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Gender-equity panel works to identify goals

An increase in the participation of women rather than a reduction of participation opportunities for men was identified as an objective of the NCAA Gender-Equity Task Force at its first meeting.

The group, charged with seeking equitable opportunities for both sexes within the NCAA, devoted most of its time at its July 9 meeting to identifying the problem and agreeing upon the best approaches to solve

The task force recommended no legislation to the NCAA Council. Since the committee will not meet again before the Council's August 15 legislative deadline, no be considered by the 1993 NCAA Convention.

Three themes

The task force's discussion centered on three major themes: Title IX, fairness and opportunities for participation (and how to fund those opportunities).

The group agreed that NCAA members should comply with Title IX and that the Association should aid them in compliance when possible.

In discussing participation opportunities, the task force stressed the need to broaden women's opportunities and determined that affirmative action will be required to accomplish that goal.

In that discussion, the task force reached the following conclusions:

- It may be beneficial to study the ratio between scholarships and squad sizes.
- Walk-ons should be encouraged in women's athletics
- More creativity should be employed in recruiting female student-athletes. Cooperative programs with national governing bodies and with high-school and junior high-school organizations might help in this regard.

■ The Association might consider additional sports such as synchronized swimming and badminton. Grants to conferences introducing such sports could provide an incentive for a pilot program.

The treatment of football also was discussed, and the following observations

■ Football coaches believe it is unacceptable to cap the number of walk-ons. They say they have taken the initiative in costcutting and now believe that 85 scholarships is the minimum at which competitive quality

Members focus on playing seasons

Slightly more than one-third of 104 legislative proposals submitted by member institutions and conferences for the January 1993 Convention deal with playing and practice seasons as outlined in NCAA Bylaw 17—including a series of proposals that would permit earlier competition in basketball or allow exemptions from contest

Among those 36 proposals per taining to Bylaw 17 is one that would permit a Division I member institution to play its first basketball contest on the Friday immediately after Thanksgiving, rather than on December 1, the date that becomes effective this year.

Other proposals in that grouping would provide exemptions from contest limitations for a variety of basketball competition ranging from games in Hawaii, Alaska and Puerto Rico to the preseason National Invitation Tournament and Basketball Hall of Fame Tip-Off Classic.

All 104 proposals currently are being prepared for printing in the Initial Publication of Proposed Legislation, which will be mailed to the membership by August 1. The proposals have been reviewed

Football hall finds a home

The College Football Hall of Fame will relocate to South Bend, Indiana.

"The city of South Bend, and in fact this entire region, has a long and rich tradition of support for college football," said William Pearce, chair of the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame. "...This corner of the world has been a vital and remarkable part of the game. It has produced scores of legendary players and coaches."

"And, of course, we're just minutes away from (the University of) Notre Dame—a school that has produced more than its share of great players, coaches and teams. These include coach Knute Rockne, George Gipp, Paul Hornung and, of course, Moose Krause—for whom the local National Football Foundation chapter is named—among many other notable hall-of-famers."

Since its beginning, the College Football Hall of Fame has grown to become one of the world's major sports shrines. Today, more than 500 players and coaches—those whose careers have exemplified the foundation's basic creed of "Scholarship, Citizenship and Performance"—are enshrined at the College Football Hall of Fame.

The hall had been located in Kings Mills, Ohio, near Kings Island amusement park, until earlier this year.

Coach helps Czechs

Boston College assistant men's basketball coach **Rick Boyages** recently returned from a trip to Czechoslovakia, where he assisted that country in developing its national basketball program.

Boyages spent approximately three weeks in Czechoslovakia before returning to the United States July 9.

Boyages served as a guest clinician during the trip, working with the nation's first-division club champions, Universitni Sportovni Klub Praha. In addition, he was a clinician and consultant at Camp Podebrady, a camp he founded during a trip to Czechoslovakia in 1990. It was the first coed summer basketball camp in that nation.

"My involvement with the Czech Basketball Federation has been both productive and heartwarming," Boyages said. "The young players and coaches, facing extreme

economic hardship, possess a great love of basketball and a sincere appreciation of my efforts"

Boyages was first invited to the country in 1986 by the federation. During that visit, he worked with Czech national and junior national teams and gave clinics for 100 federation coaches.

The 30-year-old Boyages, who was head men's basketball coach at Bates College from 1987 until joining the Boston College staff in 1991, also has helped develop an exchange program that brings two Czech players and coaches to the United States. The two current players are Julius Michalik at Iowa State University and Juri Zidek at the University of California, Los Angeles.

French football

Albright College will become the first American college to play the French national team in football when the teams meet August 15 in Vichy, a resort city about a three-hour drive south of Paris.

The game, called the Vichy Classic, will

be the main attraction of the town's annual American Festival. The French are paying the expenses of Albright's trip except for airfare, which the players are providing for themselves.

American football has become one of the hottest sports in Europe, and the game is expected to be televised nationally in France. And to provide all the trappings of college football, Baylor University's cheerleaders will be on hand, along with the Lions Club District 22C Honor Band from suburban Washington, D.C.

"They're even going to have tailgating," Albright coach Jeff Sparagana said. "They're having a dance, a barbecue, fireworks—a big celebration. It's going to be a little more extensive than regular tailgating. I looked over all the facilities. The field was in fantastic condition compared to what we see over here (in America). Everything I saw was first-rate.

"We think it's a great opportunity to globalize our players' education. A liberal arts education is supposed to provide a broad scope, and this is something that lends itself perfectly to that goal."

Committee taking nominations for officers, positions on Council

The NCAA Nominating Committee is accepting nominations for president, secretary-treasurer and Division II vice-president plus 12 NCAA Council positions that become available in January 1993.

Three of the five elected NCAA officers will be replaced in January. President Judith M. Sweet, University of California, San Diego; Secretary-Treasurer B. J. Skelton, Clemson University, and Division II Vice-President Anthony F. Ceddia, Shippensburg University of Pennsylvania, will conclude their two-year terms in those offices at the 1993 Convention.

One Division I Council member whose term expires is eligible for reelection. Four Division I members are not eligible for reelection, three Division II members cannot be reelected, and in Division III one member may be reelected and three members must be replaced.

The deadline for filing nominations is September 1, 1992. Nominations must be received by that date to ensure consideration by the NCAA Nominating Committee.

Nominations must be sent to Charles Cavagnaro, chair of the 1993 Nominating Committee and director of athletics at Memphis State University, as well as to all appropriate division members of the Nominating Committee (for example, Division I nominations must be sent to the chair and to all other Division I members of the committee). Nominations also must be sent directly to Fannie B. Vaughan, executive assistant, at the NCAA national office, 6201 College Boulevard, Overland Park, Kansas 66211-2422.

A brief paragraph describing the qualifications of each nominee must accompany the nomination form, which appears on page 18 of this issue of The NCAA News. The paragraph must include information about the nominee's administrative and committee experience.

The Nominating Committee has emphasized that all nominations must be submitted in written form. A separate form, with accompanying paragraph, must be provided for each nominee.

The Nominating Committee will propose candidates to serve as NCAA president, secretary-treasurer and Division II vice-president. The Division II vice-president position must be filled by a member of the Council.

Hard-working Fieber kept the NCAA on track

Walter Byers, former NCAA executive director, says that when Marjorie Fieber came to work at the NCAA, it was a one-horse wagon, and when she retired, it was a high-

And according to her boss of 33 years, Fieber never got the credit she deserved for keeping the NCAA on track.

"She went through the progress of handwritten records to the computer-generated ones of today and she probably hasn't been given full credit for helping the NCAA grow," Byers said, "She was the second person I hired (Wayne Duke, now retired as commissioner of the Big Ten Conference, was first) when we set up the office in Kansas City. She was one of the hardest-working and most reliable and loyal employees the NCAA has ever had."

Fieber and Duke were hired in 1952, before the office officially was moved from the Chicago area, where it had been run as a part of the Big Ten office. She was hired as

l Where are they now?

Byers' secretary, a position she held for eight years. The early years were nothing spectacular, she says.

On 11th Street

"We started out on 11th Street in Kansas City with three rooms and no air conditioning," she recalled. "We opened the windows to cool off but then we almost died from the bus fumes. We had an Addressograph with metal plates on it. There were no copying machines. We did all of our work on a mimcograph machine."

Fieber's responsibilities grew as the NCAA grew. In the early 1960s, the Association's bookkeeper left—"we couldn't keep them because we had such a peculiar setup," she said—and Fieber asked Byers if she could take over the position. "I volunteered to do that since I knew the setup. I told him that he could always get another secretary."

Fieber may not have known what she was getting into,

but she didn't seem to mind, either.

"We kept adding sports and the television (revenue) got bigger," she said. "We kept adding people to the staff. I didn't stop to think about it. I just kind of absorbed it."

In 1964, the offices moved to another downtown location. Then in 1973, the NCAA moved to "the new building" at 63rd and Nall in suburban Mission, Kansas. Meanwhile, Fieber kept plugging away as business manager.

A builder

"Marjorie, Wayne, Walter and Art Bergstrom built the organization," said current Associate Executive Director Louis J. Spry. "There really wasn't an organization. They had no money.

"In the early years, they depended on insurance premiums. The NCAA collected the funds from the institutions and used the funds as operating money until the premiums were due to the insurance company. They were tough

Ice hockey championship sells out

Officials from the NCAA, Hockey Wisconsin and the Bradley Center announced July 21 that tickets for the 1993 NCAA Division I Men's Ice Hockey Championship in Milwaukee are sold out. The championship semifinals and finals will be held April 1 and 3 at the Bradley Center.

With more than nine months remaining until the event, it is the earliest sellout in the history of the Division I championship.

Joe Sweeney, president of the Wisconsin Sports Authority and Hockey Wisconsin, said, "Bringing this tournament to Milwaukee has been a total team effort. A lot of people played a major role and deserve credit. This indicates to the nation that Wisconsin is the hockey capital of the country. We have the best fans, the best facility and we will put on the best NCAA ice hockey championship in tournament history.

Hockey Wisconsin, the group that secured the tournament for Milwaukee, consists of the University of Wisconsin, Madison; the Wisconsin Sports Authority; the Greater Milwaukee Convention and Visitors Bureau; the Greater Milwaukee Committee; the West-

ern Collegiate Hockey Association, and the Milwaukee Chamber of Commerce.

"The NCAA is extremely excited about the opportunity to announce a sellout for this championship," said Philip A. Buttafuoco, NCAA assistant director of champion-

With a seating capacity of 18,200 for hockey at the Bradley Center, the 1993 championship will set the single-session attendance record. Previously, the record was 16,632, set at Joe Louis Arena in Detroit in

Officiating clinics aim for consistency

"Each program should be developed and administered in an effort to reach a national consistency regarding officiating mechanics, philosophy and rules implementation. The programs also should educate coaches and athletics administrators regarding new rules, rules changes and interpreta-

Thus reads the mission statement of the NCAA Officiating Improvement Program, a series of regional clinics conducted across the country for six Division I sports - baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's ice hockey, lacrosse, and wrestling.

Several conference supervisors of men's and women's basketball officials say the clinics have been a great asset and have contributed to more consistent officiating nationwide in those sports. They concede, however, that problems still arise

"I think they're really belpful," said Dee Todd, Atlantic Coast Conference assistant commissioner and supervisor of officials for nonrevenue sports, including women's basketball. "I think officiating has improved significantly. But when you're dealing with individuals, you're never going to have everybody on the same page. As for consistency nationally, I don't know what it will take to get that."

Same message

men's and women's basketball be gan in 1986. Attendance is mandatory for officials and, in most cases, for an institution's head coach or a full-time assistant coach. Staff members from the NCAA, along with the national coordinator of officials for a sport, attend each of the clinics to ensure that the same message is heard.

For that reason, some say, if regional differences in officiating exist, they are subtle.

"(Officiating) is better than it used to be," said Patricia Wall, associate commissioner of the Southeastern Conference. "The supervisors and the officials are hearing the same thing from the same people. I think once you get to the NCAA finals, those officials

are considered so good (that) they're not going to be stylized by any geographical area."

On-court and on-field debates between officials and coaches have become part of the fabric of sports, said Art Mendini, assistant commissioner for officiating services at the Big Sky Conference. He said that there probably is little the clinics or any other program could do to change the relationship between coaches and officials.

"I think the clinics have really made officiating more consistent throughout," Mendini said. "I think we've moved a long way to getting it more consistent. But I think coaches are complaining more at all levels of basketball. That's the nature of the game."

Fewer complaints

Officiating in the Southwestern Athletic Conference may or may not have become more consistent, but Lawrence Collins, the league's supervisor of men's basketball officials, said his officials have received more positive comments from coaches than they did several vears ago.

"I think the clinics are very useful," Collins said. "It says we're singing the same song. Whether we're singing the same tune?...They're giving the same dose (at the clinics) and all of the officials know what we're looking

"I like the fact that coaches have Regional officiating clinics for to attend because I think they understand the rules a little bit better. I'm not sure if we're getting more complaints from coaches or not, but our coaches have been very positive about officials in the past couple of years."

> As far as Wall is concerned, there always will be an element of debate over officiating.

'My biggest concern is an attitude about officiating that coaches and fans have today," Wall said. "Their tolerance level is lower than it used to be. If I could solve any one thing, it would be to help the American public understand that it's not an exact science. Officials can call a perfect game if coaches coach a perfect game and players play a perfect game. And that's not going to happen."

Cost containment should start at top

Having coached for a quarter century at an NCAA Division III college where cost containment is a byword at times, and having followed closely the results of the NCAA Presidents Commission, I have some suggestions for colleges and universities in all divisions as cutbacks occur.

Cost containment should begin at the top. It is here where I have several questions. Could colleges and universities cut back the expenses incurred when coaches and administrators travel as representatives of their respective schools? Could we limit travel parties to conventions and postseason competition to include only those people directly involved with the activity? By doing so, we could cut back the "entourage syndrome" at NCAA Conventions, the Final Four and postseason games.

During the 1992 NCAA Convention, for example, I observed five and six representatives from several universities, yet only one vote per school is permitted. Also, could we not save vast amounts of money by having some delegates stay in economy-type motels—the type in which our teams most often stay? How about simplifying meals to soup and sandwiches at noon during the Convention?

Three months after the NCAA Convention, I observed a similar pattern at the Final Four activities in the Twin Cities, where cost containment may not have been a high priority with representatives from all schools

In an era in which schools are dropping sports, we could save some of those teams by limiting expenses at the top by sending smaller travel parties and economizing considerably.

Cost containment starts at the top. In many schools, we may be talking out of both sides of our mouth as we cut sports and limit games but spend extravagantly at conventions and postseason events.

Put in a different way, are we similar to heads of households who are unable to provide the necessities for their families, yet find the funds to party on Saturday night?

Playoff money difficult to ignore

As costs spiral, television revenue is projected to fall.

As schools drop sports, gender equity has become an issue. As state legislatures claim empty pockets, boosters point to the recession. In college athletics, as in anything else, money matters. In the present condition, it's a lack of money that matters.

Joe Paterno offers a solution.

"Last year, there was an attempt to put (the Universities of) Miami (Florida) and Washington together for something like \$40 million," the Pennsylvania State University football coach said before addressing the College Sports Information Directors of America convention. "We have to find ways to generate some income. If there's \$40 million out there for one football game that would be of interest

to the fans, then we ought to be thinking about it...."

Paterno said he is not talking about an extended playoff. "To me, where you think you can get by with a national championship game, or get by with four teams and a playoff game, that's fine." he said.

"You'd be in the same situation we have with Division I-AA. Two teams would play (14) games and two teams would play (15) games, and you'd play them when school wasn't going on."

Not that this would be a perfect system. Some team, omitted from the playoff, surely would cry foul. There are those who insist 14 games are too many and that a playoff would hurt players academically.

"Then what about the NCAA basketball tournament?" Paterno said. "They're just crying wolf."

What about the bowl alliance's intention of making a national cham-

pion clear cut?

"I think that's wishful thinking," Paterno said. "I hope they're right. I think it would be great if you could come out of the bowl season with a national champion eight out of 10 times, something like that. But I don't know how you can do that when you don't have the Big Ten and Pac-10 (Conferences) involved in that arrangement. Right now, the Pac-10 is playing really well. I think it's going to be really difficult to come up with the undisputed national champion."

Just as it is more difficult for college athletics to find the bucks.

"To me, the playoff, it's there, it's easy," Paterno said. "It doesn't affect the bowls, it doesn't affect anybody.

"That may be naive. There might be some repercussions that I haven't thought out. But I don't know how else you're going to get people to give us money."

Men's teams are more vulnerable

"What (achieving the Big Ten-mandated 60/40 gender ratio) means is you have limited resources. Somebody loses an opportunity. Somebody gains an opportunity. There's no question that when you don't have the resources to take care of everybody, you have to allocate your resources according to some principles....

"I think (eliminating some men's teams) is to some extent inevitable, and anybody who says it's not is not being honest with themselves. Some people—not all people—are going to have to drop some men's sports because adding to squad sizes doesn't really create great incremental leaps in terms of cost, but adding teams does."

"(University of Nebraska, Lincoln) football coaches say that a cut from 95 to 92 scholarships this fall is going to be hard to live with.

"And who can ignore the coaches of the program that brings in almost 70 percent of the \$15 million budget? That income supports all other sports (except men's basketball, which covers its own expenses), a new recreational center for the entire university and the Devaney Sports Center. The football program also has a multimillion dollar impact on Lincoln and the entire state every Saturday Nebraska plays a home game in the fall.

"Cut football, and cut the lifeline of athletics.

"But 'gender equity' isn't going away. So what happens? Nonrevenue sports for men are cut. A higher percentage of athletics scholarships go to football and basketball.

"Then, where is the gender equity?

"A girl softball player is going to have a greater chance at an athletics scholarship than a male baseball player. The girls' state 100-meter freestyle champ will be more likely to get a scholarship than her male counterpart.

"How is the problem solved?

"Let's see. The National Football League gets by on 47 players. The Big Eight Conference limits teams to 55 players on the road. With 92 players on scholarship for 24 positions (11 defense, 11 offense, kicker, punter), that means there are enough scholarships for four deep at every position. Would it be too much to limit the scholarships to 72? How about 68, and ask the third-string kicker to try punting?

"No? Too drastic? Still need a fifth-string deep-snapper? "Strangely enough, yes.

"The NFL gets by with only 28 teams. It gets by with a talent pool that is already trained by the colleges. It gets by

with dropping a bad player (recruiting mistake in college) and it gets by without having its players maintain a 2.000 grade-point average.

"Football should be left out of the 'equity equation' until somebody can show that 78,000 people will pay \$20 for a ticket to watch something else on Saturday afternoons in the fall."

Future of football

Charles M. Neinas, executive director College Football Association

"We have a need to develop a unified stance to protect college football. It's the old saying, 'If we don't hang together, we shall certainly hang separately.'

"Football may represent the last bastion of male domination. Women have proved themselves to be talented and competent in a variety of professions ranging from politics and medicine to the military and athletics. But just as there have been no recorded instances where males have been mothers, there have been no recorded instances that a female has ever played college football.

"But there, the similarity ends. While no one will attack motherhood, there are any number of critics that enjoy targeting college football."

Aluminum baseball bats

"The aluminum bat has caused a great deal of concern for pitchers and coaches. All you have to do is get the bat on the ball, and it goes over the infield, whether a pitch is inside or outside. (The pitchers) learn to pick and nibble.

"It starts in high school, or even before. By the time they get to college, they don't want to go inside very much. They throw a lot of breaking balls because what they're trying to do is miss the bat."

NYSP utilizes USA Today educational program

The National Youth Sports Program is the first organization to use an educational program produced by the partnership of USA Today and the National Education Association Health Information Network.

The program, "Today's Issues: The Time to Talk is Now," targets critical issues that impact today's youth. "This is a culmination of the long relationship we have had with NYSP," said Adam M. Naide, national account manager for USA

The program brings middleschool and high-school students face-to-face with today's issues and challenges them to make responsible decisions.

It consists of a teaching guide that is provided to the enrichment coordinators at each NYSP site and copies of the journal Let's Talk, which encourages students to write about their lives.

In the journal, a thought from a student is expressed, then the program participant is asked to answer a question on that subject. Naide said that much of the subject matter covered in Let's Talk—such as self esteem, peer pressure, social situations, gang violence and the consequences of decisions—came from NYSP, but the actual quotes came from the children involved with USA Today's educational programs throughout the country.

Naide said that the newspaper, ing in one of our programs. particularly the sports page, ties the whole program together.

"One of the links between USA Today and the NCAA is athletics," he said. "The sports page is very important to USA Today, and it can be used to teach children a lot of different things. Box scores can be used to teach math and recently, an article on Michael Jordan was used for a discussion on advertis-

"Today's Issues" will be used by approximately 53,000 youths at 163 NYSP sites this summer. Naide said that after a month of use, feedback from the enrichment coordinators on the program—particularly the teaching guide—was

I Compliance briefs

General Information

NCAA Graduation-Rates Disclosure software: The diskettes and the User's Guide for Version 1.00 of the NCAA Graduation-Rates Disclosure software were mailed July 2. The graduation-rates software is intended to assist Division I member institutions in completing the 1992-93 Division I Graduation-Rates Disclosure Form (92-6). Compliance coordinators of NCAA Division I member institutions who are interested in the software are asked to complete the request form that was mailed May 8 and return it to the national office.

1993 NCAA Divisions II and III Enrollment and Persistence-Rates Disclosure Form (Form 93-6b): NCAA Divisions II and III member institutions will be required to use Form 93-6b to disclose enrollment and persistence information to the NCAA. The NCAA Council has approved the development and distribution of Form 93-6b to Divisions II and III member institutions as an alternative to the reporting requirements specified in the Federal Student Rightto-Know Act. The form is scheduled for distribution in July

All Divisions II and III institutions must complete the form and send it to the national office by July 1,

Financial audit guidelines resource document: To assist chief executive officers of NCAA Division I member institutions in using and evaluating independent financial audit reports as mandated by NCAA Constitution 6.2.3, members of the compliance services staff are in the process of developing a financial audit resource document. The document is intended to serve as a concise reference tool that highlights key aspects of the audit report. Each section of the document will contain pertinent questions to key athletics issues that, when answered, should help identify weaknesses or concerns in the financial organization of the athletics program. The document is scheduled for distribution in late August.

1992 NCAA regional seminars: Regional rulescompliance seminars were conducted May 6-8 in New Orleans; May 27-29 in San Diego; June 17-19 in Chicago, and June 25-27 in Baltimore. Staff members have begun the process of reviewing the evaluation forms completed by those who attended. The compliance services and legislative services staffs request that those who have not completed the form do so and return it to the national office as soon as possible. All interested individuals are encouraged to submit suggestions that may assist in enhancing future seminars.

Resource File Checklist: By now, all compliance coordinators of NCAA Division I member institutions and conferences should have received a copy of the 1992-93 NCAA Resource File Checklist. The master checklist contains a complete listing of all of the compliance-related resource materials available from the national office. Condensed versions of the checklist (developed for use by chief executive officers, athletics administrators, coaches and personnel in the offices of financial aid, admissions and registration) were included in the 1992-93 NCAA Guide to Rules Compliance and distributed at the regional seminars. As of July, the compliance services staff has received and filled about 200 requests. Additional requests are encouraged.

can be maintained. They also maintain that the nature of football demands expensive support sys-

■ Others observed that a reduction in squad sizes may promote competitive parity. Some task force members noted their belief that in many cases, staff and athletes involved in football and men's basketball are treated better than their peers in women's and other nonrevenue sports.

Regardless, the task force agreed that Congress has spoken clearly about football and that the sport is to be included in the Title IX equation.

Funding difficulties

In discussing the difficult task of financing participation opportunities in the present economic climate, the following observations were made:

■ Cuts in scholarships have been made, but the savings has been virtually nullified by an increase in tuition and other costs

Draft principle on gender equity

The NCAA Gender-Equity Task Force formulated the following draft of a gender-equity principle at its July 9 meeting. The statement could change before it is recommended to the membership for incorporation into the Principles for the Conduct of Intercollegiate Athletics (NCAA Constitution, Article No. 2):

"Structure, programs, legislation and policies of the Association shall assert the value of equitable participation by, and treatment of, men and women in intercollegiate athletics. It is the responsibility of the Association to act affirmatively to increase the quantity and quality of women's athletics participation."

- California state law prohibits the use of state funds for athletes (some have suggested that state legislatures should appropriate scholarship money to aid female athletes)
- Supplemental Federal funding does not appear to be a viable. alternative.
- The U.S. Olympic Committee might be interested in supporting some sports.
- Programs should examine their policies for cost-effectiveness. For example, if a destination is less than 250 miles away, charter buses would be far cheaper than air travel and would get the team where it is going just as quickly.
 - Need-based aid will be ex-

plored in greater depth.

Championships

The task force also discussed NCAA championships and the effect they have on gender equity. In particular, the task force agreed to examine further the premise that fields for individual championships should be the same for men and women and that fields for comparable team sports should be based, in almost all cases, upon the number of men's and women's teams playing the sports.

The next meeting of the task force will be in in Washington, D.C., probably in early October. In the interim, subcommittees may be formed to examine pertinent

131,433 seek Final 4 tickets

The 131,433 applications received for tickets to the semifinals and championship game of the 1993 Division I Men's Basketball Championship in New Orleans is the third largest number in Final Four history.

The applicants requested approximately 262,600 tickets. Seating capacity for the 1993 Final Four, scheduled for April 3 and 5, will be approximately 63,000, and approximately 35,750 tickets have been allocated to the general public.

Fifteen percent of the applications were submitted from Louisiana, and 15 percent of the applications selected for tickets

also were from that state. Applications were received from 50 states and nine foreign countries.

Applicants could apply as many times as they wished; however, only one application per household could be selected. Applicants could request only one or two tickets. A Vax 850 computer designed by the Digital Electronic Corporation was used to select ticket recipients.

Game tickets and refund checks were mailed during the last week of June. Interest income generated by ticket moneys are forwarded to NCAA youth programs and drugeducation efforts.

Clemson athlete is reprimanded

The NCAA Division I Men's and Women's Track and Field Committee has reprimanded Clemson University student-athlete Scott Erbach after what the committee termed a "misconduct incident" during the 1992 NCAA championships last

In addition, the committee will withhold Erbach's per diem and travel expenses for the champion-

The committee determined that Erbach used a light shot during the warm-up portion of the competition. According to the committee, the shot was discovered by meet officials before actual competition.



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Year-round testing begins for track and field

Beginning this fall, Division I track and field athletes will be subject to year-round drug testing.

The program will be similar to the one implemented for Divisions I-A and I-AA football athletes in 1990. Year-round testing will be new for 71 members that sponsor Division I track and field.

Besides the year-round testing programs for football and track and field, the Association also tests student-athletes after NCAA championship competition and in conjunction with postseason football bowl games.

Testing for track and field athletes will not begin until the Monday after an institution's fourth week of classes.

Notification of testing will be provided 48 hours in advance. Upon notification, the institution will submit a complete track and

field squad list (NCAA Form No. 92-5) to the NCAA via fax machine. Only grant-in-aid athletes will be tested in track and field.

The NCAA will select randomly 12 track student-athletes for testing (six male and six female athletes who receive athletics grants-in-aid). For institutions that do not provide athletics grants-in-aid, the athletes will be selected at random from the squad list.

An NCAA testing crew then will visit the university. Athletics directors have received instructions for their department's role in administering the test.

Earlier this month, athletics directors at Division I members were asked to provide a calendar for the period from August through December so the testing process will not interfere with academic schedules. Calendars will be provided

later in the year for the period from January through June.

Track athletes will be tested for the same drugs as football athletes. Those drugs include anabolic steroids, diuretics and urine manipulators. Any athlete testing positive is ineligible for at least one year; the athlete is subject to retesting any time within that year and must test negative to begin the eligibilityrestoration process.

■ Drug-testing questions and answers

Proposal No. 53, which was passed at the 1990 NCAA Convention, authorized the NCAA Executive Committee to establish a year-round drug-testing program beginning August 1, 1990. These questions and answers were developed by the NCAA sports sciences division to assist member schools in educating student-athletes about the testing program and about eligibility sanctions for a positive drug test.

GENERAL QUESTIONS

What guidelines has the NCAA Executive Committee set for the year-round testing program?

Before the passage of Proposal No. 53, the Executive Committee recommended at its December 1989 meeting that year-round testing be introduced during the 1990-91 academic year with Division I football. In May 1992, Division I Men's and Women's Track and Field was added to the year-round program.

Samples collected during year-round testing are analyzed for anabolic steroids, diurctics and urine manipulators (for example, probenecid and related compounds).

Will the NCAA test at track and field championships and postseason football games?

Yes. The Executive Committee will continue to operate the postseason drug-testing program. All student-athletes competing at NCAA championships and postseason football games will be subject to testing at those events. Samples collected as a part of the postseason program will be analyzed for substances from all NCAA banned-drug categories.

How does the year-round drug-testing program operate?

Schools that sponsor Division I-A or I-AA football will be subject to year-round drug testing any time between August I and the end of that institution's spring term. The NCAA will test all Division I football programs at least once during each testing year. In addition, 25 percent of those schools will be tested more than once.

Schools that sponsor Division I track and field will be subject to year-round drug-testing between the Monday of the institution's fourth week of classes and the end of that institution's spring term.

Testing will be coordinated with an institution's academic and travel schedules.

Who chooses the student-athletes to be tested? How are they notified?

The NCAA will select student-athletes for year-round testing. Student-athletes may be chosen on the basis of playing position, financial-aid status, playing time, an NCAA-approved random selection or any combination thereof. The NCAA will choose 24 football student-athletes, six female track and field student-athletes and/or six male track and field student-athletes based on the institution's sports sponsorship. The institution will be notified 48 hours before the scheduled drugtesting and the institution will notify the student-athletes selected.

To what degree is the school to be involved with an NCAA oncampus drug test?

The institution will designate a site coordinator (repre-

sentative of the institution) to assist the NCAA testing crew while on campus, will provide the NCAA with institutional calendars in order to schedule testings, will notify the student-athletes to be tested, will have a representative present during the testing to certify student-athlete identity, and will be responsible for the security of the collection station and for student-athlete compliance with the collection protocol.

What time of day is testing conducted?

The time of testing will be decided by the institution. Student-athletes will be scheduled for testing according to their academic schedules. In most cases, testing will begin early in the morning and will be completed well before noon.

Will the testing protocol currently used for NCAA championships and bowl testing be followed for the year-round testing program?

There will be minor changes in the current testing protocol; however, any changes will be included in the 1992-93 drug-testing brochure. NCAA testing crews will continue to handle specimen collection at all NCAA testing events.

Where are specimens analyzed?

Specimens are analyzed at an NCAA-certified laboratory.

SANCTIONS AND ELIGIBILITY

What are the sanctions for a positive NCAA drug test?

The first time a student-athlete tests positive for any banned substance during an NCAA drug test, he or she will be ruled ineligible for *all* competition (regular-season and postseason) in *all* sports for no less than one calendar year.

If the student-athlete is later restored to eligibility and tests positive again for any banned substance other than a street drug (that is, marijuana or heroin), he or she will lose all remaining regular-season and postseason eligibility in all sports. If this positive test is for a street drug, the student-athlete will lose one season of competition in all sports and will remain ineligible for regular-season and postseason competition at least through the next calendar year.

When does the period of ineligibility begin?

The period of ineligibility begins at 12:01 a.m. the day the specimen was provided or was to be provided.

Do individual sanctions differ according to whether the student-athlete tested positive at an NCAA championship or as

part of the year-round testing program?

No. The sanctions do not differ. For example, a football student-athlete who tests positive from an NCAA campus drug test is subject to the same sanctions as the student-athlete who tests positive at an NCAA championship or postseason football bowl game.

Are there team sanctions for a student-athlete's positive drugtest?

No, unless a student-athlete tests positive before an NCAA team championship or a postseason football bowl game and the institution fails to rule him ineligible and knowingly allows him to compete while ineligible. Team standings from NCAA individual/team championships may be adjusted as a result of a student-athlete's positive drug test.

If a student-athlete is ruled ineligible as a result of a positive NCAA drug test, may be or she continue to practice?

Yes, unless the conference's or institution's rules would preclude this.

Many schools and conferences have drug-testing programs. Are they required to adopt these sanctions for institution- or conference-administered drug tests?

No. Although schools and conferences may adopt these sanctions for their testing programs, NCAA legislation requires that a student-athlete be declared ineligible only on the basis of an NCAA-administered drug test. Institutional or conference drug tests (as distinguished from an NCAA-administered drug test) would not affect the student-athlete's eligibility under NCAA rules.

RESTORATION OF ELIGIBILITY

What is the process for eligibility restoration?

Institutional requests for restoration of a studentathlete's eligibility should be submitted to the NCAA director of eligibility.

Are student-athletes tested during their period of ineligibility?

Yes. All student-athletes who are ruled ineligible as a result of a positive drug test and who will be eligible for eligibility restoration will be subject to NCAA testing at any time during their period of ineligibility. In addition, all student-athletes who are ruled ineligible will be subject to a mandatory exit drug test prior to the last month of their minimum period of ineligibility (for example, the 11th month of a one-year suspension). The results of any drug tests conducted during the period of ineligibility would be provided to the NCAA Eligibility Committee. The school will be responsible for the cost of the exit retest.

OTHER QUESTIONS

When will additional information about the drug-testing programs be available?

The annual brochure about NCAA drug programs will be mailed to all NCAA member schools and conferences in August. This brochure will contain information about the year-round and postseason testing programs.

An educational videotape about the drug testing programs also will be available this summer.

I baseball panel looks at big picture

Even though the NCAA Division I Baseball Committee made few recommendations at its summer meeting to the NCAA Executive Committee, it spent considerable time discussing the philosophy of the game, policies and championship procedures in preparation for its next meeting in November.

Among the major topics of discussion at the committee's July 13-16 meeting in San Diego were automatic qualification and the selection process for the cham-

The committee reviewed the specific philosophy of automatic qualification and the process used to determine deserving conferences. The committee noted the impact of automatic qualification, but stated that it believes it must provide only deserving conferences with an opportunity for their conference champions to compete.

It appears probable that 29 to 30 Division I conferences will apply for automatic qualification; however, with the present 48-team field, the committee likely will not select more than 24 automatic-qualifying conferences.

With regard to the selection process, the committee reviewed a recommendation by member conferences asking the committee to release its ratings percentage index information before selections. The committee will review the request and decide whether to release the information at its meeting in No-

The committee also discussed developing a guideline by which to select at-large teams for the championship. A subcommittee was appointed that will study the issue and make a recommendation at the committee's November meet-

Division I baseball

In other actions during its July 13-16 meeting in San Diego, the NCAA Division I Baseball

- Discussed the selection and announcement of regional sites and confirmed in writing that regional sites will be selected on the Monday before the final selection meeting. In 1993, the final selection meeting will be conducted May 23; therefore, regional sites will be selected and announced May 17.
- Appointed a subcommittee to review the ticket policy and procedure for the 1993 College World Series in Omaha, Nebraska. As a result of the second phase of the renovation of Rosenblatt Stadium, the committee will allocate an additional 3,200 reserved seats.
- Expressed its concern about on-field security problems at regional sites and the College World Series. The committee is concerned expressly with equipment manufacturers and other noncredentialed representatives who gain access to the field of play. The committee will address the problem at its November meeting.
- Voted to propose that all participants be required to attend all official championship functions, including press conferences, the pretournament banquet and the autograph session.
 - Discussed the dates and times of games at

the College World Series, as well as the idea of interbracket competition. The committee, however, stated that it was concerned about some of the inequities that would occur with interbracket competition, including inconsistent rest days and consecutive days of competition. The staff was asked to circulate a questionnaire and obtain comments on the issue from selected coaches.

- Voted to recommend that seeds No. 2, 3, 6 and 7, which last year played the first Saturday at the College World Series, play the opening Friday of the tournament. Seeds No. 1, 4, 5 and 8 would play Saturday.
- Discussed long-range planning issues, including the committee's earlier bracket-expansion proposal, which will be reviewed by the NCAA Executive Committee at its August meeting, and the contract for the College World Series.
- Cited and acknowledged the accomplishments of Gene McArtor, chair of the committee and head baseball coach at the University of Missouri, Columbia. McArtor's term will expire August 31. The committee stated that college baseball has grown tremendously during McArtor's five-year tenure as chair. He played a leadership role in the renovation and expansion efforts at Rosenblatt Stadium, David B. Keilitz, director of athletics at Central Michigan University, will chair the committee beginning September 1.

Division II baseball

In other actions at its July 7-10 meeting in Kansas City, Missouri, the NCAA Division II Baseball Committee:

- Adjusted the power rating index so that a team would receive two points for a win against a Division III opponent (up from one point) and two points for a loss against a Division I opponent (down from three points).
- Agreed to develop a marketing plan that will help gain exposure for the Division II championship and would include television coverage as a major part of the plan.
- Discussed the 1992 championship and agreed that increased attendance at the regionals and championship would be a goal for
- Agreed to begin the process of looking for a host institution for the 1994 championship.
- Discussed the NCAA legislative process and emphasized the need for all coaches to understand the process.
- Recommended that the following conferences and associations be recommended for automatic-qualification privileges in 1993: Great Lakes Valley Conference, Gulf South Conference, New England Collegiate Conference, North Central Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, Northeast-10 Conference, Northern California Athletic Conference, Peach Belt Athletic Conference, Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference, Sunshine State Conference, California Collegiate Athletic Association and Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletic Association.

Division II committee stresses regionalization

The NCAA Division II Baseball - realignment plan that would en-Committee has developed a detailed proposal for regionalization that will be reviewed by the Division II Championships Committee in August.

The recommendation was formed at the committee's July 7-10 meeting in Kansas City, Missouri. It states that for the 1993 and 1994 championships, when considering at-large teams, the committee will place an emphasis on selecting at least three teams from each of the eight regions. However, if conclusive data is available from head-to-head competition or results against common opponents, the committee would reserve the right to select the best team available.

The committee also will recommend that the NCAA Executive Committee approve a regionalsure regional equality in terms of sponsorship numbers and team

In another matter, the commit tee redefined automatic-qualification criteria and will submit the following applications to the Division II Championships Committee for approval:

- Conference record the previous season.
- Conference record vs. Division II teams the previous season.
- Conference schedule strength.
- Conference results for the past five years in NCAA championship competition.
- Conference rank the preceding year in the automatic-qualification analysis.

If approved, the criteria would first be used for the 1994 championship.

Concerns of rules committee voiced to bat manufacturers

In an effort to maintain the integrity of intercollegiate baseball and a balance between offense and defense, the NCAA Baseball Rules Committee met with representatives of six bat manufacturers to discuss the current performance level of the nonwood bat.

During its July 7-10 meeting in Kansas City, Missouri, the committee reviewed possible procedures and testing methods that would control performance and reviewed the results of a recent nonwoodbat survey that was completed by a significant number of college base-

Hal Smeltzly, director of athletics at Florida Southern College and chair of the committee, said he was pleased with the level of cooperation from the manufacturers and stressed that the meeting was a continuation of previous nonwood-bat meetings held in 1986

Representatives from Worth Sports Co., Rawlings Sporting Goods Co., Hillerich & Bradsby (Louisville Slugger), Easton Sports, Baum Research and Development, and American Modern Metals Corp. attended the meeting.

The committee started the process of gathering information on the performance level of the nonwood bat and possible testing procedures by allowing each of the six representatives a 10-minute opening statement. The committee and manufacturers then exchanged ideas in a question-and-answer

Among the topics that were discussed regarding bat-performance standards were the effects of weight differential, handle flex, length of hitting surface, and new metal alloys and composite mate-

The committee asked for, and the manufacturers agreed to provide, more detailed written docu-

Baseball rules

In other rules and administrative actions at its July 7-10 meeting in Kansas City, Missouri, the NCAA Baseball Rules Committee:

- Renumbered Rule 1-15-b Note to Rule 5-2-d. A new note has been added so that during a contest, any scouting information from nonuniformed team personnel outside of the playing field shall not be transmitted to the field; however, a team may film or videotape its game without relaying information to the dugout area or field.
- Added an approved ruling to the definition of "Obstruction" in Rule 2: "Obstruction shall be called on a defensive player who blocks off a base or home plate from a base runner while not in possession of, or in the immediate act of, catching the ball."
- Defined "time of the pitch" in Rule 2: "The time of the pitch is 1) in the wind-up, when the pitcher makes any movement habitually connected with the delivery to the plate, or 2) in the set position, when the pitcher separates the hands prior to the delivery to the plate.
- Added wording to Rule 7-11-p so that the ball is dead and no runner may advance when, after hitting or bunting a foul ball, the player intentionally deflects the course of the ball in any manner while running to first base, or the player interferes with the catcher's attempt to field a third strike.
- Redefined Rule 8-3-c so that if obstruction by a fielder is committed against a batter-runner before the player reaches first base or is committed against a runner while a play is being made, the ball is dead and the obstructed runner is awarded at least one base beyond the base last touched.
- Added to Rule 8-3-f (Entitled to Bases) so that in the event of a thrown ball, the individual shall be entitled to two bases. If it is a pitch, the individual shall be entitled to one base.
- Added an exception to Rule 8-3-m Note 1: "For the purpose of this rule, the act of fielding the ball is not considered a play, and neither is a faked or feinted throw. A 'play' must be a legitimate attempt by a fielder to retire a runner."
- Revised the penalty in Rule 9-1-a Note 5 (a pitcher who moves from the wind-up position to the set position) so that with the bases occupied, a balk shall be called. With the bases unoccupied, the umpire shall declare no pitch, and the ball shall be declared
- Voted that an oval-handled bat may not be used in NCAA competition because it does not meet the specifications of Rule 1-

Realignment tops III basketball meetings

Men recommend changes in certain areas

Basketball Championship has resulted in a careful study of realignment by the Division III Men's Basketball Committee.

While two recommendations are being made by the committee to account for increased strength in certain regions, substantial realignment will wait for at least one

Meeting July 14-17 in Kansas City, Missouri, the Division III men's committee had a lengthy discussion regarding realignment. An increasing number of schools with membership in both the NCAA and the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics

Women vote for realignment in two regions

Regional realignment was the primary topic at the NCAA Division III Women's Basketball Committee meeting July 7-10 in Kansas City, Missouri.

The committee voted to request a realignment of two regions. It will recommend to the NCAA Executive Committee that the state of Pennsylvania be split in half for regional purposes, with the eastern half of the state and New Jersey forming the Mid-Atlantic region and the western half of the state aligning with Maryland and Delaware to form the Atlantic region.

Twenty-one schools would be affected by the proposed realignment. Schools moving from the current Mid-Atlantic region to the Atlantic region would be Carnegie Mellon University, Grove City College, Pennsylvania State University-Behrend College, Thiel College, Washington and Jefferson College, and Waynesburg College.

Schools that would move from the Atlantic region to the Mid-

An influx of new members eli- are electing to participate in the gible for the Division III Men's Division III championship. The committee determined those schools are affecting the strength of certain regions.

> After the discussion, the committee voted to recommend to the NCAA Executive Committee that the Midwest region receive a minimum of five berths and a maximum of six berths in the 1993 championship. Currently, each region is guaranteed a minimum of four and a maximum of six spots in the tournament. Distribution of berths to the other seven regions will remain the same.

In addition, the committee will recommend that beginning with the 1994 scason, the following nine schools be moved from the East region to the Atlantic region: Manhattanville College, State University of New York Maritime College, College of Mount St. Vincent, New York University, State University College at Old Westbury, Polytechnic University (New York), State University of New York at Stony Brook, U.S. Merchant Marine Academy and Yeshiva University.

Since the basketball committee is uncertain how many more schools will choose to participate in NCAA championships, the committee thought it unwise to realign regions, thinking that even more region-switching would be required in the next few years. The realignment issue will be revisited by the committee next year.

Men's, women's rifle committee wants questionnaire developed

The NCAA Men's and Women's Rifle Committee has recommended that the national office staff send a questionnaire to institutions sponsoring the sport to determine interest in changing the smallbore portion of the championships format and to determine the number of females participating in rifle.

The committee met July 6-9 in Whitefish, Montana.

Institutions sponsoring rifle will be asked if they support changing from the current 120-shot course used for smallbore rifle to a 60shot course. Two rifles are used in the championships—air rifle and smallbore.

Because of the Association's interest in gender equity, the committee also wants to know how many women participate in rifle.

Under NCAA sports-sponsor-

The 1996 Final Four will be at the Meadowlands Arena in East Rutherford, New Jersey. Hosts for all sessions of the 1994 and 1995 championships already have been selected.

Committee examines women's epee options

The NCAA Men's and Women's Fencing Committee has begun studying the development of women's epec in collegiate competition and the inclusion of the weapon in the NCAA Men's and Women's Fencing Championships.

At its annual meeting June 30-July 3 in Kansas City, Missouri, the committee appointed a two-person subcommittee to begin work on a plan for phasing in women's epec over the next few years. The subcommittee members are David M. Micahnik, men's and women's fencing coach at the University of Pennsylvania, and Merry L. Ormsby, associate athletics director and senior woman athletics administrator at Columbia University-Barnard College.

Micabnik and Ormsby hope to present a proposal to the full committee this fall. The inclusion of women's cpee in the NCAA championships is subject to approval by the NCAA Executive Committee.

Before appointing the subcommittee, the group heard a proposal from committee member Laurence D. Schiller, men's and women's fencing coach at Northwestern University, to phase in women's epee by first encouraging it in dual-meet competition, then incorporating it into conference and regional tournaments, and finally making it a scoring event in the NCAA championships.

Micahnik said the phase-in ap-

proach makes sense because institutions currently are not recruiting woman fencers in epec, and it would give women's coaches time to improve their expertise in the weapon. That approach also allows institutions to include the weapon in their budgeting and personnel plans.

The addition of women's epec would increase the number of female student-athletes—and improve the balance between men and women at the NCAA fencing championships—at a time when gender-equity concerns have prompted NCAA member institutions to search for ways to increase sports participation by women. Some committee members believe that more institutions may sponsor the sport if it provides more opportunities for women.

Micahnik believes these factors are good reasons to develop women's epee, but he also sees it as "something we ought to be doing anyway."

Most collegiate competition is conducted in the four weapons that are fenced at the NCAA championships: men's foil, men's epec, men's sabre and women's foil. However, most noncollegiate club and international competition—including the United States Fencing Association national championships, junior tournaments and senior events—includes women's epec.

Cal State Hayward cited

The Division II subcommittee of the NCAA Women's Softball Committee has publicly reprimanded California State University, Hayward, for public behavior by its student-athletes that the subcommittee said "discredited the sport of softball" at the 1992 NCAA Division II Women's Softball Championship.

In addition, the subcommittee will withhold a total of \$1,846 of Cal State Hayward's transportation and per diem allowances.

Chris Bellotto, women's softball coach at Florida Southern College

and chair of the Division II subcommittee, said the behavior occurred at the team's hotel after the championship. "The conduct displayed in this instance cannot be tolerated," Bellotto said. "We also felt the coach's inaction in the situation contributed to a scene that discredited the championship.

"The subcommittee did, however, commend Cal State Hayward for its prompt attention to this matter," Bellotto continued, "and for its commitment to ensuring that such incidents do not occur in the future"

- Discussed a reduction in the length of the Men's and Women's Fencing Championships but agreed to retain the current five-day format.
- Agreed that all committee members soon will begin calling prospective hosts for the 1993 championships.
- Emphasized that the power-point system used in the evaluation of schedule strength is not a criterion for selection by itself. The committee also agreed to retain the current selection criteria for the 1993 championships.
- Discussed the NCAA's misconduct policy regarding criticism of officials and conduct at championships and reemphasized the need for the games committee to enforce it at future championships.
- Reaffirmed its earlier recommendation for an additional armorer at the championships. The NCAA Executive Committee has deferred action on this recommendation until its August meeting.
- Formed a subcommittee to explore ways of improving communication with coaches regarding new and pending legislation
- Discussed ways in which the committee and the United States Fencing Association can work together to improve fencing and create more exposure for the sport.

"In women's epee, the only gap is in college, so we're somewhat behind the rest of the world," said Micahnik. "For collegiate programs not to include women's epee is a bit anachronistic."

The fact that women compete in epee before college should help coaches find and recruit fencers

for their new squads. Many top foilists are converted epee specialists, according to Micahnik.

"Many collegiate women fencers are actually very accomplished in epec," he said. "In fact, it could be argued that their development as fencers has been restrained by the collegiate limitation to foil."

Men's gymnastics: The NCAA Men's Gymnastics Committee is soliciting bids to host the 1993 Men's Gymnastics Championships East regional April 3 and the 1994 nationals April 7-9. Proposals must be received by September 30, 1992. Interested parties should contact Deborah R. Nelson, NCAA assistant director of championships, at the national office.

Panel focuses on procedures

Meet procedures for the 1993 NCAA Women's Gymnastics Championships—the first that will use a three-day format—were addressed by the NCAA Women's Gymnastics Committee at its July 6-9 meeting in Kansas City, Missouri.

The 1993 championships will be April 15-17, 1993, at Oregon State University. Previous championships were two-day competitions.

In planning for the three-day format, the committee voted to establish the following championships schedule: Preliminary team and all-around competition will be Thursday, April 15; final team and all-around competition will be Friday, April 16, and individual event competition will be Saturday, April 17.

The preliminary team competition will consist of two sessions with teams seeded Nos. 1, 3, 5, 7, 9 and 11 competing in the first session and teams seeded Nos. 2, 4, 6, 8, 10 and 12 competing in the second session. Seeding will be based on the regional-championships score of each team.

Corporatecontribution bill written

A bill that would exempt college football bowl games from paying taxes on many contributions they receive from corporate sponsors has been forwarded to the full U.S. House of Representatives.

The House Ways and Means Committee sent the bill to the House July 9.

The Internal Revenue Service has ruled that charitable organizations are to be taxed for corporate contributions that result in extensive promotion for the donors. The IRS ruled specifically on the Mobil Cotton Bowl and John Hancock Bowl football games, but the ruling could affect a broad range of athletics events, including the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta.

ACC to furnish team for Peach

The Atlantic Coast Conference signed a three-year agreement June 25 with the Peach Bowl that will send a league team to the New Year's Day game.

Bowl officials will choose an ACC team from the schools remaining after the conference's top two teams secure spots in other bowl games as part of deals already announced, according to United Press International.

The other berth in the game will be left open, so officials have a chance to invite a top team that is not obligated to a bowl game elsewhere.

The Peach Bowl-ACC deal takes effect with this season's game, to be played in the newly constructed Georgia Dome in Atlanta. The payout for the game has been raised to \$1 million.

Other highlights

In other actions at its July 6-9 meeting in Kansas City, Missouri, the NCAA Women's Gymnastics Committee:

- Recommended to the NCAA Executive Committee that the University of Utah be selected as host institution for the 1994 championships
- Recommended the following gymnastics regional sites for 1993 to the Executive Committee: Oregon State University (West); Utah State University (Midwest); Louisiana State University (Central) and University of Georgia (Southeast). The recommendation for the Northeast regional site has yet to be finalized.
- Voted to eliminate the requirement that at least two allaround performers must represent a six-member team in countable meets. Under that provision, a team was limited to a maximum of four specialists in an event. The committee, however, also recommended that if an individual competes as an all-around performer in a meet, that gymnast's score should be compiled and noted on the official score sheet.
- Reaffirmed a ban on the round-off entry vault for NCAA competition. The round-off entry vault is one in which a competitor lands on the vaulting board hands first, makes contact with the vault horse feet first, and then dismounts.
- Recommended to the Executive Committee that the date formula for the championships be amended, effective for 1994. The amended formula would read: "The regional competition will be held the first Saturday in April; the national championships will be held two weeks later, the third Thursday, Friday and Saturday in April. In the event a holiday or the NCAA basketball Final Fours fall on one of these weekends, the regionals and championships would be moved one week later."

The three top-scoring teams in each preliminary session will advance to the "Super Six" final

competition on Friday. The order of competition that day will be determined by a random draw.

Neutral-site games give basketball attendance a boost

Men's college basketball attendance climbed to a record high for the fifth straight year in the recession season of 1991-92, reaching 33,977,581 spectators for all 1,329 senior-college varsity teams, including 813 NCAA members.

NCAA Division I (298 teams) set a record high for the sixth straight season at 23,893,993. These are the same six seasons the threepoint shot (along with the 45second clock) has been in universal use, and that may be more than coincidence. The only national decline came in 1986. (The 1992 record came from more teams in Division I—the same 298 teams totaled a higher figure the previous year.)

The way attendance increased was a surprise. A key was more neutral-site games and spectators

at regular-season double-headers and conference tourneys, both in Division I and for all 1031 teams outside of Division L-NCAA members and nonmembers combined. This offset small declines in home average at almost all levels.

The increases, both in Division I (3,738) and for all of the nation's college teams (15,706), were by far the smallest in history (previously, the smallest increase ever had been 62,000-plus in 1978). The nationalchampionship tournament declined only because the regionals were held at traditional sites (rather than domes), in keeping

■ Eligibility appeals

In cases involving prospective student-athletes, current NCAA policy allows the NCAA Eligibility Committee either to restore the involved prospect with all eligibility remaining at the violating institution or to render the prospective student-athlete permanently incligible at that institution.

Accordingly, because the eligibility ramifications of violations that involve prospects and enrolled student-athletes are treated differently, those cases that involve prospects are published separately from the other matters.

Also, note that any actions taken by the institution,

conference or NCAA Committee on Infractions regarding the institution's responsibility for the occurrence of the violation that caused the ineligibility of the student-athlete are reported along with the publication of the particular eligibility case.



Brooklyn forced to drop sports

Nearly two months after New York State required Brooklyn College to cut its operating budget by \$5.4 million for the 1992-93 academic year, school officials said July 1 that the college's 16 sports programs would be eliminated.

The move will affect approximately 175 student-athletes. It also means that 14 head coaches, several trainers and two administrators-athletics director Len Roitman and associate athletics director Mark Reiner-will lose their jobs.

"Certainly, this is being done reluctantly," said Richard Coniglione, the college's public relations director. "I don't think there is any glee here. Having to disrupt the lives of our student-athletes brings no joy on the part of the college administration."



Group to review certification report; will consider survey on I-AAA football

tee to Review the NCAA Enforcement and Infractions Process. Both committees will be represented at the Boston meeting.

■ Results of a survey of the Divisions I and II member institutions regarding the "Division I-AAA football" issue. Essentially, the Council needs to determine whether it will resubmit legislation to create a new football subdivision within Division I or whether the affected institutions—which no longer will be able to classify their football programs in Division II or III after September 1, 1993—will be incorporated in some manner within the existing Division I-AA.

■ The initiatives being taken by the NCAA Presidents Commission regarding NCAA Conventions; the legislative process, and establishment of a Joint Policy Board to involve the officers of the Presidents Commission in NCAA activities in which they currently are not involved, such as the NCAA budget.

This will be the Council's second meeting in its new format, in which it sets aside a significant portion of its agenda—in this case, the entire first day of the meeting—to focus on current major issues.

Other topics

The Council will have the opportunity to review all legislation—

104 items — submitted by the membership in accordance with the July 1 deadline, and it can decide, if it wishes, to sponsor, support, oppose or take no position on any of them. It also can decide to support, oppose or take no position in its fall meeting.

In addition, the Council will receive a staff analysis of the membership-submitted proposals, especially as they relate to the "reform agenda" of the past three Conventions. The NCAA Administrative Committee and the Presidents Commission officers asked for such an analysis when they met recently in Dallas.

Another issue of interest on the agenda is consideration of elimi-

nating the authority for the national office staff to issue binding interpretations of NCAA legislation.

Committee reports

NCAA committees scheduled to report, in addition to those already mentioned, include:

- The Academic Requirements, Eligibility, Executive, Legislative Review, Minority Opportunities and Interests, Professional Sports Liaison, Recruiting, and Student-Athlete Advisory Committees, as well as the Divisions I, II and III Steering Committees. The steering committees will conduct separate sessions August 6.
 - The Committee on Competi-

tive Safeguards and Medical Aspects of Sports and the Committee on Women's Athletics.

- The Special Committees to Review NCAA Legislative Procedures and to Review Implementation of 1990 Convention Proposal No. 24.
- The Council Subcommittee to Review the Concept of Establishing an Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse and the Council Subcommittee on Initial-Eligibility Waivers

Highlights of the meeting will be featured in the August 19 issue of The NCAA News, and the minutes of the meeting will be printed in a September issue.



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

times. When you go through those tough times, there is a bond between those people that is different from

today.

"Going through that, you have a tendency to be a little skeptical about automatically doing something without worrving about funding."

It may be because Fieber went through the lean years, but she got the reputation of being tough. Byers thinks the

reputation is fair, and it's that toughness and willingness to say no that is one of his fondest memories.

"One of the things I liked about her was she was able to say no," he said. "That's something that many present-day administrators don't have. That's certainly a desirable trait, especially as far as money is concerned. She also never laid the 'no' on somebody else. She simply said, 'What you're asking me to do is against policy. I agree with the policy, so the answer is no."

Convention memories

It may not be much of a reach to say that nobody in intercollegiate athletics between the early 1950s and the middle 1980s interacted with more people than Marjorie

Fieber handled registration for her first Convention in 1953, when the registration fee was \$5 and nobody knew who was coming. "People just showed up and gave their name and institution," she said. "We got some pretty unusual names," she said. 'We just prepared the badges on the spot." She coordinated the process every year until her retirement in 1985.

Of all 33 annual Conventions, one sticks in her mind the most. Right before each Convention, Fieber and the office staff would pack up all the files and ship them by freight to the Convention site — except in 1965, when the Convention was in Chicago. The files were packed up, and they were shipped, but they never made it to Chicago.

"Mr. (Charles M.) Neinas and Mr. Duke kept going down to the railroad station every little while in minus 20 degree weather looking for our boxes," she said. "A few boxes showed up before the end of the

Convention, but we had to start most of our files over from scratch."

Besides handling registration for the NCAA Convention, Fieber began handling registration for the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) convention in the middle 1970s.

"Michael Cleary was working for us when he took the position of executive director of NACDA," she said. "He and I did two NCAA Conventions together. When he took the NACDA job, he asked Mr. Byers if I could come and work his registration. Mr. Byers said I could, but I had to take vacation."

Fieber is on permanent vacation now,

but it is difficult to tell. She continues to work for the NCAA as a consultant, balancing the Association's bank statement (2,000 to 3,000 checks) every month. But in her "doing-it-for-the-cause" attitude, she plays down the job.

"It's not that much," she says. "I spend only three to four hours a month if everything goes well. It's all done by computer."

Fieber also stays busy as treasurer for her church. Her health is great, she says, and she has lost 100 pounds since she retired. She bought an organ and has taken lessons.

And, she says, she has watched a lot of colleagues' kids grow up. "It started with Danny Duke (Wayne's son) two or three months after we opened the office," she said. "They just keep coming."

So do the fond memories. "I'm just a real happy person," she said. "I had a great life at the NCAA. I had a lot of opportunities."

Byers said she made the most of them. "She contributed to the development far beyond the call of duty," Byers said. "And to repeat myself, she never got the credit she is due."

Maybe now she will.



peated with a 27,103 average and Kentucky and North Carolina again ranked second and third. All three were down a bit in average. Louisville showed a small increase and again ranked fourth.

Memphis State enjoyed the nation's biggest per-game increase at 5,207, reaching 16,142 in its new arena. Next were Louisiana State (up 2,516 to 15,921), Seton Hall (2,405 to 12,895), North Carolina-Charlotte (2,299 to 7,725) and Cleveland State (2,001 to 4,405). Louisiana State was boosted by the season's largest crowd, 61,304 paid in the Louisiana Superdome in New Orleans for the Texas game.

North Dakota is the Division II attendance leader at 4,943 per game, replacing Southeast Missouri State, which moved to Division I. Calvin, the Division III leader three straight years before Hope ended its streak a year ago, returned to the top with a 2,757 average.

More than one-third of membership's submissions deal with playing and practice seasons

by the Legislative Review Committee, which met July 6-8 in Kansas City, Missouri.

Other topics

While playing and practice-seasons legislation is by far the most popular target of proposals, the membership also was busy in the areas of recruiting (Bylaw 13), which prompted 14 proposals; eligibility (Bylaw 14), with 11 proposals, and personnel (Bylaw 11) and financial aid (Bylaw 15), with nine proposals each.

The personnel proposals include efforts in Division I to increase the number of full-time coaches in baseball, men's basketball and men's ice hockey and to eliminate the category of restrictedearnings coach in men's basketball and men's ice hockey.

Also sponsored are five proposals in the area of awards, benefits and expenses for student-athletes; five proposals pertaining to membership; three each in the areas of committees and administrative regulations, and three amendments to the NCAA constitution.

ing to the constitution attracted more sponsorship from member institutions than any other. More than 100 institutions are sponsoring a proposal to revise the Association's legislative calendar by establishing new submission and publication dates for legislative

Under the proposal, the deadline for the membership to submit proposals would be moved back from July 1 to August 1. Also, the NCAA Council's deadline for submitting proposals would be moved from August 15 to October 1 and the deadline to propose amendments-to-amendments would be moved from October 15 to Novem-

Rounding out the 104 proposals are four resolutions.

The most active sponsor of legislative proposals, in terms of numbers submitted, was the Big Ten Conference, which submitted 17 of the 104 proposals.

Publication

Even though there are six more proposals from the membership

One of those proposals pertain- than last year, this year's Initial Publication of Proposed Legislation will be a 104-page book, compared to 108 pages a year ago.

> This year's publication will be sent to the chief executive officer, faculty athletics representative, director of athletics and senior woman athletics administrator at each member institution. Member conferences, affiliated members and corresponding members also receive copies.

> In the publication, the 104 proposals are printed in the order in which they would appear, if adopted, in the NCAA Manual, rather than in topical groupings or in the order in which they might eventually appear in the Convention agenda.

> As in the past two years, the proposals carry not only the traditional statements of intent, but also statements of rationale, as provided by the sponsors. Each also lists the primary contact person identified by the sponsors for those who wish to suggest changes in or withdrawal of the proposal.

> The intent statements for the proposals also will be published in

News.

Modifications

From now until September 1, the sponsors of the 104 proposals can change them in any way they want, as long as the change is germane to the proposal as printed in the initial publication. They can make a proposal tougher or more lenient, change details in the legislative calendar leading up the proposal, or refine it any way they wish. They also can withdraw

All such changes from the sponsors must be received in the national office not later than September 1, and the changes must be submitted by the individual listed as the primary contact person for the involved proposal.

No new amendments from the membership may be submitted for the 1993 Convention.

However, member institutions and conferences are encouraged to suggest revisions in the 104 proposals already submitted. To do so, they must contact the primary contact person listed with the proposal they wish to address. Such contacts should be made

the August 5 issue of The NCAA promptly to give the sponsors time to react to them before, the September 1 deadline.

Members wishing to suggest such changes should not call or send the changes to the national office. Only the primary contact person is allowed to submit revisions to the sponsor's original proposal.

Other important deadlines in to the 1993 Convention in Dallas include the August 15 deadline by which the Council, NCAA Presidents Commission and NCAA Executive Committee must submit any amendments that they intend

All of the August 15 submissions, plus the modifications made by September 1 in the 104 membership proposals, will be printed in the Second Publication of Proposed Legislation. That book must be mailed to the membership by September 15.

All amendments-to-amendments and resolutions have to be submitted by October 15. After that deadline, the Official Notice of the Convention will be printed for mailing November 15.

Division I tennis considers format change

A men's team-championship format that would change collegiate termis on the Division I level is being considered by Division I members of the NCAA Men's and Women's Tennis Committee.

At the committee's annual meeting July 12-15 in Kansas City, Missouri, Division I subcommittee members representing men's tennis agreed to advise the Division I Championships Committee that they are considering a team-match format featuring three eight-game pro-set doubles matches and six singles matches for use at the 1994 Division I men's championships.

Under the proposal, which would require NCAA Executive Committee approval, doubles play would be held before singles, and the school whose doubles teams win two of the three doubles matches would earn one point. The six singles matches would be best of three sets and worth one point each. The team winning at least four of the possible seven points would be the winner.

Currently, the team-championship format provides for six singles and three doubles matches. All matches are best of three sets and worth one point each. Also, singles currently are contested before doubles, and the team winning at least five points is declared the winner.

With the format change, the subcommittee hopes to shorten the length of team matches while retaining doubles play as an integral part of the match. Other alternatives considered by the subcommittee would have shortened matches at the cost of deemphasizing doubles play.

Subcommittee members believe the new format would shorten matches from as many as six hours to a maximum of four hours in length, thereby encouraging more spectator interest.

Division I tennis

In other actions during the July 12-15 meeting of the NCAA Men's and Women's Tennis Committee in Kansas City, Missouri, members of the Division I subcommittee representing men's tennis:

- Recommended to the NCAA Executive Committee that the 1993 championships be played May 14-23, rather than May 21-30 as scheduled.
- Adjusted the playing schedule for the 1993 championships to include more evening competition.

Members of the Division I subcommittee representing women's tennis:

■ Selected Kelly Ferguson, University of Wisconsin, Madison, as subcommittee chair, effective September 1.

Division II tennis

In other actions during the July 12-15 meeting of the NCAA Men's and Women's Tennis Committee in Kansas City, Missouri, the Division II subcommittee:

- Agreed to solicit bids from host institutions that are interested in hosting both the men's and women's championships concurrently at a common site.
- Announced it will survey coaches, athletics directors and senior women administrators of member institutions that sponsor Division II tennis regarding the concept of playing only a team championship and eliminating individual singles and doubles championships competition. The team-championship format would include a 16-team men's field and 16-team women's field.

Members of the Division II subcommittee representing men's tennis:

■ Recommended to the NCAA Executive Committee that the University of Central Oklahoma serve as the host institution for the 1993 championships.

Members of the Division II subcommittee representing women's tennis:

- Selected Georgene A. Brock, Mankato State University, as subcommittee chair, effective September 1, 1992.
- Voted to select all participants in the singles competition on an at-large basis rather than award three automatic berths to each of the top four seeded teams in the team championship.

■ Expressed concern over the NCAA Executive Committee's ruling in May 1992 that the play-out portion of the team competition would be eliminated beginning with the 1993 tennis championships and agreed to submit a recommendation in May 1993 that it be reinstated.

Members of the Division III subcommittee representing men's tennis:

- Recommended to the Executive Committee that the current eight-region alignment be realigned into four regions beginning with the 1993 championships. The change would result in creation of an East region (the current East, Northeast and Mid-Atlantic regions), South region (South and South Atlantic), Midwest region (Midwest and Great Lakes) and West region (West)
- Agreed that if the current eight regions are reduced to four, championships-selection procedures would be altered to provide for a minimum of two teams to be selected from each of the regions. The remaining four teams would be selected nationally on an at-large basis. Additionally, a minimum of eight singles players and four doubles teams would be selected from each of the four regions.
- Recommended to the Executive Committee that Kalamazoo College serve as the host institution for the 1993 championships.
- Recommended to the Executive Committee that, effective in 1993, the dates of the championships be changed so that they begin on the Monday of the the third full week in May. Future dates would be as follows: May 17-24, 1993; May 16-23, 1994, and May 15-22, 1995. The purpose is to avoid many institutions' commencement exercises, which traditionally are held the preceding weekend.
- Recommended to the Executive Committee that team results from the fall season (beginning September 1) be considered in the selection process for the championships. Currently, only results from January 1 until the time of selection are considered.
- Determined that all championships matches will be played to decision rather than completion. However, singles matches already in progress will not be terminated.

Members of the Division III subcommittee representing women's tennis:

- Recommended to the Executive Committee that Carleton College serve as the host institution for the 1993 championships.
- Selected Edward Hegmann, Mary Washington College, as subcommittee chair, effective September 1.



Rutgers forms equity plan

Rutgers University, New Brunswick, officials hope that within three years women athletes at the school will be getting their fair share of athletics grants-in-aid.

The university hopes to raise \$185,000 over three years to make the amount of scholarship dollars for female athletes comparable to that for male athletes, university President Francis L. Lawrence said July 20.

He said the university determined the need through an internal study of intercollegiate athletics programs that he ordered in April 1991. The funding will help the school comply with Title IX regulations requiring that proportionally equal amounts of money and support be given to female athletes and male athletes.

The year-long study found that male athletes, who compose 64 percent of athletics participants, and female athletes are treated equitably in most areas, according to The Associated Press.

However, the study found that men get 74 percent of all athletics scholarships while women get 26

at Amherst College, the committee voted to redefine the obstruction rule (Rule 8-5-j) and added a second approved ruling to clarify that if a defensive player blocks the base or plate clearly without possession of the ball, or is not in the immediate act of catching the ball, obstruction shall be called.

The rule also states that if the runner causes a flagrant collision, he shall be declared safe as a result of the obstruction call, but will be ejected from the contest. The ball would be declared dead.

Beginning with the 1993 season, the committee voted to eliminate

the speed-up and optional-substitution rules. The committee noted that the rules may not be used for official NCAA contests because they fall under the category of conduct rules. By definition, conduct rules are those that are applied directly to the playing of the contest. No conduct rule may be changed by mutual consent or

agreement.

The committee also clarified Rule 7-2-c-2 so that a game pitcher who is not the designated hitter and is replaced may:

■ While on offense, replace the designated hitter and bat only in the designated hitter spot. If the

pitcher becomes the designated hitter, he may not reenter game in any other capacity. There is no loss of the designated hitter.

■ While on defense, be moved to a defensive position and must bat in place of the defensive player removed. The designated hitter's spot would be eliminated.

Fall preseason practice

Divisions I and II sports (other than football and women's volleyball) that conduct traditional fall seasons

Divisions I and II member institutions should note that in sports in which the traditional playing season occurs during the fall, institutions may begin preseason practice on the date that permits 21 practice opportunities prior to the first contest. In accordance with NCAA Bylaw 17.02.13, in determining the number of practice opportunities, there should be counted one for each day beginning with the opening day of classes, one for each day classes are not in session in the week of the first scheduled intercollegiate contest and two for each day in the preseason practice period. Sundays are excluded from the counting, even if an institution chooses to practice on Sunday. Note that Bylaw 17.02.13 is used for calculating the date in which practice may begin and should not be construed to indicate the number of permissible practice sessions. The "week" of the first scheduled intercollegiate contest is defined as the six days, excluding Sunday, preceding the date of competition (even if one or more of the days falls into different traditional calendar weeks). The "opening day of classes" is defined as the first day of classes as listed in the member institution's official catalog. Required freshman orientation is not considered to be the opening day of classes for the academic year.

For example, a member institution in the sport of soccer conducts its first contest Saturday, September 5, 1992, and the institution's first day of classes is Tuesday, September 1, 1992. Using the previously mentioned formula, it would be permissible for an institution to begin practice Thursday, August 20. Please note that in this instance, it would be permissible for the institution to conduct medical examinations (if necessary), issue equipment and conduct picture day Wednesday, August 19 (i.e., the day before preseason practice). That being the case, it would be permissible for institutions to permit soccer team members to report Tuesday evening, August 18, for an evening meal, provided no athletically related meetings in the sport take place. Please note that these regulations would apply to all team sports that conduct a traditional fall season, as well as any individual sport using the 144-day traditional season

It should be noted that a student-athlete's participation in countable athletically related activities during the scason is limited to a maximum of four hours per day and 20 hours per week. In addition, during the playing season, all countable athletically related activities are prohibited during one calendar day per week. However, in accordance with Bylaw 17.1.5.3.4, daily and weekly limitations (and the day-off requirement) do not apply to countable athletically related activities occurring during preseason practice prior to the first day of classes or the first scheduled contest, whichever is earlier.

Bylaw 11.7

Division I coaching limitations

Division I member institutions should note that in accordance with Bylaw 11.7, there shall be a limit on the number of coaches that may be employed by an institution in each sport. An athletics department staff member must count against coaching limits as soon as an individual participates (in any manner) in the coaching of the intercollegiate team in practice, games or organized activities directly related to that sport, including any organized staff activity directly relating to the sport.

Please note that the following individuals may be employed by the institution's athletics department without being counted in the applicable coaching limitations:

1. An athletics department staff member who performs department-wide responsibilities (e.g., recruiting coordinator who coordinates recruiting for all intercollegiate sports conducted by the institution) shall be excluded from the limitations on the number of coaches in any one sport. However, that individual (other than the weight coach, per Bylaws 11.7.2.1.1, 11.7.3.1 and 11.7.4.1.1) may not be involved in any on-field coaching and may not recruit or evaluate prospects or scout opponents off campus unless he or she counts against the coaching limits for head coaches and full-time assistant coaches;

- 2. A temporary consultant hired by the institution to provide in-service training for the coaching staff. Such a consultant may have no interaction with the studentathletes unless the individual is counted against the applicable coaching limits;
- 3. A coach participating in a visitor's program (e.g., international visitor's program) may observe an institution's sports program without counting in the numerical coaching limits established for that sport, provided the individual is not involved in any on- or off-field coaching activities, and
- 4. An institutional staff member (e.g., administrative assistant) may be involved in noncoaching activities that are not conducted on a department-wide basis, provided such individuals are not identified as coaches, do not engage in any on- or off-field coaching activities (e.g., attending meetings involving coaching activities, analyzing videotapes or films involving an institution's or opponent's team) and arc not involved in any off-campus recruitment of prospects or scouting of opponents.

Further, in all sports, undergraduate coaches (per Bylaw 11.02.5) are not included in the limits on the number of coaches. Finally, in sports other than football and basketball, an institution may use the services of a volunteer coach (per Bylaw 11.02.6) in each sport. (Note: Indoor and outdoor track are considered separate sports and, in sports in which the NCAA conducts separate men's and women's programs, a combined men's and women's program may use two volunteer coaches.)

Pro sports forum, FARA plan meetings on back-to-back days

In an effort to boost attendance at two separate events addressing topics of widespread interest, the NCAA's annual Professional Sports Counseling Forum and the fall meeting of the Faculty Athletics Representatives Association (FARA) will be held on back-to-back days in

The forum is scheduled for October 22 and FARA's meeting is October 23. Both events will be in

Organizers hope faculty athletics representatives planning to attend the FARA meeting will come a day early to attend the forum and that other athletics administrators participating in the forum will stay for the FARA sessions.

The forum, which grew out of a ries of meetings on establishing professional sports counseling panels to serve student-athletes with professional-sports aspirations, is held annually. Approximately 120 NCAA member institutions have established such panels. In some cases, faculty athletics representatives are involved.

"This is a good meeting for faculty representatives to attend," said Richard C. Perko, NCAA legislative assistant. "They can carry the message back to their campuses, become involved in established panels, or possibly help set one up."

Meanwhile, FARA discussions will range from establishing links with academic-support and compliance personnel in athletics departments to reviewing proposed legislation for the 1993 NCAA Con-

Among the topics on the agenda for the forum are a discussion of how to conduct a successful professional sports counseling panel, a report on international basketball opportunities for female student-athletes, a presentation on dealing with sports agents and a discussion of a recent boom in the portrayal of student-athletes on "trading cards."

Also, reports are scheduled from representatives of the Major League Baseball Players Association, National Football League Players Association and National Basketball Players Association and on state legislation and the NCAA's disability insurance program.

The Faculty Athletics Representatives Association will meet October 23 at the nearby Atlanta Airport Hyatt.

A featured session of the meeting will allow faculty representatives to discuss common interests with representatives of the National Association of Academic Advisors for Athletics and the National Association of Athletics Compliance Coordinators. The purpose of the session is to explore ways faculty representatives can work with academic-support and compliance personnel more closely and efficiently.

Also planned are a review of possible or proposed legislation for the NCAA Convention in the areas of gender equity, enforcement (specifically the penalty structure) and academics, and a roundtable discussion of practical concerns of faculty representatives, including case studies in such areas as certification of eligibility and roles in an investigation of alleged rules violations.

FARA members also plan to formally ratify a document titled "The Role of the Faculty Athletics Representative" (see February 5, 1992, issue of The NCAA News).
