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## Tuned in, big time

TV ratings for I women's final best in '90s; I men attract 50 million viewers

More than 50 million viewers watched this year's NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Championship final between the University of California, Los Angeles, and the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville.

Meanwhile, the rating for the Division I Women's Basketball Championship final was up sharply over 1994 and the rating for the championship game was the highest since 1987.

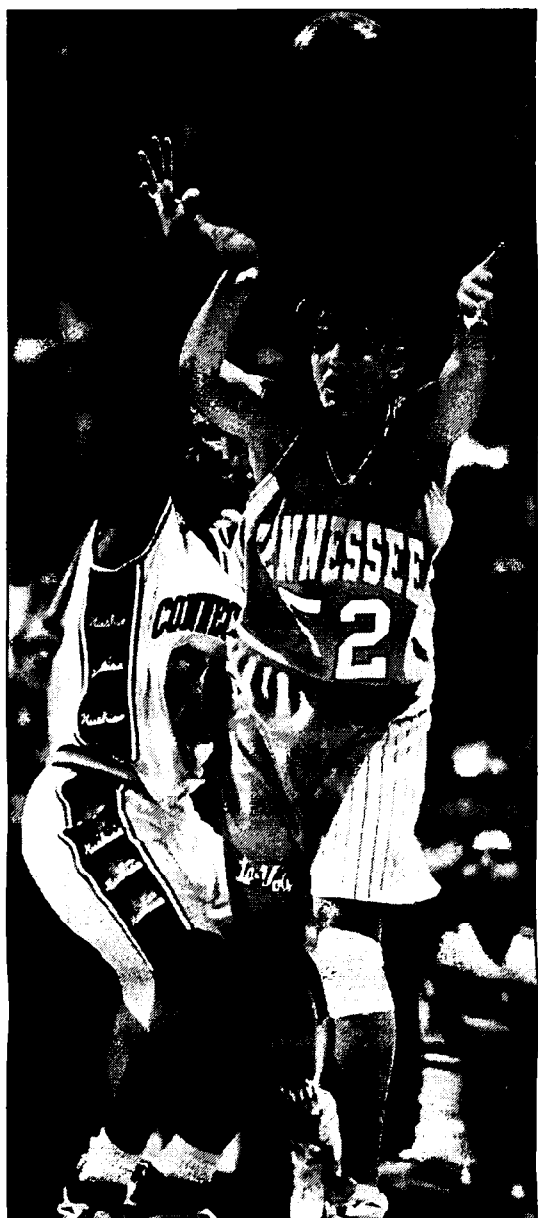
The men's championship game easily was the most-watched program of the night with a 19.3 rating and a 30 share. Those figures mean that 19.3 percent of the television homes in the country were tuned to the event and that it was being watched by 30 percent of those watching television at the time.

The championship game did especially well in Los Angeles, where it drew a 25.4 rating and a 42 share despite a 5:30 p.m. start time.

"It was the fourth most-watched championship game in history," said CBS publicist LeslieAnne Wade. The game was the top-rated CBS prime-time program of the year so far, Wade said.

Wade said those figures are more significant than a comparison of ratings with previous years. The ratings were down this year compared with past years, but Wade said it is unrealistic to expect them to go up every year since so many factors can affect them.

## Ideas, information on Title IX shared during first seminar

The first NCAA Title IX seminar offered some needed clarification of a topic that often is flanked by conflict and confusion, according to some participants.

More than 200 institutional administrators, conference officials, institutional and private counsel, and others attended the 1½-day event April 10-11 in Dallas. A second seminar — scheduled for April 20-21 in Baltimore — is expected to attract a similarly large turnout.

The Dallas seminar consisted of four panel discussions, as well as several roundtable gatherings that allowed participants to share experiences more directly with one another.

"I think this was a tremendous seminar," said David P. O'Brien, athletics director at Long Beach State University and a panelist in a discussion of coaches' compensation as it relates to Title IX and similar statutes. "What we're finding out in the field is that there is confusion. We need clarity. This helps create a national debate. I think the seminars will help institutions learn to comply with something we still don't fully understand."

The seminar opened with a discussion of athletics opportunities and financial aid. This area, which

included discussion of the three-part test that the U.S. Department of Education's Office for Civil Rights (OCR) utilizes to determine if an institution is in compliance with Title IX, sparked the most intense discussion.

Specifically, the seminar focused on the question of which component of the three-part test institutions need to be most concerned with. The answers, panelists said, depended upon experiences.

Panelist Valerie M. Bonnette, a former senior program analyst at OCR and founder of Good Sports, Inc., a company providing clients with technical assistance in complying with Title IX, presented OCR's perspective. She stressed that the Federal agency evaluates an institution in all three areas and does not concentrate only on the proportionality element.

But Mary Ann Connell, general counsel at the University of Mississippi and a professor in the university's business and law schools, contended that proportionality appears to be the only component to which the courts are giving significant notice — judging from decisions handed down thus far.

While the three-part test and the relative importance of each of the

## Regional rules-compliance seminars add a few wrinkles

A number of new features have been added to the NCAA regional rules-compliance seminars for 1995, and a popular old feature has been expanded.

The seminars will be May 1-3 in Washington, D.C.; May 10-12 in Orlando, Florida; and May 31-June 2 in San Diego.

Computer-software training has been one of the most popular features at previous regional seminars, so the schedule has been arranged to emphasize that area. This year, a four-hour Compliance Assistant software training session for beginners will be conducted the first morning of each seminar, and two classrooms will be made available for one-hour training sessions in specific modules of Compliance Assistant, the legislative services database and the Internet.

Preceding the beginning of each regular seminar program, a special two-hour session about the NCAA Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse will begin at 10 a.m. local time. A slightly abbreviated version of the clearinghouse presentation (90 minutes) will be made twice during each regular program.

This year, personnel from local high-school athletics staffs, student-athletes and parents will be able to attend a special session designed for them. That session, from 7 to 9 p.m. local time the second evening at each site, will require no preregistration or registration fee.

The NCAA regional-seminar staff will conduct a 90-minute open forum on the second afternoon of each seminar. Those attending will have the opportunity to ask any question of staff members or peers attending the session. This will be the first year for this feature.

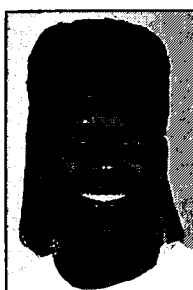
Registration will be open from 5 to 7:30 p.m. the evening before the beginning of each seminar (Sunday in Washington, D.C.; Tuesday evenings in Orlando and San Diego). Registration will be open again beginning the first morning and will remain open throughout the seminar.

A complete schedule for the seminars will be published in the April 19 issue of The NCAA News.

## Title IX

### Cantu to make presentation at seminar in Baltimore

Norma V. Cantu, director of the Office of Civil Rights (OCR) of the U.S. Department of Education, will appear on the program of an NCAA Title IX seminar in Baltimore April 20-21.

Janet M. Justus, NCAA director of education resources women's issues coordinator, said that only those who have preregistered should plan on attending the seminar. She encouraged individuals who have preregistered but will not be able to attend to let her know as soon as possible so that others can be placed on a waiting list.

In a related matter, a U.S. district judge in Rhode Island ruled March 29 that Brown University is in violation of Title IX and gave it 120 days to develop a comprehensive compliance plan.

University officials said they would appeal.

Judge Raymond Pettine's decision determined that the university did not meet any part of the three-part Title IX compliance test prescribed by OCR.

Pettine almost completely dismissed Brown's claims, including the school's assertion that it would have no alternative other than to cut men's sports if it were required to meet the proportionality standards.

The U.S. House Subcommittee on Postsecondary Education, Training and Lifelong Learning will hold a hearing May 9 in Washington to consider Title IX and the enforcement policy of the Office for Civil Rights of the Department of Education. The hearing will be an oversight hearing, rather than a hearing on specific proposals to amend Title IX.

Under the plan, CEOs would make up the primary governing bodies within each division, with the specific composition of those bodies determined by the respective divisions. Each division also would create its own governance structure; currently, all divisions are proposing management councils composed of athletics administrators and faculty athletics representatives that would report to the division's primary governing group of college presidents.

An executive committee, also made up of CEOs, would provide coordination and oversight for the entire Association. The executive committee would be authorized to convene at least one combined meeting per year of the three divisions' presidential governing bodies.

Under the Commission's plan, the executive committee would contain 16 members with eight I-AA representatives and two each from I-AA, I-AAA, II and III. The NCAA executive director and the chairs of the Divisions I, II and III management councils would be ex officio, nonvoting members.

## Briefly in the News

### Realizing a major dream

Sara Graziano, for as long as she can remember, has dreamed of playing baseball in the big leagues. Now, she is pinching herself to make sure it is real.

Graziano, who was a three-sport standout (basketball, softball and volleyball) at Coastal Carolina University, found a spot on the spring-training roster of the Colorado Silver Bullets, a women's professional baseball team based in Denver that tours the country competing in exhibitions, primarily against men's teams.

"It has always been a dream of mine to play professionally but, as a woman, professional status has not been a viable reality until now," Graziano told Wayne White, Coastal Carolina sports information director. "This opportunity, to actually be paid to do something you love, it is beyond a dream — it is just incredible. I hope that I can make the most of it."

Graziano began spring training April 4 with the Silver Bullets, managed by former major-league pitcher and Hall of Famer Phil Niekro. She won an invitation to the camp with her performance March 25 during tryouts for a new women's baseball league in the Mediterranean region.

"Before I left for Atlanta (site of those tryouts), I spoke with someone over the phone about (a Silver Bullets) tryout," she said. "I told him that I had missed an earlier tryout with the Silver Bullets and was wondering if they would work with a collegiate athlete who had class conflicts and could not make the earlier tryouts. He said that, yes, they would consider it if that person was an exceptional athlete. Then he said that during this tryout, I should be concentrating on the Mediterranean league because the chances of joining the Silver Bullets were not very likely."

Graziano's talents, obviously, did not go unnoticed. It did not hurt her chances that she set NCAA Division I women's softball records in 1994 for batting average (.589) and slugging percentage (1.006).

During the March 25 tryout, Graziano had an opportunity to hit a few pitches thrown by Niekro. Would-be players were told that if the Silver Bullets invited them to camp they would hear back the following

day.

"I was a little disappointed because I do not like to wait," Graziano said. "After I got my cleats off and things packed up, I started to head to the parking lot. One of the people conducting the tryout came up to me and said that Phil Niekro wanted to have a word with me. He spoke with me for a couple of minutes and then invited me to spring training."

### BCA and careers

Rudy Washington, head men's basketball coach at Drake University and executive director of the Black Coaches Association, said his association is not in the process of organizing student-athletes to form a players' union" as was suggested in an April 3 article in USA Today.

Washington said the BCA — because of its concern about the presence of young minorities in intercollegiate athletics

administration and coaching careers — is organizing students to participate in its jobs fair, which will be conducted in conjunction with the BCA's annual convention this May in Orlando, Florida.

"What we're trying to do is get students down to Orlando and look at careers in athletics," he said. "We're not trying to organize students in a way to overthrow college athletics. We're trying to organize students and get them in our minority vita bank. We'd like to help create a network that is sorely missing in the African-American community."

Washington said NCAA institutions are invited to send representatives to the BCA convention to meet prospective minority job candidates. Sporting-goods companies and other athletics-related businesses also have been invited to participate in the jobs fair.

## Nominations for Council vacancies due August 25

Administrative personnel at NCAA member institutions are invited to submit nominations for upcoming vacancies on the NCAA Council.

Nominations must be submitted to Fannie B. Vaughan, executive assistant, at the NCAA national office, 6201 College Boulevard, Overland Park, Kansas 66211-2422 (fax 913/339-0035), and must be received no later than August 25.

The NCAA Nominating Committee will review nominations and make recommendations to fill the Council positions, as well as vacancies for NCAA officers.

While nominations will be accepted from anyone at an NCAA member institution or conference, customarily the director of athletics, faculty athletics representative, senior woman administrator of athletics programs, president or conference commissioner nominates personnel for service on NCAA committees.

*As part of its commitment to diversity, the Association invites the nomination of ethnic minorities for Council positions. Nominees are encouraged to include this information somewhere on the nominee form that will be sent to them after they are nominated.*

The vacancies to be filled are for terms beginning in January 1996 immediately after the NCAA Convention. Council members who are eligible for reelection are reelected automatically unless there is a recommendation to the contrary from those responsible. Terms on the Council are four years, with no immediate reelection.

The nominee's name, title, institution, address and fax number should be submitted. If possible, the nominee's division, region and conference should be provided. A separate nomination letter is to be provided for each candidate. If the nomination letter is sent by fax, there is no need to mail a hard copy.

To be eligible for consideration, candidates must complete a form providing information about qualifications for service in the specific positions for which they are nominated. The NCAA office will send the form (by fax or by mail) to each nominee. A candidate's chances of appointment could be jeopardized if the form is not completed and returned by the deadline, which will be about one week after the form is sent.

A complete list of NCAA officers and Council members may be found in the 1995 NCAA Committee Handbook, which was distributed to the membership in early March. Council changes that have occurred since publication of that booklet have been printed in the Committee Notices column in The NCAA News.

### Council positions that expire January 1996

Nominations will be considered by the NCAA Nominating Committee at

its fall 1995 meeting. The deadline for submission of nominations is August 25, 1995.

Terms of two of the five elected NCAA officers will expire in January 1996: Division I Vice-President William M. Sangster, Georgia Institute of Technology, and Division III Vice-President Edward G. Coll Jr., Alfred University. The Divisions I and III vice-president positions must be filled from the appropriate divisions by individuals who are members of the Council.

Six Division I Council members' terms expire (they are not eligible for reelection); two Division II members cannot be reelected; and in Division III, two members must be replaced.

### Football decision based on hard facts

My recent decision to end football at San Francisco State University has brought a level of attention to Gator football that we would have welcomed over the past few decades.

The decision was based on many factors, one of them being gender equity. One of our state senators has since called for a reinstatement of our football program. While I have received only a handful of letters regarding this issue, the local media have picked up on the controversy and recent editorial coverage has failed to accurately present key facts.

As one of the first universities in the country to cite gender equity as a key reason for eliminating a football program, I would like to set the record straight.

In February 1993, the California National Organization for Women filed a lawsuit against the California State University (CSU) system, alleging discrimination against women students in the conduct of intercollegiate athletics. The consent decree that resulted from that suit sets increased participation targets for women athletes beginning in 1998. As one of the 21 CSU campuses, we must comply with those targets for participation. Similar cases are taking place across the nation, with the latest, a Federal ruling that Brown University has discriminated against women athletes, being described as a landmark case and a major boost for women's college sports.

I made our football decision only after weighing many factors: the consent decree's requirements, our athletics program budget, student participation, competitiveness and the role of athletics on this campus.

Here are the facts:

The consent decree does not, as our state senator maintains, provide an exemption for football. It allows no exemptions whatsoever from its requirement that the percentage of our intercollegiate athletes who are women must come within five points of the number of women on campus who are NCAA-eligible. In other words, if 50 percent of San Francisco State's NCAA-eligible undergraduates are women, then at least 45 percent of our athletes must be women.

A study of participation rates in our 1994-95 athletics program, including football,

In response to coach Pat Henry's opinion in the March 8 issue of The NCAA News about track being "too pure, no controversies, no fights," I reflected on my own track and cross country career at C. W. Post College and how "pure" we all did feel then compared to other, more recognized sports.

I also reflected on an illegal disqualification of a disabled runner whom I coached at Vassar College. Our runner, Tracy Nichols, believed, as I did, in the "purity" of our sport of running. She took two strides with one foot hitting a barely visible boundary line and was cited by a high-school volunteer judge and later disqualified from all-American status by

an NCAA championship subcommittee. We were not made aware of the "disqual" until her name wasn't called for 19th place. Only one committee member (an old-timer) had the understanding enough to at least apologize.

Our sense of purity of our great sport was impaired permanently that day. If anyone reading this letter is on any subcommittee, rules committee or involved in imposing penalties on student-athletes (in particular the most pure, the Division III volunteer athlete), please temper your decisions to be just and fit-

ting to the degree of the infraction.

Remember, we are here for the athlete and we in the sport of running must aspire for the "purity" that embodies this ancient competition. Our decisions must put the athlete and the sport ahead of the minuscule and picayune penalizers who now seem to dominate our NCAA running world and who have seemingly fallen from that pure path that coach Henry alludes to. Division III, in particular, should retreat from that mentality.

### Focus on women aids athletes, fans

"While Title IX generally accommodates different athletics interests among men and women, the critical question is whether a school offers men and women equal opportunities to participate in sports. Judge (Raymond J.) Pettine ruled that Brown University had failed to meet this test by all three standards put forth by the U.S. Department of Education. Brown did not enroll men and women in varsity sports in substantial proportion to their respective undergraduate enrollments, which is the most demanding test. Nor did it expand sports programs for women to meet demand or show that it had already met the demand of all women who wanted to participate, regardless of proportionality.

"While 49 percent of undergraduates were men and 51 percent women, Judge Pettine found that the school offered 62 percent of its varsity athletics slots to men and only 38 percent to women. Since women already had fewer athletics opportunities than men, and since Brown's efforts to expand women's sports had peaked, leaving some unmet demand, Judge Pettine ruled that demoting women's teams was even more harmful than demoting men's teams.

"The judge gave Brown more time to determine how to allocate resources to support more women's teams. But the university protests that the ruling comes too close to ordering sports by quota, and will appeal.

"More than two decades after passage of Title IX, the NCAA reports that female participation in sports is slowly but steadily increasing, after sharp cutbacks in the mid-1980s. In 1993-94, women accounted for about 36 percent of college athletes and 53 percent of college students in NCAA member schools.

"Greater emphasis on women's sports would benefit not just the athletes but the fans as well."

"If anyone had lingering doubts about the quality of women's collegiate sports, the recent basketball championship between Connecticut and Tennessee should have erased them. The athletics skills and mental toughness of both teams were obvious, as Connecticut fought back to take the title in the last few minutes of play.

"A little less obvious, perhaps, are the legal and cultural changes enveloping not only well-publicized events like the NCAA women's basketball finals, but women's athletics in general. These changes are largely impelled by a 1972 Federal law, Title IX, which, among other provisions, requires schools that get Federal funds to give men and women equal athletics opportunities.

"A string of recent Title IX cases have established legal guidelines for the fair treatment of female athletes. The latest ruling came a week ago, when a Federal district court in Providence, Rhode Island, found Brown University in violation of Title IX. Along with other considerations, the judge noted the disproportionate varsity slots available to men (62 percent) and women (38 percent) on a campus where the gender breakdown is 50-50.

"To opponents of Title IX, this question of proportionality rings of quotas. But backers of the law point out that schools have other avenues of compliance, too — such as showing a pattern of consistently expanding opportunities for women athletes.

"Such opportunities have traditionally been sparse compared with those afforded men. Athletics scholarships, for instance, have been largely a male domain, and women's coaches have been paid less. Title IX is gradually altering this. Colleges and universities are having to find room in their athletics budgets for women. Even the 800-pound gorilla of such budgets, football, may have to give ground.

"The standard rationale for the old status quo was that women simply aren't very interested in sports. Legally, the courts aren't buying that argument.

"Culturally, assumptions about women and athletics are changing as events like the NCAA finals not only showcase for fans the team spirit and individual talents in women's sports, but give countless girls an idea of what they can aspire to."

Discussing the Brown University Title IX decision:

"There has been excess in college football, financially and in other ways, but I think it has been trimmed as far as it can go to still put an attractive product on the field....

"If that logic (the Brown decision) — or I might say illogic — prevails, it has enormous portent for college athletics.

"The real issue in some people's minds is the role of college football. If there were no football, Title IX would not be so much of an issue. The football issue is really at the heart of this. Title IX already has had an enormous impact, most of it positive in terms of opportunity for females, but there must be some balance."

#### Men's basketball

John Wooden, former men's basketball coach

"I think there's too much showmanship today. It's taken away a little of the finesse and beauty of the game, in my opinion, and it hurts team play a little bit.

"But yet the people like that and the crowd likes that. It certainly hasn't hurt the attendance in any way.

"Now, the players are becoming better all the time. That also takes something away from team play, because coaches tend to let them do a little more on their own.

"But I love team play. Always have."

On paying student-athletes:

"Paid? They are paid. They get a free education. Completely free. What do they do to get that? They play. They play basketball. Is that work? They can't tell me that's work.

"Now, that education covers board, room, books and tuition. It doesn't cover social activities, that's true. What should they do in the summertime, sit around? They ought to work a little. Learn to save.

"As Mr. Lincoln, my favorite American, said, 'The worst thing you can do for those you love are the things they could and should do for themselves.'

"Well, when you start doing too much, I think you take away their independence. And when you take away someone's independence, you're not helping them. You're hurting them."

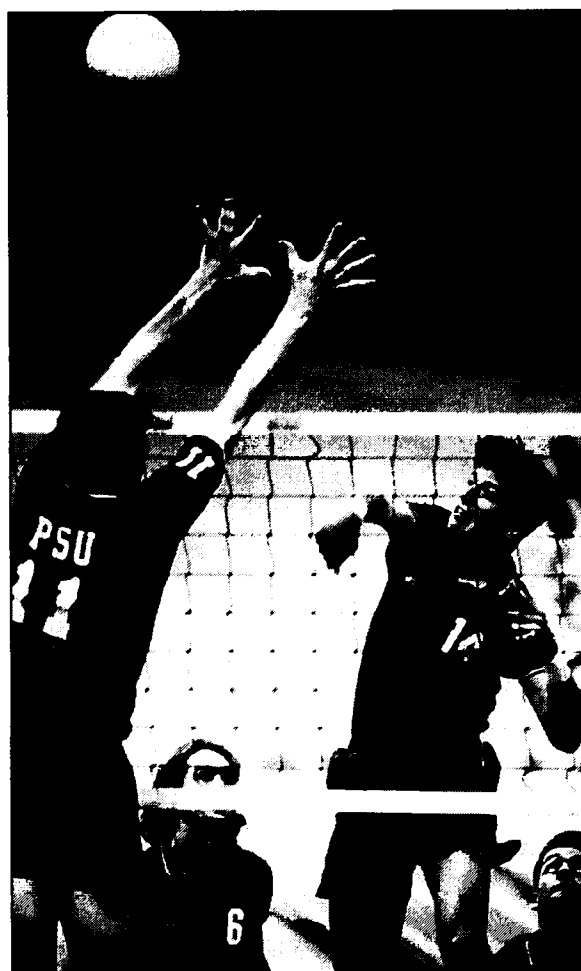

**Volleyball turns 100 and sets its sights on a bright tomorrow**

But the celebration's most noteworthy aspect may be the fact that it is based in a strong grass-roots campaign to foster youth participation in volleyball.

## Week-long 'volley'

At the heart of the campaign is Volley Across America, a week-long extravaganza targeting major markets as well as more remote locales across the country. The program, funded by the SGMA Volleyball Council and managed by The Sherry Group, a New Jersey-based sports marketing agency, is designed to increase awareness and participation in volleyball through a series of clinics, on-site promotions and competitive tournaments.

"Volley Across America is a national grass-roots sports marketing program that comprises two levels," said The Sherry Group's Stuart Valentine. "One, it's a series of participatory events in major markets designed to create national media awareness; and two, it's a grass-roots program that ties in with boys and girls clubs and YWCAs that will stage their own Volley Across America celebrations featuring clinics conducted by established coaches and players."

Slated for June 17-25, Volley Across America will kick off in New York City with a major media event featuring celebrity spokespersons and high-profile volleyball players. Also planned is a major participatory event in Washington, D.C., spanning 20 courts along the Washington Mall. Other major-market events will be staged in Atlanta; Chicago; Sacramento, California; Omaha, Nebraska; Holyoke, Massachusetts; and Santa Barbara, California.

At local levels, youth groups at 100 sites will receive a Volley Across America "kit" that includes event information and guidelines, three volleyballs, a free three-month subscription to Volleyball Magazine, and a public relations incentive contest featuring as the top prize a visit from a high-profile volleyball star.

## Increasing awareness

"We're encouraging youths to be interested in volleyball by getting them to these events," Valentine said. "The more people we attract to the sport and the more interest

we create, the more people will attend collegiate events, national-team events and volleyball events at all levels. We're hoping to increase awareness in all aspects of volleyball, whether it be national, men's collegiate, women's collegiate, indoor, outdoor or the beach game."

The Volleyball Hall of Fame also is providing party favors, joining Springfield College as cohost of the National Collegiate Men's Volleyball Championship at the Springfield Civic Center, and then joining with USA Volleyball the week of May 27 through June 3 in Chicopee, Massachusetts, to stage the USA Volleyball Open, involving some 300 teams.

Located in Holyoke, the Hall of Fame also sponsored its eighth annual men's volleyball Hall of Fame Classic in March, which featured defending national champion Pennsylvania State University. It also will conduct the 16-team Division III Women's Induction Tournament at nearby Smith and Mount Holyoke Colleges October 20-21 — during induction week-end.

"We wanted to host some spectacular events in the region to celebrate the birth of the sport," said Hall of Fame President Alex Stetynski. "We also wanted to gain added recognition for the Hall of Fame and the region, which has a proud sports heritage. Volleyball was developed in Holyoke and basketball in nearby Springfield, and many local athletes have gone on to collegiate and professional stardom, but we don't have a local major-league team so we tend not to get as much national recognition as the area deserves."

Stetynski said the Hall of Fame also is promoting grass-roots growth by encouraging local companies to sponsor inner-city youth attendance at the major national competitions it is hosting.

"Local clubs have provided us with a list of kids who would be interested in seeing the National Collegiate men's championship," he said. "We're soliciting local companies as donors who would fund a block of tickets to the championship. Our hope is that we can get more kids in this region playing volleyball and to get them acquainted with the sport as it is played at the championship level."

## Following soccer's example

With success, these events should provide a boost to collegiate and national volleyball programs. Stetynski points to youth soccer as having grown to where it is a regular contributor to top collegiate and

national teams. He hopes volleyball can follow that pattern.

"We've been fortunate to be competitive at the world level," Stetynski said. "We have some athletes who've played volleyball all their lives — plus we tend to grow some pretty tall people in this country — but to consistently be at the top internationally, as we have in basketball and other sports, we need to get more young people involved in regularly playing volleyball."

Some sources say that interest in boys' volleyball in particular is at an all-time high and that the time is now for colleges to plug into that interest.

"We're finding now that boys are wanting an alternative to football, basketball and baseball," said Sandra L. Vivas, executive director of the American Volleyball Coaches Association. "While there aren't many men's teams right now, there will be some pressure soon because more and more boys are playing."

Springfield volleyball coach Joel Dearing agreed.

"These kids are just looking for schools to go to," he said. "The demand alone should be great enough to influence schools thinking about starting up a men's team."

Dearing, a Hall of Fame board member who will play a major role as Springfield cohosts the National Collegiate men's championship, believes the events surrounding the centennial celebration will spur interest — particularly in the Northeast.

"In New England, boys' volleyball has grown tremendously over the past decade," he said. "And the events this year will do a lot to help continue that regional growth. You can sense the excitement. There are kids out there saying, 'Wow, look at these players. I want to be like them.'"

"The interest is certainly there for volleyball," Vivas said. "Both the National Collegiate men's and the Division I women's championships have good television ratings and are well attended. I see the women's game only continuing to grow, and as far as the men's game is concerned, there is unlimited potential for growth."

According to Dearing, that potential for growth begins now.

"There's a success story out there waiting to happen down the road," he said. "Every kid has a dream and there's bound to be a kid out there who'll get a chance to live that dream — and when he's asked what the turning point was, he'll point to the centennial."

shows how far we have to go: While 59 percent of our eligible students are women, only 34 percent of our student-athletes are female. If we were to keep our male student-athlete number unchanged (at 190, as of fall 1994), we would have to increase the number of female athletes from 96 to at least 219.

I wish we had the funding simply to expand our overall athletics program, adding opportunities for women while retaining all those for men. However, our limited athletics budget does not allow that luxury.

We attempted in 1992, with the passage of a student referendum, to put athletics on a self-supporting basis. But even with higher student

activity fees, athletics still requires major support from our state budget — almost \$500,000, enough for 134 class sections — this year. It is simply not possible — or justifiable — weighing our academic and operational needs, to provide additional sports dollars.

Furthermore, budget analysis shows that the high costs associated with football have limited the opportunities for both men and women in other parts of our athletics program.

Football is only one of several upcoming changes in San Francisco State intercollegiate sports. We are adding women's tennis — the first new women's sport since 1982. We are expanding existing women's teams, capping the size of existing men's teams and reallocating our athletics budget. Both women and men in many of

the so-called "minor" sports will benefit as their teams now will get a larger share of those funds.

Critics of our decision have charged that it harms minority athletes. To the contrary: The end of San Francisco State football can enhance opportunities for minority athletes. Minorities play many sports, not just football. We expect that many of the athletes who will be joining our expanded program will be ethnic minorities — fully in keeping with our student population.

And with stronger support for a "minor" sport such as track, we will be able to better develop the talents of athletes such as San Francisco State track star Ricky Carrigan, an African-American sprinter who recently was ranked No. 1 nationally (Division II) in his event. He and many other San Francisco State athletes will have richer

opportunities in a better balanced sports program.

It is important to remember that athletics is not a part of the academic program at San Francisco State, nor is it linked with financial aid. (We are a Division II nonscholarship school.) Throughout the university, academic programs — our reason for being — have suffered in the hard budget years since 1989. We offer an athletics program as one of a number of opportunities for our students to develop all of their talents and develop personal qualities that will serve them well throughout their lives.

Now a note about the timing and the people most affected by this decision. I felt that our players would be better served if we ended football

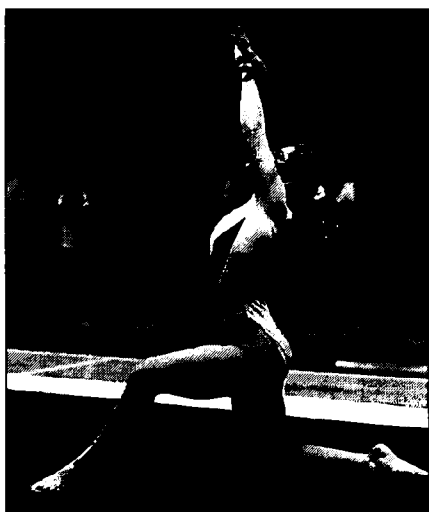

## Host Georgia enjoys the advantage

**Event:** 1995 National Collegiate Women's Gymnastics Championships.

**Overview:** Six times in the championships' 13-year history, the host institution has claimed the team title. Georgia hopes to make it seven in 14 years. In what is fast becoming an annual happening, Georgia, Alabama and Utah have monopolized the top three spots in the top-20 rankings this season and again should battle for supremacy....Georgia, which will host its second championships, is the nation's top-ranked team. The Bulldogs, who set the championships scoring record with 198,000 points in 1993, are led by Lori Strong, Agina Simpkins and Leah Brown. Strong is defending trichampion on the uneven bars, while Simpkins was co-champion in the event in 1993....Utah, the defending champion, certainly has the talent to repeat. The only team to win back-to-back titles — Utah won five consecutive titles from 1982 through 1986 — the Utes are led by the trio of Suzanne Metz, Sandra Woolsey and Traci Sommer. Metz has been the most impressive, setting the NCAA all-around record March 25 with a score of 39.95 points against Brigham Young, including perfect scores on the vault and floor exercise....Alabama, runner-up at the last two championships, relies on Chasity Junkin and Kim Kelly, among others, to end its three-year title drought. The Crimson Tide split two regular-season encounters with Georgia, before outdistancing the Bulldogs at the conference championships....Michigan and Southeastern Conference rival LSU, ranked Nos. 4 and 5, respectively, also will be in the hunt for the team title. Michigan, which finished fourth in 1994, boasts two-time uneven bars champion Beth Wymer. Wymer, who has set school records on all five events, has enjoyed a stellar campaign, registering perfect scores on the vault, uneven bars, floor exercise and balance beam. LSU, second at the SEC championships, is led by Kristy Savoie and Jennifer Wood, both of whom earned all-SEC honors.

**Field:** The championships field will consist of 12 teams, as well as 12 individual all-around competitors who are not on a qualifying team. Seven teams and

seven all-around competitors not already on qualifying teams competed at each of five regionals; the team and individual all-around winners in each region received an automatic berth in the national championships. The championships field will be filled with at-large teams and all-around competitors who qualified on the basis of scores at the regionals.

**Dates and sites:** Regional competition was conducted April 8 at Michigan (Central), Nebraska (Midwest), Kent (Northeast), Towson State (Southeast) and Oregon State (West). The championships will be April 20-22 at Georgia.

**Television coverage:** The championships will be televised tape-delayed by CBS at 3 p.m. (Eastern time) April 29.

**Results:** Championships results will appear in the April 26 issue of The NCAA News.

**Championships notes:** Georgia won the team title the last time the Bulldogs hosted the championships, in 1989....Kentucky's Jenny Hansen, who has won four individual-event titles, needs only one title to tie Missy Marlowe of Utah as the most-decorated gymnast in championships history. Marlowe won five individual-event titles. Hansen, two-time defending all-around champion, is vying to become the first three-time champion in the event.

## Steady Cornhuskers lead field again

**Event:** 1995 National Collegiate Men's Gymnastics Championships.

**Overview:** If consistency is the mark of a champion, then champion is spelled N-e-b-r-a-s-k-a. Fourteen times in the championships' last 16 years, Nebraska has finished first or second. Nebraska has claimed the crown eight times, including last year. This year, the squad is young — the Cornhuskers boast five freshmen and two sophomores — but has more than enough talent to win its second consecutive team title. Seniors Richard Grace, defending champion on the parallel bars, and Richard Kieffer and junior Jason Christie are the squad's top performers. Grace, the nation's top-ranked performer on the vault and parallel bars, has enjoyed a tremendous senior campaign, posting career bests on the rings, pommel horse and in the all-around. Grace also ranks among the nation's top five in the floor exercise and the all-around. Kieffer, like Grace, has set several career bests this season, including a 9.85 on the still rings....New Mexico is the nation's No. 1-ranked squad and the primary threat to the Cornhuskers' reign. The Lobos, who edged Nebraska, 231.00-230.125, February 26 in dual-meet competition, have held the nation's top ranking nine of 11 weeks. Blaz Puljic is the squad's top performer, ranking among the nation's top 10 in five events. Coach Rusty Mitchell's squad also

is bolstered by Shane Evangelist, Scott Jones and Tim Gergen....Iowa, which won its first and only team title in 1969, is in position to record its best championships finish in recent memory. The Hawkeyes, led by all-American Jay Thornton, defeated New Mexico March 4 at Albuquerque and earned a tie at Nebraska March 17.

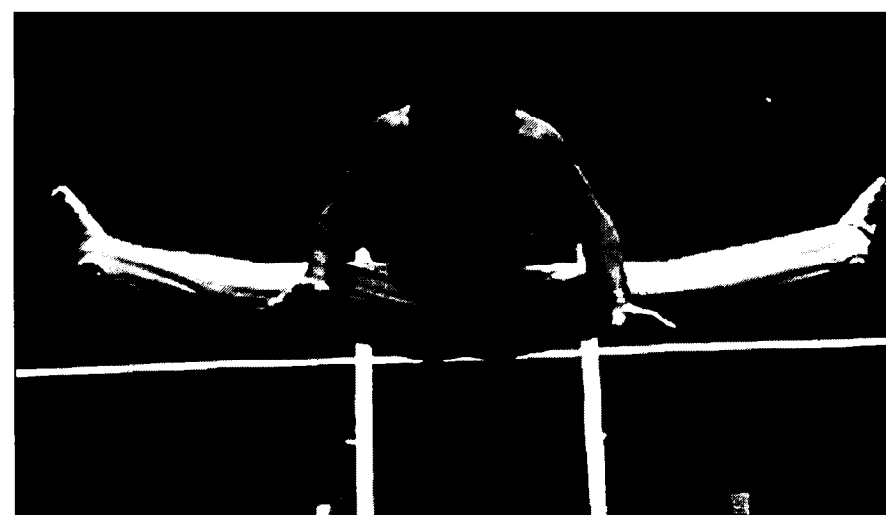
**Field:** Three teams are advancing from each of two regionals; also advancing are the top three all-around competitors who are not on one of the qualifying teams and the top three individuals in each event not already qualified on a team or as an all-around competitor.

**Dates and sites:** Regional competition was April 8 at Penn State (East regional) and Oklahoma (West regional). The championships will be April 20-22 at Ohio State.

**Television coverage:** The championships will be televised tape-delayed by CBS at 2:30 p.m. (Eastern time) May 6.

**Results:** Championships results will appear in the April 26 issue of The NCAA News.

**Championships notes:** Nebraska's eight team championships ranks third behind Illinois and Penn State, which have won nine titles each....Richard Grace of Nebraska is vying to become the first competitor to win back-to-back individual parallel-bars titles since Dan Hayden of Arizona State in 1986 and 1987.

State University (I-AA West, chief executive officer, Region 4); Jerry L. Kingston, Arizona State University (I-A, Pacific-10 Conference, Region 4); Chris Monasch, Northeast Conference (I-AAA, Region 1); Richard A. Rosenthal, University of Notre Dame (I-A Independent, Region 3); William M. Sangster, Georgia Institute of Technology (I-A, Atlantic Coast Conference, Region 2); Mary Jo Warner, George Washington University (I-AAA, Region 1).

Two of the Division I representatives must be from Division I-A conferences — the Pacific-10 Conference (to replace Kingston) and the Atlantic Coast Conference (to replace Sangster). One must be from a I-A independent (to replace Rosenthal). One

must be from Division I-AA West (to replace Alost), and two from I-AAA (to replace Monasch and Warner). One must be a woman. One must be from Region 3 and one from Region 4.

Note: The NCAA constitution provides that Division I-A conferences may name their representatives. The Pacific-10 and Atlantic Coast Conferences will select their representatives; therefore, nominations for those two positions are not being solicited from the membership at large.

■ **Division II** — Three expirations. Not eligible for reelection: Rita M. Castagna, Assumption College (Region 1); Richard A. Johanningmeier, Washburn University of Topeka (Region 3); Janet R. Kittell, California State University, Chico (Region 4). One new member must be from Region 1 (to replace Castagna).

■ **Division III** — Two expirations. Not eligible for reelection: Dennis M. Collins, North Coast Athletic Conference (Region 3); Linda S. Moulton, Clark University (Massachusetts) (Region 1). One new member must be from Region 1 (to replace Moulton). One must be from Region 3 (to replace Collins).

Those who plan to nominate individuals for Council positions should consult Constitution 4.8.2., which lists the Association's geographical regions for purposes of Council representation.

Where possible, nominees for the NCAA Council should have current or prior service on other NCAA committee(s) or some related service. Initial involvement in the Association's committee structure should be at the committee level whenever possible, rather than at the Council level.

immediately, giving them the opportunity to devote their remaining eligibility to a competitive team, rather than one that knew it was going through a final season. I also was concerned that if we gave a year's notice to eliminating football, we would play a final season with a greatly diminished group, posing a hazard to the safety of the remaining team members.

In addition, it is going to take time and money to meet the consent decree's participation targets for female student-athletes. Many students, coaches and advisors at both the high-school and college levels are not aware of the athletics opportunities available to young women on our campus. We must begin immediately putting our limited resources toward recruiting young women to participate in our athletics program.

Behind all the logic and the dollars and the details is a group of outstanding young men who had expected to play football for us next fall. With the active involvement of Betsy Alden, our director of athletics, we are working with these student-athletes to help those who want to play football elsewhere find that opportunity. We have brought coaches from around — and beyond — the state to campus. We have several successes already; more, we hope, are to come.

As we move forward with these changes in our sports program, we hope to carry with us public understanding and respect for the thoughtfulness and genuineness of our decision — and a true sense of how positive it will be for generations of women and men athletes at San Francisco State.

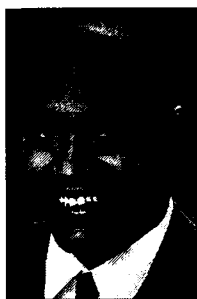

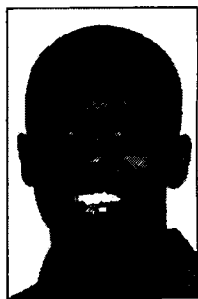

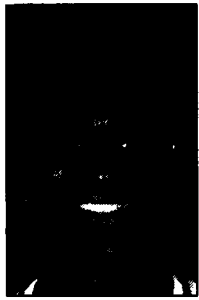

#### Women's ratings

The women's championship game bounced back sharply from 1994 with a 5.7 rating and a 15 share in its last appearance on CBS before moving to ESPN next year.

Viewership for the semifinals was mixed, with the first game between the University of Tennessee, Knoxville, and the University of Georgia drawing a 2.6 (compared to 2.9 last year) and the second game between the University of Connecticut and Stanford University drawing a 4.0, compared to 1994's 3.7.

The rating for the championship game surpassed the 5.5 of the 1993 title game between Texas Tech University and Ohio State University. That had been the highest-rated women's final in this decade.

components prompted disagreements among seminar participants and panel members, the subject of attitudes produced unanimity.

"Attitudes are the biggest problem we have," Connell said. "This isn't about hurting anyone. This is about being realistic. What hurts your school is doing nothing."

Another panel discussion focused on areas of Title IX that receive much less consideration but are just as much of an imperative in the OCR's view. Program areas such as facilities, support services, scheduling, tutoring and publicity all are components that OCR has indicated may be reviewed to determine if men and women are being provided with equitable athletics experiences.

Marcia L. Smeltzer, associate athletics director at Colorado State University, served as a panelist for that discussion. She said those components outside of the three-part

test often are considered a "laundry list."

Recalling the court case in which her institution was ordered to reinstate its women's softball program, Smeltzer said schools can benefit from learning about Colorado State's experiences following litigation. One result was improved communication.

"We're starting to at least talk about some of this stuff," she said. "For the first time, we're bringing together people from all walks of university life, and they all have a different wrinkle."

A third panel discussion addressed issues surrounding coach-

es' pay. Generally, the discussion focused on reasons for the gap that exists between the pay of some male and female coaches in the same sport.

Long Beach State's O'Brien argued that coaches' compensation — particularly the high salary and benefits packages granted to some coaches — is inappropriately scrutinized.

He said coaches who hold similar responsibilities should be compensated as equitably as possible in the base contract. O'Brien also suggested that a second-tier or supplemental contractual arrangement be developed that will allow institutions to compensate a high-profile coach for the gains that he or she may bring to that institution. That is the arrangement O'Brien uses at Long Beach State.

"We need to be free to invest in coaches who provide a return to the institution," said O'Brien, who served on the panel with Christine H. B. Grant, women's athletics

director at the University of Iowa. "Let's use the academic analogy. The professor of geography is not paid as much as a professor of business, medicine, engineering or law. There is in the United States — for better or worse — a marketplace. I see no productive reason why we should disregard the marketplace and pay all coaches equally."

Discussion of developing action plans and formulating proper and effective procedures for their implementation dominated the closing half day of the seminar. A panel including Jim Livengood, athletics director at the University of Arizona; David R. Scott, university counsel at Rutgers University, New Brunswick; and Diane T. Wendt, associate athletics director at the University of Denver, described plans and provided guidance on procedures to create and implement Title IX plans.

of Atlanta and Georgia Institute of Technology, which hosted the 1993 Women's Final Four at The Omni, also will be invited to make an in-person presentation.

"Narrowing the field of prospec-

tive hosts was a very difficult decision," said Linda Bruno, chair of the committee and commissioner of the Atlantic 10 Conference.

"Virtually all of the cities and institutions that submitted preliminary bids were very viable sites in terms of facilities and community support, and it's encouraging to see

that degree of interest in the Women's Final Four."

The committee expects to announce the 1999 and 2000 hosts after its June 26-30 meeting.

The 1995 Women's Final Four in Minneapolis marked the fourth sellout in the event's history, and the third consecutive sellout. Future

sites are: 1996: Charlotte Coliseum, Charlotte, North Carolina (University of North Carolina, Charlotte, host); 1997: Riverfront Coliseum, Cincinnati [Xavier University (Ohio), host]; and 1998: Kemper Arena, Kansas City, Missouri (Big Eight Conference, host).

Jerry Tarkanian returns to Fresno State

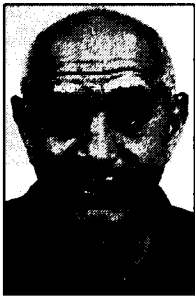
**Jerry Tarkanian** has accepted the head men's basketball coaching position at Fresno State, where he played in the mid-1950s.

Jaworsky, the current 134-pound champion, had a 38-0 record this season, including 24 pins. The trophy is named for Dan Hodge, who won three NCAA titles at Oklahoma and went unbeaten in his college career.

Connecticut senior **Rebecca Lobo** named the first Associated Press women's basketball player of the year. The selection was made in voting by AP member newspapers nationwide.

**Nolan Richardson**, head men's basketball coach at Arkansas, received the Most Courageous Award from the United States Basketball Writers Association. Richardson accepted the award just hours before his team finished as runner-up in the Final Four in Seattle.

The American Volleyball Coaches Association selected senior technique hitter **Todd Reimer** of Ball State as its national player of the week for April 3.

The Associated Press honored Oklahoma's **Kevin Sampson** as coach of the year, and Maryland sophomore **Joe Smith** as national college basketball player of the year. Smith ended the season with an average of 20.8 points and 10.4 rebounds while shooting 58 percent from the field. Sampson led the Sooners to the first round of the NCAA tournament, finishing the season with a 23-9 record.

**Jeff Sauer**, head men's ice hockey coach at Wisconsin, chosen as head coach of the 1995 United States national team, which will compete in the 1995 International Ice Hockey Federation World Championship April 23-May 7 in Stockholm and Gavle, Sweden. In 24 seasons as a collegiate head coach, Sauer has compiled a 513-415-38 record.

**Robyn Yorke**, sophomore right fielder at Fresno State, named Louisville

Slugger women's softball player of the week for the second time this season. She currently has a 34-game hitting streak, the second longest in NCAA history.

Maine men's ice hockey coach **Shawn Walsh** named university division coach of the year by the American Hockey Coaches Association. Walsh led his team to second place in the NCAA tournament and a 32-6-6 record. **Bill Beaney**, head coach at Middlebury, was chosen as the college division coach of the year. Middlebury finished the season as Division III champion with a 23-2-2 record.

## Deaths

**Bill Lange**, an offensive guard with the Los Angeles Rams team that won the 1951 NFL championship, died of a heart attack April 5. He was 67. Lange played football at Dayton in the late 1940s. After a knee problem that forced an end to his six-year NFL career, Lange returned to Dayton and worked in the trucking industry.

**Rev. Michael J. Lavelle**, president at John Carroll and a former member of the NCAA Presidents Commission, died March 25 in East Cleveland, Ohio, at age 60. Lavelle never regained consciousness after he collapsed February 27 during a morning workout at the campus fitness center. Lavelle's career at John Carroll began in 1969, when he joined the staff as an assistant professor of economics. He became department chair in 1973 and dean of the School of Business in 1975. After service with the Detroit Province of the Society of Jesus, he returned to John Carroll in 1984 as academic vice-president. In 1988, he was appointed president of the university. Lavelle oversaw the school's move from the Presidents' Athletic Conference to the Ohio Athletic Conference.

**Harvey Penick**, head golf coach at Texas from 1931 to 1963 and a teacher of several prominent American golfers, died at his home April 2 after a lengthy illness. He was 90. Penick also served as head golf pro at an Austin country club for 48 years. He taught such professionals as **Ben Crenshaw** and **Tom Kite**, and wrote three books, including the best-selling sports book of all time, "Harvey Penick's Little Red Book."

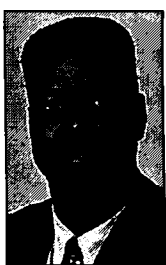

### NCAA Bylaw 15.3.5 Renewal of financial aid

NCAA institutions should note that in accordance with NCAA Bylaw 15.3.5.1, the renewal of institutional financial aid must be made on or before July 1 prior to the academic year in which it is to become effective. Institutions shall notify promptly in writing each student-athlete who has received an award the previous academic year for the ensuing academic year, whether the grant has been renewed or not renewed. Notification of financial aid renewals and nonrenewals must come from the institution's regular financial aid authority and not from the institution's athletics department.

In accordance with Bylaw 15.3.5.1.1, if the institution decides not to renew or decides to reduce financial aid for the ensuing academic year, the institution must inform the student-athlete that he or she, upon request, must be provided with a hearing before the institutional agency making the award. The institution must have established reasonable procedures for promptly hearing such a request and may not delegate the responsibility for conducting a nonrenewal hearing to the institution's athletics department or its faculty athletics committee. The decision to renew or not to renew the financial aid is left to the discretion of the institution to be determined in accordance with its normal practice for students generally. *Please note that with the adoption of the 1995 Convention Proposal No. 7, the notification and hearing opportunity required for the nonrenewal of institutional financial aid applies only to a student-athlete with eligibility remaining in the sport in which financial aid was awarded the previous academic year.*

Further, during its November 19, 1992, telephone conference, the NCAA Interpretations Committee determined that the reference to institutional financial aid set forth in Bylaw 15.3.5.1 refers only to institutional aid that is based in any degree on athletics ability. Thus, if a student-athlete is receiving institutional financial aid unrelated to athletics ability and such aid is reduced or not renewed for the ensuing academic year, the institution is not obligated to provide an opportunity for a hearing before the institutional agency making the award except as provided under institutional policy applicable to all students.

Finally, pursuant to Bylaw 15.5.1.5, if an institution does not renew financial aid for a counter in the subsequent year and a hearing before the institution's regular financial aid authority results in a successful appeal for restoration of aid, the student must continue to be a counter if the individual continues to receive athletically related financial aid. However, the student-athlete would not be a counter if he or she receives institutionally arranged or awarded, nonathletically related financial aid available to all students, provided such financial aid was granted or arranged without regard in any degree to athletics ability. If the student-athlete ever participates again in intercollegiate athletics at the institution, he or she would be considered to have been a counter during each year the financial aid was received.

### NCAA Bylaw 13.7.5.7 Meals on official visit — Divisions I and III

NCAA Divisions I and III institutions should note that meals provided for a prospect and the prospect's parents or legal guardians on an official visit must occur in the institution's regular, on-campus dining facilities. If all such dining facilities are closed, the institution may provide meals off campus. Further, meals provided to

prospects during official visits may include the following:

1. **Awards Banquet.** An institution may provide a meal to a prospect and the prospect's parents or legal guardians at an institutional awards banquet, provided the banquet occurs on the institution's campus.

2. **Meals Served at Other On-Campus Facility.** An institution may provide a meal prepared in an on-campus dining facility at an on-campus location other than the dining facility.

3. **Pregame or Postgame Meal or Snack.** An institution that provides a pregame or postgame meal or snack to its student-athletes as a benefit incidental to participation may provide that meal or snack to a prospect and the prospect's parents or legal guardians as one of the three permissible official-visit meals.

4. **Training Table.** An institution may provide a meal to a prospect at the institution's training table, provided the training table meal is on campus.

*Division I institutions should note that effective August 1, 1995, in all sports, the restriction on the location of official-visit meals will be eliminated. Thus, meals provided to prospects during an official visit may occur either on or off the member institution's campus, provided they occur within a 30-mile radius of the campus.*

## Zatechka, Ainsworth win Walter Byers Scholarships

### Nebraska, Kenyon stars each receive \$10,000 grants

Football player Robert B. Zatechka of the University of Nebraska, Lincoln, and swimmer Carla R. Ainsworth of Kenyon College are this year's choices to receive the Association's Walter Byers Scholarships.

Zatechka and Ainsworth each will receive a \$10,000 scholarship from the Association. They were selected from among eight finalists who were interviewed April 9 and 10 in St. Louis by the NCAA Walter Byers Scholarship Committee.

The Byers scholarships were established in 1988 to recognize the contributions of the former NCAA executive director by encouraging excellence in academic performance by student-athletes.

Award recipients are required to have at least a 3.500 grade-point average (4.000 scale), show evidence of superior character and leadership, and demonstrate that participation in athletics has been a positive influence on personal and intellectual development, among other qualifications.

Following is a look at this year's Byers scholars and their accomplishments:

#### Zatechka

Eight honoree, Zatechka was a two-year starter on an offensive line that helped Nebraska attain the wire-service national championships after the Cornhuskers defeated the University of Miami (Florida) in the 1995 Federal Express Orange Bowl.

Voted captain of this year's Cornhusker squad, Zatechka holds the school performance strength index record with 2,625 points. He ranked among Nebraska leaders in knock-down blocks and was a second-team all-Big Eight Conference selection.

Zatechka, who expects to attend medical school, graduated with high distinction last May with a 4.000 grade-point average in biological sciences. He earned a spot on the Hitachi/CFA Scholar-Athlete Team for the second consecutive year. Zatechka also was awarded an NCAA post-graduate scholarship last fall.

A frequent speaker at elementary and secondary schools, Zatechka also was a member of the NCAA Special Committee to Study a Division I-A Football

Championship and the Nebraska Student-Athlete Advisory Board.

#### Ainsworth

Ainsworth's performance during the 1995 NCAA Division III Women's Swimming and Diving Championships made her Kenyon's most successful female swimmer. She won three individual titles and participated on three winning relays to lead the Ladies to a 12th consecutive team title, the longest streak in NCAA women's sports.

Named swimmer of the meet for a third time, Ainsworth set records in the 50-, 100- and 200-yard freestyles and won the latter two races for the fourth consecutive year. Her time of 23.53 seconds in the 50-yard freestyle surpassed the previous best set by fellow Kenyon swimmer Patricia Abt in 1985.

Ainsworth's six titles during the 1995 championships gave her 25 career wins, topping Abt's 23 from 1984 through 1987.

Ainsworth, who plans on attending medical school next fall, has compiled a 3.720 grade-point average in chemistry and history and will graduate in May. Named 1994 GTE academic all-American of the year, she is president of the Kenyon senior class and a senior interviewer for the college's admissions department.

Ainsworth also is the musical director for the Owl Creek Singers, a women's cappella group.

## Six individuals receive Giant Steps Awards

The Center for the Study of Sport in Society at Northeastern University and the National Consortium for Academics and Sports has announced winners of the 1995 Giant Steps Awards.

The honorees are former collegiate and professional basketball star Kareem Abdul-Jabbar and Women's Sports Foundation Executive Director Donna Lopiano, for accomplishments as civic leaders; Geno Auriemma of the University of Connecticut and Marian Washington of the University of Kansas, for achievements as coaches; and Phillip Castillo of Adams State College and Tanya Hughes of the University of Arizona, for courage as student-athletes.

Giant Steps Awards are given annually in conjunction with National STUDENT-Athlete Day to individuals and organizations providing the support young people need to fully realize academic and athletics potential.

Abdul-Jabbar, who played on championship teams at the University of California, Los Angeles, and in the National Basketball Association, was cited specifically for "Kareem's Kids," the organization he established in 1989 to encourage the youth of Los Angeles to achieve dreams and overcome obstacles by obtaining a firm educational foundation.

Lopiano was honored as a pioneer in the pursuit of gender equity — as an athlete and coach, as director of athletics at the University of Texas at Austin, as president of the Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women and, most recently, as head of the Women's Sports Founda-

tion.

Auriemma, whose Connecticut team recently won the Division I Women's Basketball Championship, was honored as a male coach. Auriemma was cited not only for his coaching accomplishments but as an active figure in several regional and state charitable and educational foundations. For the past three years, he has chaired Why Me of New England, a fund-raising organization for breast cancer research.

Washington, the first woman to be elected president of the Black Coaches Association, was honored as a female coach. A player on a championship basketball team at West Chester University of Pennsylvania, Washington also was one of the first two Blacks selected for a U.S. women's national basketball team. She has led Kansas teams to several Division I Women's Basketball Championship appearances.

Castillo is a seven-time all-American runner at Adams State who coordinates a summer outreach program for Wings of America, a youth-development program for Native Americans based in Santa Fe, New Mexico. In that position, Castillo uses his running talent as a catalyst to inspire youth.

Hughes, a four-time Division I high-jump champion, was honored as 1994 NCAA Woman of the Year and also was honored as one of this year's NCAA Today's Top Eight. She recently was elected to serve as chair of the NCAA Student-Athlete Advisory Committee.
