Initial-eligibility question now a matter of choice

The NCAA Council will propose two pieces of initial-eligibility legislation for the 1995 NCAA Convention, one mirroring a June recommendation by the NCAA Presidents Commission and the other similar to a recommendation made by the NCAA Special Committee to Review Initial-Eligibility Standards.

"This issue is a sensitive one," NCAA President Joseph N. Crowley said at the conclusion of the August 8-10 Council meeting in Carlsbad, California. "We are balancing two important values for the Association: academic standards to ensure student-athletes are prepared for college-level work and educational opportunity for those student-athletes who may not have had the best preparation but are capable of college-level work.

"Both of the Council's proposals

incorporate these important values. The Council felt that the full Division I membership should debate and decide which proposal is better."

The Presidents Commission proposal would keep standards that are scheduled to go into effect in August 1995, but would add provisions permitting partial qualifiers to practice and receive financial aid (but not compete) in their first year. Under the Commission's plan, partial qualifiers could earn a fourth year of eligibility by meeting satisfactory-progress requirements.

The Council's only modifications of the Commission plan were a proposal to permit nonqualifiers to receive need-based financial aid from a nonathletics source and a

Association budget for 1994-95 set at \$190.1 million

The NCAA Executive Committee has approved a 1994-95 budget that distributes 70 cents of every dollar to the membership, either in direct payments or in funding for NCAA championship events.

Total operating revenue for the 1994-95 fiscal year will be \$190.1 million. Of that amount, \$132.9 million will be returned to the membership, mostly through the revenue-distribution plan but also through championships, conference grants, the membership trust, royalties and grants to other organizations.

Although the budget was the principal item on the agenda at the committee's August 3-5 meeting in Lake Tahoe, California, a number of other significant actions were taken, including:

Authorization for the staff to begin renegotiation of the NCAA catastrophic-injury insurance program with North American Specialty Insurance.


■ The creation, at no additional expense, of-an NCAA branch office in Washington,

■ Adoption of a statement about the generation of revenue as a purpose of the Association.

The \$190.1 million budget is 9.3 percent greater than the 1993-94 budget, but the distribution to members through the revenue-distribution plan, grants, royalties and the membership trust is up 11 percent. The increase is mainly because of greater amounts designated for the academic-enhancement fund and the membership trust.

A total of \$151.9 mil-

Rush hour hits **Initial-Eligibility** Clearinghouse

The NCAA Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse, in its first year of full operation, is handling a last-minute rush of student-athletes seeking certification for participation in intercollegiate athletics during the approaching school year.

"As we expected, quite a few students have left certification to the last minute," said B. J. Skelton, athletics director at the University of Texas at Arlington and chair of the Special Committee to Oversee Imple mentation of the NCAA Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse.

"The clearinghouse staff is working seven days a week, handling up to 1,500 certifications a day, to make sure that any delays are kept to a mini-

operated by American College Testing on behalf of the NCAA, has doubled its staff since June 1 to handle the expected crunch; that staff now numbers more than 60 people. There is a delay of about 10 days from receipt of documents to final certification by the clearinghouse — a delay created by the backlog in lastminute submissions.

NCAA institutions have requested certification information on about 48,000 prospective student-athletes who are entering college this fall. Of those, more than 38,000 have registered with the clearinghouse.

Budget

Budget of \$190 million approved for 1994-95

The NCAA Executive Committee has approved a 1994-95 budget with total operating revenue of \$190.1 million.

Of that amount, \$132.9 million will be returned to the membership through the revenue-distribution plan, championships, conference grants, the membership trust, royalties and grants to other organizations.

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A total of \$151.9 million of the budget will come from the Association's contract with CBS Sports. The 1994-95 fiscal year will be the fifth year of that contract.

Staff to begin renegotiation of catastrophic-injury policy

The NCAA Executive Committee has reviewed the Association's catastrophic-injury insurance program and has authorized the staff to begin renegotiation of the contract with the current carrier.

NCAA Special Committee to Review Initial-Eligibility Standards.

The Presidents Commission recommendation maintains the standards set forth in 1992 Convention Proposal No. 16. That legislation is scheduled to take effect in August 1995. It also extends the sliding scale of re-

quired grade-point averages and standardized test scores to determine partial qualifiers, who would be eligible to practice and receive athletically related financial aid as freshmen. They would not be able to compete in their first year but would be eligible for four years of competition if they met satisfactory-progress standards.

The other proposal also involves the use of a sliding scale, although a somewhat less restrictive one than what is proposed by the Presidents Commission. The special committee recommended a scale with a floor of a 2.000 GPA (4.000 scale) but no floor on standardized tests. However, the Council proposal will have an SAT floor of 610.

Revenue distribution

Sports-sponsorship fund paid to Division I institutions

Checks from the sports-sponsorship fund of the 1993-94 NCAA revenue-distribution plan were mailed to Division I institutions August 12.

A total of \$10.53 million is set aside for the sports-sponsorship fund, which credits one unit to each institution for each sport it sponsored in 1992-93 in excess of 12 (the minimum requirement for Division I in the 1992-93 academic year). The value of each unit is \$7,189.

Clearinghouse

Processing stepped up for last-minute requests

The NCAA Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse is handling a last-minute rush of student-athletes seeking certification for participation in intercollegiate athletics during the approaching school year.

■ High-school athletics participation

Girls' involvement sparks another gain for high schools


Participation in high-school athletics programs increased for the fifth consecutive year in 1993-94, due in part to an all-time high of more than 2.1 million girls involved in high-school activities.


The annual high-school athletics participation survey conducted by the National Federation of State High School Associations revealed 2,124,755 female participants in 1993-94, exceeding by more than 41,000 the previous high of 2,083,040 in 1977-78.

The total number of participants was 5,614,980, the third-highest mark in the survey's 24 years and the highest since the "baby boom" figure of 6,450,482 in 1977-78. The increase for 1993-94 was the biggest one-year jump in 15 years.

Fast-pitch softball registered the biggest gain in girls' athletics programs, with an additional 1,086 schools and 31,480 participants. Other girls' programs with major increases were soccer, basketball and volleyball.

Participation in boys' athletics programs increased by 62,141, propelled by jumps in football (17,727), soccer and wrestling.

Oliphant comes to the 'rescue'

Elmira College athletics trainer John Oliphant probably never quite expected that his moment of national prominence would hinge on an incident during a quarterfinal game of the 1992 Division III Men's Ice Hockey Championship.

Oliphant was featured this summer in an episode of "Rescue 911," a television show that recreates rescue efforts in life-threatening situations. In Oliphant's case, the program used real film footage.

Elmira hockey player Mike McNamara received a hard check during that quarterfinal game, which was played at the State University of New York at Plattsburgh. He hit his head on the ice and began experiencing grand mal seizures, and then went into cardiac arrest.

"It was very much a collaborative effort," Oliphant said of his and others' actions. "When I first reached him, he still had a pulse. Ron Laham, ATC, the trainer for Plattsburgh State, coordinated his students to bring out the equipment we needed, like the backboard."

Oliphant administered CPR to McNamara and restored his pulse. After three weeks in the hospital, during which he lay comatose for 4½ days, McNamara recovered fully from the injury and went on to play two more seasons of hockey — without missing a game due to injury.

"I guess it was my 15 minutes of fame that you hear about," Oliphant said. "'Rescue 911' is watched by 100 million people in 62 countries every week, so I'm hoping that the show did something to educate people and promote the importance of athletics trainers."

ABCs of eligibility

A video produced by The College Board seeks to warn incoming freshman student-athletes that life is not all about play.

In "ABCs of Eligibility for College-Bound Student-Athletes," Mike Koehler, the video's creator and narrator, emphasizes the fact that many student-athletes leave college after four years with few marketable skills and little prospect of competing in professional athletics. Koehler said it is imperative that student-athletes realize that getting a solid education is just as important as enjoying a good athletics career, considering that more than 250 rookies combined are drafted each year in the National Football League and National

Basketball Association and that more than 400,000 high-school seniors compete in those two sports.

"College athletics are not for the weak or lazy," Koehler said. "The student-athlete is going to have to work hard in the classroom and the gym or on the playing field."

Marybeth Kravetz, the college counselor at a suburban Illinois high school, said the video is an important tool for college-bound student-athletes, parents, coaches and counsolors

"Many kids have big dreams, which are most often propelled by their parents who believe in them and their abilities," Kravetz said. "This video brings everything into perspective. It lets kids and their parents know that the student-athlete stands a better chance of being hit by a meteor than making it to proball. Their focus should be on getting a good college education."

It's all in the wrist

Dean Robertson was used to using his hands and wrists to flick balls through basketball rims during his career as a player at Ferrum College from 1989 to 1993. Recently, however, Robertson's talented hands and wrists have earned him accolades away from basketball.

In the August issue of Men's Fitness, a national health and fitness magazine with a

circulation of more than 200,000, Robertson's artwork is featured in a story called "Jock Art." The article discusses the artistic endeavors of several professional athletes and also cites the efforts of "...a whole group of athletes at Ferrum College in Virginia who have been flexing their artistic impulses...." Robertson's piece is a colorful, stylized depiction of a group of four men.

An art major who graduated in May, Robertson spent last season as an assistant coach at his alma mater. He is the college's all-time leader in rebounds and games played and ranks seventh in scoring.

Lotsa, lotsa golf

Golf aficionados should have gotten their fill of the sport August 16 when Montana State University, Billings, conducted the Birdies, Bogeys, Blisters and Bucks "fun"-raiser to help fund athletics scholarships. Golfers were scheduled to play up to 100 holes of golf at the Pryor Creek South Course.

"The purpose of the event is to raise money for athletics scholarships, and all participants are requested to be committed to securing and collecting pledges based on the number of holes played," said Gary Nelson, a member of the university athletics department staff. "It is hoped each player will attempt to raise \$2,500."

The grand-prize winner — the golfer who collects the most money in pledges — will receive two tickets to accompany the Yellowjackets to Hawaii when they compete against Chaminade University and the University of Hawaii at Hilo.

Three bowls picked for new alliance

Three bowls were selected August 4 to form a new bowl alliance designed to produce an annual national-championship game.

The bowls — the IBM OS/2 Fiesta Bowl, Federal Express Orange Bowl and USF&G Sugar Bowl — will take turns annually in selecting a matchup of the nation's top-ranked teams, or a matchup of the highest-ranked teams available in years when the No. 1- or No. 2-ranked team plays in the Rose Bowl.

Champions of the Big Ten and Pacific-10 Conferences are committed to play in the Rose Bowl through 2001.

Core-course rule needed for JCs

All of us in higher education realize the importance of adequate academic preparation for the student-athlete.

Two-year community college transfer students poses a special set of problems. These individuals have unique needs that must be addressed to assure their eventual success at a four-year institution.

The NCAA's 25/50/75 percent rule has been fashioned to make certain that a student-athlete is progressing toward a specific bachelor's degree, but the implementation of the rule has created special problems for two-year transfer student-athletes. It is not necessarily ensuring that the objective of that rule is met.

For that reason, the California Community College Association of Academic Advisors for Athletics (3C4A) — along with Karl Mooney of Texas A&M University, Fred Strock of the University of Southern California and other members of the National Association of Academic Advisors for Athletics — have examined this problem and unanimously agreed that a two-year community college core curriculum should be established to replace the 25/50/75 percent rule.

We need a national standard for two-year college students, just as one is needed for high-school students who must meet requirements for entrance into a four-year institution. A core of English, science, math and other substantive courses is a better way to ensure the academic preparation of the transfer student-athlete than the current requirement of 48 transferable units with the associate of arts degree.

When the 25/50/75 percent rule is put into practice, it leaves the community college academic advisors and their students at a disadvantage for the following reasons:

- The typical two-year college student-athlete is in his or her third or fourth semester when recruiting begins. By that time, the student-athlete has taken many courses that may not be applicable toward a specific major.
- The two-year college academic advisor often is counseling a student-athlete who has many transfer options, since more than one four-year institution may be recruiting that person. Each institution could have very dif-

Eating disorders demand attention

The American College of Sports Medicine issued the following statement after the recent death of gymnast Christy Henrich.

The American College of Sports Medicine joins the sports community in extending its sympathy to the family of Christy Henrich, a member of the 1989 world gymnastics team. Ms. Henrich died July 26 after a long battle with anorexia and bulimia.

While the American College of Sports Medicine is one of the nation's strongest advocates of exercise for all women, the College is extremely concerned about young female athletes who are driven to excel in athletics through obsessive weight loss or a focus on body leanness.

Estimates show that up to 62 percent of female athletes participating in certain sports may suffer some type of disordered eating, which can range from the use of laxatives and diuretics to lifethreatening anorexia nervosa and bulimia. Athletes who compete in "appearance" sports that emphasize lean bodies (such as gymnastics, ballet, figure skating and distance running) are at the greatest risk for developing disordered eating.

Excessive leanness may hinder sports performance by causing weakness,

fatigue, anemia, delayed healing from illness or injuries, and depression. As many as 18 percent of females with untreated chronic anorexia nervosa die prematurely from heart problems, blood chemistry disorders, suicide or other health-related problems.

In many cases, female athletes become victims of "The Female Athlete Triad: Disordered Eating, Amenorrhea and Osteoporosis," a term coined by the American College of Sports Medicine to describe the three interrelated problems that can cause long-term health problems for the athletes.

A frequent symptom of eating disorders is amenorrhea, or the lack of menstrual periods. Irregular menstrual cycles are associated with low reproduction hormone levels and, left alone or combined with poor nutrition, can lead to inadequate bone structure.

Bones with poor mineralization are susceptible to stress fractures, and they can progress to complete breaks. At a time when young women should be building bones for later in life, scientists have seen amenorrheic 20-year-olds with osteoporotic bones similar to those found in their 70-year-old grandmothers. The osteoporotic bones may pre-

dispose women to spine, wrist and hip fractures later in life.

For athletes who may be suffering with disordered eating or the components of the Female Athlete Triad, the American College of Sports Medicine makes the following suggestions:

- A female athlete may be more likely to seek medical help if risks from inadequate calcium, poor nutrition and amenorrhea are explained in a nonjudgmental manner.
- She also needs to be reminded that medical care and proper nutrition may enhance her athletics performance.
- Treatment often requires a team of health-care providers, including a physician, psychologist and nutritionist. These providers may recommend improved nutrition, increased calcium intake, hormone replacement with estrogen or oral contraceptives, and a reduced training regimen, as well as counseling for the athlete, coach and parents.

Business can coexist with opportunity

"Football generates about \$16 (million) to \$17 million at Florida, and it spends about \$4 million. The rest goes into supporting our other programs. So if we have a dropoff of 10,000 people a game in football, it's going to have a huge impact on us. So, yes, it is a big business.

"You can always make the philosophical argument that intercollegiate athletics is not meant to be big business. But the bottom line is we're providing many men and women an opportunity to get their education. There's no doubt the money has the potential to distort things, but only if you let it...only if you ignore the academics and your responsibility to prepare these student-athletes for life after school."

Academic standards

No fighting chance

New football rules strive to rid game of image-damaging skirmishes

In January, the NCAA Football Rules Committee adopted a new penalty structure for fighting aimed at preventing fights from escalating into large-scale skirmishes. Under the new rules, substitutes and coaches who leave the team area during a fight or who join a fight that breaks out in the team area will be disqualified for the remainder of that game and suspended for the entire next game.

In the worst-case scenario, where both benches empty, the game will be halted and each team will have to forfeit its next game.

This is a high price to pay — both in terms of lost revenue and adverse publicity — for lack of self-control, but the rules committee believes such a deterrent is necessary to eliminate the type of ugly scene that marred several high-profile games last season and did untold damage to the image of college football.

"Statistics show that disqualifications for fighting are not significantly more frequent now than they were five years ago," said University of Tennessee, Knoxville, athletics director Douglas A. Dickey, who will finish a three-year term as rules committee chair September 1. "Unfortunately, it seemed like regional or national TV games had more than their share of fights and brawls last season. This created the perception that fighting was getting out of hand in college football and, warranted or not, this perception damages the game.

"College football is in a plateau of popularity right now. Attendance has leveled off, and there is more competition for the fans' entertainment dollar. The committee felt that further image problems would be particularly damaging at this point."

On and off the field

The committee acknowledged the aggressive nature of the sport by dealing less harshly with players who fight while involved in play (see accompanying chart). Such players will be disqualified for the rest of the half in which the fight occurred and for the team's next half of play, even if that carries over to the next game. The carry-over provision was not in the previous rule, and the committee hopes it will cause players to think twice before throwing a punch, particularly late in the game.

But the committee had no tolerance for individuals who come off the bench and add fuel to somebody else's fire. In fact, the rule against coming off the bench applies regardless of intent: Substitutes and coaches who go onto the field intending to break up a fight serve the same penalty as those who run out

Fight-reporting procedures

The Football Rules Committee has adopted the following procedures for officials, institutions and conferences to follow after a player or coach has been disqualified from a football game for fighting:

- The official who calls the disqualification will inform the player or coach and his head coach of the disqualification.
- After the game, the referee will contact his assigning agent (usually the conference officiating supervisor) to report the person(s) who were disqualified for fighting.
- The assigning agency will notify the athletics director and the university president that one or more of the institution's student-athletes or coaches was disqualified for fighting. If the disqualified person is not under the jurisdiction of the assigning agency, that agency will notify the agent who represents the institution, and similar procedures will be followed.
- The assigning agent also will alert the next scheduled opponent of the disqual-

ification if it carries over to the next game.

- Players who have been disqualified from a game must remain in the team area for the rest of that game. If disqualified from the first half of the next game, they may participate in warm-up drills before the game and may be in the team area during the first half. If suspended for an entire game, they cannot participate in warm-up drills or be in the team area during the game.
- must remain in the locker room (or similar facilities) for the rest of that game. If disqualified from the first half of the next game, they may participate in warm-up drills before the game and may be in the team area during the first half. If suspended for an entire game, they may not be in the stadium area or have contact with the team from two hours before the game until two hours after the game. Coaches may not participate in any coaching activities while serving a disqualification or suspension.

to throw punches.

"There has been a lot of confusion about what 'leaving the team area' means," said John R. Adams, committee secretary-rules editor and supervisor of officials at the Western Athletic Conference. "I have received calls from people who seem to think it's illegal to leave the team area only if it is to throw a punch or defend a teammate. But leaving the team area is a foul — period. Officials have

no way of knowing what someone's intent is, and even peacemakers can turn into punchthrowers in the wrong circumstances."

Adams also said he has had many questions about how far a person must go before he is considered to have left the team area. Coaches have said that they need to be able to step a short distance onto the field to contain the initial surge of players, who have a natural inclination to rush to the aid of an

imperiled teammate.

Adams said that officials will use their judgment and give some leeway when coaches obviously are acting to restrain their players and clearly have no intention of advancing onto the field.

"It would be ridiculous to expect everybody to become a statue when a fight breaks out," Adams said. "Coaches need to be able to take steps to restrain their players; in fact, the committee encourages them to develop a plan for doing that. But the officials will have to call a foul if anyone takes more than a few, non-threatening steps toward the action."

Disqualification procedures

In situations where restraint efforts break down and team members enter the field, officials will disqualify all substitutes and coaches they can identify. In addition, conference offices will have the authority to review game tapes and impose additional suspensions on individuals who were not identified by officials. Conferences also may correct any indisputable errors in identification.

"I think the commissioners support this rule and are comfortable with the review authority," said Southeastern Conference Commissioner Roy F. Kramer, who worked with the rules committee on behalf of the Collegiate Commissioners Association to develop guidelines for conference action. "The commissioners condemn fighting in all sports and endorse the Football Rules Committee's efforts to control it.

"We want a common understanding of the rule so that it is enforced uniformly from conference to conference. I have no problem suspending a significant number of players for running onto the field, even if none of the players gets involved in the fight, as long as the same set of circumstances results in the same penalty in another conference on another day."

There is no provision in the rules to allow institutions or conferences to delay suspensions or stagger them to ensure that the team can suit up enough players to avoid a forfeit. Dickey said such orchestrations would send the wrong message, particularly since ticket and television revenue are involved.

"This is a matter of principle, and if we are serious about eliminating or reducing fighting in our sport, then we have to stick to our convictions, even if we risk a financial setback," said Dickey.

"The potential costs of fighting, both financial and otherwise, are the incentives that the committee hopes will prompt all schools to counsel their players and develop plans for containing their benches. If this happens, the ugly brawls we saw last year will become a thing of the past. And that's the bottom-line intent of the new rule."

Minority numbers in athletics administration unchanged

An NCAA survey shows virtually no change for minority opportunities in athletics administration over the last year.

The four-year study of race demographics of member institutions, conducted by the NCAA Minority Opportunities and Interests Committee, shows that the percentage of black athletics administrators increased 0.1 percent from 1992-93 to 8.7 percent. During the same period, the percentage of white administrators declined from 86.9 percent to 86.0 percent.

The number of athletics administrative positions throughout the NCAA increased by 25.0 percent between 1990-91 and 1993-94; dur-

ing that same period, the number of Blacks in athletics administrative positions increased by 30.3 percent.

In the study, administrators were defined as those in the following positions: administrative assistant, equipment manager, graduate assistant, strength coach, athletics trainer, assistant coach, academic advisor, auxiliary services personnel, faculty athletics representative, head coach, compliance coordinator, eligibility officer, ticket manager, sports information director, promotions/marketing director, business manager, assistant athletics director, associate athletics director and athletics director.

Athletics directors and coaches

Excluding historically black institutions, the number of athletics directors increased from 775 to 897 between 1990-91 and 1993-94 (a 15.7 percent gain). During that period, the number of black athletics directors increased from 17 to 32, an increase of 53.1 percent. Of the gain in athletics director positions between 1990-91 and 1993-94, 12.3 percent were filled by Blacks.

Although Blacks have progressed in becoming athletics directors, they are having less success in obtaining the positions that would prepare them for the athletics director's post. Among associate athletics directors (with historically black institutions excluded), the percentage of blacks declined from 5.0 to 4.5 from 1992-93 to 1993-94. Among assistant athletics directors (with historically black institutions excluded), the percentage of blacks declined from 5.1 in 1992-93 to 4.9 in 1993-94.

In 1993-94, blacks made up 12.9 percent of the 2,321 revenue-sport coaches. That percentage is up 1.1 percent from 1992-93. Although that may suggest adequate opportunities for more minorities to become head coaches, the percentage of black assistant coaches has remained virtually unchanged over the past four years, meaning that

few minorities are being trained for head coaching positions.

Between 1990-91 and 1993-94, the percentages of black assistant coaches annually (with historically black institutions excluded) were 10.0, 9.8, 10.0 and 9.8, respectively.

Comparisons among the NCAA's three divisions reveal lower levels of minority employment in Division III, which has the lowest percentages of blacks in every category, except associate athletics directors by race.

change in the effective date for the new standards from August 1995 to August 1996, but only if questions concerning the recentering of SAT scores have not been resolved by the time of the 1995 Convention.

The other initial-eligibility legislation proposal features a sliding scale of grade-point averages and standardized test scores that is somewhat less restrictive than the one currently scheduled to take effect in August 1995. The proposal contains the 2.000 GPA cutoff featured in the special committee's recommendation, but it also establishes 610 as a floor for SAT scores. The special committee's original recommendation had no floor on standardized test scores.

The effective date for the second proposal would be August 1996.

The NCAA membership also has proposed other legislation in this area, including a proposal to make all Division I freshmen ineligible for competition and another to retain the current academic standards in that division

Student-athlete welfare

Besides the initial-eligibility recommendations, a number of other significant actions were taken by the Council, including approval of most elements of the report of the NCAA Special Committee to Review Student-Athlete Welfare, Access and Equity.

The Presidents Commission accepted the special committee's report in full in June. While it accepted almost all of the report, the Council did not agree to sponsor all of the legislative suggestions, including a proposal to establish a standing committee on student-athlete welfare since it believed that the purpose of such a committee was served by the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and by other recommendations contained in the plan (such as adding student-athletes to several other Councilappointed committees).

The Council also declined to rec-

Other highlights

In other actions at its August 8-10 meeting in Carlsbad, California, the Council:

- Supported an NCAA Eligibility Committee proposal to eliminate one level of the eligibility appeals process.
- Endorsed an NCAA Academic Requirements Committee recommendation that a joint subcommittee be formed to resolve questions involving "recentering" of SAT scores. The subcommittee will consist of members of the Academic Requirements and NCAA Research Committees; it will meet with the testing company and attempt to identify the appropriate changes to the test score requirements of Bylaw 14.3 before the 1995 Convention.
- Issued an interpretation applicable to Division I to allow the NCAA Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse to obtain test scores from official transcripts submitted to the clearinghouse. Such a rule currently exists in Division II.
- Agreed, upon recommendation of the NCAA Special Committee to Study Rules Federation by Sport, to advance legislation to amend the language concerning playing and practice seasons set forth in Bylaw 17 by eliminating references to traditional and nontraditional seasons in Divisions I and II.
- Supported legislation from the NCAA Legislative Review Committee, as part of that committee's deregulation efforts within Bylaw 14. The legislation would simplify the definition of intercollegiate competition, simplify the application of the "hardship" rule, and, in Division I, modify the 20-year rule related to seasons of competition; it also would change the deadline for a prospective student-athlete to achieve

a required standardized test score from July 1 immediately preceding that individual's full-time enrollment to any time before his or her initial full-time enrollment.

- Supported an NCAA Recruiting Committee proposal to allow coaches in Divisions I and II to make one call per week between April 15 and May 15 during a prospect's junior year in high school in sports other than football. Also, the Council agreed to cosponsor with the Great Midwest Conference a proposal that would exempt counting evaluations of a prospect once the prospect has signed a National Letter of Intent.
- Referred an NCAA Special Events Committee recommendation related to contest exemptions to an appropriate committee for further study
- Agreed to propose legislation to implement a two-year time frame for applying the Association's regulations pertaining to emerging sports for women
- Supported Division II Steering Committee proposals to establish coaching limitations in all Division II sports, effective in 1996; to limit the number of official visits in Division II football (35) and basketball (eight); to reduce the number of regular-season football contests in that division from 11 to 10; to move the date for the first permissible contest in Division II football to the second Saturday in September; and to eliminate spring football practice in that division.
- Agreed to sponsor a revised Division III philosophy statement. The Division III Steering Committee made some editorial revisions in that document and will send the revised draft to the Presidents Commission for its comments.

- Require each member institution to establish a student-athlete advisory committee.
- Allow up to two hours of skill instruction during the eight hours of countable athletically related activity permitted per week outside of an institution's playing and practice season under specified conditions. (The Council sponsored a modified version of this proposal, as recommended by the NCAA Special Committee to Study Rules Federation by Sport.)
- Add two student-athletes, in an advisory capacity, to the following Council-appointed committees: Academic Requirements, Financial Aid and Amateurism, Minority

Opportunities and Interests, Recruiting, and Women's Athletics.

- Prevent institutions from reducing athletically related financial aid based on a student-athlete's receipt of a Pell Grant.
- Permit reasonable local transportation for student-athletes on an occasional basis.
- Amend the Association's principle of student-athlete welfare to incorporate six guiding principles developed by the special committee (see The NCAA News, June 29).

Student-athlete welfare, access and equity is the 1995 Convention topic in the strategic plan of the Presidents Commission.

The Council also supported in concept a proposal by the NCAA Student-Athlete Advisory Committee that a grievance process should be available for student-athletes on each campus. The Council will sponsor a resolution directing that the requirement be included in the Division I athletics certification process and in the Divisions II and III Institutional Self-Study Guide. The Council noted that institutions that currently have grievance procedures in place for all students

would satisfy this requirement.

Other business

The Council voted to sponsor two of three proposals recommended by the NCAA Minority Opportunities and Interests Committee. Most significantly, the Council supported a recommendation that Division I student-athletes be permitted to earn up to \$1,500 a year for on- or off-campus employment beyond the value of a full grant. Such employment could not be arranged by athletics staff members or boosters.

It also approved an exemption to the maximum number of contests and permissible starting date for the Martin Luther King Classic basketball tournament, which will generate revenue for local and national charities, postgraduate scholarships for students interested in coaching or athletics administration, and the Black Coaches Association.

The Council did not support a Minority Opportunities and Interests Committee recommendation to exempt from recruiting contact restrictions certain "communityactivity" contacts (for example, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, Big Brothers and Sisters, parks and recreation programs) between a prospective student-athlete and an institution's athletics department staff members. The Council noted that while it supports the concept of community involvement for coaches, it believes current rules provide a reasonable amount of access.

The Council declined to act on a recommendation by the NCAA Committee on Competitive Safeguards and Medical Aspects of Sports to ban spring football in Division I. That committee's recommendation was based on the high injury rate associated with spring football. However, the Division II Steering Committee recommended the elimination of spring football in that division on cost-containment grounds.

The Council also will oppose a Pacific-10 Conference proposal to eliminate the one-time exception for basketball student-athletes to test their market value in the National Basketball Association draft.

Minutes of the Council meeting are scheduled for publication in the September 26 issue of The NCAA Register.

Bowls

Fiesta, Orange and Sugar Bowls to form new bowl alliance to determine national champion

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first choice of teams when the new coalition becomes effective after the 1995 season.

Participants in bowl coalition games will include champions of the Atlantic Coast, Big East, Southeastern and Big 12 Conferences. The bowls also will choose two atlarge teams from among all remaining Division I-A institutions.

The alliance will operate for six years, although the participating conferences have the option of canceling the arrangement after three years.

One of the at-large berths will

be awarded to the Southwest Conference during the first year of the coalition — the conference's final year of operation.

The three coalition bowls would generate a payout of more than \$315 million through six years. Each team participating in a coalition bowl will receive between \$8.6

and \$8.8 million. Currently, the Rose Bowl's \$6.5 million payout per team is the highest among bowls.

Coalition games will be played on consecutive days between New Year's Day and January 4, pending approval by the NCAA membership of legislation that currently requires bowl games to be com-

pleted by January 2. Most, but not necessarily all, of the games will be played at night.

The Fiesta and Orange Bowls will be televised by CBS, while ABC will televise the Sugar Bowl and also retain the Rose Bowl. NBC has televised the Orange Bowl since 1965 and the Fiesta Bowl since 1978.

NO. 1 EXPANDED INFRACTIONS REPORT

Intent: To delete the requirement that once a decision of the Infractions Appeals Committee is announced,

copies of the expanded infractions report be made available to the media.

Bylaws: Amend 32.10.6, pages 465-466, as follows
[General provision,

all divisions, common vote]

"32.10.6 Expanded Infractions Report to Institution and Media. A copy of the Committee on Infractions' expanded infractions report to the Infractions Appeals Committee (as described in 32.10.5) shall be provided to the institution prior to the time of its appearance before the

Infractions Appeals Committee. Once the decisions of the Infractions Appeals Committee regarding the appeal are announced, the report, with names of individuals deleted, shall be made available to the national wire services and other media outlets. Any press release regarding the expanded report shall meet the requirements of 32.9.2."

Swimming coaches name all-academic teams

A record 233 NCAA swimming and diving teams have been recognized by the College Swimming Coaches Association of America (CSCAA) for academic achievement during the spring 1994 semester. In addition, the CSCAA has named a record 176 student-athletes to its 1993-94 all-academic team.

To qualify for team honors, a swimming team must have compiled a combined gradepoint average of at least 2.800 (4.000 scale) during the spring semester. The CSCAA recognizes a grade-point average of 2.800 or higher as commendable, 3.000 or higher as excellent and 3.250 or higher as superior. Thirty-six teams earned the CSCAA's superior rating for the spring 1994 semester.

To qualify for individual honors, a studentathlete must have qualified for NCAA championships competition; must have a cumulative grade-point average of at least 3.500 (4.000 scale); and must have completed the equivalent of 24 semester hours at the institution that he or she represented at the championships during the academic year.

Twelve student-athletes posted cumulative grade-point averages of 4,000, including three at the University of Georgia — Barry Wynn, Laura Adams and Sonja Leiter — and two at Texas A&M University, College Station — Jennifer Guillory and Jennifer Saul.

Survey: Four died from football injuries in 1993

One college and three highschool athletes died from injuries sustained while playing football in the 1993 season, according to a national survey conducted by the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill.

Ninc other players — eight in high school and one in college died, but their deaths from heart failure and asthma cannot be attributed directly to football, the researchers said.

"We're pleased that the number of deaths from injuries remains low, but we're still concerned about what we call 'indirect' deaths," Dr. Frederick Mueller, professor of physical education, exercise and sport science at North Carolina, told The Associated Press.

"We need to encourage all players to undergo physical examinations at the beginning of the season...," Mueller said. "An important part of the preparticipation examination should be a thorough medical history, which may reveal prob-

Reports are partly based on newspaper stories that come to Chapel Hill from around the United States, along with information from the NCAA, the National Federation of State High School Associations and about 150 volunteers who monitor sports accidents in their states.

In 1968, 36 players died from catastrophic injuries during football games and practice, Mueller said.

Association's contract with CBS Sports. The 1994-95 fiscal year will be the fifth year of that contract.

A complete review of the budget will appear in the August 31 issue of The NCAA News.

Catastrophic-injury insurance

After hearing a Budget Subcommittee report on the recommendations of risk managers from four member institutions, the Executive Committee voted to authorize the staff to renegotiate the Association's contract with North American Specialty Insurance. The current contract expires August 1, 1995.

The risk managers made the following points about the current policy:

- The subrogation clause should be modified to restrict the definition of a third party to exclude the NCAA and its member institutions, thereby reducing or minimizing institutional exposure in that regard.
- Any future catastrophicinjury insurance contract should include an opportunity to renegotiate various provisions affected by Federal health-care legislation.
- Consideration should be given to increasing the \$25,000 deductible, the \$50,000 home health benefit and the disability lost earnings benefit.
- The ancillary illness benefit was considered to be "fairly generous," but it is important to ensure that all available community resources (such as Social Security and Medicare) are being fully used.
- The risk managers identified no specific items of concern about the ability of North American Specialty Insurance to provide the catastrophic coverage.

After reviewing the report, the Executive Committee noted that

increasing the deductible would reduce the Association's budget but could result in increased costs to member institutions. It also noted that the policy addresses medical coverage, not liability, and that member institutions should be aware of the provisions of the program so they are adequately protected through their own programs.

Washington office

The Executive Committee approved a Budget Subcommittee recommendation that the Association open a branch office in Washington, D.C. Office space will be leased at One DuPont Circle, the site of several higher-education associations.

The approval for the branch office was made with the understanding that such an office can be established for approximately the same cost as what the Association currently pays for Washington legal representation. The NCAA currently is represented in Washington by the firm of Squire, Sanders and Dempsey.

Revenue generation

The staff recently initiated a comprehensive review and evaluation of NCAA programs and services, and that report eventually will be submitted to the Executive Committee.

To guide the staff in that effort, the Executive Committee agreed it should describe what it believes to be the proper role of the Association with respect to generating revenue.

With that in mind, the Executive Committee approved the following statement:

"While the generation of revenues to support members' athletics programs is not a primary function of the Association, there are areas in which, at the will of the membership and with the approval of the appropriate gov-

Other highlights

In other actions at its August 3-5 meeting in Lake Tahoe, California, the Executive Committee:

- Approved a Budget Subcommittee recommendation to discontinue grants to affiliated associations after the 1994-95 academic year (with the exception of a grant to the Faculty Athletics Representatives Association). It also agreed that grants to the National Association of Basketball Coaches and the Women's Basketball Coaches Association shall be repaid if those groups have excess revenues at the end of the fiscal year.
- Approved a Marketing Subcommittee recommendation that the staff continue its efforts related to studying NCAA promotions, marketing and licensing, with a full report to be submitted to the Executive Committee for its December 1994 meeting.
- Voted to negotiate with Host Communi-

cations, Inc., an expansion from 15 to 20 in the number of full-time corporate partners and to eliminate the secondary category of one-year corporate-partner participants.

Playoff is exclusively a Division I-A football playoff is exclusively a Division I matter, and agreed to support any recommendation in that regard from the Division I Championships Committee. The championships committee praised the work of the NCAA Special Committee to Study a Division I-A Football Championship and noted that many important issues related to financial considerations and student-athlete welfare had been raised by that group. The championships committee agreed to table any playoff-related discussion until the May 1995 Executive Committee meeting, but it referred to the NCAA Council the student-athlete issues and concerns raised in the report.

erning entities, the Association has a fiduciary responsibility to maximize those revenues and manage them on behalf of the membership."

Legislative recommendations

The Executive Committee took the following action on membership proposals appearing in the Initial Publication of Proposed Legislation for the 1995 NCAA Convention:

- Proposal No. 1-69: Voted to support. This proposal would increase from \$10 to \$20 per day the amount of unitemized incidental expenses that an institution may provide to a student-athlete competing in an NCAA championship or certified bowl game.
- Proposal No. 1-87: Voted to oppose. This proposal would extend the moratorium on the discontinuation of National Collegiate Championships through the 1996-97 academic year. The Executive Committee noted that the proposal is contrary to the

principles it established over the past two years after extensive review and discussion with the membership.

- Proposal No. 1-88: Voted to oppose. This proposal would permit a National Collegiate Championship or a division championship for women that existed during the 1993-94 academic year to be continued through the 1998-99 academic year if the number of institutions sponsoring the sport fell below the minimum requirement of 40 institutions.
- Proposal No. 1-89: Voted to oppose, upon the recommendation of the Division II Championships Committee. This proposal would make the Division II swimming and diving championships a combined-scoring event for men and women.

Play-ins

The Executive Committee approved a recommendation from the Division II Championships Committee that play-ins be eliminated for the Division II

Men's and Women's Basketball Championships and that the bracket for both events be increased from 32 to 48 teams, with the guaranteed transportation and per diem for the additional 16 teams not to exceed \$90,000. The recommendation was based on significant growth in the Division II membership.

While the play-in system was abolished in Division II basketball, a new play-in arrangement was approved for the Division III Men's and Women's Basketball Championships. In those events, the committee voted that the brackets would provide for 32 teams, with guaranteed transportation and per diem reimbursement and with play-in opportunities for another 32 teams without guaranteed reimbursement, with the total cost not to exceed current levels.

ferent requirements, this creating a special set of problems.

The two-year college studentathlete may not meet the selected major requirements at a particular four-year college and could be forced to select any major that "fits" into the framework of the courses completed, thereby stripping the student of motivation.

The only student who needs an A.A. degree to transfer to a four-year college is the student-athlete who was a nonqualifier coming out of high school. Therefore, the four-year institution should be looking at the quality of the courses taken at the two-year college. If a core curriculum of at least 36 to 48 units were established, the practice of having to search for a major that "fits" into the equation would be eliminated while the student would be even better prepared by having completed core courses.

The 3C4A is proposing that a core-curriculum rule be established at the 1995 or 1996 NCAA Con-

vention. The proposal states that a nonqualifier from high school who attends a two-year college needs to complete the core courses with a total of 48 transferable units. Since no two A.A. programs in the country are alike, the core-course rule fulfills the objective of the current 25/50/75 percent rule, but vastly improves on the method of achievement.

We all know that many four-year institutions will not touch the two-year community college transfer stu-

dent-athlete because of the perception that the student lacks academic preparation for the standards of the four-year institution. We are aware that courses that are transferable to one institution may not be accepted at another and may not count toward a degree.

This proposal will put all two-year community college students on a level playing field for recruitment by the nation's four-year programs.

All four-year institutions should have the opportunity to recruit our nation's two-year community college student-athletes with confidence that they will compete successfully, not only on the field, but in the classroom as well. The two-year core curriculum rule is the solution and should be adopted by the NCAA.

necessarily shocked that movement has not progressed as I would have liked since the last study (completed in 1990-91)," said Charles Whitcomb, faculty athletics representative at San Jose State University and chair of the Minority Opportunities and Interests Committee.

Whitcomb cited possible com-

placency toward diversifying athletics administration after three black head coaches were hired in Division I-A football — a sport where the number stood at zero earlier in the decade.

Even though the Association is committed to providing opportunities in athletics administration to all qualified individuals, NCAA Executive Director Cedric W. Dempsey

said member institutions have not been active enough in providing minorities the chance to experience the rewards of intercollegiate athletics administration.


"While the membership has acknowledged a problem exists and has implemented women's and ethnic-minority scholarships, internships and a vita bank to begin to address the situation, the member-

ship cannot rest on those achievements," Dempsey said. "We still have a long way to go toward creating diversity in athletics administration.


"We must redouble our efforts to allow minority individuals access to careers in intercollegiate athletics. It is not enough for us to merely discuss and define the problem. We must continue to seek solutions."

Whitcomb said solving the problem will take cooperation. "It is a matter of the member institutions making a commitment to it," he said. "First, they need to provide greater opportunities. Secondly, there has to be a commitment from the top down. It is not a charge that can be led by the athletics directors alone. It will take presidents, as well as athletics directors.'


Athletics Administrators by Race **Including Coaches**




Athletics Directors by Race Historically Black Institutions Excluded

NCAA Council action regarding Interpretations Committee decisions

During its August 8-10, 1994, meeting, the Council reviewed NCAA Interpretations Committee minutes from telephone conferences Nos. 6 through 9 and made the following revisions:

1. In regard to Minute No. 1 of Conference No. 7 (June 2, 1994), the Council reversed the provisions of item 1-c. The modified language of item 1-c should read as follows:

"An individual who was employed at one institution as a restricted-earnings basketball coach during the 1993-94 academic year and who previously was employed as a head or assistant basketball coach in Division I may be employed as a restricted-earnings coach in the sport of basketball at another institution, regardless of the individual's previous employment."

Please note that the five-year period of time during which such an individual may be employed as a restricted-earnings coach began with the 1993-94 academic year.

2. In regard to Minute No. 4 of Conference No. 8 (June 16, 1994), the Council suspended the minute and recommended that the issue of course work leading to the equivalent of another major or degree at any institution be referred to the NCAA Academic Requirements Committee for further review.

3. In regard to Minute No. 1 of Conference No. 9 (July 7, 1994), the Council utilized the provisions of NCAA Constitution 5.3.1.1.1 (noncontroversial amendment) to

permit an institution's basketball coach and his or her team to observe the NCAA Basketball Officiating Clinic conducted by video conference (scheduled for October 12, 1994) related to the playing rules prior to the permissible on-court practice date in the sport of basketball, provided the student-athletes do not miss class to view the conference.

ACT and SAT test-score reporting

Division I institutions should note that during its August 8-10, 1994, meeting, the Council determined that, effective immediately, the NCAA Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse may use test-score results submitted on official high-school transcripts for the purpose of certifying the initial-eligibility status of student-athletes at Division I institutions.

One-time transfer exception Percentage of degree requirements

Division I institutions should note that during its August 8-10, 1994, meeting, the Council utilized the provisions of Constitution 5.4.1.1.1 (modification of wording) to clarify that in determining whether a student-athlete meets the satisfactory-progress component of the one-time transfer exception [Bylaw 14.5.5.3.10-(c)], the student must fulfill the necessary percentage-of-degree requirements [Bylaws 14.4.3.2.1 ("50 percent") and 14.4.3.2.2 ("25/50/75")] based only upon his or her academic record at the certifying institution, rather than at the institution from which the student-transferred. Please note that the institution from which the student-athlete transfers must continue to verify that the student-athlete has satisfied the fulfillment of credit hours requirement (Bylaw 14.4.3.1) and the hours earned during the academic year ("75/25") requirement (Bylaw 14.4.3.1.3).

Bylaw 30.10.5-(e)

Division I football recruiting calendar

Divisions I-A and I-AA institutions should note that during its August 2, 1994, telephone conference, the NCAA Administrative Committee amended Bylaw 30.10.5-(e) by increasing the number of in-person, off-campus contacts that may occur during the period from January 17-29 to two, provided not more than one contact with a prospective student-athlete occurs during any calendar week (Sunday through Saturday) or partial calendar week.

Bylaws 30.10.1-(c) and 30.10.1-(d) Division I men's basketball

Division I institutions should note that during its August 2, 1994, telephone conference, the Administrative Committee amended Bylaw 30.10.1-(c) to extend the quiet period in Division I men's basketball from September 27 through November 16, and amended Bylaw 30.10.1-(d) to begin the evaluation period November 17. The March 15 ending date for the evaluation period set forth in Bylaw 30.10.1-(d) remains the same.

nying chart offering suggestions for institutions that have not yet requested or are still awaiting final certifications for student-athletes.)

Recruited student-athletes can practice for two weeks before receiving certification. Walk-ons can practice up to 45 days prior to the rendering of a certification deci-

Publicity effort

While this is the first year that use of the clearinghouse is mandatory, it has been available since last year for official-visit certification. The NCAA sent extensive information to member institutions and to high schools to prepare for the first full year of operation.

Television spots on the clearinghouse aired during the NCAA Final Four. In addition, NCAA staff members have traveled extensively throughout the country and visited with high-school coaches and administrators, in an effort to get the word out about the process.

The clearinghouse was instituted by the NCAA membership to provide a central, impartial body for determining whether a prospective student-athlete is qualified under NCAA rules to compete as a freshman.

In the past, a prospective studentathlete instructed guidance counselors to send a transcript and list of core courses to every college recruiting that prospect; standardized test scores also were forwarded to those institutions. Each institution then made its own decision as to whether the prospect met NCAA academic initial-eligibility standards.

With implementation of the clearinghouse, transcripts and test scores for prospects are sent to only one place. There, trained professionals interpret the information and render one decision for all institutions requesting a certification for a prospect.

Clearinghouse costs

The NCAA has paid the entire cost of setting up the clearinghouse. The NCAA also is paying part of the processing cost, which supplements an \$18 fee paid by each student-athlete. Student-athletes who have received a waiver of standardized-test fees can obtain a waiver of the clearinghouse fee — which is then covered by the NCAA.

The Association's costs related to the clearinghouse have been estimated at upwards of half a million dollars a year.

Obtaining certification

It is essential that prospective student-athletes and NCAA institutions complete the following steps in obtaining initial-eligibility certification for a prospect who is entering college during the approaching academic year:

Student-athlete

- 1. Must register with NCAA Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse.
- 2. Must ask high-school counselor to send final transcript to clearinghouse. Student-athletes who have attended more than one high school are responsible for ensuring that all schools attended submit transcripts. (Minimum required SAT or ACT scores must have been achieved no later than July 1.)

Institution

- Must submit to clearinghouse an Institutional Request List, which lists prospects for whom certification information is needed.
- 2. Must request a final certification for each prospect.

Important information for institutions awaiting final certification

■ Institutions should immediately review weekly status reports from the clearinghouse, to learn of problems that may have occurred in processing a certification. It is hoped that the status report form, which recently was redesigned, will eliminate many telephone calls to the clearinghouse regarding certification status — thus freeing the staff to concentrate on processing new requests for certifications.

[As an example of how the status report can be useful, the form has a space in which the clearinghouse reports eligibility status. When a report indicates that no documents are missing and the letter "Y" is indicated in the "p" (preliminary) column, the institution seeking certification can infer that the prospect has met all initial-eligibility criteria but the clearinghouse has not received proof of graduation (the final transcript). Knowing that information, the institution can ensure that the prospect presents that proof to the clearinghouse [

- The NCAA Council recently reversed a previous interpretation, and now the clearinghouse can utilize standardized-test scores from either a testing agency or from an official high-school transcript.
- The NCAA Administrative Committee has approved a recommendation of the Special Committee to Oversee Implementation of the NCAA Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse to allow an institution to submit a copy of the official transcript (which includes proof of graduation) directly to the clearinghouse for final-certification purposes. An institution's registrar or admissions office can forward a prospect's transcript to the clearinghouse, provided that the transcript is verified by the registrar or admissions officer as an official transcript received directly from the prospect's high-school. (The document must be accompanied by the signature of the institution representative providing the verification, and that individual's title and department.) Institutions that provide a prospect's transcript must mail the document to the clearinghouse; faxes are not acceptable.
- Because of the time required to handle telephone inquiries, the clearinghouse staff is requesting that questions about complex or significant problems relating to a prospect's certification be submitted by fax (the telephone number for submission of faxes is 319/337-1556). Cooperation in that regard will enable the staff to continue to concentrate on processing certifications and also handle problems efficiently.

California State University system settles suit with ex-volleyball coach

The California State University system has agreed to pay \$1.35 million plus \$300,000 in attorney fees to settle a wrongful-termination lawsuit by former Cal State Fullerton volleyball coach Jim Huffman.

Those amounts were the same as ordered by a Superior Court jury and judge last winter, but the university avoids interest of 10 percent

by agreeing to drop its appeal of the February 8 verdict.

The sides agreed July 27 to finalize the arrangement, attorneys said.

"I don't want to sound overconfident, but we didn't think they would win an appeal," said Huffman.

He claimed he was unfairly fired

because he blocked the school's effort to drop its women's volleyball program in 1992.

The settlement brings to \$2.6 million the amount that the San Francisco firm of Boyd, Huffman & Williams has won for clients in six cases against the Cal State system in the last $2\frac{1}{2}$ years, according to The Associated Press. All have

involved wrongful termination or sex discrimination.

Volleyball coach Huffman's brother, attorney Jared Huffman, is a principal in the firm.

Huffman, who had a 25-80 record in three years as coach of the Titans, was fired in March 1992, just after a judge signed a preliminary injunction blocking the

school's attempt to drop volleyball.

The university contended it acted properly. Huffman's attorneys said during a three-week trial last winter that he was fired in retaliation for his sex-discrimination lawsuit that saved women's volleyball, forced changes in the school's athletics policies and embarrassed the school.
