offs

The Big Ten Conference and Prime Sports Network have entered into a five-year agreement to televise conference championships beginning with the 1990-91 season, Commissioner James E. Delany and Ed Frazier, president and chief executive officer of Deime Sports Net Engman said any CFA member can sell telecasts of its games to televisions stations as long as the schools do not sell to national networks or ESPN cable, with which it also has an exclusive deal.

"CFA is not a cartel," he said. "We are not interested in restricting output. We are trying to get more and more games on TV."

"We are disappointed that the FTC has decided to file a complaint against the CFA," said Charles M. Neinas, CFA executive director. "Such action, however, should not be construed as a finding that the CFA has acted unlawfully, but rather as an initiation of the formal hearing process."

The complaint said competition among schools and networks for college football games has been hindered and that "consumers have been deprived of the selection of college football games that would otherwise have been televised in a competitive environment."

The FTC asked that the CFA and Capital Cities appear before an administrative law judge November 13 in Washington. The FTC could void the national television contracts and prohibit the CFA from negotiating new deals for all its members.

ABC currently televises games under a contract with the Big Ten and Pacific-10 Conferences. The CFA's \$64 million, four-year contract with CBS expires after this season, and it is scheduled to begin a \$210 million, five-year contract with ABC in 1991.

In addition, the CFA has a contract with ESPN that expires after this season and a \$125 million, fiveyear renewal with ESPN that begins in 1991. Capital Cities owns 80 percent of ESPN.

The CFA is composed of 64 schools from all major conferences except the Big Ten and Pac-10.

The CFA announced the filing of the complaint at its Boulder, Colorado, office after Engman received the papers.

ABC Sports spokesman Mark Mandel said the network did not have a comment because it had not seen the complaint.

After the administrative law judge makes his ruling, either side can appeal to the five commissioners of the FTC. If the full commission rules against the CFA, the association can turn to the U.S. Court of Appeals.

The papers say that, "Competition among schools in the marketing of college football telecasts has been hindered, restrained, foreclosed and frustrated; and competition among telecasters of college football games has been hindered, restrained, forclosed and frustrated."

The FTC said these acts "constitute unfair methods of competition in or affective commerce."

The CFA began marketing football games in 1984. In June of that year, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled that the NCAA Television Plan violated antitrust law by selling national TV contracts.

"It should be obvious to the casual observer that the college football fan today has a varied and attractive selection of games available on television," Neinas said. "Therefore, it is difficult to understand how the CFA can be accused of restraining trade or restricting output," he told the Associated Press.
