## Equity, financial issues top Commission agenda

A special workshop on issues involving gender equity and financial conditions in college athletics highlights the schedule for the NCAA Presidents Commission's June 29-30 meeting in Kansas City, Missouri.

The workshop, to be held the morning of June 29, will feature the final report of the NCAA Special Committee to Review Financial Conditions in Intercollegiate Athletics and a status report by the NCAA Gender-Equity Task Force.

James E. Delany, commissioner of the Big Ten Conference and chair of the financial-conditions

committee, will attend the workshop to present that group's report. The co-chairs of the gender-equity panel—Phyllis L. Howlett, assistant commissioner of the Big Ten, and James J. Whalen, president of Ithaca College—will appear to discuss that committee's current recommendations.

Another part of the workshop will be a review of the gender-equity recommendations passed along earlier by the NCAA Council (reported in the April 28 issue of *The NCAA News*); a "first principles" document being prepared by Commission member Alice

Chandler, president of State University College at New Paltz, and a report by University of Colorado President Judith E. N. Albino, who chairs the Presidents Commission Subcommittee on Gender Equity and also serves as the Commission's representative on the Gender-Equity Task Force.

If the Presidents Commission is to sponsor any legislation for the 1994 NCAA Convention on those or other issues, this is the meeting at which it must make at least its tentative decisions in that regard. Commonly, the group authorizes its officers to make final decisions

regarding legislation in advance of the August 15 submission deadline.

### Other sessions

The Commission's executive committee, Subcommittee on Strategic Planning, Subcommittee on Minority Issues and Liaison Committee all will hold sessions in conjunction with the Commission meeting. The first three will meet June 28; the Liaison Committee will convene upon adjournment of the Commission session June 30 and continue July 1.

And the Divisions I, II and III

subcommittees will meet separately as part of the scheduled Commission session.

Major issues in those sessions:

■ The executive committee—the four elected Commission officers—will prepare for the Commission meeting itself and will make plans for determining final Commission legislative positions, roll-call votes and placement of issues in the agenda for the January Convention.

■ The strategic-planning subcommittee, chaired by President

For the answer, return to the first sentence of this article. There is no

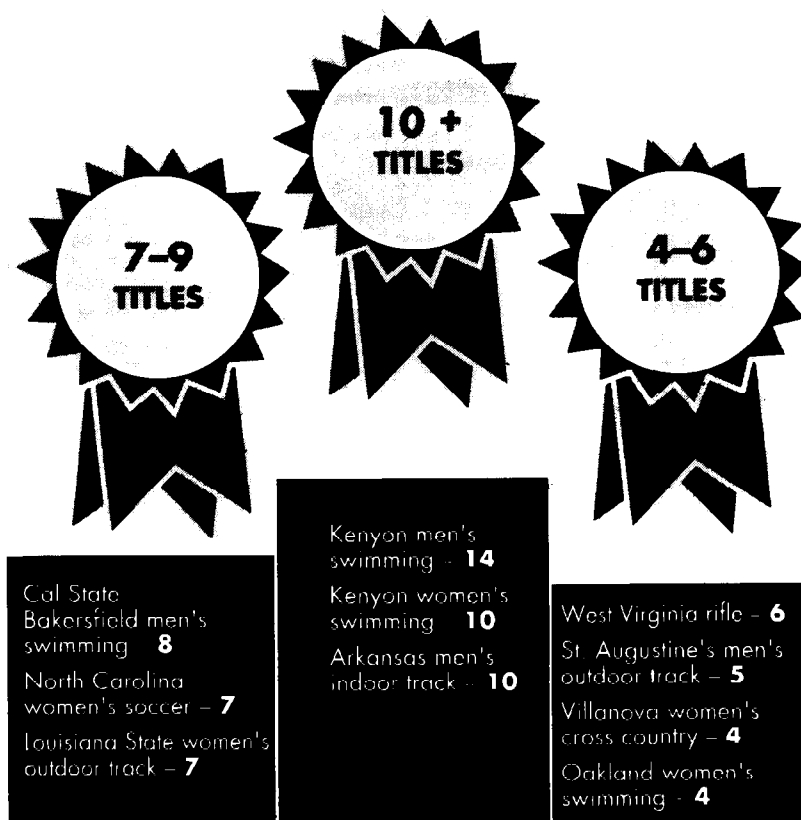

## Recent comments on gender equity cause concern

Concerned about what it believes are unfounded fears from the NCAA membership and some constituent groups regarding gender equity, the NCAA Committee on Women's Athletics has recommended that the NCAA Gender-Equity Task Force incorporate language from a recent Title IX ruling into its final report.

The women's athletics committee met June 14-16 in Big Fork, Montana.

The committee, which endorsed the principles of the Gender-Equity Task Force's preliminary report, expressed concern about recent negative statements in the media regarding the issues of gender equity in general and proportionality based on enrollment in particular.

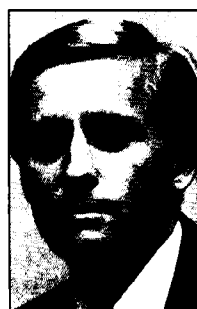
Although the committee believes that proportionality is the ultimate goal in athletics programs, it noted that proportionality is not a mandate and is only one of three ways a member institution can meet Title IX requirements, as set forth in the recent Cohen vs. Brown University decision.

"Most of the fears I'm hearing around the country I think are unfounded," said Jim Livengood, athletics director at Washington State University, who is completing his term as a member of the Committee on Women's Athletics and was a consultant to the Gender-Equity Task Force. "We need to move along the road to changing attitudes. We're in a different era, an era

## Briefly in the News

### Ten diplomas to go, please

With a little pomp and under some unusual circumstances, graduation for 10 student-athletes at Drake University turned out to be something to remember.

An impromptu, surprise commencement ceremony was held May 12 for graduating seniors on the women's softball, men's and women's track and field, and men's tennis teams. Drake President **Michael R. Ferrari** got the idea after learning that a number of student-athletes would miss the university's commencement exercises because of out-of-town competition.

"I went up to him and shook his hand and told him I was pretending to be graduation," said track athlete **Kristin Hahn**, who was taking a management class taught by Ferrari. "I told him I would be missing it. He was really upset and said, 'If there's anything I can do, I'll do it.' He did, and I can't believe it."

Ferrari kept his idea secret and arranged for the parents of the student-athletes to be invited to the ceremony, which was held at the Knapp Center on campus.

"I learned that the conference or NCAA tournaments would conflict with our commencement ceremony," Ferrari told the student-athletes. "Recognizing the importance of commencement to you and your families and knowing how hard you have worked in the classroom and in athletics, I wanted to be sure that we recognized in an appropriate way—although a surprise to you—your accomplishments."

"Earlier this week, my husband said, 'I guess we aren't going to see Luke graduate,'" said Jane Patrick of Topeka, Kansas, whose son, Luke, is a member of the track team. "Luke walked up the steps and the expression on his face when he saw us was worth the trip. This was just perfect."

### All-around success

**Colleen Holloway** of Southern Illinois University at Carbondale will not be forgotten soon on campus. The finance major recently graduated with a 3.270 grade-point average (4.000 scale) and a couple of school softball records.

this season for the third time in her career. Holloway became only the second woman in the school's history to be so honored (joining **Cheryl Venorsky**, who was selected in 1990, 1991 and 1992 in softball).

Holloway's career batting average of .352 and slugging percentage of .600 as a four-year starter are all-time bests at Southern Illinois. Also, her 207 hits, 159 runs, 119 runs batted in, 34 triples, 16 home runs, 353 total bases and 83 bases on balls are all-time Saluki highs.

### It takes two

Here's a tidbit for trivia fans: Since the adoption of the current format of the National Collegiate Women's Lacrosse Championship in 1983, four institutions have advanced teams to the semifinals of both the women's tourney and the Division I Men's Lacrosse Championship in the same season.

They are the University of Maryland, College Park, in 1991; Loyola College (Maryland) in 1990; University of Virginia in 1986, and Princeton University, which accomplished the feat twice—in 1992 and

1993.

### ESPN2 to debut

ESPN announced plans to launch a second network, "ESPN2," which will target young and light-to-moderate sports viewers.

ESPN2, scheduled to premiere in November, will broadcast coverage of the National Hockey League, college basketball, arena football, volleyball, auto racing, BMX racing and "extreme" sports such as skysurfing and snowboarding. In addition, a fan call-in program will air weekdays from 11 p.m. to midnight Eastern time, and ESPN2's flagship program, SportsNight, will air from 8 to 11 p.m. Eastern time weeknights. That program will feature scores and sports updates, as well as features, analysis and humor.

"ESPN2 will provide a new alternative in sports television that will benefit affiliates, advertisers and ultimately viewers," said **Steve Bornstein**, ESPN president and chief executive officer. "We are confident that the same ingenuity that helped ESPN revolutionize sports television in the '80s will make ESPN2 a success in the '90s."

## Milestones

**Bob Corradi**, baseball coach at Massachusetts Maritime Academy, recorded his 300th victory April 28 when his team defeated the U.S. Coast Guard Academy, 8-1. Corradi recently concluded his 21st season as coach at Massachusetts Maritime.

**Augie Garrido**, baseball coach at California State University, Fullerton, recorded his 1,000th victory May 7 when the Titans defeated San Jose State University, 12-1. Garrido has coached at Cal State Fullerton for 18 seasons and has been a college coach for 25 years. He coached the Titans to Division I titles in 1979 and 1984.

On the same day that Garrido reached his milestone, Cal State Fullerton women's softball coach **Judi Garman** registered her 900th victory as a coach. The total includes 211 victories while she was coach at Golden West College, a two-year institution.

## Fact file

In the NCAA conference grant program for 1991-92, \$3,893,073.88 was expended by the Division I conferences receiving the grants. Of that total, 30.77 percent went for compliance programs, 24.9 percent for opportunity-enhancement programs, 16.91 percent for men's basketball officiating, 14.14 percent for women's basketball officiating, 10.34 percent for drug education and 2.95 percent for shared programs. Nearly half of the dollar total—48.49 percent—went for salaries and benefits. The rest was spent on seminars, operating expenses, subgrants, computer expense and equipment.

### Sports bodies agree to unify procedures for doping controls

In what they described as a breakthrough, sports leaders agreed June 21 to harmonize doping rules and sanctions and set up a special arbitration court to settle athletes' grievances.

The agreements were reached during a special joint meeting in Lausanne, Switzerland, of the International Olympic Committee executive board and the council

of the Association of Summer Olympic International Federations.

The two bodies agreed that unified rules and procedures for doping controls, both during and out of competition, should be applied to all sports federations, according to The Associated Press. In addition,

## Benchmark could endanger soccer

In May, the NCAA Executive Committee approved a new approach to the NCAA championships program, one that—among other things—tied bracket and field sizes to the number of institutions sponsoring a particular sport.

The only men's team championship to expand under this new arrangement was the Division I Men's Soccer Championship, which increased from 28 to 32 teams because of soccer's broad sponsorship throughout the Division I membership (65.1 percent of all Division I members, almost exactly the same as football).

It is therefore more than a little ironic to consider the effect that the "proportionality benchmark" set forth by the NCAA Gender-Equity Task Force could have on soccer.

First, it is noteworthy that soccer, as the fastest-growing NCAA women's sport, offers institutions currently not sponsoring the sport an excellent opportunity to address gender-equity issues. With the potential to share facilities and perhaps coaching staffs, women's soccer may offer a more cost-effective means of enhancing women's athletics programs than adding new or "emerging" sports.

However, the prospect of adding new sports and increasing financial aid for Divisions I and II women's sports concerns the National Soccer Coaches Association of America because of the potential impact on existing men's programs. As various NCAA committees have worked diligently in recent years to formulate cost-reduction plans, the recommendations of the Gender-Equity Task Force are likely to place severe financial strains on most athletics departments.

If faced with implementing those recommendations, many athletics departments likely will be forced to enhance opportunities for women by reducing such opportunities for men. The NSCAA believes that the task force should be on record as stating that enhanced participation opportunities for women should not be created at the expense of similar opportunities for men. Existing men's varsity programs should not be

## Social factors determine interest

The NCAA Gender-Equity Task Force recommends in its preliminary report that the goal of each institution should be to provide intercollegiate athletics participation opportunities for women and men in the same proportion as the numbers of men and women in the undergraduate student population.

Some have suggested that this is unfair because men are more interested than women in sports.

It is difficult to read the arguments about whether women are *as interested* in sports as men. Girls may be *more interested* than boys in sport. We don't know. We have no data to indicate how interested in sports girls are. Why? We live in a society in which girls and boys have been, and still are, more socialized toward some activities and away from others. Let me share an example.

One of the young women on the high-school team I coached approached me before practice. She very excitedly told me that she had been selected to the homecoming court. She stated that she would not be coming to soccer practice because she had to be fitted for a gown.

The next morning, I asked the football coach whether any of his players had made the homecoming court. He said yes, but that none of them had missed practice. They had found a tux shop that was open in the evening. He added, "They *know* they can't miss practice."

Are the boys inherently more inter-

ested? Or have they been encouraged for generations that sports are important and that a commitment to a varsity athletics team implies they will not miss practice? Their "interest" was so ingrained that the coach never even had to state the rule of no missed practice.

On the other hand, was the girl less interested? Or had she also been told, like other generations of girls, that the homecoming-court activities should take precedence over a commitment to a varsity athletics team?

Parents and teachers made up the homecoming-court advisory group. Adults told her that she wasn't as interested in sports. We all send subtle messages often that serve to restrict or channel the interests of young people. Ideally, some adult would have taken the time at least to point out to her the set of expectations that had been set up by the advisory group. This at least would have given her more opportunity to make her own decision as to how interested she was in sports.

We can look at this "interest" issue in another setting. Take parenting. In the past 10 years, there has been a far greater recognition in the courts that men are capable of parenting. In the state of Washington, courts are obligated to the concept of being sex blind. This means that, all other things being equal, parenting should not be

awarded to the mother just because she is a woman.

Not very long ago, however, there were presumptions in favor of moms. Does this mean that only recently men have been "interested" in parenting? Or does it mean that perhaps men always were interested but only recently have been given the opportunity to be active in parenting?

Does it make sense to limit men's future opportunities at parenting based on what we deem is their level of interest today?

Young men and women deserve to have the doors open to whatever interests them. If educational opportunities are going to be restricted for women, hopefully someone will come up with a stronger reason than lack of interest. We tend to be interested in what society allows us to be interested in.

## ■ State legislation relating to college athletics

This report summarizes legislation currently pending in state legislatures that could affect, or is otherwise of interest to, the intercollegiate athletics programs and student-athletes at NCAA member institutions. Set forth below is a list of 19 bills from 14 states. The report includes three bills that have been introduced, and 16 pending bills on which action has been taken, since the last report (June 9). The newly introduced bills are marked with an asterisk. Pending bills discussed in the previous report on which no action has been taken do not appear in this report.

This report is based on data provided by the Information for Public Affairs on-line state legislation system as of June 17, 1993. The listed bills were selected for inclusion from a larger pool of bills concerning sports, and they therefore do not necessarily represent all bills that would be of interest to individual member institutions. Bills pending in the District of Columbia and U.S. territories are not available on-line and are not included.

The NCAA has not verified the accuracy or completeness of the information and is providing this summary as a service to members. For further information regarding a particular bill, members should contact the state legislature concerned.

As an overview, the table below summarizes the number of bills included in the report by subject:

Three bills have become law since the last report, including one each on academic standards, athlete agents and Olympic athletes.

Four state legislatures—Connecticut, Kentucky, Louisiana and Nebraska—have adjourned since the last report, bringing to 33 the number of state legislatures that have adjourned. In Nebraska, pending bills will carry over to 1994. In the remaining three states, bills will not carry over, and pending bills died at the conclusion of the session if they had not been cleared for the governor's signature.

**California S. 262 (Author: Hart)**

Requires the Trustees of the California State University to create a Gender Equity Committee; provides that the Committee shall prepare an annual report on the progress made in providing equitable incentives and encouragement to female student-athletes; provides that athletics teams shall reflect the ratio of women to men by the

beginning of the 1998-99 academic year.

Status: 2/11/93 introduced. 6/3/93 passed Senate. To Assembly. 6/10/93 to Assembly Committee on Higher Education.

**Colorado S. 30 (Author: Wells)**

Establishes the In-State Tuition Classification Program for Olympic Athletes; provides that an Olympic athlete at the United States Training Center in Colorado Springs shall be classified as an in-state student for tuition purposes at any state-supported institution of higher education in El Paso or Pueblo Counties.

Status: 1/13/93 introduced. 2/19/93 passed Senate. To House. 5/12/93 passed House as amended. To Senate for concurrence. Senate concurred in House amendments. 5/28/93 to governor. 6/6/93 signed by governor.

**Illinois H. 2187 (Author: Meyer)**

Provides that certain anabolic steroids shall not be classified as Schedule III controlled substances.

**\*Louisiana H. 886 (Author: Downer)**

Adds certain anabolic steroids to the list of Schedule III controlled substances.

**Louisiana H. 1910 (Author: Wilkerson)**

Provides that an athlete agent may not give anything of value to an athlete's parents, legal guardians or other advisers; provides that an interest in an athlete's profits may be sold only with the written consent of the athlete.

Status: 4/12/93 introduced. 5/14/93 passed House. To Senate. 6/7/93 passed Senate. 6/8/93 to governor.

**Massachusetts H. 3601 (Author: Fitzgerald)**

Provides immunity from liability for compensated sports officials acting within their official duties; provides an exception for willful or wanton actions.

Status: 1/6/93 introduced. 3/2/93 released to Joint Committee on Judiciary. 6/9/93 from Joint Committee on Judiciary: Reported.

**Nevada A. 402 (Author: Committee on Education)**

Requires a member of a varsity athletics team in the University of Nevada system to make satisfactory progress toward obtaining a degree.

Status: 3/23/93 introduced. 4/26/93 passed Assembly. To Senate. 5/27/93 passed Senate. 6/1/93 to governor. 6/7/93 signed by governor.

**\*Nevada A. 749 (Author: Committee on Judiciary)**

Prohibits wagering on certain amateur sporting events; provides a penalty.

Status: 6/9/93 introduced. To Assembly Committee on Judiciary.

**New Hampshire H. 131 (Author: Sytek)**

Repeals a penalty provision relating to anabolic steroids; changes state laws to reflect current Federal law that classifies anabolic steroids as a Schedule III controlled substance.

Status: 1/6/93 introduced. 2/18/93 passed House. To Senate. 4/20/93 passed Senate as amended. To House for concurrence. 4/29/93 House refused to concur in Senate amendments. To conference committee. 6/8/93 conference report adopted by Senate. 6/9/93 conference report adopted by House.

**\*New York A. 8495 (Author: Committee on Rules)**

Replaces the existing definition of "anabolic steroids" with the definition used by the Federal government.

**New York S. 3165 (Author: Volker)**

Expands the definition of "trademark" in the trademark counterfeiting law to include words and symbols reserved and protected under the Amateur Sports Act of 1978.

**New York S. 5601 (Author: Tully)**

Expands the list of anabolic steroids to include substances related to testosterone.

Status: 5/5/93 introduced. To Senate Committee on Health. 6/2/93 from Senate Committee on Health: Reported with amendment. To Senate Committee on Rules.

**North Carolina S. 30 (Author: Conder)**

Provides that sports officials who are registered with a training organization shall be immune from civil liability in their officiating; provides an exception in cases of willful misconduct or gross negligence.

Status: 2/3/93 introduced. 5/13/93 passed Senate. To House. 5/17/93 to House Committee on Judiciary II. 6/14/93 from House Committee on Judiciary II: Reported with amendment.

**Oregon H. 2175 (Author: Office of Higher Education)**

Clarifies provisions on contributions to a retirement plan for football coaches.

Status: 1/11/93 introduced. 3/26/93 passed House. To Senate. 3/29/93 to Senate Committee on Labor and Government Operations. 6/11/93 from Senate Committee on Labor and Government Operations: Do pass.

**Oregon S. 483 (Author: Hannon)**

Establishes procedures for the registration of athletics trainers; authorizes the Health Division to adopt rules; establishes registration fees.

Status: 2/23/93 introduced. 3/24/93 passed Senate. To House. 3/26/93 to House Committee on Human Development Services. 6/7/93 from House Committee on Human Development Services: Do pass as amended.

**Pennsylvania H. 450 (Author: Colafella)**

Provides for the licensing of athlete agents; provides penalties.

Status: 2/10/93 introduced. 5/4/93 passed House. To Senate. 5/13/93 to Senate Committee on State Government. 6/9/93 from Senate Committee on State Government: Reported with amendment. 6/15/93 to Senate Committee on Appropriations.

**South Carolina H. 4059 (Author: Felder)**

Exempts coaches in public institutions of higher education from the state employee grievance procedure.

**Texas S. 87 (Author: Armbrister)**

Relates to the regulation of athlete agents.

**Wisconsin A. 9 (Author: Schneider)**

Relates to written policies on entering locker rooms used by athletics teams representing certain schools.

lated, though. Many outside the sport experience believe similarly, as do some athletes. Yet....

Although Gough states that coaches have shaped his moral character more profoundly than any other educator, which he believes is a rule rather than an exception, he, as well as others with similar beliefs, offers no proof.

No one presently has documented that sports build character.

We do agree with Gough and others that good and decent people are alive and well in sport and serve as moral role models. From what Pete McGinnis (The NCAA News, April 7) said, he most assuredly fits that role. However, because we can name five or 10 or 50 good, decent role models does not mean that everyone is.

Gough and others continue to challenge our research and its truth. They violate the moral-reasoning process by using a meta-ethical extremist argument—specifically, emotivism. Just because someone says the research is wrong does not mean it is. And just because they love the game and the people they played with and for does not mean they are right. Research is not based on a common perception of "I played

football and I'm moral, therefore I know sport builds character."

Gough further states that moral-education research is a quasi (false) science at worst. To be candid, though, research in social science is not in the dark ages. Experimental design and statistical analysis are now the modus operandi.

Sound research is based on asking a good question. Good questions come from years of studying the total milieu of history, sociology, psychology and philosophy, not only in society, but also in sport. Data generated from the good question are meaningless; all data must be interpreted. To be meaningful requires that the data be interpreted in light of the current and past research and theory. There is a trend in this country to doubt science and to disregard the consequences of valid and reliable longitudinal data.

While Gough is correct that a few writers make light of the 40 years Kohlberg spent researching, writing and teaching about moral development, if they had read and studied in depth Kohlberg's underlying philosophy they would find, as have most cognitive developmental theorists, that Kohlberg is the icon of cognitive developmental psychology (period). We would venture that anyone who would take the time to read all of Kohlberg would find that he developed a good problem and went

about his social science in a proper, rigorous fashion. As such, he developed a philosophy underlying the theory.

Kohlberg himself stated that his work was incomplete, that it was only a foundation. Also, he described social learning theory, not the development of character, as a "bag of virtues" approach (Kohlberg 1981). However, if you doubt Kohlberg, try Piaget (1932) or Lickona (1991).

We have found in our work that arguments presented by a majority of people, including those used by Gough, fall to the fallacy of equivocation. This fallacy in reasoning is when a word or expression changes meaning in course of discussion or when words mean different things. In other words, what happens with most people is that they do not speak the same language as those researchers and educators in moral education. If they spoke the same language, they would know that we agree with them—as we agree with Gough—on a basic point: Moral character is a complex process and is not in and of itself moral acting.

We are confused, however, on Gough's point that character precedes intellectual judgment. We would hope that Gough does not mean that character comes before thinking. If this is what he means, then character is predetermined by fates.

We think, however, what Gough means is that one must have character before deciding issues. If he had thoroughly read Lickona, Rest, Haan, Hall, Gilligan, Bredemeier, Shields, Romancé, Weiss, Wandzilak, Tuiko, Olgilvie, Boyver, Allison, Beller, Stoll and, yes, Kohlberg, he would see that we all agree. Character is the sum result of knowing, feeling and valuing, which results in acting.

We recommend that those who question moral reasoning/development research read the historical data on the development of moral-reasoning instruments so that they can understand how consistency checks and validity work to minimize the statistical and experimental and design threats (see Thomas and Nelson, 1990).

To summarize, we are neither Kohlbergians nor Kantians, though we wouldn't mind making such positive changes in society. We have never ever met a dumb jock, nor do we perpetuate this myth. We believe in the research that states there is a low positive correlation between motor-skill development and intellect (Sage).

We aren't in the business of perpetuating the negative; we leave that to the media. Rather, we are in the business of education.

We again thank Professor Gough for his latest response concerning moral reasoning and moral development of athletics

*Gough responds: "The difference between Professors Beller and Stoll and myself is just a difference in points of view. It has little to do with a familiarity of the scholarly literature on moral development (for what it's worth, I am very familiar with the work of every writer/researcher mentioned), nor does it have to do primarily with fallacies in logic. The difference between us is in one of assumptions.*

*"Where our points of view most fundamentally diverge is in our assumptions about the role that science can play in the areas of moral reasoning and moral development. Professors Beller and Stoll continually appeal to—and their conclusions depend upon—the assumption that scientific method can somehow measure and quantify moral development. I respectfully, yet strongly, disagree with that assumption. I contend that questions of morality and moral development cannot be addressed meaningfully by the methods of science (other than tallying the actual behaviors of individuals, of course). Thus, talk of 'experimental design,' 'valid and reliable longitudinal data,' and 'consistency checks' will be compelling only to those who share their assumption. In my view, the complex, moral lives of human beings transcend scientific experimentation."*

# I hockey considers eight possible host sites

The NCAA Division I Men's Ice Hockey Committee met with representatives from eight potential host sites for the 1997 and 1998 Division I ice hockey championships during its June 13-16 in Hilton Head, South Carolina.

The committee presently is conducting final negotiations with the prospective sites and will announce its recommendations in mid-July.

The eight potential hosts that made bid presentations to the committee were representatives of the Knickerbocker Arena, Albany, New York; The Anaheim Arena, Anaheim, California; The Palace at Auburn Hills, Auburn Hills, Michigan; Boston Garden, Boston; Joe Louis Arena, Detroit; Bradley Center, Milwaukee; Centrum, Worcester, Massachusetts, and the St. Paul Civic Center, St. Paul, Minnesota.

## Other highlights

*In other actions at its June 13-16 meeting in Hilton Head, South Carolina, the Division I Men's Ice Hockey Committee:*

- Discussed a variety of topics with the commissioners of the four Division I ice hockey conferences. Specifically, the commissioners expressed concern about decreases in per diem and travel squad sizes and that some schools will have to pay some expenses to participate in championship competition.

- The commissioners and the committee also discussed the Division I revenue-distribution process and agreed to develop a recommendation that would provide a portion of championships revenue to Division II or Division III schools that participate in the Division I ice hockey championship. Presently, 17 of the 49 Division I hockey programs come from Division II or III institutions. The commissioners and the committee agreed that it should not cost a school money to participate in the championship.

- Voted to recommend that the two-referee, one-linesman officiating system be used at the 1994 championship. The committee also agreed to require that an official work in a two-referee, one-linesman system during regular-season conference competition to be selected to work in the championship.

In a related matter, the committee will recommend an increase in the referees' fees from \$225 to \$250 and an increase in the linesman fee from \$100 to \$125.

- Reviewed the championship selection criteria, noting that the current process provides for a consistent application of the criteria. The committee, however, will evaluate further the Ratings Percentage Index to ensure that it provides an equal ratio between won-lost record and strength of schedule.

- Granted automatic-qualification to the Eastern College Athletic and Hockey East Conferences and the Central Collegiate Hockey and Western Collegiate Hockey Associations.

- Reviewed a request from the Men's Ice Hockey Rules Committee to allow the use of instant replay, upon referees' request, to resolve disputes over the scoring of goals in championships competition. The committee denied the request, citing inconsistencies it would face in trying to apply the recommendation when all games are not televised.

- Reviewed the current television contract with ESPN that runs through the 1997 championship and discussed possibly changing the championship game time so that it does not coincide with the semifinals of the Division I Men's Basketball Championship.

## At-large selection process reviewed

The NCAA Divisions II and III Men's Ice Hockey Committee discussed the issue of quality of competition vs. number of sponsoring institutions as a factor in at-large selections for the Division III championship during its June 8-11 meeting in Hilton Head, South Carolina.

Although it made no recommendation to the NCAA Executive Committee, the ice hockey committee discussed the issue at length and agreed to study further the concept of implementing geographical ratios for at-large participation in future championships.

With schools in the East outnumbering those in the West by more than a two-to-one margin, the committee agreed to gather input from coaches and administrators as to whether a geographical ratio should be implemented for at-large selection.

Six schools presently are selected at large to participate in the eight-team championship, while two institutions qualify automatically.

## Other highlights

*In other actions at its June 8-11 meeting in Hilton Head, South Carolina, the Divisions II and III Men's Ice Hockey Committee:*

- Voted to conduct the 1994 Division III championship semifinals and final on the campus of one of the competing institutions. The committee is in the process of securing a predetermined site for the 1995 championship.

- Agreed to explore the option of conducting the Division III championship at the same site and time of the Division I championship.

- Voted to recommend to the NCAA Executive Committee that automatic qualification be granted to the Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference and the State University of New York Athletic Conference for the 1994 Division III championship.

- Agreed to explore options that will allow Division II institutions to participate in the Division III championship if the Division II championship is eliminated at the 1994 NCAA Convention.

- Voted to conduct the Division II championship March 18-19, 1994, on the campus of one of the competing institutions.

- Voted to conduct the first round of the 1994 Division III championship March 11-12, 1994, and voted to propose an open weekend between the first round and the semifinals and final of the championship.

- Voted to propose that the Division III semifinals and final be conducted March 25-26, 1994, if the week off is granted.

# Hammer throw considered for women's track

The NCAA Men's and Women's Track and Field Committee has discussed adding the women's hammer throw to the list of events at outdoor track championships.

At its annual meeting June 13-18 in Jackson Hole, Wyoming, the committee discussed various time-tables regarding the addition of the women's hammer throw at the national championships. Any such move would have to be approved by the NCAA Executive Committee.

If the hammer throw is added to the women's championships, it would increase to 20 the number of events contested. Currently, the men's championships feature 21 events.

Division III may be the first of the three divisions to contest the women's hammer throw outdoors. The Division III subcommittee will submit a recommendation to the Executive Committee in August requesting that the hammer throw be added effective with the 1994 championships.

With the addition of 69 women's participants to the outdoor championships field (the Executive Committee at its May meeting increased the women's field from 246 to 315 competitors), it was the sense of the Division III subcommittee that a portion of those numbers could be used to add the hammer throw.

The Divisions I and II subcommittees are considering a plan in which they would recommend to the Executive Committee that the women's hammer throw be added effective with the 1996 championships. The Division I subcommittee also is considering adding the women's weight throw, effective in 1996.

The Division II subcommittee noted that while adding the hammer throw is a possibility, it first will survey the membership through the coaches association regarding the possibility of adding events.

## Rules actions

*During its June 13-18 meeting in Jackson Hole, Wyoming, the NCAA Men's and Women's Track and Field Committee took the following actions pertaining to rules:*

- Determined that the intersections of each lane line and the finish line shall be painted black. (Rule 1-1-6)
- Determined that removing any part of the official team competition uniform (for example, lowering of the shoulder straps) while in the area of competition shall lead to a warning and, if repeated, to disqualification. (Rule 4-2-1)
- Determined that uniforms for all cross country team members must meet the following criteria:
  - (a) Must be school-issued;
  - (b) Singlets are identical;
  - (c) Pants may be of any length but each team's uniforms must have identical color and markings, and
  - (d) Visible undergarments must be of an identical solid color. (Rule 8-8)
- Determined that in the multiple events, hurdles must be placed in all lanes. (Rule 9-2-6-b)
- Recommended that the order of the indoor distance medley relay be as follows: 800-meter run, 400-meter dash, 1,200-meter run and 1,600-meter run. (Rule 10-4)

## Division III subcommittee

*The Division III subcommittee of the NCAA Men's and Women's Track and Field Committee took the following actions during its meeting in Jackson Hole, Wyoming:*

- Recommended the following cross country regional sites to the NCAA Executive Committee for 1993: University of Massachusetts, Dartmouth (New England); University of Rochester (New York); Allentown College of St. Francis de Sales (Midwest), and Methodist College (South/Southeast). Three sites—Claremont McKenna-Harvey Mudd-Scripps Colleges (West); University of Wisconsin, Oshkosh (Midwest), and Grinnell College (Central)—were determined earlier. The Great Lakes regional site has yet to be determined. Also recommended were the following regional sites for 1994: State University of New York at Binghamton (New York); Allentown (Midwest), and Pomona-Pitzer Colleges (West).
- Recommended to the Executive Committee that Rochester serve as host site for the 1994 men's and women's cross country championships and that Ohio Northern University and Carleton College be the host sites for the 1995 indoor and outdoor track championships, respectively.
- Clarified the advancement policy for cross country to state: "If an individual or team declines to advance from the regional, that berth will be filled using the formula for advancement and would not automatically roll over to the next team in the region."

## Division I subcommittee

*The Division I subcommittee of the NCAA Men's and Women's Track and Field Committee took the following actions during its meeting in Jackson Hole, Wyoming:*

- Recommended the following cross country district-meet sites to the NCAA Executive Committee for 1993: George Mason University (Districts I and II); Furman University (District III); Indiana University, Bloomington (District IV); Southern Illinois University at Carbondale (District V); University of North Texas (District VI); Salt Lake City (Brigham Young University, host) (District VII); University of Portland (District VIII).
- Recommended to the Executive Committee that Iowa State University be the host site of the 1995 cross country championships.
- Increased from six to eight the number of scoring places in events at the 1994 indoor championships.
- Requested permission from the Executive Committee to increase by 100 percent the fine for late declarations submitted by repeat offenders. The increase would apply only to those institutions that continually submit proof-of-performance and declaration forms after the posted deadline.
- Approved the order of the distance medley relay as follows: 800-meter run, 400-meter dash, 1,200-meter run and 1,600-meter run. Also, the subcommittee decided that the relay would be run only as a final at the national championships.
- Voted that the minimum field sizes for women's events match those for men's events at the Division I national championships.

## Division II subcommittee

*The Division II subcommittee of the NCAA Men's and Women's Track and Field Committee took the following actions during its meeting in Jackson Hole, Wyoming:*

- Voted that the minimum field sizes for women's events will match those for men's events at the national championships.
- Voted to change the date of the 1993 men's and women's cross country championships from November 20 to November 22.
- Voted that the University of California, Riverside, serve as host site of the 1993 cross country championships.
- Recommended to the NCAA Executive Committee that South Dakota State University be the host site of the 1994 indoor track championships.
- Designated the following cross country regional sites for 1993: South Dakota State (Central); Springfield College (East); Missouri Southern State College (Great Lakes); University of South Carolina at Spartanburg (Southeast); Fort Hays State University (South Central), and California State Polytechnic University, Pomona (West).

sacrificed, nor should there be any significant reductions in financial aid or coaching staffs for men's programs as the goals of gender equity are attained.

Obviously, the economics of the situation are difficult, but we believe the task force would be remiss if it did not send a clear message of fairness concerning the continuing viability of men's varsity athletics.

We laud the task force's observation that proportionally offered opportunities may not yield identically proportionate participation

and that proportionality does not require fixed quotas. Still, we are troubled by the proportionality benchmark if football is to be included in the equation. If so, true gender equity would become almost impossible, given current economic reality.

The NSCAA does not presume to offer any suggestions about cost reduction in football. But there can be little doubt that including football in any definition of proportionality would lead to severe financial hardships for most athletics departments.

The NSCAA is enthusiastic about the idea of camps, clinics

and workshops for girls in elementary and middle school. We would be more than willing to assist in such programs (we have a national coaching staff that regularly conducts similar programs). In general, coaches associations may be an excellent resource in this regard.

Similarly, coaches associations could be quite helpful in recruiting more female coaches and developing increased educational experiences for women. The NSCAA has a highly successful and respected coaching education program, with four levels of certification. By cooperating with individual institutions, confer-

ences or the NCAA through grants or other programs, the NSCAA is well-equipped to expand opportunities and training for female soccer coaches.

The NSCAA appreciates the enormity of the task facing the Gender-Equity Task Force. We stand ready to assist in any way we can to make gender equity a reality, but we wish to reemphasize our belief that existing men's programs should not be disadvantaged as we strive toward these goals.

## Arkansas to keep men's swimming through 1996

The men's swimming and diving program at the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, will stay afloat another two years, according to athletics director J. Frank Broyles.

Broyles had said in April that the school would cancel the men's program after the 1994 season

and add women's volleyball.

After that announcement, diver Tom Caruso filed a lawsuit in Federal court to save the program, alleging that its cancellation would deny team members an opportunity to participate in the Southeastern Conference simply

because they are men.

After university officials agreed to discuss possible measures to save the program, the lawsuit was dropped.

Now, the program will be maintained through the 1996 season, which would allow freshmen from

the 1993 season to complete their eligibility, according to The Associated Press.

Broyles said the program will offer partial scholarships and encourage walk-ons so that the team can meet the NCAA Division I standard of 11 participants.

The guide is designed to help coaches, compliance coordinators and other members of athletics departments understand and apply NCAA recruiting legislation. # Four-star pitcher: Senior repeats on all-America team

Lisa Fernandez, considered by some to be the best collegiate women's softball player ever, headlines the National Softball Coaches Association all-America team. Fernandez, a pitcher for UCLA, was picked by the NSCA as a first-team member for the fourth consecutive year.

Fernandez is joined on the first team by her counterpart at California, Michele Granger. Granger was a second-team all-American in 1992.

Fernandez compiled a 93-7 record in four years with the Bruins. During her career, UCLA won two national championships. She is a two-time Honda award winner, recognizing her as the nation's best collegiate softball player. In addition to her pitching exploits, Fernandez ended the 1993 season as the nation's leading hitter.

Granger set a single-season record for strikeouts and broke the NCAA record for career strikeouts this year. She pitched 21 shutouts and nine no-hitters. Granger was 22-2 for the Bears in 1993, allowing only 17 earned runs in 168 innings pitched.

## Future not so certain for less-glamorous sports stars

In only moments, the baggy shorts and off-kilter baseball cap are replaced by cropped white pants and a mesh helmet. Nick Bravin, typical undergrad, has become Nick Bravin, champion fencer.

Bravin is a three-time NCAA foil champion from Stanford University. He has won the U.S. National foil championship twice. He is on the World University Games and

World Championships teams. He was on the U.S. Olympic team in Barcelona, Spain, and won a bronze medal in the 1991 Pan American Games in Cuba.

But while basketball stars shoot for the NBA and quarterbacks aim for the NFL, Bravin faces an uncertain future now that he has graduated.

"I'll probably have to get a job," said the 21-year-old human biology major. "Or maybe I'll go to law school. I don't know."

There is not a lot of cash floating around for fencing champions. Nike and Reebok aren't exactly offering the big sponsorship bucks. Fencers aren't lined up to take lessons. Fencing organizations can't freely dispense money.

The U.S. Fencing Association in Colorado Springs, Colorado, can only reimburse some expenses for the top fencers, said spokeswoman Colleen Walker Mar. Sponsorship money for the USFA would "filter down to the athletes, but would

not go to individual fencers," she said.

So Bravin is left mostly to his own devices when it comes to reaching his goal: a medal in the 1996 Atlanta Olympics. But he has a better-than-average shot at corporate and private sponsorship, thanks to talent and promotion.

### Attracts media

Bravin is a rarity in the fencing world because he has garnered a fair amount of media attention.

Sports Illustrated came calling; Vogue magazine put him in a fashion shoot.

For now, Bravin will finish his work on a survey of minorities and probation for a Santa Clara, California, judge. From there, he will work on collecting enough money to train, and he will continue to promote himself and the sport, which he says deserves more recognition.

# Two seniors travel different paths to stardom

### Sharp-shooting Swoopes grabs national attention along with national title

She came. She saw. She conquered.

That observation was not made with women's basketball in mind, but it fits neatly in describing the kind of year Sheryl Swoopes had at Texas Tech University this season.

The 6-foot senior forward helped lead the Red Raiders basketball team into the Women's Final Four, where Swoopes then proceeded to capture the attention of an entire nation.

Those witnessing her 47-point performance in Texas Tech's victory in the final were treated to a spectacular display of offensive weaponry. Swoopes shot 67 percent from the field (16 of 24) and was perfect from the foul line in 11 attempts to help lead Texas Tech to the school's first national championship with an 84-82 victory over Ohio State University. Her 47 points is a championships-final record for both the Division I men's and women's tournaments.

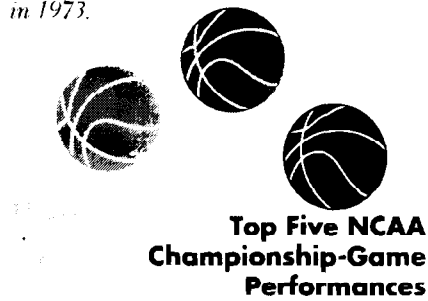
Voted national player of the year, Swoopes was a relative unknown when the season started. After the 1992-93 season, she is being mentioned as one of the greatest—if not the greatest—woman basketball player of all time.

"There are no words to explain what a great player Sheryl Swoopes is," coach Martha Sharp said after the Red Raiders' national-championship victory. "We are just pleased that she got to show the whole nation."

In all, Swoopes set Women's Final Four records for most points (78), most field goals made (27) and most field goals attempted (48) and Division I women's tournament records for most points (177), most field goals (56) and most free throws made

### Swishin' Swoopes

*Sheryl Swoopes of Texas Tech University was selected the 1993 women's national player of the year, and with good reason. ### Kicker's first — and last — field goal of his career lets him go out a hero in I-AA championship game

Although just a chip shot by place-kicking standards, Willy Merrick's 22-yard field goal in the Division I-AA Football Championship title game last December in front of a record crowd of 31,304 and a national television audience proved big. Very big.

His field goal with seven seconds left in the game against Youngstown State University was the senior's first and last as a collegian, and it helped Marshall University claim its first national crown in football in a 31-28 thriller.

Merrick's heroics were performed at a familiar site — Marshall Stadium. He found himself the center of attention after the team's regular place-kicker, who doubles as his younger brother, Dave, was suspended for the game for skipping practice.

"When it came down to about three minutes left and we were on the last drive... my roommate came over and said, 'Willy, you know this is going to come down to a kick,'" Merrick said afterward.

Merrick's field goal was especially sweet for Marshall, because it avenged a 25-17 championship-game defeat to Youngstown State in 1991, a game in which the Thundering Herd yielded 19 consecutive points in the fourth quarter.

Youngstown State mounted another comeback in the 1992 game. Marshall led 28-0 with 5 minutes, 46 seconds remaining in the third quarter, but saw that lead disappear when the Penguins reeled off 28 consecutive points to tie the game with under four minutes remaining.

"We had to shake off the thought, 'Here we go again,'" Marshall coach Jim Donnan said.

The Thundering Herd was just that on the game's final drive, moving the ball 81 yards to the Youngstown State five-yard line and putting Merrick in position for glory.

While Merrick's heroics were a highlight of the year, other interesting stories developed at several men's championships. They included:

■ The University of Maine winning its first national team title when the Black Bears captured the Division I Men's Ice Hockey Championship. The Black Bears went to Milwaukee, site of the championship, with the blessings of renowned horror writer and Bangor, Maine, resident Stephen King and his wife, Tabitha, who purchased a full-page advertisement in a Milwaukee newspaper wishing Maine well in the championship.

■ California State University, Bakersfield, which had 33 thrills of victory and not one agony of defeat en route to its Division II Men's Basketball Championship title. The Roadrunners set an NCAA all-divisions record for most victories (33), capping the perfect season with an 85-72 win over Troy State University.

■ University of California, Los Angeles, men's volleyball coach Al Scates, who doesn't know what it is like to go more than three years without winning the National Collegiate Men's Volleyball Championship. UCLA won the championship in 1989 then endured a three-year dry spell before securing its 14th title since 1970 this year.

■ Adams State College, which was competing for the first time at the Division II

It doesn't take much for our team to get up."

Steen said he never envisioned the two streaks running as long as they have.

His swimmers understand that each championship brings with it an entirely different set of variables that shape the outcome. One common factor, however, has been his teams' ability to concentrate on swimming well and being relaxed.

"Actually, we recognize it could happen every year," Steen said, referring to the possibility of one or both streaks being snapped. "Every year I am sort of 'defocused' from that. Unquestionably, you need the ability to not take it too seriously. You need to divorce yourself from that. I think it can interfere with developing those team qualities that get you (into the championships)."

Steen said there will be no more pressure on his teams to continue the streaks at next season's championships than there was on the teams that started the streaks.

"The pressure doesn't build exponentially," Steen said. "You can feel overwhelmed going for your first (championship) and be as loose and relaxed going for your fourth. That's the normal course of human emotion."

To Steen, the streaks are a product of his teams' preparedness and hard work—and there's nothing glamorous about that.

And largely for that reason, Kenyon's coach and team members view the streaks in a different light than others.

"There's something surrealistic about it," Steen said. "It may appear to be out of this world for some people. But it's something that is mundane, the day-in and day-out thing. From the outside looking in, it looks like this huge thing."

At some point, the streaks will come to an end. Steen said he will be interested in seeing how the fortitude of those Kenyon teams will develop as a result.

"I think the team that finishes outside of first place will be an outstanding team here," Steen said. "I'm looking forward to that team from a character point of view."

And what about the possibility

of one or both of the streaks coming to an end after next year's championships? Says Steen, "We'll have a big challenge. It will be interesting."

#### Arkansas rolls again

The University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, men's indoor track team joined the two Kenyon swim teams as the only programs in the nation currently boasting 10 or more consecutive championships. At this year's Division I Men's Indoor Track Championships, Arkansas recorded its 10th straight team title.

Just when it appeared that other programs were posed to dethrone the Razorbacks, Arkansas reaffirmed its dominance in the championships by finishing 36 points ahead of second-place finisher Clemson University. The margin was the largest since Arkansas' 41-point spread over runner-up University of Tennessee, Knoxville, at the 1985 championships.

Arkansas claimed two other national titles this year—in Division I men's cross country and men's outdoor track.

"We're proud of the accomplishments of our athletes, coaches and teams," said Arkansas athletics director J. Frank Broyles. "It has been another remarkable year. The people of Arkansas have been so loyal to our program, it is wonderful to be able to give something back to them. We greatly appreciate their support."

#### Other streaks

Of the 79 NCAA championships during the 1992-93 academic year, 28 team titles were claimed by programs winning the championship for at least the second year in a row. But several programs are in position to join the exclusive company of teams that have won at least 10 straight championships.

With titles at the next two Division II Men's Swimming and Diving Championships, California State University, Bakersfield, will reach that milestone. The women's soccer program at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, and the women's outdoor track and field team at Louisiana State University each won its seventh straight championship this season.

Swoopes until you have to stop her," Darsch said. "We wanted to make her work hard for her shots. We tried to keep somebody fresh on her. We also tried trapping her when she had the ball. She answered everything we tried."

There were interesting stories that developed at other women's championships during the 1992-93 season. They included:

■ Coach Vivian Stringer, who led the University of Iowa women's basketball team into the Women's Final Four only months after the death of her husband, Iowa joined Texas Tech, Ohio State and Vanderbilt University as first-time participants

at the Women's Final Four.

■ The University of Texas at Austin, which became the lowest seed in Division I women's tennis history to win the team title at the Division I Women's Tennis Championships. Recording their first title in the sport, the Longhorns were the No. 5 seed. At the same championships, Lisa Raymond of the University of Florida, a sophomore, became only the second woman in Division I history to win back-to-back singles crowns.

■ University of California, Los Angeles, women's softball player Lisa Fernandez, who finished a stellar career with a 93-7 pitching record. But not even her one-hitter in the 1993 title game could

lift the Bruins to what would have been their second straight title and fifth in six years in the Division I Women's Softball Championship. The University of Arizona scored on a UCLA error and took the title with a 1-0 victory.

■ The University of Georgia, which registered five perfect 10s and racked up 198.00 points to win the National Collegiate Women's Gymnastics Championships for the third time since 1987.

■ The University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, which set a championship-game scoring record in its 9-1 rout of cross-state rival Duke University for its seventh consecutive Division I soccer championship.

Men's Cross Country Championships recording the championships' first perfect score, 15, as its runners finished Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5. And if that wasn't enough of an entrance, Adams State also won the Division II Women's Cross Country Championships team title.

■ Stanford University successfully defending its National Collegiate Men's Gymnastics Championships crown, becoming the first team in 10 years to repeat. The University of Nebraska, Lincoln, was the last institution to do it, in 1982 and 1983.

■ Kalamazoo College becoming the first team in Division III

men's tennis history to win three straight team titles. The Hornets beat the University of California, Santa Cruz, which finished as runner-up for the fourth straight year. With his seventh national title in hand, Kalamazoo coach George Acker called it a career after 34 successful years.

■ The University of California, Berkeley, winning its third straight and 11th overall National Collegiate Men's Water Polo Championship. If the Golden Bears aren't winning the crown, they are seemingly in a position every year to do so. Since the start of the championship in 1969, California has been in the championship game 16 times.

# Seventy-eight basketball camps certified

A total of 37 men's and 41 women's summer basketball camps have been certified in accordance with legislation regulating Division I men's and women's basketball coaches' attendance at camps as the beginning of the summer evaluation period approaches.

Certification of these camps has been reported in previous issues of *The NCAA News*, but the entire list of certified camps is being provided here as an aid to coaches preparing for camp visits.

In accordance with new NCAA Bylaws 13.13.5 and 30.15, basketball coaches at Division I institutions may attend only institutional summer basketball camps and non-institutional camps that are certified by the NCAA.

The restriction is for events that occur July 5-31 for men and July 8-31 for women.

tion, all sports should impose a minimum punishment of two years for use of performance-enhancing drugs.

Financial assistance will be provided to any federation needing help to intensify its anti-doping controls.

The resolution said sports on the Olympic program must be governed by international federations that comply with the common rules—a clear threat to expel any sport that refuses to go along with the agreement.

The two bodies will meet again in October or November with representatives of all federations, national Olympic committees and athletes to implement the decision.

The fight against doping has been slowed in the past because of the discrepancy in rules and sanctions among sports. Some federations carry out regular drug tests, but others have no tests.

A one-hour program recapping 1992-93 NCAA championships will be aired in early June by the ESPN cable network.

The program, produced by NCAA Productions, will feature video clips of many of the past year's championships.

Air time is 2:30 p.m. Eastern time July 2.

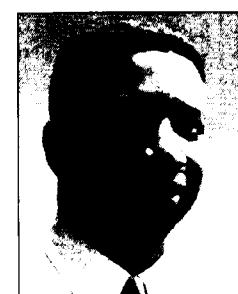

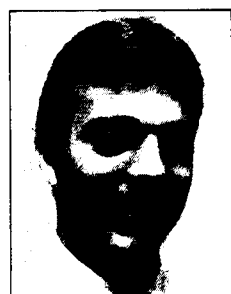

### NCAA Bylaws 14.3.1.1 and 14.3.1.3

**Core-course requirements—computer science and preparatory courses used to fulfill core-curriculum requirements (Divisions I and II only)**

Divisions I and II institutions should note that during its August 5-7, 1992, meeting, the NCAA Council approved a recommendation from the NCAA Academic Requirements Committee indicating that effective with courses taken during the 1993-94 academic year and thereafter, in order for a course to count as a computer science course in the additional academic course area specified in Bylaws 14.3.1.1 and 14.3.1.3, at least 75 percent of the instruction in the course must go beyond keyboarding and word processing, and must be in areas such as the development and implementation of electronic spreadsheets, electronics

networking, database management and computer programming.

In addition, Divisions I and II institutions should note that during its April 13-14, 1992, meeting, the Council approved a recommendation from the Academic Requirements Committee indicating that effective with courses taken during the 1993-94 academic year and thereafter, "preparatory courses" (e.g., prealgebra) that are taken in preparation for the first course normally taken to fulfill the progression of core-curriculum requirements set forth in Bylaws 14.3.1.1 and 14.3.1.3 will not be acceptable as core courses, regardless of the course content. For example, a prealgebra course taken during the 1993-94 academic year and thereafter would not be acceptable as a core course, regardless of the content of the course.

### Correction

**Figure 14-2—1993-94 NCAA Manual**

Division II institutions should note that Figure 14-2

(page 158) in the 1993-94 Manual incorrectly indicates that effective August 1, 1995 (for those student-athletes first entering a collegiate institution on or after August 1, 1995), the minimum core-curriculum grade-point average requirement is 2.500. Figure 14-2 should list the correct minimum core-curriculum grade-point average in Division II as 2.000. Please note that the minimum core-curriculum grade-point average requirement for initial eligibility in Division II is listed correctly in Figure 14-2 in the 1993-94 NCAA Division II Operating Manual.

### Meeting to focus on equity, financial issues

Thomas K. Hearn Jr., Wake Forest University, will continue to develop the next topic in the Commission's three-year strategic plan—"Integrity: Sportsmanship and Ethical Conduct in Intercollegiate Athletics."

It also will receive a report on the long-range NCAA research project designed to measure the effects of recent reform-movement actions, including changes in academic standards. On hand for that topic will be Jerry L. Kingston, Arizona State University, chair of the NCAA Academic Requirements Committee, and Glennelle Halpin, Auburn University, chair of the NCAA Research Committee.

■ The minority-issues subcommittee, chaired by President David G. Carter of Eastern Connecticut State University, will hold its first meeting. It will discuss the work of the NCAA Minority Opportunities and Interests Committee and what the Presidents Commission and

chief executive officers in general can do to enhance opportunities for ethnic minorities in college athletics.

■ The Liaison Committee, chaired by President Richard E. Peck, University of New Mexico, will meet with representatives of the American Football Coaches Association, the American Volleyball Coaches Association and the National Association of Basketball Coaches to discuss concerns that those groups want to share with the Presidents Commission.

Those are the first three constituent organizations to request appearances before the new Liaison Committee, which includes five members of the Commission along with two faculty athletics representatives, two athletics directors and two senior women athletics administrators. The Liaison Committee is designed to assure an effective opportunity for constituent organizations to communicate with the Commission.

### Division subcommittees

The Division I subcommittee is scheduled to discuss implementation of the Division I athletics certification program and the actions taken by the NCAA Council in April regarding restricted-earnings coaches.

At the end of that session June 29, the Division I-A subcommittee will have a short meeting to review the concept if a Division I-A football playoff, including a presentation on that topic developed by a joint venture called "Victory," comprising the Creative Artists Agency and Nike. All members of the Commission will be invited to sit in on that session, if they wish.

In Division II, the major topics will be continued discussion of a possible approach to athletics certification in that division, as well as the impact of other current concerns—gender equity, financial conditions and rules federation by sport—on Division II.

■ A status report by the Special Committee to Review Student-Athlete Welfare, Access and Equity, presented by a member of that committee, Chancellor Donald Behrend, University of Alaska Anchorage.

■ A report on graduation-rates reporting by President Rodney C. Kelchner, Mansfield University of Pennsylvania, who serves on the special committee that has been working on that topic since 1990.

■ A report on the search for a new NCAA executive director by NCAA President Joseph N. Crowley, who is chairing the search committee.

■ Continuing discussion of concerns regarding the use of offensive language and other unsportsmanlike conduct in athletics competition. Included in this topic will be an appearance by Henry O. Nichols, secretary-rules editor of the NCAA Men's Basketball Rules Committee and NCAA national coordinator of men's basketball officiating.

■ A report by the Ad Hoc Committee to Study Enforcement Issues, chaired by Chancellor Charles E. Young, University of California, Los Angeles.

■ Other possible legislation for the 1994 Convention that the Commission may wish to sponsor or of which CEOs may wish to be aware in advance of the availability of the pre-Convention publications.

### Committee concerned about recent remarks regarding gender equity

where equity is extremely important.

"If that attitude can change, then we have a chance."

In the Brown case, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the First Circuit ruled that the university's action in downgrading two of its women's teams from varsity status violated its obligation to accommodate fully the interests and abilities of its female student-athletes.

Under the Department of Education's Title IX regulation and intercollegiate athletics policy interpretation, a three-part test is used to determine whether equal opportunities are being provided to members of both sexes.

An institution may comply with Title IX (1) by providing participation opportunities for men and women students that are "substantially proportionate" to their respective enrollment; (2) where members of one sex are underrepresented, by showing a history and continuing practice of program expansion that is demonstrably responsive to the

developing interests and abilities of the members of that sex, or (3) where members of one sex are underrepresented and the institution cannot show a continuing practice of program expansion, by demonstrating that the present program "fully and effectively" accommodates the interests and abilities of the members of that sex.

The committee believes that incorporating the three-part approach into the gender-equity report will help educate the membership on the multifaceted approach to achieving gender equity and alleviate fears based solely on the matter of proportionality.

In a related matter, the committee expressed concern that too much focus is being placed on the issue of emerging sports for women. In its preliminary report, the task force recommended that any two emerging sports be accepted toward meeting the minimum sports-sponsorship requirements. The committee said more emphasis and support should be placed on existing women's sports.

### Other highlights

*In other actions at its June 14-16 meeting in Big Fork, Montana, the Committee on Women's Athletics:*

■ Received a report from Janet M. Justus, who was appointed NCAA coordinator of women's issues in February, regarding the development of a database identifying senior women administrators (SWAs) at member institutions. The database, which would include a description of each SWA's duties and responsibilities, would show the extent of authority of SWAs on each campus.

■ Discussed whether the SWA position should be mandated at all institutions, similar to the position of faculty athletics representative. The committee also asked the NCAA staff to tabulate and analyze the results of a survey conducted by a subcommittee regarding the SWA's role at the conference level. The preliminary report, which indicated that four Division I conferences have no women above the administrative assistant level, concluded that conferences whose member schools have SWAs with meaningful positions of authority tend also to have an SWA of corresponding authority at the conference level and that this

position seems to increase positive interaction among the conference staff.

■ Recommended to the NCAA Ad Hoc Committee to Administer the Conference Grant Program that Divisions II and III be included in the conference grant program.

■ Endorsed the NCAA Minority Opportunities and Interests Committee recommendation to sponsor diversity training on a pilot-study basis within the membership, contingent upon the pilot program including broader issues, such as traditional sexism and sexism directed at an individual's sexual preference.

■ Recommended that the Committee on Women's Athletics and the Minority Opportunities and Interests Committee hold a joint meeting in February 1994 to discuss issues and goals in an effort to foster greater communication between the two groups. The women's athletics committee also endorsed the continuation of a standing joint subcommittee of the two committees.

■ Discussed the possibility of sponsoring an annual scholarship through the NCAA women's enhancement program in honor of a leading woman in the field of intercollegiate athletics.
