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# **Committee opposes certification changes**

A review of several amendments-to-amendments to the proposed NCAA athletics certification program legislation highlighted the October 26 meeting of the Special NCAA Committee on Athletics Certification.

The special committee opposes three of the amendments-to-amendments to the proposed legislation. Those amendments-to-amendments involve (a) expanding the proposed Committee on Athletics Certification to include financial aid and admissions personnel; (b) extending the cycle for certification from at least once every five years to once every 10 years, and (c) delaying the implementation of the program from January 1, 1994, to January 1, 1996.

The special committee also opposes a resolution that would seek to make the program a pilot program rather than a permanent one.

At its October meeting, the NCAA Council voted to oppose any proposals that would delay the certification program in any way.

Regarding the amendment-to-amendment that would change the cycle, the special committee recommended that the Council sponsor an amendment-to-amendment that would clarify that the Committee on Athletics Certification's duties include the responsibility to review and recommend changes in the certification process, including

cycles of certification, as a means of maintaining maximum flexibility in the program beyond five years.

The special committee believed that such an action would emphasize its belief that, while a 10-year cycle may prove to be preferable in the years ahead, all aspects of the program-including the certification interval-should be subject to changes based upon the experiences that the permanent committee encounters.

In its last in-person meeting, the special committee covered a broad range of topics. The group:


### Self-study guide ready for schools

Chief executive officers at Division III institutions soon will be receiving the new Division III Institutional Self-Study Guide (ISSG), which has been developed as an alternative to establishing an athletics certification program for those schools.

The Division III guide was adapted from the ISSG that has been used by all NCAA institutions to fulfill the self-study requirements of Constitution 6.3.1. Use of the Division III ISSG meets the requirement that institutions conduct a comprehensive self-study and evaluation of their intercollegiate athletics programs at least once every five years.

The Division III edition of the guide was reviewed and approved by the NCAA Council at its October meeting.

It was developed by the Special Committee to Review the NCAA **Division III Institutional Self-Study** Guide, which was formed at the request of the Division III Steering Committee. The special committee was established as the result of a belief that a certification program like the one currently proposed for Division I programs is not needed in Division III, but that some additional internal review

## Tight end tackles law

Matt Whitaker, a tight end on the football team at the University of Iowa, is doing quite a bit of hitting away from the gridiron this semester. In addition to grueling, daily football practices, Whitaker is tackling the books as a first-year law student.

"And I thought playing football in the Big Ten Conference was tough," Whitaker told the Des Moines Register.

Whitaker first went to Iowa in 1988. He sat out of competition that fall and concentrated on getting his academic career off to a strong start. Whitaker received a bachelor's degree in communication in 3½ years and is currently in his second semester of law school

Although his schedule looks hectic, Whitaker claims it is manageable. He is up at 8 a.m. for classes; then after lunch he slips in a little football practice. After dinner, he heads for the library to study and then finally gets to bed around midnight.

"It's not grueling if you're into a routine," he said. "But if I get abnormal sleep, I'm all messed up."

### Victory off the field

For University of California, Berkeley, tailback Russell White, a 229-yard, threetouchdown performance in last year's 52-30 victory over the University of Southern California pales in comparison to what White hopes to accomplish next May.

White, who suffers from dyslexia, a learning disability, is on track to complete his bachelor's degree in social welfare at that time.

That's going to be the best day of my life," White told the Los Angeles Times.

White was ruled academically ineligible his first year at California because he failed to score the minimum 700 on the Scholastic Aptitude Test coming out of Crespi High School in Encino, California. He said that while others were lying in wait for him to fail once he was admitted to the institution, White believed he had something to prove.

"Whenever I'm doubted, I set a goal to prove people wrong," he said. "I had to really go down and dig deep. My mother taught me never to give up

A season-ticket holder can request a refund any time during the regular season; however, the amount of the refund will cover only those games remaining on the team's schedule.

In the second game of the year, against Boston College, the backup quarterback, Brian Ellis, broke his jaw as Navy fell, 28-0.

Then, in game three, Navy moved its starting tailback, Jason Van Matre, to the quarterback position in a game against Rutgers University, New Brunswick. Van Matre suffered a hip pointer and had to leave the game. Enter signal-caller No. 4. But within minutes of entering the contest, Steve Seoane also dislocated a shoulder and had to leave the game.

# Qualifying standards for swimming adjusted

Adjustments in qualifying procedures for the 1993 Divisions I and III championships highlighted the NCAA Men's and Women's Swimming and Diving Committee meeting October 19-22 in Overland Park, Kansas.

The committee's Division I subcommittee reviewed qualifying procedures from last year and determined that a maximum of 12 relay teams would be selected in each relay event. In addition, an individual who has qualified in a relay but not an individual event may now swim in individual events as an optional entry. The swimmer must have achieved a consideration time in order to enter the individual events.

In addition, it will be recommended to the NCAA Executive Committee that platform diving be added to the zone diving meets and that a diver shall choose two events (out of three) in which to participate. A point system will be used for place finishers, and total points for the two events will be added to determine championships qualifiers.

The 1993 zone meets will be held at the following sites March 12-13: Zone A, University of Pittsburgh; Zone B, University of Alabama, Tuscaloosa; Zone C, University of Michigan; Zone D, University of Texas at Austin, and

### Swimming rules

The rules subcommittee adopted several rules changes during the October 19-22 meeting of the Men's and Women's Swimming Committee in Overland Park, Kansas,

Those changes, which were ratified by the entire committee, are subject to Executive Committee approval for the 1993-94 season. The subcommittee:

Revised rule 2-2-1-c, which defines the turn during backstroke events.

Added "air horn or bell" as sound devices used for gun laps. Eliminated the requirement that swimmers touch the "sensitized portions" of touch pads when automatic judging and timing equipment is used.

■ Added a resolution regarding sportsmanship and verbal conduct to rule 2-5-6.

■ Clarified rule 3-3-1-a to read, "A contestant is permitted to compete in a maximum of three events in any combination of individual and/or relay events during a men's or women's 13- or 15-event dual, double-dual, triangular or quadrangular meet. This limit also applies during a concurrent men's and women's 26- or 30-event dual, double-dual, triangular or quadrangular meet"

Revised rule 5-2-1-f, which explains aggregate relay times for qualifying procedures.

Zone E, Arizona State University. The following diving qualifying standards proposed by the Division III subcommittee also were approved by the swimming and diving committee: men's one-meter dual, 270 points, and championship, 435; men's three-meter dual, 280, and championship, 435; women's one-meter dual, 240, and championship, 370, and women's threemeter dual, 250, and championship, 415.

Divers wishing to compete in the Division III prequalification meet must achieve the qualifying standard at least once at a bona fide conference championship meet or twice at any other bona fide competition.

### **Other highlights**

In other actions at its October 19-22 meeting in Overland Park, Kansas, the Men's and Women's Swimming Committee:

■ Recommended to the Executive Committee that Indiana University Natatorium in Indianapolis be selected as the site for the 1994 Division I women's and the 1995 Division I men's championships, and that the University of Minnesota, Twin Cities, be host for the 1994 Division I men's championships. Proposals still are being reviewed for the 1995 Division I women's championships site.

■ Learned from the Division II subcommittee that the C. T. Branin Natatorium in Canton, Ohio, will be the site of the 1993 and 1994 Division II men's and women's championships. The subcommittee requested input from the full committee regarding sites for 1995 and beyond. The subcommittee also stressed the importance of increasing championships attendance and swimming sponsorship within Division II.

■ The committee's rules subcommittee switched the order of the 200-yard breaststroke and the 200-yard butterfly in the threeday championships format with platform diving, as well as the four-day, common-site format for the 1992-93 season, to comply with the same change made earlier this year in the three-day format without platform diving.

Acceptable methods of double qualification include qualifying 1) twice during a dual-meet format; 2) twice during a championship format; 3) a combined once during a dual and a championship format, and 4) once in a bona fide conference championship meet. Combining one-meter and three-meter qualifying scores would not be permitted. A total of 24 divers for both men and women will be selected for the championships.

Also for the Division III championships, the committee recommended the selection of 20 qualified individuals and 10 relay teams for women's championships and 18 individuals and 10 relay teams for men's championships.

# Pregame changes adopted

Several pregame policy changes highlighted the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Committee's October 25-27 meeting in Atlanta.

The committee voted to require that, beginning with the 1993 championship, the head coach or one full-time assistant coach from each participating team must attend the administrative meeting held before each round of the tournament.

Currently, the athletics director and/or senior woman administrator and sports information director



## Anti-gambling measure becomes law

President Bush has signed into law the Professional and Amateur Sports Protection Act of 1992, legislation passed earlier by Congress

"window" provided to New Jersey to authorize casino-based sports gambling before January 1, 1994. Authorization of a sports-gammajor media and lobbying effort to persuade the legislature and the voters of the benefit of sports books, particularly in terms of state

that would prohibit the spread of state-authorized or state-sponsored sports gambling schemes.

The NCAA, along with the major professional leagues, had strongly supported adoption of the measure. Bush signed the legislation October 27.

The new legislation, while prohibiting the creation of new state gambling mechanisms, does not affect those schemes in effect on the date of enactment, most notably sports books at the Nevada casinos, the Oregon lottery involving professional sports and the Delaware lottery that is in place but not operating. A further exception contained in the law is the bling scheme in New Jersey requires a constitutional amendment, adopted by the voters. Under New Jersey law, however, the amendment first must be approved by both houses of the legislature. A bill now pending in the New Jersey Senate would permit casinobased gambling on both professional and college sports. The pending Assembly bill relates only to professional sports, but the Federal "window" is written in such a way as to raise the possibility of betting on college sports being added after initial authorization of betting on professional games. Last week, representatives of the New Jersey casino industry announced the beginning of a

revenues that would be earmarked to support programs for older citizens.

A less ambitious effort last summer was not successful: Despite the Senate bill having been reported from committee, fewer than half the members of the Senate were thought to support the proposal.

New Jersey lobbyists for the professional leagues anticipate that over the next few months, the casinos will commit about \$5 million to an all-out effort to gain passage of the constitutional amendment now that the Federal bill has become law and contains the January 1, 1994, deadline.

### Study shows asthma drug does not help performance

New research argues against restricting athletes' use of a valuable asthma medication out of fear that nonasthmatics can abuse iL

Although albuterol helps asthmatics breathe more freely, nonasthmatic athletes cannot add a chemical kick to their performance by dosing themselves with it, according to a study in the journal Medicine and Science in Sports and Exercise, published by the American College of Sports Medicine.

The study at the University of

Calgary Sport Medicine Centre in Alberta, Canada, looked at seven highly trained, nonasthmatic competitive cyclists who were tested on stationary bikes after inhaling albuterol or a gas that gives no physiological effect,

With or without albuterol, there was no difference between endurance and leg strength.

The finding should ease fears that sports organizations would want to limit use of a drug that may be needed in competition by the 10 percent of athletes who are asthmatic, he said.

# New standards require planning

With legislation that doesn't take effect immediately, institutions often do not take the necessary steps to prepare themselves for the time at which the change must be

implemented. However, given the significant increases in eligibility standards adopted at the 1992 NCAA Convention, a failure to begin to prepare for the effect of such change immediately, particularly in the area of satisfactory progress, could result in devastating effects on many athletics programs.

NCAA Bylaws 14.5.2 and 14.5.3 (1992 Convention Proposal No. 21) specify that a student-athlete must have completed successfully a minimum percentage of course requirements in his or her specific degree program to be eligible for competition and, further, that a student-athlete must present a minimum grade-point average based upon a percentage of the institution's cumulative grade-point average required for graduation.

This proposal will affect student-athletes first entering a collegiate institution on or after August 1, 1992. These new standards will be applied at the beginning of a student-athlete's third year of enrollment. Because of this delayed implementation date, many institutions may be lulled into postponing the development of a program for "living under" the new legislation until their

# Another idea on reclassification

This is in response to Gregg Summers' recent article in The NCAA News about reclassification of multidivision football schools.

These schools have a fourth option — probably the most realistic one. They could reclassify their other sports to Division II or Division III. Of the 27 schools listed, virtually all are Division I "wannabees." The athletics programs of these schools are not competitive in Division I (with a couple of exceptions), though a few have one sport capable of playing Division L

Many of these schools, if they were Division II, would struggle to be competitive at the upper levels of that division. If these schools would change to Division II, they would be in a more realistic division and would bolster the ranks of Division II.

There are quite a few more schools that don't play football that are of the "wannabee" stature that

### Swimming system a tease

For athletes who have devoted entire seasons and even entire careers to making the NCAA championships, such a tease only leads to false and dashed hopes, agony, and heartache.

The stated purpose of the new system is to limit the number of participants and to cut expenses, but to what extent is this occurring at the expense of our collegiate athletes?

There must be a better way.

However, those institutions that do not begin to address the many issues that are raised with such increased standards may be in for a rude awakening in 1994. To meet the Proposition 21 challenge successfully, institutions need to begin planning now as the 1992 freshman class begins its college career. Those who do not begin to prepare for these increased standards will face academic, and thus athletics, hardship in the future.

Planning efforts should involve five issues offered here. Administrators throughout the institution-coaches, athletics administra-

### Institutions must prepare now before increases in eligibility standards take effect

tors, registrars, admissions directors, directors of studentathlete support programs, faculty athletics representatives and deans of students—should be involved in planning these systems.

Institutional definition of the academic profile of prospects: Personnel from each institution should discuss the types of prospects they will recruit. In the past, it was sufficient to ask only one question regarding the academic ability of a prospect: "Will the prospect meet NCAA initialeligibility standards?" The new standards will require questioning whether the prospect has a legitimate chance to succeed academically at the institution, to retain eligibility and to progress toward a degree.

Junior college transfer students will be particularly affected. Although in many cases junior college transfers may be able to "piece together" 25 percent of the course requirements in their majors by the beginning of their third year of collegiate enrollment from credits earned at the junior college, *maintaining* eligibility may be more difficult.

In many circumstances, the jump from 25 percent of course requirements in the third year to 50 percent of course requirements in the fourth year and to 75 percent in the fifth year will be a significant challenge for junior college transfers, particularly those who were nonqualifiers or partial qualifiers. In these times of cost containment, each institution must determine whether it is cost-effective to spend a significant amount of money recruiting a prospect who may only be capable of remaining eligible for one or two years. Thus, it will serve institutions well to define clearly the academic profile of the prospects they will recruit.

Effectiveness of student-athlete support program: Inasmuch as it will become more challenging for studentathletes to meet NCAA continuing-eligibility standards, the scope and effectiveness of the institution's studentathlete support program should be evaluated to assure that student-athletes have access to all of the services and programs that can assist them in their efforts to achieve academic success.

Division I institutions will have another excellent opportunity to enhance these services with the receipt of the \$30,000 NCAA Academic Enhancement Grant. Careful consideration of how to use these funds is crucial. For example, because eligibility repercussions will severely curtail student-athletes' opportunities to change majors, it will be increasingly important that student-athletes carefully make their choice of major at the outset of their college career, or soon thereafter.

To assist student-athletes in making a more informed choice of major, it may be necessary to enhance diagnostic testing and interest-assessment programs for freshman and sophomore student-athletes.

Additionally, the various ethical issues involved with the temptation to "channel" student-athletes into the "major of least resistance" also will present significant challenges.

Institutional responsibility for verifying academic credentials: As a result of the increased continuingeligibility standards, an institution's system for verifying academic credentials must be clearly defined and effective. Thus, it may be beneficial for institutions to review thoroughly their current system for verifying academic credentials to help ensure institutional academic integrity.

If anything is clear regarding these new standards, it is that the certification process will become much more complex and detailed. Such increased complexity will enhance the possibility that things will "fall through the cracks." In short, if certification processes are not improved corresponding to the increased complexity of the certification requirements, institutions subject themselves to the risk of embarrassing cligibility certification mistakes.

Reassessment of the coach's responsibility as an educator: Increased academic standards, as well as graduation-rate reporting requirements, will result in coaches' being held more accountable for the academic performance of their student-athletes. Coaches will be expected to recruit prospects with a legitimate chance to succeed academically and adjust socially at college. Once a prospect enrolls, the coach will be expected to become much more active in challenging the studentathlete to perform academically, as well as athletically, by creating an environment that is conducive to the positive academic and social development of the student-athletes. In short, a coach must become an advocate for education and not simply a teacher of athletics skills.

Increased responsibility for presidents, faculty athletics representatives and commissioners: Presidents, faculty athletics representatives and conference commissioners do not escape increased accountability and responsibility as a result of these increased standards. These decisionmakers must effectively articulate and communicate changing expectations to coaches through job descriptions and the hiring process and then must develop the necessary professional-development programs and initiatives to assist coaches in meeting these changing expectations.

It is interesting to note that one of the suggestions offered in the June 1992 American Institutes for Research Report on Academic Performance and College Sports was that "measures designed to increase the involvement of coaches in providing academic support of the studentathletes in their charge" might hold promise for reform.

Since coaches hold the key to setting the proper academic tone for their programs, ways in which to highlight for coaches the importance of this responsibility and to assist them in their efforts to become more effective educators must be explored.

To prepare for the changes brought about by increased satisfactory-progress standards, institutions must begin to address issues now through dialogue that includes broadbased athletics and academic constituencies.

In these rapidly changing times, it will be those institutions that are perceptive enough to recognize change, resolute enough to address those tough issues directly, flexible enough to accommodate such change and creative enough to develop the programs to meet these changing expectations that will prosper in the future.

## Committee expresses concerns over lack of black head coaches

The lack of black head football coaches in Division I-A was a major topic of discussion for the NCAA Minority Opportunities and Interests Committee, which met October 26-28 in Kansas City, Missouri.

The committee debated ways in which the seriousness of the matter could be more effectively communicated to the NCAA and its membership, particularly presidents and athletics directors, said Charles Whitcomb, faculty athletics representative at San Jose State University and chair of the committee.

"I think the lack of (black) Division I-A coaches is our No. 1 issue," Whitcomb said. "We realize the Association cannot dictate hiring practices. Not every minority may fit the requirements of every job minority candidates on the short list for these openings."

#### Workload grows

The committee also expressed concern about the increasing number of minority-oriented issues referred to it and whether the committee has the ability to effectively address those issues. The recent meeting was the second in-person gathering for the committee this year. Whitcomb said the committee will seek approval for one or perhaps two additional yearly meetings from the NCAA Executive Committee.

"This committee cannot handle the volume with us meeting every six months or so," Whitcomb said. "Having three or four meetings

### Other highlights

In other actions at its October 26-28 meeting in Kansas City, Missouri, the Minority Opportunities and Interests Committee:

■Received reports from three subcommittees on action steps for implementing the committee's long-range plan, which involves affirmative action and minority enhancement issues, continued research opportunities, identification of programs that may educate individuals regarding multicultural diversity, promotion of minority student development and enhancement at all educational levels, and solicitation of support of minority enhancement from the private and public sector.

■ Discussed the two legislative amendments it has sponsored for the 1993 NCAA Convention. One involves the establishment of a principle of nondiscrimination in the Association's principles for the conduct of intercollegiate athletics and the other concerns professional enhancement programs, specifically allowing athletics department staff members to receive direct compensation as a result of participating in these programs.

■Met with Gayle Hopkins, past president of the National Association of Academic Advisors for Athletics, to discuss initial eligibility, continuing eligibility and the socialization of minority student-athletes as they progress through predominantly white institutions.

■ Conferred with the NCAA Committee on Women's Athletics on gender-equity concerns as they relate to minority females at all levels of participation in intercollegiate athletics.

### Presidents need to gain more control

The NCAA can best continue its steps toward reforming athletics programs by giving presidents of colleges and universitics greater control over their sports programs, members of the Knight Foundation Commission on Intercollegiate Athletics said October 27.

The group wants the NCAA to enact three proposals at its January 1993 Convention, including the proposal calling for certification of all Division I athletics programs.

In addition to increasing the control of presidents, the Knight Commission urged schools to pare down their athletics budgets.

## Wisconsin-Superior drops football program

The University of Wisconsin, Superior, is dropping intercollegiate football permanently.

Chancellor Betty J. Youngblood announced the decision October 27, saying the school receives "very little funding for athletics and no funding specifically for football.

"Academic programs and services...and many other campus activities and functions must all be considered when institutional budgetary decisions are made," she told The Associated Press.

Officials suspended the pro-

gram earlier this season after Wisconsin-Superior had played two nonconference games. The school cited a shortage of players for the decision. The team had won only five games in five seasons and last won a Wisconsin State University Conference championship in 1946, the longest drought in the WSUC.

Nine players were ruled ineligible at the start of the season due to incomplete or unacceptable academic records, and injuries then sidelined six indefinitely, leaving a roster of only 28 when the season was canceled.

Youngblood said highly skilled players willing to attend a nonscholarship institution rarely can be recruited from northern Wisconsin alone. Recruiting from other areas is costly and "even when successful, has often been followed by low retention and even lower graduation rates," she said. She said the ineligibility of nine players at the beginning of this season was because of "incomplete and/or unacceptable academic records."

The decision is a positive step to "maintain institutional quality" and follows the lead of a number of schools that have made similar decisions, including Wichita State University, the University of Southern Colorado and Northeastern Illinois University, she said.

While dropping football, Wisconsin-Superior plans to add two other sports—likely including soccer—through reallocation of the current football budget, she said.

### Recent tourney champions dominate field

Event: 1992 Division I Men's Soccer Championship.

**Overview:** Virginia, UCLA, Clemson and Indiana have combined to win nine of the last 10 championships and should lead a strong field again this year. Duke, coming off recent victories over Virginia and St. Louis, which leads Division I with 10 championships, also will contend.

**Field:** Twenty-eight teams from eight regions will be selected November 9. The top four teams will receive first-round byes.

**Selection show:** Monday, November 9, 1 p.m. Eastern time, Galaxy 6, channel 11, transponder 11H.

**Dates and sites:** All games before the semifinals will be played on the campuses of participating institutions. Firstround games will be completed by November 15, secondround games by November 22 and third-round games by November 29. The semifinals and final will be December 4 and 6 at Davidson.

**Results:** Championship results will appear in the December 7 issue of The NCAA News.

**Championship notes:** All 5,400 seats at Davidson's Richardson Field were sold by mid-September, marking the first time that the championship has been sold out. This year's semifinal games will be televised live by Sports South and shown by Prime Network on a delayed basis. The championship game will be tape-delayed by CBS....St. Louis coach Joe Clarke has had to use 13 different starting lineups this season because of player injuries or illness. 

### Interpretations Committee minutes

### **Conference No. 17 October 8, 1992**

Acting for the NCAA Council, the Interpretations Committee issued the following interpretations

#### Out-of-season practice/countable athletically related activity

1. Payment of fees for use of a facility for student-athletes to participate in voluntary workouts during the summer vacation period. It is not permissible for an institution to pay fees for the use of a facility for student-athletes to participate in voluntary workouts during the summer vacation period. [References: 17.02.1.2-(n) (noncountable athletically related activities), 17.02.1.2.2 (Divisions I and II summer workout sessions in individual sports), 17.\_\_.6.1 (summer practice) and Administrative Committee 2/5/92, Item No. c]

**Employment/offers and inducements** 2. Employment of prospect enrolled in two-year college. The committee reviewed an NCAA Recruiting Committee recommendation that a prospective student-athlete

enrolled in a two-year college should not be permitted to begin employment arranged by an institution until the prospect has withdrawn from or has completed requirements for graduation at the two-year college It was the committee's opinion that it would be necessary to amend the provisions of 13.2.4.1 in order to impose such a standard on a prospect enrolled in a two-year college The committee agreed to review this issue further during its December 17, 1992, inperson meeting. [References: 13.2.4.1 (employment of prospects -- subsequent to senior year) and IC 7/14/92, Item No. 2]

#### **Recruiting**—advertisements

3. Institution placing advertisement in athletics publication. The committee confirmed that it is not permissible for an institution to buy space for or arrange the placement of an athletics recruiting advertisement (i.e., an advertisement designed to solicit the enrollment of prospects to participate in the institution's athletics program) in any publication. Further, the committee noted that it is not permissible for an institution to place any type of advertisement (athletics or nonathletics) in game programs related to the athletics participation of prospects or in recruiting publications.

The committee noted that it is permissible for institutions to place advertisements related to the institution's educational pirograms as well as advertisements containing information related to the institution's athletics programs in athletics publications (other than game programs or recruiting publications). [References: 13.4.5.1 (recruiting advertisements) and IC 8/13/92, Item No. 3]

#### Advertising/endorsements

4. Recorded interviews with studentathletes made available through "1-900" number. It is not permissible for a studentathlete with remaining eligibility to record an interview with an outside commercial organization (c.g., media entity) that will be made available to the general public through a "1-900" telephone number without jeopardizing that student-athlete's eligibility for intercollegiate athletics. [Reference: 12.5.2.1 (advertisements and promotions subsequent to enrollment)]

#### **Contacts/national service academies**

5. Contacts during junior year in high school. The provisions of 13.17.1.1 that permit an athletics department staff member employed at the U.S. Air Force Academy, U.S. Military Academy or U.S. Naval Academy

to make off-campus recruiting contacts with a prospect during the prospect's junior year in high school are applicable to athletics department staff members employed at the U.S. Coast Guard Academy and U.S. Merchant Marine Academy. The committee recommended that the NCAA Legislative Review Committee incorporate this interpretation into the provisions of 13.17.1.1. [References: 13.01.7 (U.S. service academy exception) and 13.7.1.1 (during junior year in high school)]

#### Transfer—two-year college

6. Determination of transferable degree credit hours. A student-athlete may not use courses taken at a two-year college (that do not receive actual credit hours at the certifying institution but are used to satisfy a program necessary for the student-athlete to receive a baccalaureate degree) to satisfy the two-year college transferable degreecredit requirement. [References: 14.6.4.1 (two-year college transfers-to Division I institutions), 14.6.4.2 (two-year college transfers-to Division II institutions), 14.6.4.4.3 (determination of transferable degree credit) and 14.6.6 ("4-2-4" college transfers)]

**Fund-raising activity** 7. Institutional fund-raising activity. An institution's team that is conducting a fund-raising activity that meets an exemp tion from the contest/date of competition limitations in the applicable sport may not permit student-athletes from another institution to participate in such activity. [References: 14.02.6 (intercollegiate competition), 14.8.1.1 (outside competition, sports other than basketball — Divisions I and II), 17.02.8 (intercollegiate competition) and 17.\_\_.5.3-(l) (fund-raising activity)]

#### Contacts/postseason contests/ bowl game

8. Coaches speaking at banquet in conjunction with bowl game. An institution's coaching staff member may speak at or attend a meeting or banquet (at which prospects are in attendance) in conjunction with the institution's appearance in a postseason contest that occurs during a dead period only if the meeting or banquet is open to the general public, the meeting or banquet is a scheduled activity associated with the contest, and the coach does not make a recruiting presentation or have any direct contact with prospects at the meeting or banquet. The device is placed on top of the rim and is secured by three wing nuts. It shrinks, the rim's 18-inch diameter to 15% inches - still plenty of room for a basketball to fit through, although it requires that shooters concentrate more.

### Championships corner

Men's gymnastics: The NCAA Men's Gymnastics Committee has extended the deadline for submitting bids to host the 1994 National Collegiate Men's Gymnastics Championships, set for April 8-9. Bids will be accepted through December 31, 1992. Any organization interested in submitting a bid to host the championships should contact Deborah R. Nelson, NCAA assistant director of championships, at the national office.

October 27 that it will appeal a Federal judge's order to elevate its women's ice hockey team from club to varsity status by the 1993-94 season.

The school will appeal the ruling in U.S. District Court in Utica, New York, Colgate spokesman James Leach told The Associated Press

In response to a lawsuit brought by several female ice hockey players, U.S. Magistrate Judge David N. Hurd ruled in September that Colgate was obligated under Federal antidiscrimination law to grant the women's team varsity status.

Hurd said there was too great a disparity between the women's club ice hockey team and the men's

women had a budget of \$4,600 in 1990-91, while the men had a budget of \$238,561, he noted.

Hurd cited Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972 as the guiding law in his decision. The law states that schools receiving Federal aid must provide "equal athletics opportunity for both sexes."

Colgate President Neil R. Grabois said the school believes that Hurd misinterpreted the law. "We have always understood Title IX as requiring that the athletics program as a whole provide comparable opportunity to men and women, not that men's and women's programs had to be identical in each particular sport," Grabois

'It the judge's unprecedented decision stands, it could be the basis for damaging changes in athletics programs, not just at Colgate, but at colleges and schools nationwide," he said.

Hurd's decision would take the administration of athletics out of school officials' hands, Grabois said

Colgate fields 12 men's varsity teams, 11 women's varsity teams and several club sports.

The women's ice hockey team had applied to Colgate for varsity status four times. Officials rejected the application each time, citing the cost of the sport-between \$50,000 and \$75,000 annually - as a primary reason.





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### Bylaw 30 revisions

Pursuant to NCAA Constitution 4.1.3-(g) and 5.2.3.1, the NCAA Council has approved the following administrative regulations to implement policy in a manner not inconsistent with provisions of the constitution or bylaws. Bold type indicates new wording; italicized type indicates wording removed.

#### NO. 1 TRANSFER-COHORT GRADUATION RATES

**Intent:** To eliminate the reporting of refined graduation rates and to establish separate graduation rates for transfer students.

Bylaws: Amend 30.1.1.4 and 30.1.1.5, pages 378-379, as follows: [Division I only]

"30.1.1.4 Refined and Freshman-Cohort and Transfer-

Cohort Graduation Rates. In calculating the refined graduation rate, transfer student-athletes shall be included as a part of the class that had completed degree credit equivalent to the degree credit completed by the transfer student-athletes and accepted by the certifying institution at the time of transfer; a student-athlete shall not be included who left the institution while in good academic standing and who would have returned for the following academic term, and a student-athlete shall not be included who did not graduate within the specified 150 percent time period but who continued to be enrolled as a full-time student at the same institution and maintained satisfactory progress toward a specific baccalaureate degree. The refined graduation rate shall not apply in Division II. In calculating the freshman-cohort graduation rate, none of the foregoing adjustments shall be made, and the graduation rate shall consist simply of the number of entering students or student-athletes who received athletically related financial aid and who graduated within the period specified in 30.1.1.3. In addition, the institution shall calculate a transfer-cohort graduation rate. In calculating the transfer-cohort graduation rate, the graduation rate shall consist simply of the number of student-athletes who entered as transfer students and received athletically related financial aid and who graduated within the period specified in 30.1.1.3."

## Constitution 5.4.1.1.1 modifications

Proposals that receive the support of a two-thirds majority of the Council present and voting shall be effective immediately, published in The NCAA News and submitted by the Council as legislation at the 1993 Convention. Bold type indicates new wording; italicized type indicates wording removed.

### NO. 1 CREDIT FROM OTHER INSTITUTIONS

**Intent:** To specify that credit hours carned at another institution before initial enrollment at the certifying institution may be used to fulfill the percentage of degree requirements specified in the Association's satisfactoryprogress legislation.

Bylaws: Amend 14.5.5.10, page 145, as follows: [Federated provision, Divisions I and II, divided vote]

"14.5.5.10 Credit From Other Institutions. Credit hours earned at another institution prior to initial enrollment at the certifying institution may not be utilized to satisfy minimum academic progress requirements at that institution, except that such hours may utilized to fulfill the percentage of degree requirements specified in 14.5.2 and 14.5.4.4. However, a student-athlete's total academic record subsequent to initial full-time enrollment at the certifying institution, including the record at other institutions later attended, may be considered in evaluating eligibility under the satisfactory-progress legislation.

### NO. 2 SATISFACTORY PROGRESS – WAIVER PROCEDURES

Intent: To remove the limitation that the NCAA Acade-

mic Requirements Committee may look only at a student's overall academic record when considering a satisfactoryprogress waiver request.

### A. Bylaws: Amend 14.5.2.2, page 142, as follows: [Division I only]

"14.5.2.2 Waiver Procedures. The NCAA Academic Requirements Committee shall have the authority to authorize waivers of the degree-requirement provisions of this legislation based upon objective evidence that demonstrates circumstances *in which a student's overall academic record* that warrant the waiver of the normal application of this regulation. The committee shall establish the process for granting such waivers and shall report at least annually to the NCAA Council and to the membership the actions taken in summary aggregate form."

### **B. Bylaws:** Amend 14.5.3.2, page 142, as follows: [Division I only]

"14.5.3.2 Waiver Procedures. The NCAA Academic Requirements Committee shall have the authority to authorize waivers of the grade-point average provisions of this legislation based upon objective evidence that demonstrates circumstances *in which a student's overall academic record* that warrant the waiver of the normal application of this regulation. The committee shall establish the process for granting such waivers and shall report at least annually to the NCAA Council and to the membership the actions taken in summary aggregate form."

### C. Bylaws: Amend 14.5.4.1.1, page 143, as follows: [Federated provision, Divisions I and II, divided vote]

"14.5.4.1.1 Waiver Procedures. The NCAA Academic Requirements Committee shall have the authority to authorize waivers of this requirement based upon objective evidence that demonstrates circumstances in which a student's overall academic record that warrant the waiver of the normal application of this regulation. The committee shall establish the process for granting such waivers and shall report at least annually to the NCAA Council and to the membership the actions taken in summary aggregate form."

### NO. 3 MINIMUM GRADE-POINT AVERAGE

Intent: To clarify that the minimum grade-point average requirements of the Association's satisfactory-progress legislation in Division I apply only to midyear transfer students who have completed their first term in residence, students who have completed an academic year in residence or students who have used a season of competition in a sport.

Bylaws: Amend 14.5.3, page 142, as follows: [Division I only]

"14.5.3 Fulfillment of Minimum Grade-Point Average Requirements—Division I. As a prerequisite for eligibility for competition, a Division I student-athlete shall present the minimum grade-point average specified below, computed pursuant to institutional policies applicable to all students. This provision shall be applicable to the eligibility not only of a continuing student, but also of a midyear transfer student from a two-year or four-year collegiate institution, even if the student who has not yet completed an academic year term in residence, a student who has completed an academic year in residence, or a student who has utilized a season of eligibility in a sport at the certifying institution."

[Remainder of 14.5.3 unchanged.]

**Constitution:** Amend 6.3.1 by adding new 6.3.1.1, page 43, as follows:

### [Division I only]

"6.3.1.1 Division I Exemption. Division I member institutions shall be exempt from the application of this legislation until the adjournment of the 1993 Convention."

on a single page. Those receiving the survey would be asked to identify the appropriate area, state the problem or objective that led to the successful program, describe the solution as concisely as possible and specify the cost and source of funds, if applicable.

The other subcommittee—the NCAA standards subcommittee, chaired by Charlotte West, Southern Illinois University at Carbondale—will split into two groups at the November 9 meeting. One group will review the work to date of the NCAA Special Committee on Athletics Certification and discuss ways in which the NCAA standards subcommittee might contribute to the work of the NCAA Committee on Athletics Certification (which would be created if Proposal No. 4 is approved by the 1993 Convention).

The other group will review the present financial aid limitations as they relate to gender equity and discuss criteria by which those limitations should be altered. The Eastern College Athletic Conference has formed the first intercollegiate women's ice hockey league and is scheduled to begin play for the 1993-94 scason.

The ECAC executive council approved a 12-team, single-roundrobin league, which would send its top eight finishers from regularseason play to the postseason ECAC tournament.

"This league is another important step in the development of women's ice hockey in this country," said Joe Bertagna, executive director of ECAC ice hockey. "The common schedule, with a tournament based on standings, provides a familiar structure for players, coaches and all who follow the women's game."

In the past, ECAC women's icc hockey consisted of nine Division I schools and six Division III schools, and each division held its own postseason tournament.

Twelve of those 15 varsity teams have agreed to join the new women's league: Brown University, Colby College, Cornell University, Dartmouth College, Harvard University, the University of New Hampshire, Northeastern University, Princeton University, Providence College, Rochester Institute of Technology, St. Lawrence University and Yale University.

The Division II women's ice hockey tournament has been discontinued, effective this season. At the end of the 1992-93 season, all 15 teams will be eligible for an eight-team open tournament.

Once the new league begins play, the postseason tournament will be open only to those teams that are members of the league.

### Women's colleges show strong recovery

**Higher education** 

Just when it appeared that all women's colleges were on the brink of extinction, they are beginning to flourish—thanks, in large part, to a growth in the importance of gender-equity issues.

"There's no question that there is a real resurgence of interest in these colleges, as the country gets more attuned to gender issues and what works well for girls and women," Marcia Sharp, a spokesperson for the Women's College Coalition, told The Associated Press.

At Hood College, for example, 80 percent of its 1990 graduates were employed within one year of graduation, 40 percent of those who found work got their first job through a Hood connection, and 30 percent were enrolled in graduate study, either full- or part-time.


"I do think that women benefit enormously from an environment that understands their ambitions, the circumstances of their lives and that also builds the confidence that they need to take on the many roles that they have in life after they graduate," said Elizabeth T. Kennan, president of Mount Holyoke College, the oldest institution of higher education for women in the United States.

## **Injuries force Oberlin to forfeit**

Oberlin College was forced to forfeit its game October 31 at Wittenberg University after its 29-man roster was pared to 13 by injuries in the previous week's 56-0 loss to Allegheny College.

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The school is holding out hope that enough players can regain their health to finish out the final two games of the season.

First-year coach Tony Pierce said the decision to cancel the Wittenberg game came after the trainer reported that 16 players from an already small roster were nursing a variety of minor and major injuries.

"Overall we don't feel great we had to cancel a football game. This is college football and we want to play," Pierce told The Associated Press. "But after looking at the injuries the kids had received and thinking about their health, we feel we made the right decision."

In the midst of a 26-game losing streak, the Yeomen haven't won more games than they have lost in a season since 1974. But school officials continue to hold out hope for the program's future.

"It's plain that we're not going to be a powerhouse any time soon in this conference (the North Coast Athletic Conference)," said Alfred MacKay, dean of Oberlin's college of arts and sciences and overseer of the athletics department. "But I hope we get to the point when we kind of break even on the thing, when we have a good chance of winning on any given day."

"In the '70s-or sometime, I forget exactly when --- we did think pretty hard about whether to keep football going," said MacKay. "But we decided to do it. It's got a lot of relationships to student recruiting and other areas. We think it's an important thing.

"We're doing about as well as we can probably do for a while. I hope we do better. We have a new coach, and I'm hoping he will help turn the thing around."

Pierce spent three seasons as a small-college assistant and three seasons as the coach at East Orange (New Jersey) High School in his hometown. He came in with his eyes open.

"I guess the alumni will probably start calling and asking some questions about what's going on over at Oberlin," he said. "But this is a situation I just walked into. Pcople are telling me they want a good, sound program here. That's what they're saying. I guess in the next few years we'll see if it's just talk or if it's really something they want to have here?

There have been some close calls this season — a 7-0 loss in the season opener to Thiel College and a 14-3 loss to Case Western Reserve University. But there also have been lopsided losses.

Pierce is trying to make the best of it.

"We hope we can chuckle about this someday," he said. "We have a vision for what we're going to do with this program.... It may be a blessing in disguise. We're not walking around with our tails between our legs. Our kids aren't. We believe in what we're doing and we're going to get the job donc."

## State aid for schools drops by one percent

State spending on higher education fell by one percent over the last two years, with colleges and universities in 17 states getting less money than they did two years earlier, according to a study.

Done annually by the Center for Higher Education at Illinois State University, the study said states will spend \$39.4 billion on colleges and student-aid programs in the 1992-93 academic year, \$300 million less than the amount spent in the preceding year.

The findings were reported October 28 in The Chronicle of Higher Education. University researchers said they believed the two-year drop to be the first since 1958, when they began compiling such data.

The recession was the pri-

mary reason for the cuts, the Chronicle reported, adding that many states raised tuition, froze hiring or eliminated some academic programs to try to soften the blow.

Virginia posted the largest decrease, 13 percent, followed by California's 12 percent. Nevada spent 27 percent more than two years ago, and two states-Missouri and Pennsylvania-were unchanged. Arkansas increased its collegiate spending by 25 percent.

Public colleges in 17 states are receiving lower appropriations this year, the study said. Those states are Alaska, California, Connecticut, Florida, Georgia, Illinois, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Minnesota, New York, Ohio, Rhode Island, South Carolina, Vermont, Virginia and Wyoming.

NCAA institutions should note that in accordance with Bylaws 17.02.6 and 17.02.6.1, a countable date of competition for a member institution, in those sports for which the limitations are based on days of competition, is a single date on which the institution's team in a sport engages in competition in that sport against an outside team. For individual sports, a member institution is considered to have participated in competition that constitutes a date of competition if the minimum number of student-athletes participating on one or more teams, at one or more sites, on behalf of the institution on that date equals or exceeds the minimum number established for that sport. [See Bylaws 20.9.3.3 (Division I), 20.10.3.5 (Division II) and 20.11.3.2 (Division III) for a listing of the minimum number of student-athletes per sport.]

The following examples illustrate the application of Bylaw 17.02.6.1:

1. An institution would be deemed to have used one date of competition if the institution participates in intercollegiate competition at two separate locations on a single date with the minimum number of required participants competing at each site.

2. An institution would be deemed to have used one date of competition if the institution participates in intercolle-

giate competition at two separate locations on a single date with the minimum number of participants competing at one site.

3. An institution would not be deemed to have used a date of competition if the institution participates in intercollegiate competition at two separate locations on a single date and the number of participants competing at each site does not meet the minimum number of participants, unless the combined total of participants at both sites meets the minimum number of participants specified in either Bylaw 20.9.3.3 (Division I), 20.10.3.5 (Division II) or 20.11.3.2 (Division III).

### Bylaw 14.5.5.1 and 14.5.4.3 **Designation of program of studies**

NCAA institutions should note that in accordance with Bylaw 14.5.5.1, credit hours necessary to meet satisfactory progress must be based on hours earned or accepted for degree credit toward any of the institution's degree programs or, if the student-athlete has designated a specific baccalaureate degree program, toward credit in that program. It should be noted that per Bylaw 14.5.4.3, a student-athlete must designate a program of studies by the beginning of his or her third year of enrollment (fifth semester or seventh quarter). The designation of a program of studies may be accomplished either by formal enrollment by the student-athlete in a specific baccalaureate degree program or approval by an appropriate academic official (who must not be an academic adviser/counselor employed by the athletics department) of the program leading to the specific baccalaureate degree that the student-athlete is pursuing.

### Bylaw 13.1.2.4-(b) Telephone calls during the conduct of athletics contests

During its September 24, 1992, conference, the Interpretations Committee determined that in accordance with Bylaw 13.1.2.4-(b), Divisions I and II staff members may not telephone a prospect [or the prospect's parent(s) or legal guardian(s)] during the conduct of any of the institution's intercollegiate athletics contests in that sport, which is defined as the time the institution's team reports on call at the site of the competition at the direction of the coach until the competition has concluded and the team has been dismissed by the coach. Thus, it is not permissible for an institution's coach to telephone a prospect [or the prospect's parent(s) or legal guardian(s)] from the competition site while the institution's team is engaging in pregame activities before the contest.

Heard reports from the October meetings of the Presidents Commission and the NCAA Council. The special committee noted that both bodies strongly support the certification proposal.

Certification

The Presidents Commission emphasized the need to continue working with the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools to eliminate possible redundancy between the athletics certification program and the Southern Association's accreditation process.

Discussed meetings with related associations and groups. In the last two months, members of the special committee have met with higher education groups, athletics associations and Division I conferences to discuss the certification program. They will continue to do so until the Convention.

Specific concerns have been expressed about the financial and administrative burdens the proposed program may place on institutions. Committee members rededicated themselves to identifying groups that have expressed

ings of those groups to discuss the certification concept.

Considered a recommendation (referred by the Council) from the Committee on Women's Athletics that senior women administrators be included on all peer-review teams. The special committee noted that it had considered the matter during its July 20-21 meeting and reaffirmed its earlier conclusion, which is set forth in proposed Bylaw 33.2.3.2.1.2 (that the pool of peer reviewers should include enough women and members of ethnic groups to assure their frequent assignments to review teams). The special committee did agree to forward the proposal to the Committee on Athletics Certification, which will evaluate the composition of peer-review teams if the certification proposal passes.

■ Voted to support a working agreement drafted by the ad hoc group established to minimize any duplication between the Southern Association accreditation program and the proposed NCAA certification program. The working group met October

will be forwarded to the Presidents Commission and Council for their pre-Convention meetings. Also, the Southern Association's Executive Council of Commissions on Colleges will consider the plan at its December meeting.

Approved an outline for a proposed handbook on athletics certification. The special committee had agreed earlier that one primary reference document should be developed to enable all information related to the programs to be made available to all involved parties (peer-review teams, member institutions and conferences).

Asked the Interpretations Committee to consider issuing three certification-related interpretations before the Convention.

The first would clarify that the composition of the proposed Committee on Athletics Certification, as set forth in proposed Bylaw 23.1.1, is not intended to exclude individuals with other campus responsibilities (for example, registrars, vice-presidents, associate directors of athletics). The proposed legislation requires only that the individuals referenced in the proposal (chief executive officers, faculty athletics representatives, directors of athletics, senior women administrators and conference commissioners) be represented on the committee.

The second would clarify that proposed Bylaw 33.2.3.1 provides an institution an opportunity to review a list of potential peer reviewers and chairs for purposes of identifying those who seem inappropriate or unacceptable to the institution; however, the authority established in proposed Bylaws 23.1.3-(b) and 33.2.2, which places the responsibility for appointing peer-review teams with the Committee on Athletics Certification, prevails in terms of composition of t<del>e</del>ams.

The third would clarify the special committee's original intent that Divisions II and III institutions that sponsor Division I sports would not be required to participate in the certification program in the event that it becomes mandatory for Division I only.

### procedures are desirable.

Self-study

After its formation in May, the committee identified portions of the original nine sections of the ISSG that are not relevant to Division III institutions and reworked other portions to provide information specifically for the division's members.

The committee then shared a draft of the Division III edition of the guide with approximately 40 athletics administrators and asked for reactions and suggestions. The document also was reviewed by the Division III subcommittee of the NCAA Presidents Commission and by the Association's legal counsel before its submission to the headings: Council for final approval.

Adoption of the Division III ISSG will not require that member institutions begin a new five-year self-study cycle under Constitution 6.3.1. Institutions that have completed a self-study recently will not be required to complete the revised ISSG at any time prior to completion of a current five-year cycle.

Division III institutions, however, are being encouraged to use the guide soon. Its purpose is to assist in assessing the role of athletics in an institution's educational mission.

The Division III ISSG's questions are arranged under nine

■ Institutional purpose and athletics philosophy.

■ The authority of the chief executive officer in personnel and financial affairs.

Institutional control and accountability of financial aid and athletics program finances.

Athletics program organization and administration.

Employment of athletics program personnel.

Institutional student services.

Student-athlete profiles.

Closing one historically black university and merging three other schools will hurt, not help, efforts to further integrate Mississippi's higher education system, critics told a Federal judge October 29.

In a packed courtroom, the state College Board, which oversees Mississippi's cight public universities, outlined its plan to close and merge schools to settle a 17-yearold lawsuit.

Among other things, the proposal would result in the closing of Mississippi Valley State University (an NCAA Division 1 institution).
