Search process underway

The NCAA Executive Committee has initiated the hiring process for an executive director.

The Executive Committee conducted a telephone conference May 24, at which time it worked toward forming a search committee to find a replacement for current Executive Director Richard D. Schultz, who announced his resignation May 11. The Executive Committee hopes to have members of the search committee confirmed by the end of this week.

The search committee is expected to meet for the first time in early June. At that time, it will develop procedures for the search and selection process and also will discuss a timetable.

The position will be advertised in The NCAA News, the Chronicle of Higher Education, and selected daily newspapers. The search committee will send memorandums with the announcement to all chief executive officers and commissioners at member institutions and conferences; the announcement also will be sent to chief executive officers of selected national education associations.

The Executive Committee is responsible for employing the executive director, with the approval of the NCAA Council and the NCAA Presidents Commission.

Summer tourney certification sought

The NCAA Recruiting Committee will recommend to the NCAA Council that certification be required of summer basketball tournaments at which college prospects are competing.

Currently, basketball coaches may attend during the July evaluation period only those summer leagues and camps that have been certified by the NCAA. Some individuals who previously operated

camps now are conducting the unregulated summer tournaments instead. The committee expressed its belief that the program to certify camps has operated well and hoped that the efforts to supplement that program with the certification of tournaments will enhance prospects' summer basketball experiences.

The Recruiting Committee en-

visions a certification checklist similar to that required for camps.

The committee, which met May 18-19 in Santa Fe, New Mexico, also considered several items that had been referred to it by the NCAA Legislative Review Committee regarding rules simplification and deregulation. The

Panel nearing recommendations

Presidents await financial proposals

The NCAA Special Committee to Review Financial Conditions in Intercollegiate Athletics expects to finalize its recommendations during a still-to-be-scheduled telephone conference before the NCAA Presidents Commission's June 29-30 meeting.

The special committee reviewed a "working draft" of those recommendations during its final scheduled in-person meeting May 20 at Hilton Head, South Carolina.

Committee members suggested several changes in that draft and will review a final draft during the upcoming telephone conference.

The committee also will decide during that conference how to circulate those final recommendations to the membership for review.

The special committee plans to provide the Presidents Commission with specific recommendations for legislation to be considered at the 1994 Convention, as well as other recommendations for further study and consideration by the Association and recommendations to institutions and conferences.

The committee has sought reaction from various constituencies to a list of 17 "legislative concepts" for consideration as recommendations for the 1994 Convention, as well as several longer-term concepts, financial aid models, and recommendations to institutions and conferences. Those concepts have undergone some revision and could be revised further before the committee presents its

Joint Policy Board encourages reaction

The NCAA Joint Policy Board continues to invite membership reaction to the conclusions it has reached regarding the Association's legislative procedures, as reported in the April 14 issue of The NCAA News.

The Board tentatively favors the following:

- Establishment of a one-year moratorium on amending any legislation adopted at a Convention. In simple terms, something adopted at the 1994 Convention could not be amended until the 1996 Convention, with an exemption procedure that would permit the membership to override the moratorium on a given proposal

by a two-thirds vote.

- Approval of the changes in the legislative calendar that were contained in 1993 Convention Proposal No. 52, which was withdrawn. Those changes essentially provide for later deadlines for submitting proposals.

The Board does not favor:

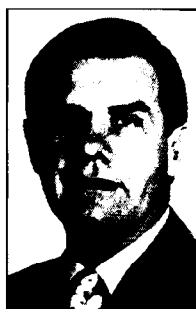
- Biennial legislative Conventions.

- Increasing the number of sponsors required to submit legislation.

Gender equity

Task force conducts hearings on report

The NCAA Gender-Equity Task Force is in the process of conducting hearings on its preliminary report.

The report was mailed to the membership May 11 and appeared in the May 19 issue of The NCAA News. Hearings were conducted May 21 in San Francisco and May 26 in Chicago. A third hearing will be conducted May 27 in Washington, D.C. A review of the hearings will appear in the June 2 issue of The NCAA News.

The task force is encouraging those who could not attend any of the hearings to submit written reaction. Those interested in doing so may send it to Ursula R. Walsh, director of research, at the national office.

After the hearings, a report will be drafted for the NCAA Presidents Commission to consider at its June 29-30 meeting.

Committee moves toward fall schedule announcement

A subcommittee of the NCAA Committee on Athletics Certification has reaffirmed its desire to produce a single, five-year certification schedule for all Division I institutions.

The possibility of releasing the schedule in increments had been discussed, but the subcommittee reaffirmed the original plan to release a single schedule.

Many conferences prefer to provide their own certification schedule, and the committee has sent materials to aid them in that regard.

In late April, Division I members and conferences received forms for nominating peer reviewers for the program. Qualifications for peer reviewers were detailed in a story that appeared in the April 21 issue of The NCAA News. Nominations are due August 15.

Rules federation

Committee explores 'tiers of emphasis'

The NCAA Special Committee to Study Rules Federation by Sport, acknowledging the discussion to be "broad and preliminary," explored the concept of permitting institutions to assign sports to national or regional "tiers of emphasis."

The approach that was discussed would involve permitting institutions to compete in some sports on a more regulated "national level" while maintaining others at a less regulated "regional level."

Special committee expects to finalize recommendations

The NCAA Special Committee to Review Financial Conditions in Intercollegiate Athletics reviewed a "working draft" of its recommendations at its May 20-21 meeting and expects to submit a final set to the NCAA Presidents Commission for consideration at that group's June 29-30 meeting.

The committee will conduct a telephone conference between now and the Presidents Commission meeting, at which time it is expected to make final changes and discuss how to distribute those final recommendations to the membership.

At an April 29-30 meeting, the committee heard reaction from several groups to the 17 "legislative concepts" that it formulated earlier this year.

Council reviews report of ad hoc committee

Revenues

Division II members receive checks from fund

Checks totaling \$3 million from the Division II enhancement fund have been mailed to the Division II membership as part of the NCAA revenue-distribution plan.

The Division II Championships Committee determined that one-half of the fund should be divided evenly among all Division II members, except for those institutions that opted to compete in one or more NAIA team championships. Checks from that half of the fund were \$7,732.

The remaining half of the fund was distributed to conference offices and independent institutions based upon their participation in the Division II Men's Basketball Championship from 1987 through 1992.

The first installment of the revenue-distribution plan was paid April 23 when checks from the basketball fund were mailed to Division I members.

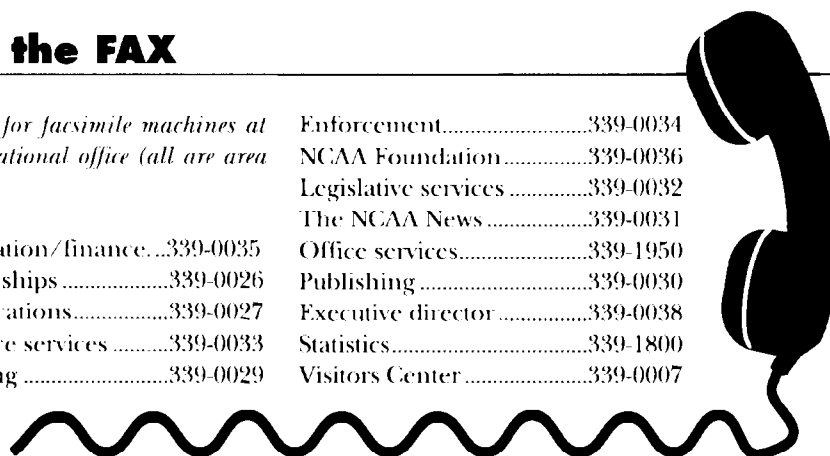

Family ties decisive

Decisions, decisions. They often are difficult for high-school seniors who find themselves courting scholarship offers from several colleges and universities.

When that time came for **Tim Pettorini**, a sophomore baseball player, and **Gary Nye**, a freshman golfer, at the College of Wooster, the decision-making process was even more complicated. That is because the fathers of Pettorini and Nye are baseball and golf coaches, respectively, at Wooster and coveted their sons' athletics talents for their teams. They got them.

"I couldn't see myself playing for anyone else," said Nye, whose dad, Bob, has coached golf at Wooster since the mid-1960s. "I was so used to having him help me out that I wasn't sure I would be comfortable with another coach."

For Pettorini, it was not so much his father's presence as the success of the baseball program that helped make the decision.

"I chose Wooster because of the strength of its academic programs and the success of its baseball program," said Pettorini, whose father owns a 328-163-5 mark at the school. "It wasn't so much playing for my dad as it was playing in the program that he built. I liked his system, and I thought it would be the best situation for me."

What does one of the fathers say? "I tried to keep out of the decision," **Bob Nye** said. "We tried to keep the options as open as they could be, but it became clear that Wooster was the best choice."

"I secretly hoped that he would play for me, but I tried not to let on."

A real cooker

When **Andrew Buggs** was not cracking shoulder pads as a football player at Iowa State University, he sometimes could be found cracking eggs in Iowa State's home economics laboratories.

Buggs, a four-year starter at defensive back for the Cyclones, recently graduated as a certified vocational home economics teacher, making him the first male in memory to complete a degree in the discipline at the school, according to the Des Moines (Iowa) Register.

Soon, Buggs will be teaching high school students the ins and outs of homemaking. But home economics teachers don't stop there these days. Buggs also will tutor students on life skills, which attracted him to the field in the first place, he says.

"I like the practical aspect of it... teaching the students the family living and child development (lessons)," Buggs said. "Those are things they can use right now."

Buggs recently finished student teaching at F. L. Schlagle High School in Kansas City, Kansas, as part of the Cooperative Urban Teacher Education program that gives students teaching experience at culturally diverse schools.

Minister of defense

Richie Butler, a safety on the football team at Southern Methodist University, runs head first into a paradox every time he steps on the field. On one hand, coaches are telling him to hit his opponent with everything he has, but on the other, Butler's personal attitude as a licensed Baptist minister is one of peace.

Butler has found an interesting way of making things mesh. After nailing an opponent during a play, Butler lends a hand to help them to their feet and says, "The Lord loves you."

"The players probably think I'm crazy," Butler told The Dallas Morning News. "They're probably used to somebody talking trash to them, so I probably catch them off guard."

Butler bestowed his blessings on opponents often last year, finishing the season as the Mustangs' third-leading tackler with 76.

Milestones

Yvette Girouard, women's softball coach at the University of Southwestern Louisiana, won her 400th career game April 4. She is in her 13th year at the institution....**University of Texas at Arlington** baseball coach **Butch McBroom**, who has led that program since 1974, etched his 600th victory this season....**Paul Mainieri**, baseball coach at the U.S. Air Force Academy, registered his 300th career victory with a 15-7 victory April 25 over the University of Utah. Mainieri is in his 11th season as a head coach and his fifth year at Air Force.

Buddy Bolding, baseball coach at Longwood College, notched victory No. 400 April 1....**Bob Bellizzi**, baseball coach at the College of Saint Rose, picked up his 400th victory April 24 when his Golden Knights defeated Concordia College (New York), 4-0. Fifty-six of those victories came between 1979 and 1984 when the team competed at the club level....**Bob Hannah**, baseball coach at the University of Delaware, posted his 750th career victory April 20 with a 26-7 thumping of Delaware State College. It was the first meeting between the state's only two Division I baseball programs.

NACDA to discuss athlete issues

Issues involving student-athletes will dominate the first full day of panel discussions at the 28th annual National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) convention.

More than 1,000 athletics administrators are expected to attend the convention June 6-9 at the Marriott Hotel and Marina in San Diego.

The convention will devote June 7 to an observance of "Student-Athlete Day," featuring discussions led by panelists Kathleen LaRose, associate athletics director at the University of Arizona; David Finnane of Teamwork Partners; Ron Heitzinger of Heitzinger and Associates, and Don Casselman and Mary Anne Heath of "Success from Within."

There will be sessions on personal-development programs, HIV/AIDS, alcohol and date-rape education, and career development, in addition to a Division I student-athlete forum.

Also, 10 \$5,000 postgraduate scholarships will be awarded at the NACDA/Disney luncheon to student-athletes who have been

selected from an initial group of more than 330 nominees. The annual NACDA/National Invitation Tournament Athletics Directors Award will be presented to Duke University athletics director Tom Butters. Television broadcaster Keith Jackson of ABC Sports will be the featured speaker at the luncheon.

New this year is an awards ceremony for "coaches of record." These are the 33 coaches who helped tutor medal-winning athletes or teams at the 1992 Olympic Games. Also, LeRoy Walker, president of the United States Olympic Committee (USOC), will receive the James J. Corbett Award, which is presented to the top athletics administrator each year. Harvey Schiller, executive director of the USOC, will deliver the keynote address.

On June 8, the theme is "Leadership Day" and panel discussions will feature topics such as "The Athletics Director as a Leader: The Positive Impact of Our Profession" and "Coaches' Forum: Questions and Answers for Coaches and ADs."

The final day of the convention will be devoted to reports on NCAA special committees, including the Gender-Equity Task Force, the Special Committee to Study Rules Federation by Sport and the Special Committee to Review Financial Conditions in Intercollegiate Athletics.

In addition, the NACDA Foundation is sponsoring the fourth annual Workshop for Athletics Fund-Raisers June 5-7. The second annual National Association of Collegiate Marketing Administrators (NACMA) Workshop will be held on those dates as well.

NACDA also is serving as host for several other affiliated athletics associations that will meet during the NACDA convention. These organizations include the College Business Management Association, the National Association of Athletic Compliance Coordinators, the National Association of Athletic Development Directors, the National Association of Collegiate Women Athletic Administrators, the NAIA Athletics Directors Association and the National Alliance of Two-Year College Athletic Administrators.

Reduce expenses outside the game

We continue to profess that basketball coaches, and therefore the National Association of Basketball Coaches, want to be part of the solution and not the problem.

The efforts of a number of individuals and groups representing the NABC have helped us reach some agreements and recommendations.

So many of our rules are initiated because of repeated abuses, but so often the restrictive rules make it even more difficult for the people who keep the rules. Many times, the rules are made to apply to the top major institutions or the name players, and quite often these rules hurt the midmajor or low-major institutions and then filter down to Divisions II or III. Restrictive rules do not help the less talented with fewer resources to compete.

With that in mind, we have increased our efforts to be focused on what is best for the student-athlete and have attempted to be fiscally responsible. We have agreed with many of the legislative concepts developed by the NCAA Special Committee to Review Financial Conditions in Intercollegiate Athletics, and, more importantly, we have offered alternatives.

Any movement toward cost reduction or cost containment always should start with those outside the game and then work inside. The players and the game should come first. Things that affect them should be the last to be cut or reduced.

All of our studies and reports from all the various groups we have worked with show that the largest increase in athletics spending over the last 10 to 15 years has come in athletics administration and not in basketball.

When we surveyed our schools, it was startling to see the increases in that area. Compliance officers, assistant athletics directors, more personnel in sports information offices, secretaries for all new positions, office space, and computers and other equipment all are part of this big jump in expenses. At one major institution, there were 11 people in the athletics department in 1982 (not counting coaches), and

Interest will follow opportunity

The study conducted by Terry Don Phillips and Paul Makris and described in their April 21 guest editorial ("Interest a factor in equity equation") fails in its methodology as well as in its argument.

The authors cite current participation levels in intramural, recreational and high-school sports as an indicator of the level of interest among women in athletics. Similar to the approach of Dan Beebe's guest editorial of March 24, this analysis is short-sighted. It does not consider the story behind, nor the meaningfulness of, the data presented.

How does an interest in sports develop in a young person? Is a person whose role model is a nonathlete more or less likely to develop such an interest than a person whose role model is an athlete? How are role models developed? Are girls encouraged differently from boys?

Some understanding of sports participation would be germane to the theory that participation is a measure of interest. The authors should ask for and give some meaning to the numbers before including the data in the definition of interest in sports. The authors should ask why and how the numbers came to be.

Historically, females of any age have not had opportunities equal to males to participate in sports. This statement

is generally agreed upon throughout the sports community and has been repeatedly proven. Yet the Phillips-Makris study misfires by acknowledging the issue without offering an attempt to prove that the statement does not hold true for the sample base or any other age group at any commitment level—collegiate, recreational, intramural, interscholastic or otherwise.

Moreover, it is invalid to refute an assumed response of equalization proponents—that lack of opportunities oppresses interest—with the statement that girls make up 69 percent of the participants in "other activities" and are thus more interested in other activities than in sports. Is it not obvious that females participate in other activities because they have fewer opportunities to play sports than males?

I contend that participation levels are not a meaningful measure for a comparison of interest in sports because men and women do not have equal opportunity to express interest. I emphatically agree with Nancy Stevens' statement that "reliance on participation numbers...has resulted in an inaccurate profile of the intent of females to become involved in sports."

In studying a problem, it is impor-

tant to use relevant and meaningful statistics. When solving the problem, it is crucial to consider the short- and long-term goals and the side effects of any resolution.

As most young people today understand, recycling, for example, is not a temporary fad. It is an attempt to solve a short- and long-term problem and leave behind a healthy planet to all persons who have not yet been born. We must do the same at our universities. We must structure programs that consider long-term goals while reacting to and operating under constantly changing short-term financial and political situations.

Simplification can enhance reform

"With the adoption of 'certification' at its Convention, the NCAA has continued the major reform movement that, in essence, began in the mid-'80s with Proposition 48. From that initial date through today, we have made changes to rules on recruiting, initial eligibility, satisfactory progress, coaching limitations, and playing- and practice-season limitations, among others.

"As we continue to reform, we also must continue to talk about the need for simplification. There is clearly a consensus among our membership that rules need to be simplified. For those of us who are challenged on a daily basis by difficult questions from our coaches, administrative staff and constituencies, while simultaneously attempting to decipher the volumes of information that constantly flow as a result of new and old legislation, this need to simplify is compelling.

"While zealously attempting to make real and significant changes in how we conduct ourselves, we have made our rules more complicated, more difficult to understand and enforce, and subject to ever-increasing volumes of interpretation....

"This is not to suggest that the task of simplification is an easy one. To maintain the ideals behind the reform while at the same time simplifying the rules is a considerable endeavor. The first step in that direction, however, is for us to continue to think of reform and simplification at the same time. As we prepare new legislation, we should think of how the legislation can be simplified with an insightful eye toward the anticipated amount of interpretation that will be required to enforce it"

"Jimmy Foxx hit 534 career homers and is, of course, in the Hall of Fame. If he hadn't emptied so many bottles, though, he probably would have hit about 700 homers.

"In that era, hard drinking was considered a badge of

honor. Jokes were prevalent; I remember hearing that Paul Waner, another legendary drinker who is in the Hall of Fame, had said that he saw two baseballs coming to the plate and just swung at one of them.

"It hasn't been until recently, when Don Newcombe and other former stars have talked of the problems caused by their drinking, that there has been some understanding of the damage it has caused.

"Now, the reaction has swung the other way, to condemnation of those taking the so-called recreational drugs. Both approaches to alcoholism/drug abuse are wrong. We all need to take a deep breath and approach this subject with more logic and less emotion.

"Yes, drug addiction and alcoholism are serious problems that need to be treated with support and rehabilitation programs, but they are problems chiefly for those afflicted and their families, not for the rest of us."

Paying athletes

"The most meaningful reform the NCAA could undertake hasn't been considered. The NCAA should rethink its reason for being, what it wants to regulate and why.

"Word arrived (recently) that U.S. athletes who win gold medals in the Olympics will receive \$15,000 each. Elsewhere, the sham associated with amateur athletics is being peeled away. The NCAA is becoming the last bastion of hypocrisy and exploitation.

"This isn't one of those pleas to pay the players. The issue is more complex than some would have us believe, what with budget crunches at some schools and gender-equity considerations across the board. It might never be feasible to put college athletes on salary, but lifting some of the restrictions on them is practical now....

"The problem, of course, is that some schools have more well-heeled jockaholic boosters than others, and allowing them to spread joy tilts the playing field. The NCAA's rules are all about mandating for all its members an honest chance at teledollars and bowl booty and very little about enriching the lives of the athletes."

■ State legislation relating to college athletics

This report summarizes legislation currently pending in state legislatures that could affect, or is otherwise of interest to, the intercollegiate athletics programs and student-athletes at NCAA member institutions.

Set forth below is a list of 28 bills from 15 states. The report includes four bills that have been introduced, and 24 pending bills on which action has been taken, since the last report (May 12). The newly introduced bills are marked with an asterisk. Pending bills discussed in the previous report on which no action has been taken do not appear in this report.

This report is based on data provided by the Information for Public Affairs on-line state legislation system as of May 20, 1993. The listed bills were selected for inclusion from a larger pool of bills concerning sports, and they therefore do not necessarily represent all bills that would interest individual member institutions. Bills pending in the District of Columbia and U.S. territories are not available on-line and are not included.

The NCAA has not verified the accuracy or completeness of the information and is providing this summary as a service to members. For further information regarding a particular bill, members should contact the state legislature concerned.

Three bills have become law since the last report, including two on athletics trainers and one on gender equity. Seven state legislatures—Alabama, Alaska, Arkansas, Colorado, Hawaii, Missouri and Vermont—have adjourned since the last report, bringing to 25 the number of state legislatures that have adjourned. In Alaska, Hawaii and Vermont, pending bills will carry over to 1994. In Missouri, pending bills may be considered if the legislature reconvenes in 1993, but they will not carry over to 1994. In the remaining three states, bills will not carry over, and pending bills died at the conclusion of the session if they had not been cleared for the governor's signature.

Alabama S. 318 (Author: deGraffenried)

Provides for the regulation and licensure of athletics trainers; establishes an Athletic Trainers' Board; prescribes civil procedures for appeals; provides penalties.

The restriction is for events that occur during the Division I summer evaluation periods (July 5-31 for men and July 8-31 for women).

Division I Men's Golf

Post-Mickelson Sun Devils, Arizona lead field

Event: 1993 Division I Men's Golf Championships.

Overview: Arch-rivals Arizona State and Arizona figure to head a strong field that also includes Georgia Tech and Oklahoma State. Arizona State won this year's Pacific-10 Conference team title by two strokes over Arizona, but medalist honors went to Arizona's Jason Gore, who bested the Sun Devils' Todd Demsey on the second playoff hole. Gore is listed as the Wildcats' No. 5 player. Other Wildcats who figure to contend for NCAA medalist honors include Manny Zerman, a top-four finisher in each of the last three championships, and 1993 Pac-10 player of the year David Berganio. Georgia Tech will mount its challenge behind all-America candidate David Duval. The Yellow Jackets have been atop the national rankings throughout much of the campaign. Other contenders for the team title include Texas and Arkansas.

Field: A total of 156 golfers representing nine districts will compete for the team and individual championships.

Dates and site: The championships will be June 2-5 at The Champions in Lexington, Kentucky. The University of Kentucky will serve as the host institution.

Television coverage: Championships highlights produced by AdCraft will be available on a tape-delayed basis.

Results: Championships results will appear in the June 9 issue of The NCAA News.

Championships notes: Now that three-time medalist Phil Mickelson of Arizona State has taken his game to the

professional ranks, the field appears to be wide open. The heir apparent may be Arizona's Zerman, who finished third last year....Georgia Tech's Duval is attempting to become only the third four-time all-American in Division I. Mickelson and Wake Forest's Gary Hallberg are the others. Duval, runner-up at the 1991 championships, won medalist honors at this year's Atlantic Coast Conference championships....Oklahoma State has participated in the last 45 championships, dating back to 1947. Since 1975, the Cowboys have finished no worse than fourth, and this year shouldn't be any different as coach Mike Holder returns four all-Americans from last year's squad.

What they are saying

**Randy Lein, head coach

"Without Phil (Mickelson), we've had to rely on a lot of good team performances. We haven't shot the real low rounds, the 67s and 68s, but we've had a lot of solid scores around par. Our team scoring average per round (289.83) ranks first in the country. Of course, Oklahoma State is in the race every year. Mike Holder (Oklahoma State coach) does just a fantastic job in Stillwater. Georgia Tech has played exceptionally well this spring, and Arkansas has been strong."

Division I Women's Track

Tigers seek seventh straight

Event: 1993 Division I Women's Outdoor Track and Field Championships.

Overview: Louisiana State has dominated the championships, winning six consecutive team titles. The Tigers are strong favorites to make it seven. Depth and balance have become Louisiana State trademarks during its six-year reign—the Tigers have won only 14 individual titles during that span. With Cheryl Taplin (100- and 200-meter dashes) and Youlanda Warren (400-meter dash) setting the pace in the sprints and Daphnie Saunders (triple jump) and Danyel Mitchell (discus) leading the way in the field events, Louisiana State has more than enough talent and experience to defend its crown. Arizona State and Wisconsin head the list of challengers

hoping to keep the Tigers within sight. Arizona State, which finished fourth in 1990, will rely heavily on sisters Omolade and Omotayo Akinremi, who are among the nation's top 400-meter run and 400-meter hurdles performers.

Field: The NCAA Executive Committee has approved a qualifying procedure that allows for a maximum of 280 student-athletes.

Dates and site: The championships will be June 2-5 at New Orleans. Tulane is the host institution.

Television coverage: The championships will be broadcast tape-delayed by CBS at 4:30 p.m. Eastern time June 6.

Results: Championships results will appear in the June 9 issue of The NCAA News.

Championships notes: Louisiana State's six-point victory over runner-up Florida last year was the closest finish since the Tigers edged UCLA by three points in 1988....Tanya Hughes of Arizona is bidding to become the first athlete to win three consecutive high-jump titles....Florida's Leah Kirklin, defending triple-jump champion, is attempting to join Sheila Hudson of California (1987 and 1988) as winners of consecutive titles in that event.

"I look (at the NCAA championships) with a great deal of expectations and apprehension. I know the competition is going to be keen and steep. (Louisiana State) is an extremely tough team. Division I Men's Track

Razorbacks appear to hold edge

Event: Division I Men's Outdoor Track and Field Championships.

Overview: Arkansas is the defending champion and the favorite to win its second consecutive title, but that isn't to say the Razorbacks will not be challenged. As many as six teams could occupy the winner's circle at the conclusion of the four-day event. Among the challengers are Tennessee, Louisiana State, Ohio State, Florida, UCLA and UTEP. As in the past, Arkansas will be well represented. The Razorbacks could have more than 10 athletes, as well as two relay teams, competing. The Razorbacks' strength lies in the distance and field events where standouts such as Niall Bruton (1,500-meter run), Frank Hanley (10,000-meter run), Ray Doakes (high jump) and Erick Walder (long jump and triple jump) lead the way. While other teams may not be able to match Arkansas' depth, they certainly can match their talent. Tennessee, with Jose Parrilla, a 1992 U.S. Olympian and defending 800-meter run champion, and Louisiana State, with Glenroy Gilbert (100- and 200-meter dashes) and Reggie Jones (long jump and triple jump), have several athletes capable of racking up points.

Field: The NCAA Executive Committee has approved a qualifying procedure that allows for a maximum of 388 student-athletes.

Dates and site: The championships will be held June 2-5 at New Orleans. Tulane is the host institution.

Television coverage: The championships will be broadcast tape-delayed by CBS at 4:30 p.m. Eastern time June 6.

Results: Championships results will appear in the June 9 issue of The NCAA News.

Championships notes: Three of the last four championships have been de-

cided by fewer than 10 points.

Upset-minded: No. 5-seeded Texas nets title

When Texas was awarded the No. 5 seed at the 1993 Division I Women's Tennis Championships, it made little difference to the Longhorns. They believed they were No. 1.

And they soon made believers of everyone else.

Susan Gilchrist and Vickie Paynter posted victories at Nos. 1 and 3 singles, respectively, and then teamed at No. 1 doubles to record the title-clinching victory against Stanford as Texas won its first tennis team title May 16 at Florida.

Texas, which was runner-up in

1992, won the final, 5-2. The Lady Longhorns are the lowest seed to win the title. Stanford won the 1987 title as the No. 4 seed.

Texas' triumph over Stanford capped a performance that saw the Longhorns knock off the three top-seeded teams. Texas defeated No. 3 Duke in the quarterfinals and No. 1 Florida in the semifinals before downing No. 2 Stanford.

Florida's Lisa Raymond won her second consecutive singles title, joining Stanford's Patty Fendick (1986 and 1987) as the only players to win back-to-back titles. Michelle Oldham and Alix Creek of Arizona were awarded the doubles crown when Texas' Gilchrist and Paynter defaulted in the final.

"All last year and this year we believed that we were No. 1," said Texas assistant coach Vicki Ellis, who guided the team after coach Jeff Moore left the championships to be with his ill father in New Hampshire. "We took every loss as a learning experience. The ladies

focused on this national tournament all year long.

"The entire year was a learning experience for the coaches and players, building ourselves up for this tournament."

The Longhorns' focus and determination came shining through in the team final, where they claimed four of six singles matches, including Gilchrist's three-set triumph over No. 2-ranked Laxmi Poruri at No. 1 singles. Paynter

dropped only three games in beating Kim Shasby at No. 3 singles.

Gilchrist and Paynter, the championships' No. 2 doubles seed, clinched the title with a 6-3, 6-0 victory over Heather Willens and Poruri, the No. 3-ranked doubles duo.

Raymond, a sophomore who announced before the championships that she would turn professional after the season, won her second singles title by defeating

Cinda Gurney of North Carolina, 6-3, 6-1, in the singles final. Raymond dropped only 23 games in six matches and improved her season record to 31-0. In two championships appearances, Raymond did not drop a set and lost only 55 of 201 games.

"Today (May 20) was the way I wanted to leave Florida," said Raymond. "There's been a lot of emotion running through my head. I'll be leaving a lot of friends in Flor-

ida."

Creek and Oldham won Arizona's first championships title when Gilchrist was unable to compete due to a rotator cuff injury in her left shoulder. The Wildcat tandem, which was unseeded, recorded its biggest victory during second-round action when it stunned California's Keirsten Alley and Pam Nelson, the No. 1 seed, 6-1, 6-0.

Tournament favorite does the expected in I men's tennis

With six returning players from a squad that advanced to the semifinals of last year's Division I Men's Tennis Championships, Southern California was labeled as the team to beat this year.

The Trojans did not disappoint. Jon Leach outlasted Georgia's Craig Baskin in a three-set marathon at No. 4 singles and Southern California broke a 3-3 deadlock by sweeping Nos. 2 and 3 doubles to win the team title May 18 at Georgia. The match was played before an NCAA tennis-record crowd of 5,435.

Southern California, the No. 1 seed, edged the Bulldogs, 5-3, in winning its second title in three years and 14th overall.

Georgia, which also was runner-up to Southern California in 1991, placed second for the third time in five years.

Chris Woodruff of Tennessee, the championships' No. 1 singles seed, won the singles title, and David Blair and Mark Merklein of Florida won the doubles crown.

"This was a great win for our program, obviously," said Southern California coach Dick Leach. "I think maybe the first (title) in '91 was better because at that time I wasn't sure I was ever going to win

one.... Although the first was best, this one is very sweet."

It also may have been tougher. Trailing 3-2 in singles, Southern California drew even when Jon Leach fought off match point and defeated Baskin, 7-6 (5), in a third-set tiebreaker.

"Everyone was really fired up after my match," Jon Leach said. "It just took the (Georgia) fans out of it. If I had lost that match, I guarantee the fans would have lost their voices from screaming so loud."

Sparked by Leach's performance, the Trojans clinched the title when David Ekerot and Andras Lanyi, then Wayne Black and Kent Seton, posted triumphs at Nos. 2 and 3 doubles, respectively. Black and Seton recorded the title-clinching victory, defeating Baskin and Mike Sell.

Woodruff, a sophomore, won Tennessee's first singles title when he defeated Georgia's Wade McGuire, the No. 4 seed, 6-3, 6-1. Woodruff's title run included a three-set victory over Louisiana State's Tamer El Sawy, the No. 3

seed.

The runner-up finish is the second straight for McGuire, who lost to Stanford's Alex O'Brien in 1992. It is the third consecutive year a Bulldog player has finished second in singles. Patricio Arnold was runner-up in 1991.

Blair and Merklein's hopes for a doubles crown seemed slim after Merklein suffered a foot injury in the singles championships.

But they overcame a one-set deficit to defeat Chris Cocotos and Michael Flanagan of Stanford. The Gator duo became the first non-California team since 1983 to win the doubles crown.

Early lead holds up as Abilene Christian wins II men's golf

Abilene Christian built an early lead over defending champion Columbus in the first two rounds to win its first Division II Men's Golf Championships team title May 18-21 at the Turlock Country Club in Turlock, California.

Abilene Christian, led by medalist Jeev Singh's six-under-par 282, also had to overcome host Cal State Stanislaus, which led the field at the halfway mark and was tied for the lead after the third round.

The Warriors' Brad Long, whose second-round 65 was a tournament best and gave Cal State Stanislaus a seven-shot lead, suffered a wrist injury and struggled to a third-round 76 before withdrawing from the tournament on the final day.

Without Long, Cal State Stanislaus struggled to a final-round 306 and finished fourth. No host institution has won the team title since Florida Southern in 1982.

Abilene Christian pulled into a third-round tie with Cal State Stanislaus behind Singh, Marcus Cain and Matt Welch, who each fired an even-par 72. Columbus also picked up seven shots on the Warriors in the third round on the strength of Martin Lonardi's 70 and a 72 from Mark Immelman, who finished

fifth last year. Abilene Christian and Columbus both shot 296 in the final round.

Singh won medalist honors in a playoff with Lonardi. Singh birdied five of the final seven holes, including the 18th, to catch Lonardi, then rolled in a short birdie putt on the par-5 second playoff hole after Lonardi missed his birdie attempt. The two golfers tied for third place in last year's championships, and Lonardi was vying to become Columbus' fourth medalist in five years.

Brian Paulson of Winona State was tied for the lead with Singh and Lonardi with two holes left to play, but Lonardi and Singh birdied the 17th and 18th holes, respectively, to drop Paulson to third. Brian Kassel of South Carolina-Aiken and Travis Dickson of Rollins rounded out the top five.

Florida Southern rallied from a rocky start to finish third in the team competition, two strokes behind Columbus. Those two schools had won the last four titles and 10 overall during the championships' 31-year history.

Lander turns first year in Division II to championship gold

If Lander's first Division II Men's Tennis Championships appearance is any indication, the Senators are going to be a force for quite some time.

Brett Simpson and Lee Holyoak each posted singles victories and then teamed to win a title-clinching doubles match against Hampton as Lander won its first team title May 16 at Central Oklahoma.

The Senators, competing in their first season as an NCAA Division II member, won the team final, 5-2.

Hampton, runner-up in 1992, finished second for the fifth time in nine years. Rollins defeated UC Davis in the third-place match.

Mark Segesta of UC Davis claimed the singles title, and Steve Kobold and Oscar Mancisidor of Cal Poly Pomona won the doubles crown.

It was the first singles title for a UC Davis player since Tim Monroe won the crown in 1976.

Kobold and Mancisidor took Cal Poly Pomona's first individual title by knocking off Mark Nielsen and Ricardo Reyes of Cal Poly San Luis Obispo, 6-4, 6-2, in the doubles final. Kobold and Mancisidor recorded the championships' biggest upset when they defeated Hampton's Cantuaria and Roberto Cavalcante, the No. 1 seed, in quarterfinal play.

Tritons finally nab golf crown

For UC San Diego golf coach Mike Wydra, there is no place like home.

Wydra's Tritons, perennial powers in Division III men's golf but never champions, finally won a team title at the Division III Men's Golf Championships May 18-21 at Torrey Pines in San Diego.

It was the first time in the 19-year history of the championships that a team from the West Coast has hosted the tournament, but

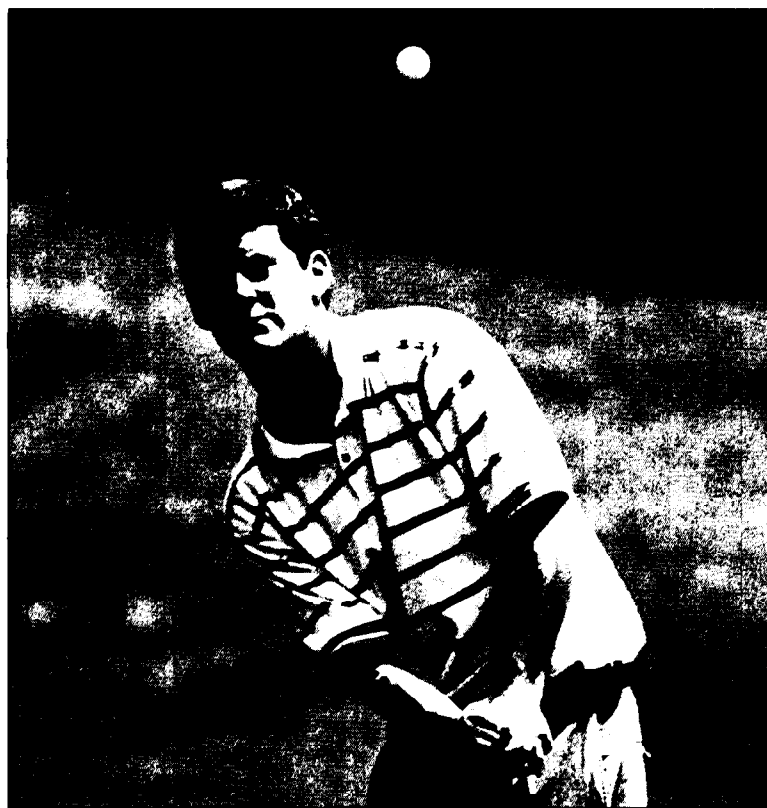
according to Wydra, the home-course advantage was not what carried the Tritons to the top.

"This is the best team I've ever had," he said. "The course didn't hurt us, but we could have won this thing anywhere."

Wydra's teams have made 15 consecutive NCAA appearances, finishing second three times from 1985 through 1987.

It also was the first time a Professional Golfers Association Tour course was used for the championships, and the scores reflected the challenging conditions. No golfer broke par and only four broke 300, compared to 13 last year.

UC San Diego rallied from a five-stroke deficit after two rounds to beat runner-up Ohio Wesleyan by 12 shots. Dale Abraham and

Brock Shafer fired final-round scores of 75 to help the Tritons combine for a 302 and run away with the crown.

Ohio Wesleyan, which also finished second in 1990, held a five-shot lead midway through the tournament but lost seven strokes to charging UC San Diego in the third round. The Bishops struggled to a final-round 312.

Three-time defending champion Methodist finished third, followed by Binghamton and Gustavus Adolphus, which had

finished second the last three years.

Abraham finished second behind medalist Ryan Jenkins of Methodist, who forged a five-shot lead heading into the final day and then survived a fourth-round 79.

It was the third time in five years that a Methodist golfer has won medalist honors. Jenkins held the lead throughout, besting Abraham and Ohio Wesleyan freshman Tim Ailes. Chris Sladish of Binghamton and UC San Diego's Pete Roberts tied for fifth.

Kalamazoo steps on Banana Slugs again to win III tennis

For the third straight year, it was Kalamazoo vs. UC Santa Cruz in the team final of the Division III Men's Tennis Championships. And just like the last two years, it was Kalamazoo that came out on top.

Kalamazoo swept the top three singles matches and Lewis Miller and Ryan Kaltenbach posted a victory at No. 1 doubles as the Hornets defeated the Banana Slugs, 5-2, to win May 20 at Kalamazoo.

With the title, the Hornets became the first team in champion-

Kalamazoo's Miller, who was striving for an unprecedented third consecutive singles crown, was forced to withdraw from individual competition because of injury.

Kalamazoo, the championships' No. 3-seeded team, took a commanding lead in singles play as Miller, Seth Denawetz and Kaltenbach—at Nos. 1, 2 and 3, respectively—posted triumphs. Andy Alaimo at No. 4 also was victorious, giving the Hornets a 4-2 lead heading into doubles play.

Miller and Kaltenbach completed the storybook ending to Acker's coaching career by defeating Dave Muldawer and Jonathan Harper, 6-1, 6-1, at No. 1 doubles.

McKee, the No. 3 singles seed, breezed through his first five matches before outlasting Morgan Shepard of UC Santa Cruz in the singles final. McKee held off Shepard in a first-set tiebreaker, 7-6 (8), then won the second set going away, 6-3.

In doubles competition, McKee and Cooley, the No. 3 seed, claimed Claremont-Mudd-Scripps' second straight title in the event with a 7-5, 7-6 (1) victory over Jeff Bethard and John Cross of UC San Diego. McKee, who teamed with Chris Noyes to win the 1992 title, and Cooley advanced to the final with a 6-3, 6-4 semifinal triumph over the No. 1-seeded team of Alan Walpole and Jay Muelhoefer of MIT.

Augustana did not quit, scoring two runs in the fourth and another—a home run by Janelle Ticken—in the sixth inning to cut the margin to 7-4.

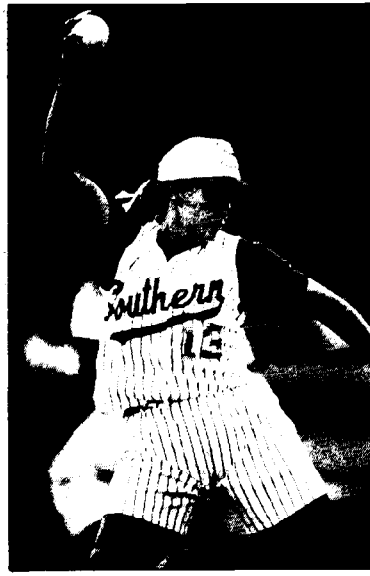

■ Council minutes

Meeting April 19-21, 1993

Following are the minutes of the April 19-21, 1993, meeting of the NCAA Council, which was held at the Ritz-Carlton Hotel in Kansas City, Missouri. All actions taken by the Council are included:

1. Opening Remarks.

a. NCAA President Joseph N. Crowley, University of Nevada, extended the Council's welcome to Chancellor Gregory M. St. I. O'Brien, chair of the NCAA Presidents Commission, and to Wilford S. Bailey, consultant to the Commission, both of whom attended portions of the meeting.

b. Crowley noted that William E. Lide's acceptance of a position as athletics director at West Chester University of Pennsylvania would require his replacement as a member of the Council after this meeting, and Crowley extended his appreciation to Lide for his contributions to the work of the Council.

2. Previous Minutes.

It was voted that the minutes of the Council's January 11-12, 1993, and January 16, 1993, meetings be approved as distributed.

3. **Major Issues in Athletics.** Council members discussed major issues in intercollegiate athletics identified for this meeting.

a. The Council received a report of the NCAA Special Committee to Review Financial Conditions in Intercollegiate Athletics.

(1) The Division I Steering Committee reported that it had reviewed legislative concepts presented by the special committee and noted specific concerns that had been identified by steering committee members and that would be directed to the special committee.

(2) The Division II Steering Committee reported the following actions:

(a) Expressed general support for a financial aid model that would permit student-athletes to receive athletics grants equal to tuition and fees, with other financial aid awarded on the basis of need; further, requested that the special committee provide more information regarding this model, including an assessment of its impact on student-athletes and the estimated cost savings to member institutions.

(b) Expressed general support for the legislative recommendations presented by the special committee and noted particular interest in proposals that would reduce expenditures in the areas of recruiting telephone calls, recruiting materials, and off-campus contacts and evaluations.

(c) Requested that legislation be drafted to amend NCAA Bylaw 13.12.2.1(e) (and the applicable provisions of Bylaw 17) to permit the tryout of a prospective student-athlete to include competition against a member institution's team at any time during the academic year, provided that if the competition occurs outside the institution's playing season, the participation be included in the eight hours of conditioning activity permitted each week.

(d) Recommended that the special committee consider a liberalization of the tryout rule for all three divisions.

(e) Agreed to review draft legislation in August to amend Bylaw 11.6.1 to prohibit off-campus scouting of opponents by institutions in Division II.

(f) Requested that the Council recommend that the special committee review insurance costs incurred by member institutions and study the feasibility of negotiating a national insurance program for the Association.

(3) The Division III Steering Committee reported the following actions in relation to the special committee's report:

(a) Recommended that the special committee consider the elimination of all institutional athletics grants and the establishment of "NCAA scholarships" based upon average tuition costs at public universities nationally.

(b) Noted that reductions of competitive opportunities are inconsistent with the Division III philosophy.

(c) Expressed opposition to a biennial NCAA Convention.

b. The Council reviewed a report of the NCAA Gender-Equity Task Force.

(1) The Division II Steering Committee recommended that the Council direct the task force to present its final report at the August Council meeting, even if the task force is unable to develop a consensus position in relation to every aspect of the task force report.

It was voted that the Council support the recommendation of the Division II Steering Committee.

(2) The Division II Steering Committee noted plans of the Presidents Commission for a gender-equity workshop in conjunction with the Commission's June meeting. The steering committee requested that the Council suggest to members of the Commission that the following points be considered during the Commission's discussions in June:

(a) That each institution's chief executive officer attempt to quantify interest in intercollegiate athletics participation within the institution's geographical area and on the institution's campus; further, that the Commission consider whether an instrument for assessing interest in this regard nationally should be developed.

(b) That each institution's chief executive officer take steps to ensure that his or her institution's current programs reflect that interest.

(c) That each institution's chief executive officer take steps to assure the institution's compliance with the provisions of Title IX; further, that the Commission consider whether the Association should enforce sanctions or other consequences on institutions that fail to comply with these provisions of Title IX.

(i) The Division III Steering Committee reported its support for the recommendations.

(ii) It was moved and seconded that the Council approve the recommendations of the Division II Steering Committee. (Note: A motion that the recommendations be amended to eliminate the suggestion related to the institution's compliance with the provisions of Title IX was withdrawn, and the original motion in support of the recommendations of the Division II Steering Committee was approved.)

(3) The Division III Steering Committee recommended that the co-chairs of the task force attend a portion of the August Council meeting to present the task force recommendations. It was the sense of the meeting that the recommendation be approved.

(4) The Division III Steering Committee reported the following additional actions in relation to the task force report:

(a) Noted that the National Association of Collegiate Women Athletic Administrators (NACWAA) had developed what that association considered to be an acceptable definition of gender equity in intercollegiate athletics and suggested that the task force be reminded of the efforts of that organization to develop such a definition.

(b) Recommended that a discussion of professional opportunities for women in intercollegiate athletics be included in any written materials eventually published by the Association related to gender equity.

(c) Agreed that greater emphasis should be given to the position of senior woman administrator and noted that this heightened emphasis would increase the number of women qualified to serve on NCAA committees; further, agreed to draft a statement of the purposes and functions of a senior woman administrator for inclusion in the Division III institutional self-study guide.

(d) It was moved and seconded that the Council forward the recommendations of the Division III Steering Committee to the task force.

(i) The motion was amended to state that the task force should be informed of the steering committee's discussion, with specific reference to the definition of gender equity approved by NACWAA.

(ii) It was voted that the amended motion be approved.

c. The Council reviewed a report of recent actions taken by the Administrative Review Panel, including a summary of decisions reached by the panel in relation to specific institutional appeals.

(1) Specific guidelines and procedures for consideration of appeals had been developed by the panel and proposed changes in the procedures would be submitted to the Council for approval.

(2) The panel recommended that its procedures be modified to state that the panel (rather than an institution) shall determine when a telephone conference is necessary and whether the institution and the involved student-athlete will participate.

It was voted that the Council approve this modification in the review panel's appeals procedures.

(3) The panel recommended that the Council consider sponsoring legislation that would permit a student-athlete to take advantage of the provisions of Bylaw 14.6.5.3.6 (discontinued/non-sponsored-sport exception) without adversely affecting future opportunities for the student-

athlete to take advantage of another transfer waiver provision.

It was voted that legislation be drafted consistent with the panel's recommendation for review by the Council during its August meeting.

(4) It was the sense of the meeting that concerns identified by the review panel related to requests it had received for extensions of the five-year (or 10-semester/15-quarter) period of eligibility be referred to the Eligibility Committee for review and comment.

(5) At the review panel's request, the Council considered whether actions taken by other committees of the Association should be permitted to be appealed to the review panel in instances in which those committees have authority to act. The review panel reported its reluctance to consider appeals that properly fall within the jurisdiction of another committee of the Association.

It was voted that the review panel be authorized to consider requests for relief from the application of NCAA legislation, including instances in which an NCAA committee takes the position that it has no authority to act; further, that in instances in which a committee has authority to act, appeals of its decisions shall be subject to review by the Council, rather than by the Administrative Review Panel.

(6) The panel expressed reservations about taking any action that would have the effect of changing a rule without action by the NCAA membership. Various Council members expressed concerns as to how "breadth of application" will be defined clearly in relation to specific appeals.

It was voted that the matter be remanded to the panel for clarification.

d. The Council reviewed a report of the Ad Hoc Committee to Study Enforcement Issues. It was reported that the final draft of the committee's recommendations was being reviewed but that it would probably recommend that open hearings not be implemented at this time, in order that other changes in the enforcement process may be in effect for a time, and that a hearing officer be employed if desired by either the Committee on Infractions or the institution involved in a case. Chancellor O'Brien noted that the Commission reviewed similar information during the Commission's April meeting, supported the general direction taken by the committee to this point, and suggested that the ad hoc committee consider limiting use of a hearing officer to situations in which the institution requests such an individual, with such an approach to be in effect for a five-year trial period. The Council received the report without taking formal action.

e. The Council reviewed recommendations of the Special Committee to Review the NCAA Penalty Structure. The committee recommended that the Council sponsor legislation to amend Bylaw 19 to include a mission statement for the enforcement program, to provide the Committee on Infractions more flexibility in determining appropriate penalties in both secondary and major infractions cases, and to replace the current "prescribed" penalties for major violations with a listing of "presumptive" penalties that would provide guidance to the committee but that also would permit the committee to design penalties that address directly the abuses found in particular cases. The committee noted that its recommendations also were intended to heighten sensitivity to the legitimate interests of uninvolved parties in infractions cases, including individuals associated with a team that receives a postseason sanction when the remaining student-athletes were not involved in the violations and individuals associated with other institutions that may have missed opportunities for postseason play due to the abuses of the offending institution.

(1) The Division I Steering Committee recommended that the Council sponsor legislation for the 1994 Convention consistent with the recommendations of the special committee.

(2) It was voted that the Council sponsor such legislation.

f. Council members received a report of actions taken by the Presidents Commission during its April 7-8, 1993, meeting.

(1) Council members noted that in the discussion of that portion of the Commission's strategic plan related to ethical conduct and sportsmanship, Commission members received information concerning moral-reasoning studies conducted by Sharon K. Stoll, University of Idaho. It was suggested that another body of research that expresses views contrary to the conclusions reached by Stoll should be made

available to the Commission and to the Council. President Crowley directed that these background materials be provided to Council members.

(2) The Division II Steering Committee reported that it had reviewed actions of the Division II subcommittee concerning the development of an athletics certification program for Division II. The steering committee agreed to request that a joint subcommittee be created to study certification alternatives for Division II member institutions.

4. Committee Reports.

a. Academic Requirements.

(1) The committee recommended that the Council sponsor legislation to amend Bylaw 14.3.1.1(a), effective August 1, 1996, to specify that the two years of mathematics required to fulfill the Association's core-curriculum requirements must consist of one year of algebra and one year of geometry or a higher-level mathematics course for which geometry is a prerequisite.

It was voted that the Council sponsor legislation consistent with this recommendation.

(2) The Council reviewed an interpretation that before initial full-time matriculation or athletics participation at a collegiate institution, a prospective student-athlete's grade in a core course may be changed or combined by a high school (for purposes of establishing initial eligibility) only in accordance with established written policies by the principal and appropriate instructors and approved by the Academic Requirements Committee on a case-by-case basis. The committee recommended that the Council modify this interpretation to preclude the committee's review of grade changes that occur more than 30 days after a high school's publicized graduation date in the computation of a prospective student-athlete's core-curriculum grade-point average per Bylaw 14.3.1.3.1(a).

(a) It was voted that the committee's recommendation be approved. (For 22, Against 21.)

(b) It was the sense of the meeting that this matter be referred to the Divisions I and II Steering Committees for their review and possible identification of alternatives that might result in greater consensus among members of the Council.

(c) The Division I Steering Committee recommended that the Council authorize the committee to determine on a case-by-case basis whether grades changed by a high school may be accepted for purposes of establishing initial collegiate eligibility, regardless of the point at which those grade changes occur before initial collegiate enrollment.

(d) It was voted that the Council revise its position in a manner consistent with the steering committee's recommendation.

(3) The committee recommended that secondary coursework completed pursuant to a home-schooling program not be considered generally acceptable for purposes of fulfilling the Association's core-curriculum requirements; further, that the Council Subcommittee on Initial-Eligibility Waivers continue to entertain waiver requests related to qualified prospective student-athletes who have pursued home schooling. The Council took no formal action in this regard.

(4) The Council reviewed waiver guidelines and procedures proposed by the committee pursuant to Bylaws 14.5.2.2, 14.5.3.2, 14.5.4.1.1 and 14.5.4.1.

(a) It was voted that the proposed waiver guidelines and procedures be approved.

(b) It was voted that the Council use its authority under the provisions of Constitution 5.3.1.1.1 to adopt noncontroversial legislation to permit the committee to waive the provisions of Bylaw 14.5.4.4; further, that the committee review such waiver requests in accordance with the guidelines and procedures just approved.

(5) The committee reported that at the Council's request, it had considered whether to recommend that "banked" hours not be used in establishing satisfactory academic progress, effective with the adoption of NCAA rules limiting the number of credit hours that may be earned during the summer to fulfill satisfactory-progress requirements. The committee did not recommend the change in the Association's satisfactory-progress rules with respect to "banking," and the Council took no formal action in this regard.

(6) The committee recommended that the Council approve an interpretation that would preclude the use of correspondence courses to fulfill the "75/25" satisfactory-progress requirement; further, that the Council sponsor legislation for the 1994 Convention to amend Bylaw 14.5.4.1 consistent with this interpretation.

It was voted that the Council approve the

committee's recommendations.

(7) The committee recommended that the Council sponsor legislation to amend Bylaws 14.1.6.2.6 and 14.4.3.2 to preclude the use of correspondence courses for purposes of establishing full-time enrollment.

It was voted that the Council sponsor such proposed legislation.

(8) The Council reviewed an interpretation of Bylaw 14.5.2.1 that a student-athlete may use hours earned from any courses taken during a session after the opening of the institution's full term until the conclusion of the institution's commencement exercises at the conclusion of the spring term in satisfying the requirement that 75 percent of the credit hours used by a student-athlete to fulfill satisfactory-progress requirements must be earned during the regular academic year. The committee recommended that this interpretation be modified to permit the use of credit-by-examination courses completed by incoming student-athletes before the opening of the institution's fall term for purposes of fulfilling the "75/25" satisfactory-progress requirement.

It was voted that the Council modify this interpretation consistent with the recommendation of the committee.

(9) The committee recommended that the Council sponsor legislation to amend Bylaw 14.5.4 to preclude the use of credit hours earned while enrolled as a part-time student to fulfill NCAA satisfactory-progress requirements.

(a) The Division II Steering Committee recommended that the Council not sponsor such legislation, inasmuch as such a modification would adversely affect Division II student-athletes who choose not to enroll as full-time students in one or more academic terms in order to make maximum use of their 10 semesters or 15 quarters of eligibility for intercollegiate athletics.

(b) It was the sense of the meeting that the Council decline to sponsor legislation in this regard.

b. Academic Requirements and Research.

(1) The Council reviewed a proposal of the joint subcommittee of the Academic Requirements and Research Committees concerning longitudinal studies of the effects of new eligibility standards on Division I student-athletes. The joint subcommittee recommended that the Council approve the proposed research study and that the proposal, if approved, be forwarded to the Executive Committee for further consideration.

It was voted that the Council approve the joint subcommittee's recommendation.

(2) The joint subcommittee noted interest expressed by the Division II Steering Committee in an ancillary study to address research issues specific to Division II, especially related to continuing eligibility. The joint subcommittee suggested that the current study of student-athletes' academic performance in Division II may serve as a valuable resource in this regard and recommended that these data be analyzed during June and July 1993, with a status report to be forwarded to the Division II Steering Committee for review during its August meeting.

It was voted that the recommendation of the joint subcommittee be approved.

c. **Communications.** The Council reviewed an existing interpretation that permits an institution (but not a media entity) to pay a student-athlete's expenses to attend a media interview in the general locale of an event in which that institution is participating. The committee recommended that the Council revise the interpretation to permit a media entity to pay a student-athlete's expenses to attend such a media interview. The committee also recommended that the Council sponsor legislation to amend Bylaw 16.11.2.7 to permit member institutions and media agencies to pay expenses for a student-athlete to participate in an interview outside the student-athlete's institution's general locale. Council members raised questions as to whether the modifications proposed by the committee could be accomplished in a manner consistent with other NCAA legislation and suggested that such modifications also may result in additional missed class time for student-athletes. It was the sense of the meeting that these recommendations be remanded to the committee for further consideration.

d. **Competitive Safeguards and Medical Aspects of Sports.** The committee recommended that the Council sponsor legislation for the 1994 Convention to ban the use of tobacco products by student-athletes, coaches and officials at practice and com-

petition in all sports.

It was voted that the Council draft legislation in this regard for review in August.

e. Financial Aid and Amateurism.

(1) The committee recommended that the Council sponsor a modified version of 1993 Convention Proposal No. 82 for the 1994 Convention to apply the provisions of that proposed legislation only to Bylaw 15 and not to Bylaw 20.9.1; further, that the modified proposal be clarified to indicate that an institutional staff member (e.g., financial aid administrator) who assists a student-athlete in securing on-campus work study in the same manner as for all students would not be considered to be interceding on the student-athlete's behalf, and finally, that the Council indicate its willingness to develop a form to assist those few Division I institutions that may want to count on-campus work study toward the Division I financial aid minimum requirements.

It was voted that the Council approve the recommendations of the committee.

(2) The committee reported that it had reviewed 1993 Convention Proposal No. 85, which was withdrawn and referred by the Council to the committee for further study. The committee recommended that the Council sponsor a version of 1993 Convention Proposal No. 85 for the 1994 Convention that would be applicable to all sports other than Division I football and basketball, and that would apply only to student-athletes entering NCAA institutions on or after August 1, 1995, so as not to affect financial aid awarded to currently enrolled student-athletes or offered to prospective student-athletes; further, that the Council clarify in the proposal's rationale statement that institutionally determined tuition waivers are countable as institutional financial aid.

(a) The Division I Steering Committee recommended that the Council sponsor legislation for the 1994 Convention consistent with the committee's recommendations, with the understanding that the proposal would add ice hockey to those sports to which the proposal would not be applicable.

(b) It was voted that the Council sponsor legislation consistent with the Division I Steering Committee's recommendation.

(3) The committee recommended that the Council sponsor legislation to continue to prohibit a student-athlete from appearing in any kind of commercial film or television or cable program during any term of enrollment, including a summer term, but to permit during the summer such appearances, the receipt of actual and necessary expenses, and compensation that is commensurate with the going rate for like services, provided the student-athlete is not involved in direct product endorsements (including the endorsement of the film or program itself) at any time. Council members requested clarification as to how such a proposal could be adopted in light of the Association's basic amateurism rules, whether the proposal would provide any relief for theater majors who generally are expected to obtain practical experiences during the academic settings that might be precluded by such legislation, and whether student-athletes' appearances on coaches' shows would be exempted from the application of this legislation.

It was voted that the proposal be remanded to the committee for further consideration.

(4) The committee recommended that the Council sponsor legislation to permit a student-athlete who is a professional in one sport to endorse or promote a commercial product in that sport and to retain eligibility to compete in intercollegiate athletics in another sport, provided the product is directly related to the sport in which the student-athlete is a professional.

(a) It was moved and seconded that the Council sponsor the proposal. (Defeated—Voice Vote.)

(b) Several Council members expressed concerns about current NCAA legislation that permits a student-athlete to be a professional in one sport and to retain collegiate eligibility in another sport.

It was voted that the committee be requested to consider whether the current legislation in this regard is appropriate.

(5) The committee recommended that the Council sponsor legislation to amend Bylaw 16.4.2(a) to permit an institution to provide health insurance to student-athletes who are not covered by applicable health insurance (e.g., family health plan), provided it is an institutionally administered health-care insurance plan. A motion that the Council sponsor such legislation was withdrawn, and it was the sense of the meeting that the matter be referred to the

committee for further study.

(6) The committee recommended that the Council sponsor legislation to permit an institution to waive, pay in advance or guarantee payment of application fees for all prospective student-athletes applying to a member institution.

It was voted that the Council sponsor legislation consistent with the committee's recommendation.

(7) The committee recommended that the Council sponsor legislation to amend Bylaw 15.2.6.4 to permit a Division I student-athlete whose eligibility has been exhausted to receive employment earnings immediately that would be exempt from the student-athlete's individual financial aid limit.

(a) It was voted that the Council sponsor legislation consistent with the committee's recommendation.

(b) The Division II Steering Committee recommended that the Council sponsor legislation to amend Bylaw 15.2.6.5 to allow a Division II student-athlete whose eligibility has been exhausted to receive employment earnings immediately that would be exempt from the student-athlete's individual financial aid limit.

It was voted that the Council sponsor such legislation.

(8) It was voted that the Council sponsor legislation to amend Bylaw 15.1.1(f) to indicate that income from participation in an athletics event shall be included in a student-athlete's individual limit, unless eligibility has been exhausted in that sport.

(9) The Council reviewed a February 1993 interpretation pertaining to the Evans Scholarship, which is awarded by an outside organization to former golf caddies who enroll at one of 14 collegiate institutions that have Evans chapters. The interpretation stated that the award must be administered in accordance with the provisions of Bylaw 15.2.5.3 (athletics participation not a major criterion) or Bylaw 15.2.5.4 (athletics participation as a major criterion) because extracurricular activities (including athletics participation or achievements) are part of the selection criteria for the award. The committee recommended that the Council revise the interpretation to indicate that the award's athletics consideration be applied on a sport-specific basis, thus enabling an individual to receive such an award and to be eligible to participate in a sport other than the sport upon which the award is based. Members of the Council expressed concerns about the advisability of treating this issue in relation to only a single award and suggested alternative means by which to address the matter more generally. It was the sense of the meeting that legislation be drafted that might treat the general issue in a manner that is consistent with the committee's recommendation and with the various concerns raised by Council members.

(10) The committee recommended that the Council ask the Special Committee to Review Financial Conditions in Intercollegiate Athletics to consider a concept that would require student-athletes receiving athletically related financial aid to complete an application for Federal financial aid in order to be eligible for intercollegiate athletics competition. The Division I Steering Committee reported that members of the steering committee had expressed concerns about the administrative burden that may be created by such a proposal and that the steering committee had directed that these concerns be conveyed to the financial-conditions committee.

(11) The committee reported that it had reviewed its responsibilities for determining and reporting to the Council an inflationary adjustment to the minimum aggregate financial aid expenditures required in Division I, noting that the first adjustment would be based on tuition and fee changes applicable to the 1992-93 academic year.

(a) The committee recommended that the Council apply a 7.6 percent inflationary adjustment (based upon an unweighted change in tuition and fees) to the existing minimum financial aid requirements for September 1, 1995; further, that the Council notify Division I members this September of the adjustment and the new minimums (\$269,000 in men's sports and \$269,000 in women's sports, or \$376,000 for institutions not sponsoring a men's or women's basketball program) applicable to financial aid expenditures during the 1994-95 academic year. The Division I Steering Committee reported that it had approved the committee's recommendation.

(b) The committee recommended that Division I members be notified of the adjustment through The NCAA News and through mailings to chief executive officers that include a description of the methodology used in determining the adjustment. The Division I Steering Committee reported

that it had approved the committee's recommendation.

(12) The committee noted a directive from the Council to the committee in January 1993 that the committee discontinue its efforts to identify a more narrow definition of athletics aid for purposes of Division I financial aid membership requirements. The committee recommended that the Council request that the staff review NCAA squad lists submitted to the national office for purposes of the revenue-distribution plan (beginning with the 1993-94 squad lists submitted in the fall of 1995) to determine, for those Division I institutions that are within 10 percent of the minimum aggregate financial aid expenditure levels, the percentage of nonathletics institutional aid that is being awarded to individual student-athletes to meet the minimum financial aid requirements. The Division I Steering Committee reported that it had approved the committee's recommendation.

f. **Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse.** The committee reported that it was in the final stage of contract negotiations between the NCAA and American College Testing to establish ACT as the administrative agency for the clearinghouse. The committee also reported that ACT intends to appoint a clearinghouse manager by approximately May 1 and that a fee of \$18 had been established for each prospective student-athlete who will use the clearinghouse for eligibility certification purposes. The Council received the report without taking formal action.

g. **Initial-Eligibility Waivers.** The Council reviewed actions taken by the Council Subcommittee on Initial-Eligibility Waivers during a telephone conference conducted December 18, 1992, and during an in-person meeting January 12, 1993.

It was voted that the actions of the subcommittee be approved.

h. Legislative Review.

(1) At the committee's request, the Council considered possible amendments to Constitution 5.3.2.2(e) and 5.4.2.3(e) that would require the chief executive officer's "countersignature" on conference submissions of amendments-to-amendments and resolutions.

It was voted that the Council sponsor such legislation for the 1994 Convention.

(2) The Council also considered possible amendments to Constitution 5.3.2.2(d), 5.3.2.2(c) and 5.4.2.3(e) to remove the reference to the institution's or conference's voting or alternate Convention delegates, inasmuch as the deadline for submission of amendments-to-amendments and resolutions now is October 15, as opposed to during the Convention.

It was voted that the Council sponsor proposed legislation in this regard.

(3) The Council reviewed suggestions by the committee for eliminating confusion that often results from the renumbering of proposals from the Initial Publication to the Second Publication of Proposed Legislation and then to the Official Notice. Council members suggested that one means by which to reduce confusion would be to note a specific proposal's number from earlier publications when it is renumbered in subsequent publications.

(4) The committee noted that the provisions of 1993 Convention Proposal No. 136 were incorporated only in Bylaw 20.9.3, while it appears that they also should have been incorporated in Bylaws 20.9.6 and 20.9.7 to reflect the sponsor's intent. The committee recommended that the Council use its authority under the provisions of Constitution 5.4.1.1.1 (modification of wording to conform to the intent) to amend Bylaws 20.9.6 and 20.9.7 in this manner.

It was voted that the Council amend Bylaws 20.9.6 and 20.9.7 as recommended.

(5) The Council reviewed the provisions of Constitution 5.3.6 and clarifications of that legislation approved by the Administrative Committee during its April 6 telephone conference.

It was voted that the evaluation of all legislative proposals by appropriate NCAA committees in a given year shall be completed by October 8.

i. Olympic Sports Liaison.

(1) The committee reported that it had reviewed a request from the U.S. Olympic Committee (USOC) to amend NCAA legislation to permit individuals to receive educational expenses from outside organizations, even if the aid is athletically related. The committee recommended that the Council forward the concept to the Special Committee to Review Financial Conditions in Intercollegiate Athletics.

It was voted that the matter be forwarded to the special committee.

(2) The committee recommended that the Council sponsor legislation to amend

Bylaw 12.1.2 to permit an individual to receive payment for the display of athletics skill in a commercial advertisement before collegiate enrollment, provided the USOC or appropriate national governing body (NGB) approves the content and production of the advertisement, and provided the funds are forwarded to the USOC or the applicable NGB and are not earmarked for the individual.

It was voted that the Council sponsor the proposal.

(3) The committee recommended that the Council sponsor legislation to permit the spouse, parent (or guardian) or relative of an individual who will participate in the Olympic Games to receive travel expenses to attend the games from a commercial company (other than a professional sports organization) or from members of the individual's local community, even if based on the individual's athletics reputation or skill.

(a) Council members expressed concerns about the possibility of fund-raising efforts organized by representatives of an institution's athletics interests, as well as potential difficulties in monitoring such fund-raising efforts.

(b) It was voted that legislation be drafted consistent with the committee's recommendation for the Council's review in August; further, that the legislation be drafted in a manner that might ameliorate the various concerns noted by Council members.

(4) The committee reported that it had considered a request from the USOC and USA Track and Field to further liberalize Bylaw 12.1.2.5 to permit an individual to receive actual and necessary expenses for developmental training programs conducted throughout the year. The committee recommended that the Council sponsor legislation to permit individuals to receive expenses for such programs conducted at any time during the year, provided the individual misses no class time and the program does not conflict with the individual's participation in institutional competition.

It was voted that the Council sponsor legislation in this regard.

(5) The committee noted a proposal of the Executive Committee to present legislation at the 1994 Convention to reduce minimum sponsorship requirements for the establishment or continuation of NCAA championships. The committee expressed concern that the proposal, as currently written, would result in the discontinuation of the National Collegiate Men's and Women's Skiing Championships after the 1994-95 academic year if current sponsorship levels do not change. The committee recommended that the Council ask the Executive Committee to consider maintaining any existing division championship or National Collegiate Championship if the sport is on the Olympic Games program, regardless of the sponsorship level in the sport; further, should the Executive Committee not favor this proposal, that it consider permitting championships in Olympic sports that fall below the proposed minimum sponsorship level to continue without per diem and transportation reimbursements.

It was voted that the Council convey the committee's concerns to the Executive Committee without taking a position on these matters.

j. Professional Sports Liaison.

(1) It was noted for the record that the committee supported action taken by the Council earlier in this meeting to sponsor legislation to prohibit student-athletes, coaches and officials from using any form of tobacco during practices and games.

It was voted that Bylaw 30.13 be amended to prohibit players and coaches from using any form of tobacco during practices and games.

(2) The Council reviewed an interpretation that member institutions' athletics department staff members are not permitted to be involved in administrative duties associated with a summer baseball league. The committee recommended that the Council revise the interpretation to permit a member institution's baseball coach to be involved only with league administrative duties (e.g., membership on a league's board of directors); further, that such a coach would not be permitted to perform any on- or off-field coaching or supervisory responsibilities that involve contact with student-athletes from the coach's institution.

It was voted that the Council revise the interpretation consistent with the committee's recommendation.

(3) The committee recommended that the Council amend Bylaw 30.12.10.2 to permit all-star competition between teams from separate neighboring summer baseball leagues.

It was voted that the Council adopt the proposed amendment.

(4) The committee recommended that the Council approve the allocation of funding for 11 summer baseball leagues.

It was voted that the committee's recommendation be approved.

(5) The committee requested that the Council recommend that the Executive Committee authorize funding for the production and distribution of a brochure intended to educate student-athletes concerning issues related to a student-athlete's transition to a professional athletics career.

It was voted that the committee's recommendation be approved.

(6) The committee recommended that the Council sponsor legislation to allow a student-athlete who has submitted a written declaration to enter the National Football League draft to retain collegiate eligibility, provided the student-athlete indicates in writing to that institution's director of athletics his intent to return to that institution at least seven days before the National Letter of Intent signing date for football; further, that the proposal would include a stipulation that the student-athlete would be permitted to use this opportunity only once during his collegiate career.

It was moved and seconded that the Council sponsor such a proposal. (Defeated—Voice Vote.)

(7) The committee recommended that the Council sponsor legislation to amend Bylaw 12.2.4.2 to permit a student athlete in basketball to enter a professional league's draft without jeopardizing remaining collegiate eligibility in that sport, with the stipulation that the student-athlete would be permitted 30 days after the draft to declare his or her intention to return to college; further, that the proposal would contain the stipulation that a student-athlete would be permitted to avail himself or herself of this opportunity only once during his or her collegiate career.

It was moved and seconded that the Council sponsor such legislation. (Defeated—Voice Vote.)

(8) The committee recommended that the Council sponsor a proposal to amend Bylaw 11.1.5 to permit a head coach to contact player agents, professional sports teams or professional sports organizations on behalf of a student-athlete, provided the coach does not receive compensation for such services; further, that the proposal limit coaches' involvement to direct communication with representatives of professional athletics teams for the purpose of securing tryouts for student athletes, assistance to student-athletes in the selection of an agent by participating with the student-athlete in interviews of agents, review of written information sent to student-athletes, direct communications with individuals to obtain comments about the abilities of an agent, and visits with player agents or representatives of professional athletics teams to assist in determining a student-athlete's market value.

It was moved and seconded that the Council sponsor legislation consistent with the committee's recommendation. (Defeated—For 16, Against 23.)

(9) The committee recommended that the Council sponsor legislation to amend Bylaw 12.6.1.4 to permit a member institution to receive donations in kind (e.g., equipment, improvements to facilities, other non-cash donations) from a professional sports organization.

(a) It was moved and seconded that the Council sponsor such a proposal. (Defeated—For 20, Against 15—two-thirds majority required.)

(b) Council members suggested that such a proposal might receive greater Council support if it were to include a mechanism for Association oversight of this activity. It was the sense of the meeting that the issue be remanded to the committee for further discussion.

(10) The committee recommended that the Council sponsor legislation to amend Bylaw 12.2.5.1 to indicate that a student-athlete would jeopardize remaining collegiate eligibility only when the student-athlete signs a written agreement (as opposed to making an oral agreement) with a professional sports team.

It was moved and seconded that the Council sponsor such a proposal. (Defeated—Voice Vote.)

k. **Proposal No. 24 (1990 Convention).** The Council reviewed an interpretation that member institutions requesting a change of division membership be subject to the graduation-rate disclosure requirements applicable in the new division, pursuant to the reclassification compliance

criteria specified in Bylaw 20.5.2.2. The advisory committee recommended that the Council revise the interpretation to specify that reclassified member institutions and new member institutions be required to submit the graduation-rates disclosure form applicable in the new division on the first reporting deadline after the effective date of reclassification or new membership; further, that such institutions be permitted to "build up" the four-year database applicable to the new division during the first four years of membership in that division.

It was voted that the interpretation be revised consistent with the advisory committee's recommendation.

1. Review and Planning.

(1) The committee recommended that the Council amend Bylaw 21.3.26.2, or sponsor legislation to amend that bylaw, to include among the committee's duties the review and evaluation of the activities of the Association.

It was voted that the Council use its authority as set forth in Constitution 5.3.1.1.1 to adopt noncontroversial legislation to amend Bylaw 21.3.26.2 consistent with the committee's recommendation.

(2) The committee recommended that the Council amend Bylaw 21.3.26.2, or sponsor legislation to amend that bylaw, to add a current member of the Presidents Commission to the committee.

It was voted that the Council use its authority established under the provisions of Constitution 5.3.1.1.1 to adopt noncontroversial legislation consistent with the committee's recommendation.

(3) The committee recommended that the Executive Committee be urged to consider appropriate means of determining where the Association's resources should be used and where reductions would appropriately occur in the budget in the future, if the Special Committee to Review Financial Conditions in Intercollegiate Athletics does not address that issue.

It was voted that the Council approve the committee's recommendation.

(4) The committee recommended that the Executive Committee be asked to conduct a thorough evaluation of the Association's catastrophic-injury insurance program, including consultation with some of the top risk managers in the NCAA membership.

It was voted that the committee's recommendation be approved.

(5) The committee recommended that James Frank, former NCAA president whose term on the Committee on Review and Planning will end September 1, 1993, be assigned to the committee as a consultant until such time as an ethnic minority is appointed to a position on the committee. It was the sense of the meeting that the committee's recommendation be referred to the Administrative Committee, acting for the Executive Committee.

(6) The Council reviewed recommendations presented by the committee regarding the Association's committee-appointment processes.

It was voted that the recommendations be approved, with the understanding that all recommendations requiring legislation be reviewed by the Council in legislative form in August.

m. Two-Year College Relations.

(1) The committee requested that the Council ask the Academic Requirements Committee to review the definition of a collegiate institution as set forth in Bylaw 14.02.3 and that the Academic Requirements Committee be apprised of the interest of the Two-Year College Relations Committee in "tightening" the definition of a collegiate institution so that two-year college transfer students will receive degrees from reputable, accredited, collegiate institutions.

It was voted that the committee's request be approved.

(2) The committee recommended that the Council sponsor legislation to amend Bylaw 14.2.4.1 to indicate that student-athletes who participate only in regularly scheduled, approved collegiate scrimmages would not use a season of competition in that sport, provided the scrimmage appears on the college's published schedule, no official score is kept, no admission is charged, the scrimmage is approved by the collegiate institution, no official time is kept, the scrimmage is played before the college's first regularly scheduled outside competition, the scrimmage counts as a contest or date of competition for institutional purposes, and the student-athlete participates in not more than two such scrimmages or dates of competition.

It was voted that the Council sponsor legislation consistent with this recommen-

dation.

(3) The committee recommended that the Council sponsor legislation to amend the effective date of Bylaw 14.2.5.1 to permit any individual with eligibility remaining at a Division I institution to be eligible to receive a hardship waiver based on an injury that occurred at a two-year college.

It was voted that the committee's recommendation be approved.

(4) The committee recommended that the Council sponsor legislation to amend Bylaw 13.1.2.4(b) to permit staff members to make telephone calls to prospective student-athletes at two-year collegiate institutions (and to those prospects' families) twice per week.

(a) It was moved and seconded that the Council sponsor proposed legislation consistent with the committee's recommendation. (Defeated—Voice Vote.)

(b) It was the sense of the meeting that the committee's recommendation be forwarded to the Legislative Review Committee for its consideration.

n. Women's Athletics. It was noted for the record that Janet M. Justus, NCAA director of eligibility, had been appointed to coordinate women's issues at the national office.

5. Committee Appointments.

a. The Council considered matters related to the appointment of the Infractions Appeals Committee, including the involvement of Divisions II and III in that regard.

(1) It was voted that legislation be drafted to establish three separate appeals committees for Divisions I, II and III, with the general public represented on each committee.

(2) The following were appointed to serve as members of the Infractions Appeals Committee for Division I: Marshall Criser, Jacksonville, Florida (representing the general public); Katherine F. Noble, University of Montana; David Price, Pacific-10 Conference; Michael L. Slive, Great Midwest Conference, chair, and John W. Stoepler, University of Toledo.

b. Each steering committee proposed its own division's candidates for positions on the Nominating Committee and the Men's and Women's Committees on Committees, after which the Council elected the chairs of those committees.

(1) The following were appointed to serve as the Nominating Committee for the 1994 Convention: Division I—Region I, Robert W. Mullen, La Salle University, and Sandra Norrell-Thomas, Howard University; Region 2, R. Daniel Beebe, Ohio Valley Conference, and William M. Sangster, Georgia Institute of Technology; Region 3, Linda G. Herman, Illinois State University, and Robert R. Snell, Kansas State University; Region 4, Kay Don, California State University, Long Beach, and Thomas C. Hansen, Pacific-10 Conference. Division II—Region I, Charles A. Eberle, Pennsylvania State Athletic Conference; Region 2, Wallace Jackson, Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference; Region 3, George W. Eastland, Saginaw Valley State University; Region 4, Janet R. Kittell, California State University, Chico. Division III—Region I, Gregory L. Lockard, Montclair State College; Region 2, Dolores A. Bogard, State University College at Cortland; Region 3, James E. Foels, Oberlin College; Region 4, Curtis W. Tong, Pomona-Pitzer Colleges. Kittell was elected to chair the committee.

(2) The following were appointed to vacancies on the Men's Committee on Committees, each for a three-year term: William T. Turner, North Carolina State University; Bill Belknap, Southland Conference; John C. Harper, Bridgewater State College (Massachusetts), and Nathan N. Salant, Gulf South Conference. Prentice Gautt, Big Eight Conference, was elected to chair the committee.

(3) The following were appointed to vacancies on the Women's Committee on Committees, each for a three-year term: Sharon E. Taylor, Lock Haven University of Pennsylvania; Christine H. B. Grant, University of Iowa; Marilyn Moniz-Kahoonahano, University of Hawaii, and Dianne Jones, University of Wisconsin, Whitewater. Laurie Priest, Mount Holyoke College, was elected to serve as chair.

c. It was the sense of the meeting that appointments to the Committee on Infractions be postponed pending receipt of additional nominations.

d. The following actions concerning appointments to the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee were taken by the Council after review by the steering committees:

(1) The Division I Steering Committee appointed Erik Nedean, Northeastern University; Tami Fisher, Vanderbilt University; Calvin Bowers, Bowling Green State University, and Brandi Brooks, University of Hawaii.

(2) The Division II Steering Committee appointed Pam Wustrow, Assumption College; Masa Oreskovic, Valdosta State College, and Julie Filpus, Wayne State University (Michigan), with Filpus to replace May Tan, resigned. The steering committee postponed two additional appointments to the committee in order to solicit additional nominations.

(3) The Division III Steering Committee appointed Brendan Cooney, Gordon College; Lynne Kraskouskas, Bryn Mawr College, and Chris Wilson, Nebraska Wesleyan University. The steering committee postponed one other appointment in order to solicit additional nominations.

e. The Council appointed Matthew Leighninger, Haverford College, as one of two representatives of the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee to serve as members of the Special Committee to Review Student-Athlete Welfare, Access and Equity. The Council postponed appointment of a second representative of the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee pending future appointments to that committee.

6. Miscellaneous.

a. The Council received a quarterly report of the Association's governmental affairs. (A summary of the report appeared in the April 28, 1993, issue of The NCAA News.)

(1) NCAA Executive Director Richard D. Schultz reported that on February 17, the House Subcommittee on Commerce, Consumer Protection and Competitiveness, chaired by Rep. Cardiss Collins (D-Illinois), held a hearing on gender-equity issues. Schultz said Rep. Collins announced her intention to introduce legislation requiring colleges and universities annually to report information on a per-sport basis concerning scheduling of contests, expenditures, athletics grants, gender of coaches and coaching salaries. Schultz noted that the bill was introduced later that day and was referred to the House Committee on Education and Labor.

(2) The Council received the report without taking formal action.

b. The Council considered means by which to reduce the number of individuals at a member institution who receive compliance-related forms, including the feasibility of having each institution designate one individual to receive all such forms. The Council considered a procedure by which each institution would designate one of the individuals it lists on Form 93-8 (designation of institutional representatives) as the recipient of all NCAA compliance-related forms [except for Forms 93-1 (certification of compliance for institutions) and 93-8 (designation of institutional representatives), both of which would continue to be sent to the chief executive officer]. It was noted that member conferences and institutions' primary athletics administrators would be notified in a direct mailing (and through the News) each year of this procedure and the distribution dates of each form.

It was voted that the Council approve these changes (including the revision of 93-8 before its July 15 mailing this year) in order that NCAA forms can be distributed in the spring and summer of 1994 in a manner consistent with this policy; further, that the procedures adopted by the Council include provisions to permit compliance-related forms to be sent to two individuals on campuses with separate men's and women's athletics programs, if such an institution designates more than one individual.

c. The Council reviewed its policy that prohibits an institution that is ineligible for NCAA championship competition in a sport from being included in the NCAA rating poll in that sport. Council members received information concerning difficulties experienced by institutions that fail to meet the deadline for submission of certain forms and that are subject to questions from the media and public because one or more of the institutions' sports teams are removed from NCAA rating polls before those institutions have an opportunity to take advantage of the opportunity for routine restoration of championships eligibility.

(1) It was voted that the Council revise its policy to state that in the case of the certification of compliance, sports sponsorship and graduation-rates disclosure forms, institutions that are ineligible for failing to submit required information by the dates specified for those forms not be permitted to be rated in polls conducted after October 15 each year, unless the institutions' eligibility for championships has been restored per Bylaw 31.2.1.3.

(2) It was noted for the record that this change would not affect institutions' obligations to pay fines under the provisions of Bylaw 31.2.1.3.1.

7. Report of Joint Policy Board. The Council received a report of the January 28,

1993, and April 8, 1993, meetings of the Joint Policy Board. The Board reported that it had considered major issues facing the Association for 1993, various options regarding the legislative process, membership structure concerns, means by which to enhance minority opportunities, and agreements reached by the Board concerning a schedule and procedures for future meetings. The Council received the report without taking formal action.

8. Administrative Committee Report on Interim Actions and Other Matters. The Council reviewed the record of five conferences conducted by the Administrative Committee since the previous meeting of the Council and one conference conducted in conjunction with the pre-Convention Council meeting, including all decisions reached on behalf of the Council by the committee and by the executive director.

a. The three steering committees reported their approval of all actions in the six telephone conferences.

b. It was voted that the Council approve all of the Administrative Committee actions.

9. Membership.

a. The quarterly report of the NCAA membership was reviewed for the record. It reflected 864 active member institutions as of April 1, 1993 (unchanged from the January report), and 1,062 members in all categories as of that date (also unchanged from January).

b. It was voted that the Council approve applications for affiliated membership submitted by the Association for the Advancement of Applied Sports Psychology, Chapel Hill, North Carolina, and the Pennsylvania Athletic Conference, Allentown, Pennsylvania.

c. It was voted that the Council approve applications for corresponding membership submitted by Belmont University, Nashville, Tennessee, and Knoxville College, Knoxville, Tennessee.

d. The Division I Steering Committee took the following actions:

(1) Approved continuation of a consortium membership arrangement per Bylaw 30.4 for Columbia University-Barnard College.

(2) Approved continuation of the designation of non-NCAA sports for the purpose of meeting sports sponsorship criteria per Bylaw 20.9.3.2.1 by Iona College, Marist College, University of Miami (Florida), University of Richmond and Seton University.

(3) Approved requests for scheduling waivers per Bylaw 20.9.7.2.4 submitted by Drake University and the University of Evansville.

e. The Division II Steering Committee took the following actions:

(1) Affirmed action taken previously by the steering committee to deny a request by Northwood University for a waiver of Division II scheduling requirements.

(2) Approved a request submitted by Oakland University for a waiver of sports sponsorship requirements per Constitution 3.2.4.10.5 for a spring sport for women, with the stipulation that the waiver be for the 1992-93 academic year only and that the institution be in compliance with the provisions of this legislation during the 1993-94 academic year.

(3) Approved a waiver of the football scheduling requirements per Bylaw 20.10.4 for Central Connecticut State University.

f. The Division III Steering Committee took the following actions:

(1) Approved continuation of a consortium membership arrangement per Bylaw 30.4 for Claremont McKenna-Harvey Mudd-Scripps Colleges.

(2) Approved continuation of the designation of a non-NCAA sport for the purpose of meeting sports sponsorship criteria per Bylaw 20.11.3.1.1 by Polytechnic University (New York).

(3) Approved a request submitted by Marywood College for a waiver of the sports-sponsorship minimum criteria per Constitution 3.2.4.10.4.

g. The Council considered a proposed provisional membership category for all institutions applying for NCAA active membership.

(1) It was noted that the Divisions II and III Steering Committees met jointly April 20 and discussed the proposed provisional membership category. The steering committees reported the following actions:

(a) Supported the provisional membership category in concept and directed that legislation be drafted for the Council's review in August.

(b) Directed that the proposal reflect that no membership-waiver opportunities would be available during the period of provisional membership.

(c) Agreed that provisional members should be required to complete a compre-

hensive institutional self-study and evaluation of their intercollegiate athletics programs during the first year of provisional membership.

(d) Requested that the costs associated with the administration of a provisional membership category be studied further to determine if dues for provisional members should reflect that cost.

(e) Directed that further consideration be given to issues related to dual NCAA/NAIA membership in relation to the provisional membership category and in relation to active membership in the Association.

(2) The Division III Steering Committee requested that the concept be reviewed by the Council in August include a requirement for a written report from the institution describing its progress in meeting NCAA membership requirements; further, that coaches of provisional members be required to participate in applicable coaches certification procedures, and finally, that representatives of provisional members be required to attend regional compliance seminars.

(3) The Division II Steering Committee concurred with the additional recommendations of the Division III Steering Committee and also suggested that further consideration be given to possible application of NCAA enforcement policies and procedures to provisional members.

10. NCAA Conventions.

a. The Council received a compilation of recommendations regarding NCAA Convention arrangements and operations. It was noted that arrangements for NCAA Conventions are under the jurisdiction of the Executive Committee.

(1) It was voted that the post-Convention Council meeting be limited to essential business items and thus be scheduled for one-half day or less.

(2) The Council reviewed a recommendation of the Convention parliamentarian that legislation be sponsored to preclude proposals considered during Presidential Agenda Day from being reconsidered during the corresponding business session that occurs subsequently. It was the sense of the meeting that this recommendation be forwarded to the Presidents Commission.

(3) The Convention parliamentarian recommended that legislation be sponsored to specify that if a proposal designed for Presidential Agenda Day is not moved during Presidential Agenda Day, it cannot be moved on a subsequent day. It was the sense of the meeting that this recommendation be referred to the Presidents Commission.

(4) The Division I Steering Committee reported that some members of the committee requested that consideration be given to providing greater flexibility to Convention delegates in choosing mementos; specifically, that consideration be given to permitting delegates to indicate preferences on the annual Convention survey for particular mementos and to investigate the feasibility of making Convention mementos (especially the annual calendar booklet) available for purchase.

b. The Council reviewed legislation that it had sponsored and that was not adopted at the 1993 Convention. The Council took no action to resubmit any of those proposals.

c. The Council reviewed a compilation of proposed legislation for the 1994 Convention.

(1) The Division I Steering Committee recommended that the Council sponsor legislation to amend Bylaw 11.6.2.1 to specify that when a Division I coach is being reimbursed to travel by automobile to scout an opponent, other coaches who travel with the coach to the site are not considered to be receiving expenses so long as they receive no reimbursement of any kind. It was the sense of the meeting that the Council sponsor the proposal.

(2) The Division I Steering Committee recommended that the Council sponsor legislation to amend Bylaw 12.3.4.2 to prohibit an institution's chief executive officer from appointing to an institution's professional sports counseling panel any individual who is a player agent.

It was voted that the Council sponsor the proposal.

(3) The Council reviewed a proposal to amend Bylaw 12.5.2.1 to permit an individual to conduct, promote or endorse a private camp or clinic in a sport in which the individual is a professional without jeopardizing that individual's remaining eligibility in another sport.

(a) The Division I Steering Committee recommended that the Council postpone consideration of this proposal pending review by the Committee on Financial Aid and Amateurism of the related issues re-

ferred to the financial aid committee by the Council earlier in this meeting. The Divisions II and III Steering Committees concurred with the recommendation of the Division I Steering Committee.

(b) It was voted that the Council postpone consideration of the proposal consistent with the steering committee's recommendation.

(4) The Division III Steering Committee recommended that the Council sponsor legislation to amend Bylaw 13.1.1.3 to permit Division III transfer student-athletes to receive institutional financial aid upon transfer, even if they do not receive prior permission to discuss the transfer.

It was voted that the Council sponsor such legislation.

(5) The Council reviewed a proposal to amend Bylaws 14.3.5.1.1 and 14.6.4.4.6.1 to eliminate the two-week temporary-certification period for practice for recruited student-athletes.

(a) The Division I Steering Committee recommended that the Council sponsor the proposal; further, that the proposal also be referred to the Special Committee to Oversee Implementation of the NCAA Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse for that committee's review and comment. The Division II Steering Committee concurred with the recommendation of the Division I Steering Committee.

(b) It was voted that the Council sponsor the proposal and approve referral of the proposal consistent with the steering committee's recommendation.

(6) The Divisions I and II Steering Committees recommended that the Council sponsor legislation to amend Bylaw 14.8.5.2 to specify that a student-athlete who is transferring from a four-year institution, who has been officially accepted for enrollment at a second institution and who receives permission from that institution to participate in an NCAA-sanctioned summer basketball league does not count on the summer-league roster as a representative of the second institution.

It was voted that the Council sponsor the proposal.

(7) All three steering committees recommended that the Council sponsor legislation to amend Bylaw 16.8.1.2.1.1 to eliminate the distinction between travel-expense exceptions applicable to an institution's (or a student-athlete's) return from regular-season competition that occurs during a vacation period and an institution's (or a student-athlete's) return from postseason events.

It was voted that the Council sponsor the proposal.

(d) The Council reviewed a proposed legislative modification pursuant to Constitution 5.4.1.1.1, which permits the Council to modify the wording of NCAA legislation in a manner consistent with the intent of the membership in adopting the original legislation, provided sufficient documentation and testimony exist to establish clearly that the original wording of the legislation was inconsistent with that intent. It was noted for the record that all such modifications approved by the Council will be submitted as legislation at the 1994 Convention.

(1) The Divisions I and II Steering Committees recommended that the Council amend Bylaw 11.3.2.7 to specify that athletics department staff members are precluded from endorsing any noninstitutional publication dedicated primarily (as opposed to solely) to reporting on an institution's ath-

letics activities.

(2) It was voted that the Council adopt such an amendment.

11. Interpretations.

a. The Council reviewed the minutes of 1993 Interpretations Committee conferences Nos. 1 through 5. The following actions were taken by the division steering committees or by the Council after review by those committees:

(1) The Council reviewed an interpretation that when a prospect visits an institution's campus during a dead period and the visit is unrelated to the prospect's athletics recruitment, the prospect may receive complimentary admission(s) to an institution's athletics event, provided the athletics department does not arrange for the complimentary admission(s). The Division I Steering Committee recommended that the interpretation be revised to clarify its application to instances in which the prospect visits an institution's campus as part of a group. [Conference No. 1, Minute No. 5.]

It was voted that the Council revise the interpretation consistent with the steering committee's recommendation.

(2) The Council reviewed an interpretation related to 1993 Convention Proposal No. 67 that if an athletics department staff member has a written contract signed and executed before November 15, 1992, with a noninstitutional publication dedicated to reporting on the institution's athletics activities, the staff member may continue to fulfill the terms of the contract for a one-year period, provided such contracts are forwarded to the Association's legal counsel for final review and approval. The committee recommended that the Council consider sponsoring legislation (or rendering an interpretation) to permit athletics department staff members to write educational articles related to NCAA rules and crowd control for such publications, provided no remuneration is received for such articles. [Conference No. 2, Minute No. 5.]

(a) The Division I Steering Committee recommended that the Council sponsor legislation consistent with the recommendation of the Interpretations Committee.

(b) The Division II Steering Committee recommended that the issue be resolved by interpretation.

(c) It was voted that the Council sponsor legislation consistent with the recommendation of the Division I Steering Committee.

(3) The Council reviewed an interpretation related to the provisions of 1993 Convention Proposal No. 87 that a student-athlete who is a recipient of Pell Grant assistance in excess of \$1,700 for the 1992-93 academic year, and whose institutional financial aid was reduced so as not to exceed NCAA financial aid limits, may be reimbursed the institutional financial aid not to exceed the NCAA financial aid limits (i.e., the value of a full grant plus \$2,400) or the cost of attendance, whichever is less; further, that any increase in institutional financial aid must be included in the institution's financial aid equivalency calculations in the specific sport. [Conference No. 2, Minute No. 8.]

(a) The Division I Steering Committee recommended that the Council attempt to identify some means by which to permit additional institutional financial aid to be awarded consistent with the provisions of this interpretation during the current academic year, even in instances in which the provision of such aid would exceed the maximum NCAA financial aid limits in a particular sport.

(b) It was voted that the Council use its authority under the provisions of Constitution 5.3.1.1.1 to adopt noncontroversial legislation to amend Bylaw 15.5.3.5 to permit institutions (during the 1992-93 academic year only) to award additional institutional financial aid consistent with the provisions of 1993 Convention Proposal No. 87, even in instances in which the provision of such aid would exceed the maximum NCAA financial aid limits in a particular sport.

(4) The Council reviewed an interpretation that an institution must provide a team one day off per week during the playing season, including the period in which the team is participating in an NCAA championship. The Interpretations Committee recommended that the Council consider sponsoring legislation to exempt the one-day-off-per-week requirement during participation in an NCAA championship. [Conference No. 5, Minute No. 5.]

(a) The Divisions I and II Steering Committees recommended that the Council sponsor legislation consistent with the Interpretations Committee's recommendation.

(b) It was voted that the Council sponsor such legislation.

(5) The Council reviewed an interpretation that an institution that provides financial aid to a student-athlete who is not a counter may not include such aid in meeting the minimum financial aid requirements necessary for Division I membership per Bylaw 20.9.1. The Interpretations Committee recommended that the Council consider sponsoring noncontroversial legislation to allow an institution to count, in meeting the minimum financial aid requirements set forth in Bylaw 20.9.1, athletics aid provided to a student-athlete who has exhausted his or her eligibility in a sport during a previous academic year, or to a medically exempt student-athlete pursuant to the provisions of Bylaw 15.5.1.4. The Division I Steering Committee reported that it had approved noncontroversial legislation consistent with the committee's recommendation, with the understanding that the wording would be modified to permit the institution to count countable aid, instead of athletics aid, provided to student-athletes under the circumstances described. [Conference No. 5, Minute No. 8.]

(6) It was voted that the minutes of 1993 Interpretations Committee Conference Nos. 1 through 5 be approved as amended by the specific actions of the Council and the division steering committees.

b. At the request of the Division I Steering Committee, the Council reviewed an interpretation approved by the Council in its October 1992 meeting that an institutional coaching staff member employed at a national service academy may not be involved in a "mass athletics" program that involves supervising or observing only prospects participating in physical activities related to the coach's sport, even if such prospects are enrolled in the national service academy's official summer program.

It was voted that the interpretation be revised to permit coaching staff members employed at national service academies to be involved in such activities.

12. **Reports of Division Steering Committees.** The division vice-presidents reported on actions taken in the steering committee meetings that had not been reported earlier in this meeting. The Council took the following actions in that regard.

a. Division I Vice-President R. Elaine Dreidame, University of Dayton, reported that the Division I Steering Committee had agreed to forward to the Executive Commit-

tee a request by the Committee on Athletics Certification that certification committee members (during the first year of campus peer-review visits) be permitted to accompany peer-review teams on campus visits at NCAA expense to become familiar with the peer-review process.

b. At the request of the Division I Steering Committee, the Council reviewed current coaching limitations in Division I and received information concerning reported efforts to circumvent the application of rules related to restricted-earnings coaches.

(1) The Division I Steering Committee reported its support for the position of the Presidents Commission that the current legislation related to restricted-earnings coaches is in need of modification.

(2) The steering committee recommended that the Council consider means by which to eliminate opportunities to circumvent the current legislation.

(a) The Council reviewed a proposed modification of Bylaw 11.02.3 to state that the compensation limitations applicable to a restricted-earnings coach remain applicable during a period in which the staff member is not actually under contract to the institution, to state that compensation paid to the spouse of a restricted-earnings coach from the sources set forth in Bylaw 11.02.3(a) and (b) shall be included in the compensation limitations set forth in those paragraphs, and to state that an institution may not alternate individuals between a restricted-earnings coach position and positions as head or assistant coaches.

(b) It was voted that the Council use its authority under the provisions of Constitution 5.4.1.1.1 to modify Bylaw 11.02.3 in this manner so as to conform to the original intent of the legislation.

(3) The steering committee reported its intention to have the Council sponsor legislation for the 1994 Convention that would modify the existing rule (in the sport of basketball only) to permit an individual to be employed as a restricted-earnings coach for a single three-consecutive-year period, with the understanding that an individual would not be confined to employment at a single institution during that period; further, that the individual so employed shall not have been paid previously to coach basketball in Division I (except as an undergraduate assistant coach or as a restricted-earnings coach at another Division I institution during the prescribed three-consecutive-year period).

(4) The steering committee reported that it had defeated a motion to sponsor legislation to eliminate the restricted-earnings category in basketball but had referred the matter of possible future elimination of the restricted-earnings and graduate assistant coaching positions in Division I to the Special Committee to Review Financial Conditions in Intercollegiate Athletics.

c. The Division II Steering Committee reported that it had discussed the impact of 1990 Convention Proposal No. 30 in Division II and noted action taken by the Division I membership during the 1992 Convention to permit a Division I member institution to exempt annually a home exhibition contest against a foreign team and a home exhibition contest against a USA Basketball club team from its maximum number of basketball contests. The steering committee recommended that the Council use its authority under the provisions of Constitution 5.4.1.1.1 to permit Division II institutions to exempt annually a home exhibition contest against a foreign team and a home exhibition contest against a USA Basketball club

team effective August 1, 1993; further, that the Administrative Committee be requested to approve the wording of the proposal for immediate publication in the News.

It was voted that the recommendations of the steering committee be approved.

d. The Division III Steering Committee reported its consideration of the Association's Today's Top Six Awards and recommended that the Council approve two additional awards, with the intention that at least one award would be presented to a student-athlete from Division II and at least one award would be presented to a student-athlete from Division III.

It was voted that the Council approve the steering committee's recommendation.

e. The Division III Steering Committee directed the Council's attention to a September 1990 interpretation of Bylaw 20.9.3.3 that an institution may count participation in a Division I regional cross country competition in meeting minimum-contest requirements, provided the institution meets the minimum-participants requirements (i.e., five participants), inasmuch as the regional qualifying meet is open to any eligible institution in the region and no qualifying standards exist for participation in the meet. The steering committee recommended that the interpretation be incorporated in the NCAA Manual for application to all divisions.

It was voted that the steering committee's recommendation be approved.

f. The Division III Steering Committee recommended that a memorandum be forwarded to directors of financial aid at all Division III institutions emphasizing the need to employ Congressional Methodology in determining the financial need of foreign student-athletes.

It was voted that the steering committee's recommendation be approved.

g. The Division III Steering Committee reported that a subcommittee of the steering committee had been appointed to review the Division III philosophy statement and to identify possible revisions.

13. **Budget Recommendations.** The Council reviewed a listing of pending Association commitments and activities that may have some impact on the 1993-94 NCAA general operating budget. The Council received this information without taking any formal action, noting that actions taken at other times in the meeting may have some budget implications (e.g., the approved brochure relating to professional sports opportunities).

14. Dates and Sites of Future Meetings.

a. The Council noted its 1993 and 1994 meetings for the record:

b. The Council considered suggested sites for its August 1994 meeting. Suggestions included the LaCosta Resort, Carlsbad, California; the Ritz-Carlton Hotel at Laguna Niguel, California; and Coeur D'Alene, Idaho. President Crowley directed that the staff determine the availability of suitable hotels in each of those locations.

Tobacco bill may burn sports, critics charge

A tobacco regulatory bill being considered in Congress could devastate sports like auto racing that rely heavily on tobacco industry sponsorship, critics say.

The bill, introduced May 17, proposes that the tobacco industry be regulated by the Food and Drug Administration. It would require additional health warnings and disclosures of additives in tobacco products, and prohibit free samples and discounts.

It also would restrain the tobacco industry from sponsoring sporting and other public events, The Associated Press reported.

Critics argue that the federal government already regulates the industry and that the bill could have a major impact on sports facilities that include advertisements by tobacco companies.

"It would impact stadiums across the country, because of the signage they buy," said H. A. Wheeler, president of Charlotte (North Carolina) Motor Speedway. "I think about every major stadium in the United States has a tobacco company that has bought a scoreboard and paid a very heavy price to do it."

Getting new advertising would be difficult, Wheeler said.

"Whether we could get other companies besides tobacco companies to do that is a good question," he said. "We would have lean times in the auto racing business if that bill passed...in the next five years. You don't replace a sponsor like R. J. Reynolds overnight. It's a long-term marketing problem."

"The irony of it all, at least with

one tobacco company, like RJR, is they have the best sports-marketing department in the world. They've written the book on sports marketing. Just having that talent available helps us greatly."

A coalition of organizations that includes the American Heart Association, the American Cancer Society and the American Lung Association supports the legislation.

"The promotion of a deadly, highly addictive product should not be tolerated," coalition spokesman Scott Ballin said. "We should not allow sponsors to promote a product that takes 417,000 lives a year."

A tobacco securities analyst said banning tobacco advertising is not new.

"That's already happening in

the private sector," said Emanuel Goldman of PaineWebber. "There have been various groups that have decided on their own not to have tobacco sponsorships. But to have a government bill banning that, I would be surprised."

The bill is in its first stages and has yet to be assigned to a congressional committee.

But Rep. Charlie Rose, D-North Carolina, does not like the proposal.

"These two colleagues would basically like to see the tobacco industry go away," Rose said. "I am clearly opposed to their proposal and don't believe they will find either the votes in the Energy and Commerce Committee or the House to pass."

Sight loss doesn't blind player's goal

Tannisha Stevens doesn't plan to let the loss of sight in her right eye end her basketball career at the University of Michigan.

"I have to do things the hard way, like trying to catch a basketball," said Stevens, 18, who was blinded during a trip in December when a van window shattered and slivers of glass pierced her cornea and retina.

"People still can't believe I'm going to get back out there and play. It's not like I lost both of my legs."

Stevens, who was averaging 10 points a game as a freshman, had surgery immediately after the accident, according to The Associated Press. She then underwent an eight-hour procedure at the Kellogg Eye Institute in Ann Arbor, Michigan, where surgeons tried to reattach the retina and reconstruct her eye.

On April 1, Stevens was told she would never see out of her eye again.

"I wanted to cry, but I knew I had to be strong, so I couldn't," she said.

Michigan women's basketball coach Trish Roberts said Stevens, who already is playing in pickup games, is coming along fine.

"We keep in touch with her and make sure things are going right with her and she's doing the things she needs to do in the classroom," Roberts said. "If she does come back, it'll be one of the great comeback stories."

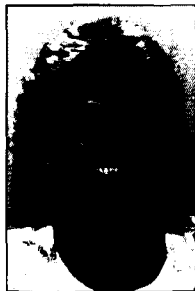

Summer baseball NCAA Bylaw 30.13

Member institutions should note that student-athletes may participate in summer baseball leagues that receive funding from the NCAA through Major League Baseball only if such leagues are approved by the NCAA summer baseball subcommittee per Bylaw 21.3.23.2-(c). To be approved by the summer baseball subcommittee, the league must meet the requirements set forth in Bylaw 30.13. The following leagues have been approved by the summer baseball subcommittee and, thus, must comply with the requirements set forth in Bylaw 30.13:

- Arizona Summer Collegiate League
- Atlantic Collegiate Baseball League
- Cape Cod Baseball League
- Central Illinois Collegiate League
- Great Lakes Summer Collegiate League
- Jayhawk League
- Northeastern Collegiate Baseball League
- Northwestern Collegiate Baseball League
- San Diego Collegiate League
- Southern California Collegiate Baseball League
- Valley Baseball League

Please note that the regulations set forth in Bylaw 30.13 apply only to leagues receiving funding from the NCAA

through Major League Baseball. Other amateur summer baseball leagues are not required to meet the guidelines of Bylaw 30.13.

Bylaw 30.13.4, 1993-94 NCAA Manual

Institutions should note that Bylaw 30.13.4 incorrectly indicates that there are no limitations on the number of student-athletes from an NCAA institution who may participate on the same summer baseball league team. Please note that in accordance with Bylaw 17.2.8.1.4-(a), in Division I, there is a limit of four student-athletes from an institution's baseball team who may participate on the same summer baseball league team. In Divisions II and III, there are no limitations on the number of student-athletes from an institution's baseball team who may participate on the same summer baseball league team.

Basketball coaches endorse some financial conditions panel ideas, recommend others

now there are 42. At a low-major institution, the figures were nine athletics administrators in 1982 and 19 in 1993. It would seem logical that this area be attacked first.

The NCAA special committee has put forth a number of concepts as means to reduce costs or contain costs, and we agree with many of those concepts. It is important to note that these are substantial cuts and that they should have a major

savings and cost-containment value. They are:

1. Eliminate training-table meals in the off-season.
2. Eliminate pregame off-campus housing before regular-season home competition.
3. Prohibit institutions from providing housing expenses for away games when the site of competition is 120 miles or less from campus.
4. Establish transportation limitations for weekend competition in all sports.
5. Establish transportation lim-

itations for weekday competitions.

6. Establish limits on the number of student-athletes, coaches, administrative personnel, etc.

7. Eliminate all printed material developed for distribution to student-athletes.

8. Decrease the number of allowable visits to campus by prospective student-athletes from 15 to 12.

9. Reduce off-campus recruiting contact and evaluation days. Eliminate tag-team recruiting or set a limit of person days.

The NABC offers the following as further ways to save money and contain costs:

1. Eliminate off-campus scouting, limiting scouting to an NCAA-legislated video-exchange program.

2. Create a limit of one coach per home visit.

3. Allow not more than three campus visits per prospective student-athlete in the fall or spring, with the annual total not to exceed five.

4. Reduce the number of per-

sons officiating games from three to two.

5. Reduce athletics department expenses overall, rather than on a sport-specific basis.

The NABC hopes our thoughts will be considered. We will continue to work to keep the student-athlete and the game at the forefront.

committee generally accepted the majority of the recommendations of the Legislative Review Committee, including the committee's recommendation regarding the development of a category called "recruiting opportunities," which would include both contacts and evaluations. The Recruiting Committee recommended seven recruiting opportunities for football and five for all other sports. It also recommended that the recruiting calendar continue to be maintained.

The committee also reviewed the results of a survey of approximately 32 coaches associations. Each association will be notified of the results of the committee's actions on its proposals.

Other highlights

In other actions at its May 18-19 meeting in Santa Fe, New Mexico, the Recruiting Committee:

- Reviewed the recommendations of the NCAA Special Committee to Review Financial Conditions in Intercollegiate Athletics.
- Expressed interest in continued examination of the concept of the "tiering" of sports, which was discussed in the first meeting of the NCAA Special Committee to Study Rules Federation by Sport.
- Noted that in the current recruiting environment, the areas of cost containment; gender equity, and rules simplification, deregulation and federation are being studied and that coaches associations are becoming more involved in the legislative process. Jody Conradt, chair of the committee and women's athletics director at the University of Texas at Austin, said the committee annually will continue to seek input from other committees and groups before legislation is recommended to the Council.

final report to the Presidents Commission.

The committee has focused during its deliberations on what were termed by committee chair James E. Delany in the May 5 issue of The NCAA News as "administrative and operational excesses." It

has been a goal of the committee to maintain as many participation opportunities as possible for student-athletes while reducing costs elsewhere.

Many of the original 17 concepts for 1994 that were circulated for reaction focused on areas such as recruiting, travel and housing expenses.

Commissioners organization to offer development session

In an effort to combine forces and pool strategies in facing problems common to conferences, the Collegiate Commissioners Association will hold its first professional-development seminar July 15-17 in St. Louis.
