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Congress hears from all sides on Title IX

WASHINGTON — A standing-only-room crowd jammed a House subcommittee hearing on Title IX May 9, providing evidence of widespread interest in whether Congress may choose to revisit that legislation.

Ten witnesses, including two members of Congress, testified before the House Subcommittee on Postsecondary Education, Training and Lifelong Learning, chaired by Rep. Howard McKeon, R-California.

Their testimony touched upon many of the arguments that

have been advanced on all sides of this issue in intercollegiate athletics in recent years.

Disagreement continues to surround these questions: What did Congress intend when it passed Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972? After Congress issued final regulations in 1979, did enforcement of the legislation generate unintended consequences? Does the U.S. Department of Education's Office for Civil Rights (OCR) effectively interpret and enforce the legislation as Congress intends?

But some general agreement also came out of the hearing: first, that Title IX has played an integral role in advancing the participation and interest of women in athletics at all levels since its passage; second, that elimination of sex discrimination in educational programs of any kind is an appropriate and morally correct mandate for educational institutions receiving Federal financial assistance; and third, that it is undesirable to increase opportunities for women by climinating opportunities for men.

Norma V. Cantu, U.S. assistant secretary for civil rights, defended the oft-discussed three-part Title IX athletics compliance test that her office is responsible for enforcing. Most notably, Cantu defended the OCR against criticisms that it

Executive Committee increases basketball, 'broad-based' funds

The value of the basketball and "broad-based" funds of the NCAA revenue-distribution plan were increased to \$40 million each by the NCAA Executive Committee at its May 2-4 meeting.

As a result of the change, Division I members will receive an additional \$8.5 million by the end of May to supplement the \$31.5 million basketball-fund distribution that was made April 21 under the previous terms of the plan.

In addition to the basketball-fund increase, the Executive Committee voted to increase the total of the sports-sponsorship and grants-inaid funds — the two "broad-based" funds — to \$40 million. Those funds will be distributed in August.

The \$17 million increase in the basketball and "broad-based" funds exceeds the growth of the Association's revenue from its contract with CBS for the 1994-95 fiscal year. The Association was to receive

\$151.9 million from CBS before the contract was renegotiated in December; after the contract was renegotiated, CBS' 1994-95 payment to the Association was \$166.2 million, an increase of \$14.3 million.

The changes were the result of a discussion of a long-term approach to revenue distribution. The Executive Committee agreed to several concepts in that regard:

- That the basketball and "broadbased" funds would be increased annually beginning in 1995-96 and the \$50 million, one-time-only payment to be received in January 1996 would be included in those two funds during the last five years of the contract. This approach will assist Division I institutions and conferences during the preparation of their annual budgets.
- Ways will be explored by which benefits for student-athletes can be further enhanced. The Executive Committee appointed a subcom-

mittee to develop specific ideas and recommendations for discussion at its August meeting.

- Academic-enhancement funds would be increased to \$50,000 per Division I institution, an amount that would be maintained through
- **■** Division I conference grants would be increased annually.
- The membership trust would be reestablished during the last five years of the contract, and the purposes of the trust would be reeval-
- Funds for Divisions II and III allocations would be determined as part of the membership restructuring process.
- Excess revenues likely will be available in future years. The Executive Committee will continue to consider supplemental distributions to Division I members as a top

Convention seating will be limited

For the first time, seating in the general business session of an NCAA Convention will be restricted because of a lack of space.

At its May 2-4 meeting, the NCAA Executive Committee approved a change in seating for the 1996 Convention that will limit nonvoting conferences, allied members and provisional members to one seat each. Other member institutions and conferences will have access to classroom seating for a


voting delegate and up to three alternates, provided one of the delegates is a senior woman administrator (as specified in the NCAA constitution).

Louis J. Spry, NCAA associate executive director and Convention manager, noted that attendance records have been set at the last two Conventions. Attendance at the event has quadrupled since 1967.

Assuming that attendance re-

mains at a similar level for the 1996 event, the Chantilly ballroom in the Wyndham Anatole hotel in Dallas will not be big enough to accommodate the 2,600 or more people who could be present at the general business session if no changes were made. The ballroom capacity at the Anatole is about 2,000 using classroom seating, about 2,150 adding seats around the perimeter.

Finances

Primary Division I funds increased to \$40 million

The basketball and "broad-based" funds of the NCAA revenue-distribution plan were increased to \$40 million each by the NCAA Executive Committee at its May 2-4 meeting.

The change means that Division I members will receive an additional \$8.5 million by the end of May to supplement the \$31.5 million basketball-fund distribution that was made April 21 under the previous terms of the

The changes were the result of an Executive Committee discussion of a long-term approach to revenue distribution. The Executive Committee agreed to several concepts that are described in a story on page 1 of this issue.

Title IX

Congressional subcommittee hears Title IX testimony

A number of witnesses on both sides of the issue on the application of Title IX testified May 9 before the U.S. House Subcommittee on Postsecondary Education, Training and Lifelong Learning.

A full report appears on page 1.

The NCAA did not testify but did provide a report that included the final report of the NCAA Gender-Equity Task Force, sports participation data, and a report on current revenues and expenses in intercollegiate athletics. It also included a description of the NCAA's efforts thus far to achieve gender equity, such as expansion of certain women's championships and the equalization of per diem granted to men and women studentathletes.

The Council agreed at its April 24-26 meeting that 1995 Convention Proposal No. 104, the current program, many of them as a re- which extended the moratorium on Nationsult of the Budget Subcommittee's meeting al Collegiate championships that had fallen

below the minimum required number of sponsors (40), was intended to apply both to National Collegiate and division champi-

The decision means that the National Collegiate Men's Gymnastics Championships, the Division II Men's Ice Hockey Championship and the Division II Men's Lacrosse Championship will be extended through at least the 1996-97 academic year.

The extension of the men's gymnastics championships was never in question since the proposal expressly applied to National Collegiate championships. However, the Council determined that remarks made during the Convention debate on the proposal could have left the impression that the intent was to extend all championships that did not meet the minimum sponsorship requirements.

Tragic bomb spurs goodwill

The closer one is — both figuratively and literally — to a catastrophe, the more the impact of that tragedy is felt. Hence, it stands to reason that the bombing of the Alfred P. Murrah Federal Building in downtown Oklahoma City would profoundly effect the University of Oklahoma and Oklahoma State University.

The Oklahoma campus is located in Norman, less than a half-hour drive from where the bombing occurred. Oklahoma State is about 60 miles northeast of the site, in Stillwater.

Cherylanne Whiteside, a senior golfer at Oklahoma State, was so touched by the tragedy that she organized a fund drive the day after the April 19 bombing. The effort involved about 75 student-athletes from Oklahoma State, said Ann Baer, assistant athletics director and senior woman administrator at Oklahoma State. Whiteside and her fellow athletes raised more than \$11,000 in just a day and a half. In addition, the athletes helped collect tons of bottled water and other essentials that rescue workers encouraged the public to donate.

"It was very fulfilling for them," Bacr said of the student-athletes' participation in the relief effort. "I think they were kind of drawn to it"


At Oklahoma, head football coach **Howard Schnellenberger** organized a May 4 blood drive to help replenish the American Red Cross' blood supply.

"The need is great so we invite coaches, staff members, athletes and immediate members of the athletics department family to join in this effort," Schnellenberger wrote in a memorandum to his athletics department colleagues.

Oklahoma men's basketball coach **Kelvin Sampson** got his players involved in the relief effort as well. He and his team visited the children's hospital in Oklahoma City where some of the smallest survivors of the bombing are recovering.

While relief efforts were being organized at the two Oklahoma schools, the University of Arkansas, Fayetteville, was mourning the loss of one of its former football players.

Mickey Maroney, who lettered in 1965 and 1966 under then-head coach and current athletics director J. Frank Broyles at Arkansas, was an agent for the Federal Bureau of Investigation when he was killed in

Easy outs

First basemen generally are one of the most active defensive players in baseball. Numerous infield grounders and bunts usually make for a busy ballgame for a first baseman.

But that was not the case recently for Tom Blake, who plays first for Long Island University-C. W. Post Campus. Blake went an entire seven-inning game against Troy State University April 29 without recording a

single put-out.

Blake's teammate, **Matt Gervasio**, was on the mound and struck out 13 opponents. Two fly-outs were recorded by outfielders and three pop-outs were registered by other infielders. A force out at second base, a runner caught stealing and a batter called out when his bunt hit him outside of the batter's box completed the 21 outs LIU-C. W. Post collected in its 3-0 victory.

The only defensive action for Blake was an assist, when he threw a runner out in a force at second

Ice hockey gears up for Centennial Celebration

The nation's college ice hockey community is getting set to celebrate a century of competition with a Centennial Celebration during the 1995-96

The celebration will be spearheaded by the American Hockey Coaches Association (AHCA), with cooperation from the nation's college ice hockey conferences and institutions.

"The centennial will give everyone involved in college hockey a chance to celebrate our great game by looking back and embracing our history as well as looking ahead at the greatness we have yet to reach," said Joe Bertagna, AHCA executive director. The first collegiate hockey game was played February 14, 1896, between Yale University and Johns Hopkins University. Yale won, 2-1.

Throughout the 1890s, a number of collegiate teams played games against American and Canadian amateur teams. In some cases, schools were making the transition from the rules of ice polo to those of ice hockey.

Among other schools nurturing programs during this time were the University of Minnesota, Twin Cities; Brown University; and Harvard University. The longest continuing rivalry among these pioneers appears to be the Harvard-Brown series; Brown won the first meeting, 6-0, in Boston in 1898.

Eating disorders demand awareness

My mind ached and screamed excruciatingly with the thoughts:

"Robyn, you lost weight. I bet you run faster."

"Sarah is 5-foot-4, 105 pounds, so since you're 5-6, you should be 115 pounds."

"She's a bigger runner, Robyn, kinda like you."

"Boy, Robyn, it looks like you've lost about 20 pounds."

"She's got big hips, Robyn, kinda like you."
"Robyn, in high school you had the mind
of a distance runner. Now you've got the body
to go with it."

I'm FAT!

The race was about to begin. I looked down the line and automatically placed myself slower than all the girls who were thinner than me. My thighs are so big. Why do I have to be so large? I know I could run faster if only I were thinner.

Thinner I got...only I became too thin.

My name is Robyn Slate Doloughan. I am a recovering bulimic, anorexic and compulsive exerciser. Life today is a miracle. Every day, I thank God for putting concerned coaches, athletics trainers, doctors, friends and parents in my life.

My life was track. Track was my life. In high school, I lost weight and suddenly ran faster. I associated weight loss with running faster. I attended a cross country camp where one of the coaches said, "Robyn, you've lost weight, I bet you run faster." That year, I won state in cross country and the 3,200-meter in track. Suddenly there were phone calls from coaches across the nation. It was a dream. A smalltown girl with the world at her hands. Little did I know that I was in its terrible grasp.

I started practicing my eating disorder in high school and continued through college. Along with practicing my eating disorder, I would exercise compulsively outside of practice. I was a perfectionist with almost a 4.000 grade-point average.

Yet success in athletics and school was never good enough. I went to outpatient treatment and was put on medication because I had damaged my esophageal sphincter due to excessive purging. I also was put on medicine because my doctors feared I was having heart

Programs should strive for balance

Henry J. Copeland, who will complete an 18-year career as president at the College of Wooster at the end of this academic year, recently reflected on changes in intercollegiate athletics during his tenure. The following is an excerpt from his article, which appeared in The Intercollegiate Athletic Forum.

Where the competitive balance among our colleges was once relatively even, exhibiting gentle ebbs and flows, it is the case that individual programs at particular colleges now dominate the scene, and I believe that the gap between the "haves" and the "have nots" in some sports is both wider and more persistent than before.

Why is this so? Often it begins when a new coach arrives and invigorates a particular sport, creating enthusiasm and building a winning team. Soon the administration is asked to make a few concessions to help that coach continue the upward climb. While these concessions are undoubtedly smaller than those made by our Division I peers in similar situations, they are concessions nonetheless, and they are designed to retain the successful coach. The program's success means more participants. So assistant coaches are appointed, and the budget is increased.

Meantime, the competition between institutions on a general level is moving

forward as well. In order to compete for the student-athletes who will keep the program successful, we build field houses, new tracks, well-appointed weight and training rooms, and more attractive stadiums. We strive to make our schedules more appealing, sending our teams to Florida during spring break so that prospective students will see that we are committed to a program of quality. We appoint additional trainers, equipment managers and support staff of various descriptions. Dominant programs rise above the pack, fueled by charismatic coaches who are able to deliver athletes for their sports.

In terms of investments made, each school can afford to focus on only three or four sports. While some have 12 football coaches, others have only seven. Some use a part-time coach for a sport; others use a full-time coach and an assistant for the same sport. The competitive balance disappears, and in some sports, the risk of physical injury increases.

Another result of the growth of dominant sports is an increasing specialization among student-athletes. Whether this trend filters down from above or percolates up from the high schools is difficult to determine, but the two- or three- or even four-sport letter winner, a common figure on our campuses in the 1950s, is all but extinct. Today, it is difficult, if not impossible, for a student to compete successfully in more than one sport, let alone in two or three.

Moreover, the demands placed on athletes to improve themselves have removed the concept of seasons in some of our sports. Participants in spring sports will be training throughout the fall and winter even though the season is not until spring. The practice of split seasons is growing, and several sports have become virtually a year-round commitment.

Thus, over the past two decades, we have sought to eliminate the distinctions between major and minor sports and to establish equality between men's and women's athletics. And in many respects, these efforts to provide equivalent opportunities for men and women in a full range of sports have been successful. At the same time, we have seen an increasing specialization among colleges and among athletes in particular sports. And specialization has ironically resulted in fewer competitive opportunities for a number of participants in several sports, canceling out at least some of the successful results achieved through the expansion of our athletics programs.

The jury is still out as to whether a balance can be achieved that will, in the long run, be in the interests of both the student-athletes and our institutions.

Title IX debate is a matter of interest

Discussing the decision in the Cohen v. Brown Title IX case:

"The possibility dismissed by the judge and the Title IX militants is that the numbers reflect differing tastes. No one thinks that discrimination explains why fewer men than women participate in ballet or drama. But the assumption is that if fewer women than men play varsity sports, only unfairness can account for the gap.

"In fact, for better or worse, young women are generally less interested in sports than young men. Despite the expansion of girls' athletics in recent decades, high-school boys are 64 percent more likely to play organized sports than girls. Fitness activities and pickup games are also less popular among teenage females than males.

"Of girls who apply to Brown University, only about 43 percent indicate an interest in athletics. In the university's intramural sports, which take all comers, eight times as many males take part as females. Several women's varsity teams at Brown have vacant slots, while the men's teams are oversubscribed.

"Plenty of young females are devoted to athletics, and the expansion of options for them over the past generation has been a thoroughly commendable change. But the chief goal should be assuring a chance for those who want to play — not reinforcing quotas in participation rates.

"If men are more inclined to these pursuits than women, there is nothing wrong with an imbalance in numbers — just as there is nothing wrong with an excess of women in the English department or a glut of men in engineering. What has taken place at Brown is plainly the result of women and men making different choices of their own free will.

"The judge and the law take for granted that America's colleges are run by reactionary males who will address the needs of women only if they have a hammer hanging over their heads. In fact, there are powerful ideological pressures in academe to assure that females are treated at least as well as men—not to mention business pressures to avoid alienating a huge pool of applicants.

"The court's decision is based on the fallacy that the surest proof of fair treatment is statistical parity. This is the kind of thinking that has doomed racial preferences with the American people, who know that equal treatment doesn't necessarily produce equal results. Title IX has enjoyed public acceptance because it is seen as a way to assure opportunity. Once it becomes a machine for dictating outcomes, its days are numbered."

"To me, as a professional (and a mother) who has devoted a 25-year career in fostering opportunities in athletics for girls and women, what is appalling is the lack of opportunity in the intercollegiate athletics program. Women are denied proportional opportunity to participate on intercollegiate teams. Colleges and universities are finally accountable. Lack of money is no excuse.

"What daughters, their mothers (and fathers) should do is examine the athletics programs on campuses. Ask why there is no varsity softball (or crew or field hockey or golf) when interested and skilled female students could and would participate if the opportunity were available. Work within the system. A cooperative attitude on both sides is essential.

"Perception is reality, and if we perceive there are no women's sports because we don't read about them in the paper, that is reality. More coverage would help change this perception."

"With more than 18,000 in attendance in Minneapolis each day, a new standard has been set for successful Women's Final Fours. The crowds were real, not just tickets sold early thanks to local business support.

"Contrast that to the two-day turnout of 15,796 just four years ago when the Final Four was played at Lakefront Arena (in New Orleans). 'We've sold out this tournament a couple of times before, but there have always been a lot of no-shows for the championship game,' said NCAA Executive Director Cedric Dempsey. 'I saw very few empty seats this time.'

"Although certainly nowhere near the level of its men's counterpart, competition for future Women's Final Fours has gotten intense. At least 18 cites are in the running for the 1999 and 2000 Final Fours, three times the number that bid for this year's."

problems. Suddenly, I decided to stop purging and began to starve. I lost 20 pounds in four months, 20 pounds I did not need to lose. It was then, with the support of family and friends, that I went to treatment at a facility called Shades of Hope in Buffalo Gap, Texas.

It was not an easy road. Yet my coach, Scott Loreck, the women's track coach at the University of Idaho, supported my decision. Not all coaches would have been so supportive. Through my nine-week stay in Texas, Scott supported the decision I had made.

This is my concern: So many times, I have heard coaches say to athletes that they need to lose weight. I feel fortunate that pressure was not put on me directly by my coach. The sad thing is, often coaches are so into winning, they forget how impressionable young athletes are. What they are often unaware of is that by having an athlete lose weight, or by commenting on their weight or what an athlete is eating, it might set them up for an eating disorder or encourage them indirectly to continue their unhealthy behavior.


When I read an article about a tennis player with a similar problem, my heart went out to her. It is a vicious cycle, one that most athletes can't escape without professional help. For me, recovery meant staying away from running for two years.

Today, I am fortunate to be running again. Mike Keller, Idaho's men's track coach, and Kienan Slate are coaching me. They never comment on my weight or what I eat. I am an athlete. They are my coaches, not my therapist, not my dietitian, not my doctor.

Coaches, please remember, eating disorders are life-threatening. What you say directly or indirectly affects your athletes. Your athletes might win a race today, but it's definitely not worth it if they die prematurely.

There is hope. Please, help them recover. Support their decisions for health, not their decision for disease.

Division I Women's Softball

UCLA, Arizona share the favorite's role

Event: 1995 Division I Women's Softball Championship.

Overview: It should come as no surprise to women's softball followers that Arizona or UCLA has held the No. 1 ranking in every softball poll this season. The Wildcats and Bruins have combined to win the last seven Women's College World Series titles....UCLA enters the end-of-the-season stretch outhitting its opponents, .359 to .183. The Bruins have four starters batting over .400. Jennifer Brundage leads the way with a .492 average in 42 starts. The senior third baseman is first in runs scored and home runs. The Bruin pitching staff has a combined earned-run average of 0.97, while opponent pitchers are not having success against UCLA hitters, recording an ERA of 6.36....Three of defending champion Arizona's four losses are to UCLA. The Wildcats rolled off 27 wins to start the season before falling to the Bruins. Seniors Amy Chellevold and Laura Espinoza and junior Leah O'Brien return to form the nucleus of the Wildcat offensive attack. All three are hitting better than .400. Chellevold leads the way with a .452 average. Three Wildcats have reached double figures in home run production. Espinoza has 32, while Jenny Dalton and Leah Braatz have 26 and 18, respectively. The Wildcats are outscoring opponents, 492-94....A relative newcomer to championship contention is Michigan. The Wolverines have been to the tournament two of the last three years and rank seventh in the latest top-25 poll. Freshman Sara Griffin leads Michigan at the plate with a .409 average. She is the team leader in runs scored and hits as well as one of the Wolverines' top pitchers, with an ERA of 1.51 in 19 games. As a team, Michigan is a threat to run. First baseman Michelle Silver is 12 of 14 in stolen-base attempts.

Field: The Division I Women's Softball Championship provides for a field of 32 teams. Four teams will participate in each of eight regionals in a double-elimination format. Winners of the eight regionals will advance to the Women's College World Series. Ten conferences have been granted automatic qualification. In addition, 12 conferences will compete for six play-in berths. The remaining teams will be selected at large.

Dates and sites: Selection of the 32-team bracket will be completed by May 14. Regional

competition will be May 19-20 or 20-21 at on-campus sites. The eight-team Women's College World Series will be May 25-29 at the Amateur Softball Association's Hall of Fame Stadium in Oklahoma City.

Results: Scores from regional competition will be published in the May 24 issue of The NCAA News. Results from the finals will appear in the May 31 issue of the News.

Championship notes: Softball sponsorship numbers indicate the sport is steadily being added to college athletics programs. When women's championships were added under the NCAA umbrella in 1982, 51.8 percent of all NCAA member schools in Division I fielded a softball team. In 1995, there are 194 Division I members sponsoring a varsity-level softball team — 64.7 percent of the total number of Division I schools.


Newcomer has hold on top ranking

Event: 1995 Division II Baseball Championship.

Overview: Top-ranked Kennesaw State (37-12) is looking to finish its first year in Division II the same way it finished its last year in the NAIA — with a championship. The Owls, who have clinched the Peach Belt Athletic Conference's regularseason championship, rely on a deep and talented pitching staff. Senior left-hander Chris McKnight is 11-0 with a 1.89 earned-run average, while Todd Kirby (2.63 ERA), most outstanding player in last year's NAIA tournament, is the top relief pitcher. Catcher Ryan Coe is the team's leader and leading hitter (.462 average) with nine home runs and 61 runs batted in....Perennial tournament participant Florida Southern (39-9) features catcher Brian Bridges and first baseman James Vida. Bridges leads the team with a .402 average, along with 42 RBIs, 22 doubles and 18 stolen bases. Vida is hitting .401 with 12 home runs and 76 RBIs on 79 hits. Meanwhile, junior righthander Brett Tomko (10-2, 1.63 ERA, 110 strikeouts) is on a strikeout roll; he has 44 in his last four starts - all complete games....UC Riverside (34-13) is looking to make its ninth appearance in the tournament and is in search of its third national title. The Highlanders have won 22 of their last 25 games, including career victory 800 for coach Jack Smitheran. UC Riverside has two fine starting pitchers — Mike Eason (8-3, 2.82 ERA, three complete games) and Grant Billingsley (6-2, 2.62) — and an outstanding closer in Scott Tebbetts (4-1, 2.16, eight saves). Right-fielder Andy Owen, an all-American last year, is hitting 398 with six home runs and 41 runs batted in....Other contenders include defending champion Central Missouri State, Delta State, Missouri Southern State, North Alabama,

Division III Baseball


Wisconsin-Oshkosh still the team to beat

Event: 1995 Division III Baseball Championship.

Overview: Defending champion and top-ranked Wisconsin-Oshkosh (25-3) is one of the favorites again this year. The Titans are led by shortstop Tim Jorgensen, the 1994 Division III player of the year, who set the NCAA Division III single-season home run record April 29 when he hit his 26th home run. Jorgensen is hitting .465 with 81 runs batted in and 50 runs scored. Pitchers Kevin Mlodik and Jarrod Washburn lead a pitching staff that has a 3.48 earned-run average and 10 shutouts. Mlodik is 7-1 with a 1.52 ERA and two shutouts. Washburn, who had 17 strikeouts earlier this year vs. Wisconsin-Whitewater, is 4-1 with a 2.12 ERA and one shutout.... Marietta coach Don Schaly, who is striving for a fourth national title, is only seven wins shy of career victory No. 1,100. The Pioneers clinched their conference regular-season championship and will play for a sixth consecutive conference tournament championship. Strong defense and outstanding pitching have catapulted the Pioneers to a No. 2 ranking nationally. Chad Farmer (8-2, 2.44) and Dave Bertolino (8-1, 2.82) are the top pitchers, while first baseman Joe Thomas (.444, four home runs, 48 runs batted in) and center fielder Toby Shamblin (.429, four HRs, 50 RBIs) lead the offense....William Paterson (26-4) is a team getting hot at the right time and a team nobody wants to play. The Pioneers have won eight straight games and are averaging 11.2 runs per game. The pitching rotation of Mat Vanderbush (4-1, 2.62, two saves), Rob Slomkowski (5-0, 2.68) and Matt Ramagli (5-1, 4.70) is William Paterson's best since its 1992 championship team....Other contending teams include La Verne, North Carolina Wesleyan, Carthage, Ithaca and Eastern Connecticut State.

Field: A maximum of 32 teams will be selected at large to compete in the championship.

UCLA sweeps Penn State and brings I men's volleyball title back to West Coast

UCLA avenged a 1994 championship-match loss to Penn State with a three-game sweep over the Nittany Lions in this year's National Collegiate Men's Volleyball Championship May 6 in Springfield, Massachusetts.

The 15-3, 15-10, 15-10 victory earned the 15th title overall for the Bruins and capped a 31-1 season in which UCLA was top-ranked throughout.

Penn State, which became the first non-California titlist in championship history with last year's upset of the Bruins, was denied a second crown by a stingy UCLA defense and a senior scoring trio headed by Jeff Nygaard, who was named the tournament's most outstanding player for the second time in his career. The Bruins held Penn State to a .133 hitting percentage in the first game and did not allow the Nittany Lions to recover.

"We're a team that all year long — whenever we had to do the job — we could dig deep and find something in a hidden reservoir," said first-year Penn State coach Mark Pavlik. "Tonight it just wasn't there. The shovels were digging — they just weren't hitting oil. UCLA is just so darn tough to score on."

Bruin coach Al Scates, the most victorious coach in men's volleyball history, credited his team's ability to shrug off the season-long pressure after last year's upset defeat.

"Tonight my job was easy because all six starters played very well," Scates said. "I felt a little pressure because these guys are so good — I figured if we lost, it would be my fault."

The Bruins took control of the championship match early and continually throttled Penn State at

the net Nygaard and fellow seniors Kevin Wong and Erik Sullivan combined for 39 kills in the three games.

"Kevin helped us get out to a big lead with his jump serves," Scates said. "Erik did a great job passing all night long and Jeff did his usual all-around game of hitting and blocking — he even had 11 digs for us tonight.

"This is one of the better teams we've had. I'm not going to compare it with others, but it's a very good team. I felt we should win if I did my job because this team has worked very hard all season."

The Bruins had to fight off more than one demon during the championship. Not only was the 1994 loss to Penn State hanging over them, but the Bruins' semifinal foe — Ball State — was the only team that had beaten UCLA in 1995, and the loss came in Springfield to boot.

UCLA, however, dispatched the Cardinals in three games, 15-12, 15-9, 15-10.

"The first match we played against them was a nightmare all the way around," said Bruin fifth-

year senior John Speraw. "We didn't react well to the conditions, but this time we started out on top and everything worked out well."

Penn State advanced to the title match with a marathon win over Hawaii, which made its first tournament appearance. Sophomore Ivan Contreras pounded out 37 kills in 59 attempts to rally the Nittany Lions to a 7-15, 15-13, 16-14, 6-15, 15-12 victory.


"We knew coming in that this was going to be a real side-out war," Pavlik said. "This was a match that shows what NCAA competition is all about."

Contreras earned a spot on the all-tournament team along with UCLA's Nygaard, Speraw and setter Stein Metzger. Ball State's Todd Reimer, who recorded 25 kills in a four-game win over Hawaii in the third-place match, also was selected, along with the Rainbows' Yuval Katz

Ball State won the third-place match, 15-6, 10-15, 15-13, 15-8.

Banana Slugs lead powerful trio in search of team title

Event: 1995 Division III Men's Tennis Championships.

Overview: UC Santa Cruz, Washington (Maryland) and Kalamazoo are the nation's Nos. 1-, 2- and 3-ranked teams, respectively. UC Santa Cruz, runner-up five of the last seven years, is looking to end a five-year title drought, and appears set to return to the courts where it won its only previous Division III victory (in 1989) — at Kalamazoo. The Banana Slugs, fourth a year ago, are led by juniors Jonathan Harper and Josh Vining and sophomore Noah Rippner....Washington, the defending champion, is vying to become only the third team to win consecutive titles. The Sho'men, who sport a 17-2 dual-match record, are led by Robin Sander, the nation's No. 1ranked singles player, and Damian Polla and Miroslav Beran. Beran, the squad's No. 3 singles player, has dropped only one of 12 singles matches....Kalamazoo, serving as host for a championships-record fourth time, has won three of the last four team titles. The Hornets are led by Pat Noud, Jason McKinney and Ryan Kaltenbach. Noud, who is questionable for the championships due to injury, has posted a 16-7 singles record, while McKinney and Kaltenbach have combined for a 34-11 mark....Other title contenders include Emory, Trinity (Texas) and Williams. Emory and Trinity, in search of their first team titles, feature seniors Travis Saacke and Brian Bethea, respectively.

Field: The team-championship field will include 12

teams; 64 singles players and 32 doubles teams will make up the individual-championships fields. Two teams from each of four regions (East, Midwest, South, West) will receive automatic berths; the remaining four teams will be selected at large. The individual-championships field will include three singles players and two doubles teams from teams seeded Nos. 1 through 4; three singles players and one doubles team from teams seeded Nos. 5 through 8; and two singles players and one doubles team from teams seeded Nos. 9 through 12. The remaining 32 singles players and 16 doubles teams will be selected at large.

Dates and site: Kalamazoo will serve as host for the championships May 15-22. The team championship will be May 15-18 and the individual championships will be May 19-22.

Results: Championships results will appear in the May 24 issue of The NCAA News.

Championships notes: The Banana Slugs' Harper and Rippner are the nation's No. 1-ranked doubles tandem. Harper teamed with Ron Ward to win the 1994 doubles crown....Sander and Polla, doubles runners-up last year, are ranked No. 2 nationally....Washington's Sander, Polla and Beran have combined for a 30-6 singles record....One of the Sho'men's two losses came March 17 against the Banana Slugs, 5-2, at Santa Cruz.

Rate of head injuries increases in ice hockey

Head injuries, primarily concussions, are on the rise in men's ice hockey, according to a report on injuries in winter sports from the NCAA's Injury Surveillance System (ISS).

This ice hockey season's game injury rate was similar to that of the previous year and higher than the nine-year average. The practice injury rate, however, remains one of the lowest of the 16 sports monitored by the ISS. Knee and shoulder injuries, as in the past, are the most common. Approximately onethird of the reported injuries required at least a one-week time loss.

Women's basketball rates dropped in both practices and games, compared to last season; however, the practice injury rate of 5.1 injuries/1,000 athlete-exposures (A-E) remained higher than the seven-year average. The game injury rate also was above the seven-year average (9.4).

Ankle, knee and foot injuries were the most common in that sport. Of the injuries reported, 29 percent restricted or prevented participation for at least seven days. For the sixth consecutive year, women players had an anterior cruciate injury rate that was almost three times that of their male coun-

Men's basketball practice and game injury rates were consistent with the sport's sevenyear average, with ankle and knee injuries occurring most frequently. Approximately 23 percent of reported injuries resulted in time loss of a week or more.

Practice injury rates for wrestling were similar to the 10-year average; match injury rates were lower. Knees (18 percent), shoulders (11 percent) and ankles (seven percent) were the most common body parts injured. Skin infections, which are not monitored in any of the other sports, accounted for more than 20 percent of all time-loss occurrences. Of the injuries reported, 38 percent resulted in time loss of at least a week.

Men's gymnastics injury rates were similar

to the nine-year averages. The most common injuries were those to the ankle, shoulder and lower back. One-third of the reported injuries from last season resulted in restricted or no participation for more than seven days.

Women's gymnastics showed a general trend of increasing practice injury rates and decreasing match injury rates. Knee, ankle and lower back injuries were the most common. Thirty-seven percent of the reported 1994 injuries resulted in restricted or no participation for more than seven days.

Base line of data

The survey, which is conducted as part of the ISS, provides a base line of injury data from a national sampling.

Although the information gathered is meaningful in its own right, researchers should use caution when comparing the results with injury data from other studies, since no common definition of injury, measure of severity or evaluation of exposure exists. The information, therefore, must be evaluated under the specific definitions and methodology outlined for the ISS.

The ISS was developed in 1982 to provide current and reliable data on injury trends in intercollegiate athletics. Data are collected yearly from a representative sample of member institutions and the resulting data summaries are reviewed by the NCAA Committee on Competitive Safeguards and Medical Aspects of Sports. The committee's goal is to reduce injuries through suggested changes in rules, protective equipment or coaching techniques based on data provided by the


Exposure and injury data were submitted weekly by athletics trainers from institutions selected to represent a cross-section of NCAA membership. The cross-section was based on



Basketball postgraduate scholarship winners named

Twenty-eight basketball players — 14 men and 14 women — at NCAA member institutions have been awarded postgraduate scholarships of \$5,000 each.

Of the 28 scholarships, 10 were awarded to Division I student-athletes, 10 to student-athletes in Divisions II and III, and the remaining eight at large.

In addition to the basketball scholarships, 29 awards have been presented during this academic year to student-athletes in football, and 97 awards (34 for men and 63 for women) will be given to student-athletes in other sports in which the NCAA conducts championships competition. A total of 154 such scholarships are awarded annually by the Association

To qualify, a student-athlete must maintain a minimum grade-point average of 3.000 (4.000 scale) or its equivalent and must have performed with distinction as a member of the varsity team in the sport in which the student-athlete was nominated.

The student-athlete also must intend to continue academic work beyond the baccalaureate degree as a full-time graduate student. In addition, the student-athlete must have behaved, both on and off the field, in a manner that has brought credit to the student-athlete, the institution and intercollegiate athletics.

Following are the accomplishments of the 1994-95 NCAA postgraduate scholarship winners in basketball:

Men's Division I

John Ekwugha Amaechi (Pennsylvania State University, 3.240 grade-point average in psychology) Amacchi was named the 1995 men's basketball GTE academic all-American of the year in the university division. His on-court accomplishments include being ranked among Penn State's all-time leading scorers and rebounders and having led this year's Nittany Lion squad to the semifinals of the National Invitation Tournament. He was named Penn State's most improved player in 1993 and most valuable player in 1994. He has been a Special Olympics volunteer, a spokesperson for the Big Brother/Big Sister program and president of the National Alcohol Awareness Program, Amaechi, a three-time GTE academic all-American, plans to focus his postgraduate studies on child-clinical psychology at Penn State.

Duncan Scott Highmark (St. Louis University, 3.600 grade-point average in marketing) — Highmark played a major role in the Billikens' resurgence as a basketball power after a 5-23 season in 1991-92. He was named team captain the following year, during which St. Louis improved to 12-17. Highmark then helped lead the Billikens to two straight NGAA tournament appearances. He has started in 105 of 107 career games and has scored more than 1,500 points. A first-team GTE academic all-American in 1995, Highmark also is a four-time Great Midwest Conference all-academic selection. He plans to begin work on a master's degree in business administration at St. Louis next fall.

Jeremy Matthew Lake (University of Montana, 3.860 grade-point average in biology) — Lake has established several school and Big Sky Conference records, including marks for career three-point field goals, single-season free-throw percentage and single-season three-point field-goal percentage. His three-point percentage hovered near 50 percent this year as the Grizzlies advanced to the National Invitation Tournament. He is a 1995 second-team GTE academic all-American and a four-time Big Sky all-academic choice. After being named Montana's Allan Nielsen Award winner in 1995, Lake plans to attend medical school at Washington University (Missouri) next fall.

Pearce Armstrong Landry (University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill, 3.830 grade-point average in biology) — A Tar Heel cocaptain this season, Landry was a top reserve on a squad that advanced to an NCAA tournament regional final. Landry is regarded as a top defender and also contributed three-point accuracy in logging key minutes for the nationally ranked Tar Heels. Landry came to North Carolina as a Morehead Scholar, the most distinguished scholarship offered to an undergraduate. A three-time member of the Atlantic Goast Conference honor roll, Landry will begin work on a master's degree in business administration in fall 1996.

Jiri (George) Zidek (University of California, Los Angeles, 3.768 grade-point average in economics) — The starting center for the national-champion Bruins, Zidek was UGLA's fourth leading scorer and third leading rebounder. He led the Bruins in field-goal percentage and logged a career-high 25 points in a game this year against the University of California, Berkeley, Zidek is a 1995 first-team GTE academic all-American and a 1995 NACDA/Disney Scholar-Athlete Award nominee. He also is a two-time Pacific-10 Conference all-academic selection. He plans to attend either law or business school at UCLA after graduation.

Men's Divisions II and III

Blades

Jamie Christopher Harless (Kenyon College, 3.480 grade-point average in English) — Harless averaged nearly 20 points and four rebounds per game in helping Kenyon advance to the Division III Midwest sectional this year. Harless' 1995 numbers boosted his career totals to more than 1,800 points, ranking him among the leaders in school history. He holds or shares four North Coast Athletic Conference records, including most three-point field goals made in a game (nine) and most three-point field goals made in a scason (96). Harless, a three-time all-NCAC performer, also is a 1995 second-team GTE academic all-American. He plans to pursue a master's degree in English beginning next fall.

Scott Egan Meech (College of Wooster, 3.507 grade-point average in mathematics) — Meech has helped lead Wooster to three Division III tournaments and two North Coast Athletic Conference regular-season championships during his four-year tenure. A starting forward averaging 14 points and six rebounds per game, Meech also holds the school record for field-goal accuracy for a season and is sixth on Wooster's all-time scoring chart. He is a two-time all-NCAC selection and was named Wooster's most valuable player in 1994. Meech presently is earning his certificate to teach middle school or high-school mathematics. He plans to continue postgraduate work in education.

David Allen Otte (Simpson College, 3.597 gradepoint average in management) — Otte is the recipient of the 1995 Barborka Award, given to the Simpson senior student-athlete who has demonstrated outstanding commitment and leadership on campus and in the community. He finished the season ranked second in Division III in scoring and field-goal percentage and helped lead Simpson to an Iowa Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (IIAC) cochampionship and a berth in the Division III tournament. He scored a school-record 57 points in Simpson's 167-148 victory over Grinnell College. Named the IIAC's most valuable player, Otte also was recognized as a 1995 second-team GTE academic all-American. He plans to pursue a master's degree in business administration beginning next fall.

John Michael Tauer [University of St. Thomas (Minnesota), 3.745 grade-point average in psychology] — The most prolific three-point scorer in school history, Tauer has scored more than 200 three-point field goals during his career, which also ranks second in Minnesota Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (MIAC) annals. In the past four years, he has helped lead the Tommies to four MIAC titles and four Division III tournament berths, including an appearance in the 1994 semifinals. A two-time all-MIAC performer, Tauer also is a 1995 second-team GTE academic all-American. Tauer plans to study social psychology in graduate school.

Justin Jay Wilkins (Nebraska Wesleyan University, 3.920 grade-point average in elementary and special education) — The starting center for Nebraska Wesleyan, Wilkins averaged more than 15 points and nine rebounds per game in leading the Plainsmen to a borth in this year's Division III tournament. Wilkins' 68.8 field-goal percentage was tops in Division III. He also established school marks in career field-goal accuracy and rebounds. A first-team CTE academic all-American, Wilkins plans to pursue a postgraduate degree in educational administration.

Men's at large

Wesley Wyatt Cooper (U.S. Naval Academy, 3.200 grade-point average in economics) — Cooper finished the season among Patriot League leaders in field-goal shooting and was selected to the 1995 all-Patriot League team. A team captain this year, Cooper started every game and averaged more than 13 points

and seven rebounds per contest. Cooper is a conduct and security officer in his military company of 120 midshipmen and is one of two students on the sub-committee on equity for NCAA certification at Navy. Cooper will pursue a postgraduate degree in business administration or management.

Nathan Alan Frank [Wheaton College (Illinois), 3.790 grade-point average in communications] — Frank is among school leaders in scoring with more than 1,400 career points. He also ranks high in career rebounds, free throws and assists. He has led the Crusaders in rebounding for four years. His offensive proficiency helped the Crusaders carn their first Division III tournament berth since 1959-60. He is a two-time all-College Conference of Illinois and Wisconsin selection and a 1995 second-team GTE academic all-American. Frank will further his studies in communication in graduate school.

Marc A. Molinsky (Boston College, 3.211 grade-point average in accounting) — A top perimeter shooting threat for the Golden Eagles, Molinsky's average from three-point range hovered near 50 percent all season. He also was nearly automatic from the free-throw stripe, connecting on 88 percent of his career attempts. A three-time winner of Boston College's Basketball Scholar Award, Molinsky also earned recognition as Big East Conference Student-Athlete of the Year. He also was a member of the People-to-People All-Star Basketball Team, which toured Europe in summer 1993 and played against top national teams. Molinsky will work for an accounting firm while earning his CPA before he begins post-graduate work in law or business.

Adam Christopher Peakes (Rice University, 3.450 grade-point average in political science and managerial studies) — Peakes has been a team leader in several statistical categories throughout his career, including rebounding, assists and free-throw percentage. Named the team's most improved player in 1991-92, Peakes finished his career ranked in the top 10 in 13 categories at Rice, A 1995 second-team GTE academic all-American, Peakes also is a three-time Southwest Conference all-academic selection. Pending a career in professional basketball, Peakes plans to work for an investment banking firm before beginning postgraduate study in business.

Men's alternates

Joseph Christopher Levesque, Massachusetts Institute of Technology; Craig Michael Marshall, University of California, Riverside; Kevin William Barker, Stephen F. Austin State University; Gregg Chodkowski, Maríst College; Alan Lybrooks Henderson, Indiana University, Bloomington.

Women's Division I

Amy Marie Burnett (University of Wyoming, 3.833 grade-point average in elementary and special education) — The 1994 Western Athletic Conference player of the year, Burnett holds conference records in career points, free throws, free-throw percentage, field-goal percentage and rebounds in a season. She also holds eight school season and career marks. Burnett is a three-time all-WAC selection and a 1995 first-team GTE academic all-American. Burnett plans to teach for two or three years before beginning post-graduate study in elementary education.

Dana Demark Drew (University of Toledo, 3.895 grade-point average in political science) — Drew finished her career as Toledo's all-time leading scorer with 1,904 points, which also ranks her fifth in Mid-American Athletic Conference (MAC) history. She became the MAC tournament's most valuable player for the third straight year after hitting a three-point shot in this year's championship game and sending it into overtime. Toledo eventually won to clinch an NCAA tournament both. Drew is a 1995 first-team

GTE academic all-American and recipient of Toledo's outstanding scholar-athlete award. A two-time MAC player of the year, Drew already has begun work at Toledo on a master's degree in political science.

Dawn K. Johnson (Seton Hall University, 3.665 grade-point average in social work) — Johnson is the only player in Seton Hall history who has accumulated more than 1,200 points, 700 rebounds and 200 blocked shots in a career. She ranks among school leaders in career points, rebounds and field-goal percentage, and her 221 career blocks is a school record. She was named to the 1995 Big East Conference allstar team and was given the Sam Kaplan Award as the top senior scholar-athlete in New Jersey. Upon graduation, Johnson plans to enroll in the master's program of social work at New York University.

Cynthia Rose Lamping (Purduc University, 3.600 grade-point average in mechanical engineering) — Lamping ranks among Purduc leaders in several categories, including games played, scoring, three-point field goals, free-throw percentage, rebounds and assists. She was named Purdue's best offensive player in 1993 and was awarded co-most-valuable-player honors. A two-year team captain, Lamping is a three-time Big Ten Conference all-academic selection. She was a member of a Big Ten all-star team that traveled to Australia and New Zealand in 1992. She plans to further her studies in mechanical engineering in graduate school at Purduc.

Susan Marie Rowlyk [Mount St. Mary's College (Maryland), 3.561 grade-point average in biology] — Rowlyk ranks fifth on the all-time school charts in career scoring, rebounding and blocked shots. She also ranks seventh in field-goal percentage and steal. Named the Northeast Conference player of the year for the second consecutive season, Rowlyk also is a two-time member of the NEC all-tournament team. She is a four-time NEC honor roll selection and was named the 1994 NEC scholar-athlete of the year. She plans to pursue a postgraduate degree in physiology.

Women's Divisions II and III

Shara Nerissa Brewer (Wingate College, 4.000 grade-point average in psychology) — A 1994-95 team captain. Brewer averaged six points and four rebounds per game in helping Wingate advance to this year's Division II quarterfinals. She became the first Wingate women's basketball player to be recognized as a first-team GTE academic all-American and is one of only three Wingate students to graduate this year with a perfect 4.000 grade-point average. She will begin work on a master's degree in community counseling at the University of North Carolina, Greensboro, next fall.

Amy Michelle Dodrill (Johns Hopkins University, 3.210 grade-point average in biomedical engineering) — A two-time all-Centennial Conference performer, Dodrill finished her career as the Blue Jays' third all-time leading scorer with 1.116 points. She holds every school three-point shooting record and also established a career mark in games played with 95. She posted another school best with 12 assists in a game against Bridgewater College (Virginia). Her efforts helped lead the Blue Jays to their first NCAA tournament berth. Dodrill actively has been involved in medical research that will assist in new applications of health care, and she plans to continue her studies in biomedical sciences at Wake Forest University next fall.

Leslie Ferguson (University of Redlands, 3.390 grade-point average in English) — Ferguson is Redlands' all-time leading scorer with 1.576 points, and she established eight other school career and single-season marks in scoring and rebounding. A 1995 Kodak all-American, Ferguson was named this year's Southern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference player of the year after scoring more than 25 points in eight games and collecting more than 20 rebounds in four others. A Big Sister program volunteer, Ferguson also has been a writer and editor for the Redlands student newspaper and a writing tutor for three years. She plans on returning to Redlands after graduation to earn her teaching certificate.

Emilie Jane Hanson [Central College (Iowa), 3.902 grade-point average in English] — Hanson's 27.7 points per game topped the Division III scoring charts this year, making her a two-time Division III scoring champion. During her four-year tenure, the Flying Dutch have carned three NGAA tournament berths and captured the national championship in 1993. Hanson holds 12 school records and has twice been named the Iowa Intercollegiate Athletic Conference's player of the year. Hanson also was named the GTE women's basketball academic all-American of the year in the college division for the second consecutive year. She plans to attend Regents University in Virginia Beach, Virginia, to begin postgraduate work in government relations and public policy.

Amanda Sue Jackson (Emory University, 3.200 grade-point average in chemistry and music) — A four-time all-University Athletic Association performer, Jackson holds 13 conference records in scoring, three-point field goals and assists. She was named athlete of the year by Atlanta Sports and Fitness Magazine and sportswoman of the year by the Georgia Women's Sports Intersport Network, Jackson also is an accomplished tennis player, having carned all-UAA honors four times and advanced to the quarterfinals in doubles at the 1994 NCAA Division III championships. A recipient of Emory's Humanitarian Award, Jackson is a resident advisor, a deacon in

places more emphasis on prong one of the test, the one that declares an institution in compliance if the female-to-male ratio of athletics participation is substantially in proportion to the female-to-male ratio of the undergraduate student body.

"I believe the three-part test offers a great amount of flexibility," Cantu said. "The campuses that find themselves not able to meet prong one may choose to comply under prongs two or three."

The second and third components of the compliance test involve whether an institution can demonstrate a history of continual program expansion for its underrepresented gender and whether it fully and effectively accommodates the interests and abilities of the underrepresented gender.

Vartan Gregorian, president at Brown University, discussed his institution's 18-sport athletics program for women and his frustration with the OCR and its guidance in defining prong three.

Brown has appealed a Federal district court ruling in which it was found to be in violation of Title IX.

"Let me say at the outset that Brown University has been, is, and will remain a firm supporter of Congress' goal in enacting Title IX," Gregorian said. "Prior to and since its passage, Brown has worked with great urgency, consistency and steadiness to put in place policies and programs that provide fair treatment and equal opportunity for women in all facets of life at Brown, including athletics.

"We are here because Brown is in disagreement over crucial issues with the Office for Civil Rights' continuously evolving and shifting regulations governing Title IX, at least as they have been interpreted by a district court judge in Providence, Rhode Island," Gregorian said in his written statement. "Our so-called 'model-for-the-nation' program was struck down by a Federal judge on every one of OCR's three tests in a decision that took advantage of all of the ambiguities, inconsistencies, and imprecision of the rules and guidelines.

"These rules and guidelines are so ambiguous, so inconsistent, and so imprecise that they leave judges with total discretion and rob institutions of any flexibility in meeting OCR's tests."

Cantu responded by saying, "I don't hear

Panelists provide differing opinions

A nine-member panel — including authorities scheduled to appear at a May 9 congressional hearing on Title IX — participated April 27 in an Institute for International Sport forum on gender-equity issues at the University of Rhode Island.

The forum, tided "Gender Equity: Leveling the Playing Field?" focused on Title IX, which was enacted by Congress in 1972 to prevent sex discrimination in educational programs receiving Federal funding.

Forum panelists — including Donna Lopiano of the Women's Sports Foundation and Charles M. Neinas of the Gollege Football Association — agreed that everyone should have an opportunity to participate in athletics, regardless of gender. But they differed on how that goal should be achieved and how an athletics program can determine if it complies with Title IX.

Many panelists stressed that the finances of athletics should be looked at more critically.

"I think you can provide equity at the Division I, II or III level only when you have done the hard work of looking at dollars and cents," said panelist Jeffrey H. Orleans, executive director of the Ivy Group.

"Something has to give in this system," said Lopiano. "It has to be a redistribution of financial resources."

Some panelists pointed to a "high standard of living" enjoyed by football, while other sports struggle to survive.

But the CFA's Neinas countered that institutions use football as public-relations and fund-raising vehicles, that 83 percent of the funds for athletics programs at CFA institutions come from football and men's basketball, and that "our objectives are really the same: to provide everybody an opportunity to compete."

Other members of the forum panel were Linda Carpenter, an attorney and physical education professor at Brooklyn College; Christine Grant, director of women's athletics at the University of Iowa; Roy Johnson, president of the National Association of Collegiate Gymnastics Coaches (Men); Janet M. Justus, NCAA director of education resources; Jeff Michaelson, an attorney who is representing Brown University in a Title IX lawsuit involving the school; and Kelly Whiteside, a staff writer for Sports Illustrated.

how you can be both specific and flexible. I think we have hit the right balance."

David Jorns, president of Eastern Illinois University, discussed many of the same concerns expressed by Gregorian. His institution has undergone an OCR compliance review and he pointed to concerns about the agency's process.

Rep. J. Dennis Hastert, R-Illinois, who has been working with a coalition of nonrevenue coaches associations since last fall, testified that Title IX was not intended to decrease opportunities for one gender while enhancing them for the other.

"It really disturbs me when people claim that it is fine to cut opportunities for men to cradicate discrimination," Hastert said. "Well, Mr. Chairman, that is not fine. That view represents everything that is wrong about Title IX. When it ceases to be a law to work for positive improvements in the future and simply becomes a way to get back at the systems that perpetrated discrimination, we have lost our focus on what it means to work toward gender equity. It doesn't help anyone to just keep tearing the future of these kids from under them."

Hastert said he will continue dialogue with the subcommittee. At a news conference after the hearing, he said he had not decided whether to introduce legislation to address what critics say is the office's strict reliance on the proportionality test.

Hastert's colleague, Rep. Cardiss Collins, D-Illinois, testified that OCR's three-part test is not merely a quota system.

"Athletics directors and coaches are the ones who develop quotas by deciding how many men and women play sports at their schools," Collins said. "The purpose of Title IX is to climinate these quotas."

Other witnesses who spoke before the subcommittee were Christine Grant, director of women's athletics at the University of Iowa; T. J. Kerr, wrestling coach at California State University, Bakersfield, and president of the National Wrestling Coaches Association; Wendy Hilliard, president of the Women's Sports Foundation; Charles M. Neinas, executive director of the College Football Association; and Rick Dickson, athletics director at Washington State University.

After the hearings, the OCR's Cantu said that even though there is considerable disagreement over Title IX, she is impressed with the emotion shown by interested groups and the commitment that is being devoted to understanding and adhering to Title IX.

"Overall, I was very pleased with the openness of the hearing," Cantu said. "I was really pleased with having an opportunity to share what our office is doing in the area of Title IX. I really appreciate the general theme of involving men and women together in athletics opportunities.

"It was not a confrontational hearing. There was more agreement than disagreement," she said. "There was a general agreement that we all support Title IX and its goals. There was general agreement that there was a need for our office to play a role in helping us all meet the goal of Title IX. I thought the chairman did a terrific job in fostering the sense of common participation, finding common ground."

priority.

Funding requests considered and approved by the Executive Committee generally will have a long-term impact on the Association's budget since such costs will be recurring.

In another significant development, the Executive Committee approved extending the catastrophic-athletics-injury insurance program for three years (August 1, 1995, through July 31, 1998) with the current insurance provider, North American Specialty Insurance Company. Several enhancements have been added, many of them as a result of the Budget Subcommittee's meeting with selected risk managers from member institutions last July.

The premium for the coverage for each of the next three years is \$3.6 million. A full description of the revised program will appear in the May 17 issue of The NCAA News.

Minutes of the May Executive Committee meeting will appear in the May 31 issue of The NCAA Register.

Other highlights

In other actions at its May 2-4 meeting in Sedona, Arizona, the Executive Committee:

- Agreed, consistent with Joint Policy Board discussions of the past year, to allocate funds from expected excess revenues for the current fiscal year to an investment reserve. The funds in the reserve will be managed with a long-term perspective, with 60 percent invested in fixed-income securities and 40 percent invested in equities. An investment manager will be selected to meet the reserve's investment objectives, and an investment committee of financial managers from member institutions will be appointed.
- Took action to further clarify the guidelines related to the basketball-fund distribution, especially regarding conference realignments. The following guideline was approved:

"In the event that 50 percent or more of the member institutions of a given conference leave the conference simultaneously and the remaining conference membership falls below six members, for the purposes of the basketball fund distribution, said conference shall be considered disbanded and each institution shall retain the units it carned in the basketball fund as if the conference had in fact disbanded."

- Approved an increase in the per diem for committee members from \$30 to \$40, effective in 1995-96, and for members of NCAA drug-testing crews from \$80 to \$100. The per diem for drug-testing crews includes lodging expenses.
- Agreed to establish three-person officiating crews for all rounds of the Division I Women's Basketball Champiouship.
- Approved all recommended rules changes from various sports committees pertaining to fighting.
- Added the 20-pound weight throw to all three women's indoor track championships and added the hammer throw to the Divisions I and II women's outdoor championships, effective in 1006
- Approved an expansion of the Division II Women's Soccer Championship from six to eight teams, effective in 1995.

the three NCAA divisions and the four geographical regions of the country. The selected institutions composed a minimum 10 percent sample of the membership sponsoring a given sport; therefore, the resulting data should be representative of all NCAA institutions.

The ISS does not identify every injury that occurs. Instead, it collects a representative sampling of a cross-section of the membership.

An athlete-exposure (A-E) represents one athlete participating in one practice or game in which he or she is exposed to the potential for injury. For example, five prac-

tices, each involving 60 participants, and one game involving 40 participants results in 340 A-Es.

Injuries

Three criteria must be met in order for an injury to be reportable. First, it must have occurred as a result of participation in an organized intercollegiate practice or game. The injury also must require medical attention by a team athletics trainer or physician. Third, the injury must result in restriction of the student-athlete's participation or performance for one or more days beyond the day of occurrence.

Injury rate

An injury rate is a ratio of the number of injuries in a particular

category to the number of athlete-exposures in that category. This value is then multiplied by 1,000 to produce an injury rate per 1,000 athlete-exposures. For example, six reportable injuries during a period of 563 athlete-exposures would give an injury rate of 10.7 injuries per 1,000 athlete-exposures [(six divided by 563) times 1,000].

Additional information on the report is available from the NCAA national office.

The tables on page 8 highlight selected information from the winter 1994-95 ISS. When appropriate, injury rates and game-practice percentages are compared to an average value calculated from all years in which ISS data has been collected in a specific sport.

"The alternative is theater seating," Spry said, "which would accommodate many more people. But it would be almost impossible for delegates to manage books, briefcases and voting units without the tables. Also, in a 1992 survey, 72.6 percent of delegates favored classroom seating in the general business session."

Spry said that Division I institutions and conferences have averaged 3.9 delegates at recent Conventions (4.8 delegates for Division I-A institutions). For Division II, the average has been 2.3 and for Division III, about 1.5.

Spry noted that Convention proceedings can be viewed throughout the Anatole via closed-circuit television. The closed-circuit feed will be available in hotel rooms and also will be available in a viewing room near the Chantilly ballroom

He said space will not be a problem at the Opryland Hotel ballroom in Nashville in 1997 but that it will have to be addressed at other future sites.

Currently, Atlanta and Orlando, Florida, are under consideration for the 1998 Convention. San Antonio has been approved as the 1999 site, and San Diego was approved at the most recent Executive Committee meeting as the site for 2000. Orlando also is under consideration for the 2001 event.

Deaths

Bruce Bosley, football player at West Virginia in the mid-1950s, died April 26 in San Mateo, California, at age 61. His death was related to heart disease. Bosley, a Pro Bowl center and guard, was nicknamed "Lil' Abner" while at West Virginia and was known as the strongest Mountaineer player of his era. In 1956, Bosley was picked by the San Francisco 49ers in the second round of the NFL draft. The College Football Hall of Fame finducted him in 1982 and the West Virginia Sports Hall of Fame inducted him in 1992. He finished his career with the Atlanta Falcons in 1969. Bosley also was executive director of the NFL Alumni Association and an executive for a San Francisco wholesale electrical supply company.

Gary Fallon, head football coach at Washington and Lee since 1978, died at his home in Lexington, Virginia. He was 56. Fallon played football, lacrosse and wrestling at Syracuse from 1958 to 1962, coached at Princeton for six years, and was an assistant coach at Ithaca in 1970 and 1971. In 1962, Fallon played with the NFL's Minnesota Vikings, and from 1962 to 1963 he played in the Canadian Football League. At Washington and

Lee, he compiled a 76-85-1 record and won two Old Dominion Athletic Conference championships. Fallon was named ODAC coach of the year in 1981, 1988 and 1992.

Ray Laiche, a four-year member of the Tulane football team, died April 24 as a result of injuries sustained in a car accident. He was 23. Laiche was critically injured in a two-car accident in New Orleans April 22. He lacked only three days of classes and final examinations to complete a bachelor's degree in social science.

Lathrop K. Leishman, also known as "Mr. Rose Bowl" and "Mr. Pasadena," died at age 91 after a battle with cancer. Leishman was president of the Tournament of Roses in 1939 and grand marshal of the New Year's Day parade in 1979. In 1994, Leishman became the first nonathlete inducted into the Rose Bowl Hall of Fame.

Mickey Maroney, a football player at Arkansas from 1964 to 1966, died in the Oklahoma City bombing April 19. He was an agent with the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Charles Gerald "Buzz" Ridl, former head coach at Westminster (Pennsylvania) and Pittsburgh, died April 28 at age 75. Ridl compiled an overall collegiate coaching record of 313-174 (.643), including a 216-91 mark at Westminster (1956 to 1968) and 97-83 record at Pittsburgh (1968 to 1975). Ridl also served Westminster in several other capacities, including director of athletics from 1977 to 1985, director of alumni affairs from 1975 to 1977, head baseball coach from 1950 to 1968 and head golf coach from 1979 to 1991.

Hayden Riley, former basketball and baseball coach at Alabama, died April 24 after a lengthy illness. He was 73. Riley was head basketball coach at Alabama from 1961 to 1968, compiling a record of 102-104 before his promotion to assistant athletics director. From 1971 to 1979, Riley coached the Alabama baseball team to a 224-163-1 mark and two Southeastern Conference Western Division titles. In 1982, he became commissioner of the Gulf South Conference for two years.

Tom Tinker, head basketball coach at Texas-Arlington for 23 years, died May I from complications stemming from a stroke that he suffered a week earlier. Before his 1966 retirement, Tinker was instrumental in Texas-Arlington's transition from a junior college to NCAA Division I athletics program. He also served as athletics director, golf and track coach, and football assistant at what was then North Texas Agricultural College and later Arlington State College. Tinker claimed 242 wins in his 23-year basketball coaching career, making him the most victorious coach at Texas-Arlington.

Ralph Sims, former basketball player at Wisconsin-Oshkosh, died of a heart attack April 14 at his Waukegan, Illinois, home. Sims, who scored 699 points in 1977, remains the career scoring leader at Wisconsin-Oshkosh with 2,303 points.

NCAA Bylaws 14.3.1.1-(b) and 14.3.1.2-(b) Qualifier requirements — ACT/SAT scores — Divisions I and II

Divisions I and II institutions should note that during its March 8, 1995, telephone conference, the NCAA Administrative Committee approved (and the NCAA Council subsequently approved) intent-based legislation (effective immediately) pursuant to NCAA Constitution 5.4.1.1.1 to specify that for initial-eligibility purposes related to 1995 high-school graduates, a score of 820 on the recentered version of the SAT (first administered April 1, 1995) shall be considered equivalent to a score of 700 on the prior version of the SAT. Further, during its April 24-26, 1995, meeting, the Council agreed to issue an official interpretation to specify that in order to achieve the minimum score of 700 on the "old" version of the SAT [pursuant to Bylaws 14.3.1.1-(b) and 14.3.1.2-(b)] or the minimum score of 820 on the recentered version of the SAT, a student may combine a converted subscore from the "old" version of the SAT with a subscore from the recentered SAT or, as an alternative, combine a subscore from the "old" version of the SAT with a converted subscore from the recentered SAT.

NCAA Bylaws 14.3.1.1-(a) and 14.3.1.2-(a) Qualifier requirements — core curriculum — Divisions I and II

Divisions I and II institutions should note that during its

April 24-26, 1995, meeting, the Council agreed to issue an official interpretation specifying that when a prospect attends a high school that offers a laboratory science course but does not take the course and subsequently transfers to another high school that does not offer any laboratory courses, the student does not fulfill the laboratory science component of Bylaws 14.3.1.1-(a) and 14.3.1.2-(b), inasmuch as the student had the opportunity to take the laboratory class and did not do so. However, such a case still may be considered by the NCAA Council Subcommittee on Initial-Eligibility Waivers.

NCAA Bylaw 14.5.5.3.11 One-time transfer exception/satisfactory progress

Division I institutions should note that during its April 24-26, 1995, meeting, the Council reviewed the provisions of Bylaw 14.5.5.3.11-(c) and the language of 1995 Convention Proposal No. M-8 regarding percentage-of-degree requirements for a student-athlete using the one-time transfer exception. The Council agreed to adopt intent-based legislation (effective immediately), pursuant to Constitution 5.4.1.1.1, to exempt from Bylaw 14.5.5.3.10-(c) the consideration of the percentage-of-degree requirements at the prior institution. Accordingly, a student-athlete no longer has to meet the "25/50/75" standard as a condition of fulfilling the satisfactory-progress provisions of the one-time transfer exception. Please note that a student transferring to a Division I institution still must meet the applicable percentage-of-degree requirement at the new school in order to be eligible immediately upon transfer. However, a student who does not meet

the requirement upon transfer now may fulfill the percentage-of-degree requirement and be certified eligible at the beginning of the institution's next regular term pursuant to Bylaws 14.4.3.2.1.2 and 14.4.3.3.1.2.

NCAA Bylaw 17.7.3 First contest — football

Divisions I and II institutions should note that during its April 24-26, 1995, meeting, the Council agreed to use the provisions of Constitution 5.3.1.1.1 (noncontroversial amendment) to amend Bylaw 17.7.3 (effective immediately, for the 1995-96 academic year only) to allow Divisions I and II institutions to play their first football contest the Thursday prior to Labor Day (August 31, 1995).


