Football to distinguish between excessive acts, enthusiasm

If beauty is in the eye of the beholder, is unsportsmanlike conduct also a matter open to individual interpretation?

Not as much as it used to be, if the NCAA Football Rules Committee has anything to say about it.

After meeting May 11-12 at the NCAA national office and reviewing nearly 150 videotaped examples of potential taunting or excessive celebration with a group of conference commissioners, student-athletes and coaches association representatives, the committee believes it has agreed on what distinguishes an unsportsmanlike act from one that is the product of youthful exuberance.

Now the group will share this insight with coaches, players and officials by producing a videotape showing specific actions that are illegal and illustrating the type of team-focused celebration that it wants to encourage.

The video, which will include rulings on selected plays from the tape reviewed at the meeting, will be

sent to all football-playing institutions and conferences in late June. Coaches will be urged to view the tape with their players.

"First and foremost, we wanted to make sure that we did not remove the enthusiasm that has been part of college football for 125 years," said Vincent J. Dooley, chair of the committee and director of athletics at the University of Georgia.

"But it's obvious to coaches, media and fans that there is a growing problem with unsportsmanlike conduct, particularly with excessive celebration and taunting. The tape we reviewed at this meeting confirmed that a wide variety of unnecessary and unsportsmanlike acts are happening on college playing fields."

The committee took a firm stand against all actions or gestures that are prolonged, delayed or call attention to one player over the rest of the team,

Certification principles could include conduct element

The NCAA Presidents Commission Committee on Sportsmanship and Ethical Conduct in Intercollegiate Athletics has agreed to recommend that a sportsmanship and ethical conduct component be added to operating principles of the Division I athletics certification program.

At its May 7-9 meeting, the committee agreed to recommend to the Commission (in June) and the NCAA Council (in August) that a resolution to amend the operating principles be submitted to the 1996 NCAA Convention and that legislation be considered in 1997.

The four operating principles of the athletics certification program are governance and commitment to rules compliance, academic integrity, fiscal integrity,

and commitment to equity. The athletics certification program is set up on a five-year cycle, and several institutions either have completed the process or currently are involved in a self-study.

In addition to discussing sportsmanship as a component of athletics certification, the committee discussed the recent meeting of the NCAA Football Rules Committee, at which that group sought to clarify what does and does not constitute sportsmanlike conduct (see story elsewhere on this page). Grant Teaff, executive director of the American Football Coaches Association and a member of the sportsmanship com-

Interested parties play wait-and-see following Title IX hearing

Now that Congress formally has heard various viewpoints on the enforcement of and consequences of compliance with Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, the looming question is, "What's next?"

The U.S. House Subcommittee on Postsecondary Education, Training and Lifelong Learning conducted a hearing May 9 at which 10 people, including two members of Congress, addressed concerns involving the 23-year-old legislation that prohibits institutions receiving Federal financial assistance from discriminating on the basis of sex.

Whether there will be any future legislative action on Title IX depends largely on the conclusions the subcommittee reaches in response to testimony and other information gathered at the hearing.

Armando E. Azarloza, press secretary and district director for the committee's chair, Rep. Howard P. McKeon, R-California, said the committee is processing information from the hearing and that the subcommittee likely will determine before the end of May what direction it plans to follow.

"We are in the process of digesting the testimony," Azarloza said May 15. "The whole idea was to assess Title IX. Right now, I don't get a sense for where (the subcommittee) is heading."

Azarloza said the subcommittee would organize more hearings on the matter if it decides that the issue needs further examination. However, if the subcommittee determines that the enforcement and interpretation of Title IX by the U.S. Department of Education's Office for Civil Rights (OCR) matches Congress' intent for Title IX, then nothing further likely will happen.

Charles M. Neinas, executive director of the College Football Association, predicts the move to address possible changes in Title IX's interpretation and enforcement will not end with the May 9 hearing.

Finances

Basketball-fund supplement to be mailed May 26

A supplementary payment of \$8.5 million will be mailed May 26 to the Division I membership as a result of action taken by the NCAA Executive Committee at its May 2-4 meeting.

At that meeting, the basketball and "broad-based" funds of the NCAA revenue-distribution plan were increased to \$40 million each. A total of \$31.5 million from the basketball fund already had been distributed April 21 under the previous terms of the plan, so a supplementary distribution of \$8.5 million became necessary in order to pay out \$40 million.

The sports-sponsorship and grants-in-aid funds — the two "broad-based" funds — will be distributed in August.

On another revenue-distribution matter, checks from the Division II enhancement fund will be mailed May 19. Here are the dates on which checks from all remaining funds of the revenue-distribution plan will be mailed:

Academic-enhancement.....June 23
Special-assistance.....July 28
Sports-sponsorship.....August 11
Grants-in-aid.....August 25

Catastrophic-injury program maintains \$25,000 deductible

The NCAA Executive Committee approved a new contract for the Association's catastrophic-injury insurance program at its May 2-4 meeting. The new three-year contract with the current carrier, North American Specialty Insurance Company, will cost \$3.6 million per year.

Several features in the existing contract were enhanced in the renegotiations, but among the most important elements agreed upon was the decision to maintain the current \$25,000 deductible.

That means that the insurance carrier for each member institution may be obligated to pay only up to \$25,000 for each athletically re-

lated injury, regardless of the nature of the injury. The most common claim involves knee injuries.

Michael S. McNeely, NCAA director of operations, said that the decision was reached after the Budget Subcommittee analyzed the difference between the extra money the NCAA would pay to leave the threshold at \$25,000 vs. what member institutions would pay collectively if the deductible were set at \$50,000 and members were forced to make up the difference. The conclusion was that it would be in the membership's best interests to leave the deductible at \$25,000.

Title IX

Subcommittee reviewing testimony from May 9 hearing

The U. S. House Subcommittee on Post-secondary Education, Training and Lifelong Learning is processing information from the May 9 Title IX hearing and likely will determine before the end of May what direction it plans take with the issue.

"We are in the process of digesting the tes-

timony," said Armando E. Azaragoza, press secretary and district director for Rep. Howard P. McKeon, R-California, who chairs the subcommittee. "The whole idea was to assess Title IX. Right now, I don't get a sense for where (the subcommittee) is heading."

The NCAA did not testify at that hearing but did provide a report that included the final report of the NCAA Gender-Equity Task Force, sports participation data, and a report on current revenues and expenses in intercollegiate athletics. It also included a description of the NCAA's efforts thus far to achieve gender equity, such as expansion of certain women's championships and the equalization of per diem granted to men and women student-athletes.

Student joins elite company

When one is asked to speak at a college or university commencement, usually it comes after many years of work experience and some notoriety in a particular field. But Michigan Technological University basketball player **Dawn Zarling** is a glowing exception to that "rule."

The senior was selected as the keynote speaker for the school's graduation ceremony May 20. In addition to encouraging graduates to "be all they can be" and "take life by its wings and fly with it," Zarling will join those graduates in the procession to receive diplomas — in her case, for a bachelor's degree in biological sciences.

"We are very pleased to have Dawn Zarling, one of our finest students, and one of the most outstanding athletes and persons ever to represent Michigan Tech, be our featured speaker for this spring's commencement," Michigan Tech President **Curtis J. Tompkins** said.

Zarling joins a list of impressive Michigan Tech commencement speakers, which includes **Martha Sloan**, a Michigan Tech professor and the first woman elected president of the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers; **John Vartan**, chair of Vartan Enterprises; **Charles M. Vest**, president at Massachusetts Institute of Technology; **Lewis Dodak**, speaker of the Michigan House of Representatives; and **Donald Petersen**, chief executive officer of Ford Motor Company.

Zarling twice was named Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference (GLIAC) women's basketball player of the year, and she is Michigan Tech's all-time leader in rebounds, steals and assists and ranks second in career points and games played. She was a Kodak honorable-mention all-American selection twice.

Zarling posted a 3.580 cumulative grade-point average (4.000 scale) and was named to the dean's list 10 times in 14 terms, and was a four-time member of the GLIAC all-academic team.

A shooter's shooter

Kari Tuft, a junior center on the wom-

en's basketball team at Luther College, accomplished something this year that no other NCAA college basketball player — male or female — ever did in the same season: She led the nation in field-goal and free-throw percentages.

Tufts led Division III with a shooting percentage of 65.6 from the floor and 88.2 from the free-throw line. In addition to her accurate shooting touch, Tufts averaged 20.5 points per game. Her 1,321 career points puts her on pace to become Luther's all-time leading scorer.

Library uplifts

The importance of campus libraries has not been lost on the athletics departments

at Louisiana State University and the University of Nebraska, Lincoln. The two highly visible athletics departments recently announced sizable contributions to help preserve the libraries at those institutions.

The LSU athletics department donated \$100,000 to the LSU Libraries, increasing to nearly \$5 million the amount the athletics department at LSU has contributed to academic programs there in the past five years.

"This is something that is very important and beneficial for the university," LSU athletics director **Joe Dean** said. "There are some vital areas of this institution that have been hit particularly hard by cuts in higher education. If the LSU athletics department, as an auxiliary unit, can help the academic side, it is important that we do so."

At Nebraska, the athletics department launched a year-long fund-raising campaign, kicking off with its April 21 celebration that honored the Cornhuskers' wire-service national-championship football team. The athletics department's gift will help raise funds needed to address a 16 percent shortfall in funding — about \$350,000. In addition, more than 1,000 subscriptions to periodicals are in jeopardy because of the funding problem.

"It's a tremendous amount of work to cut 1,200 journals, which is very damaging to the universities' libraries," said **Kent Hendrickson**, dean of libraries at Nebraska. "This will let us hold off for a year. We still need the support of the (Nebraska) legislature for ongoing permanent funding, but this stop-gap measure will definitely help with our immediate crisis. I'm elated with the support of the athletics department. It's a great response on their part to a critical problem at the university, and it just illustrates the class act that they are."

C. William Byrne Jr., athletics director at Nebraska, said the athletics department is committed to the academic well-being of the university.

"The (football) players were intent on doing this because the library is something that everyone uses," Byrne said. "It is vital to the education of not only our student-athletes, but to all other students and faculty. We're honored to help with such a noble cause."

Facilities

Niagara University announced plans May 8 to build a \$6 million hockey arena for its new men's ice hockey program, which is being elevated from club to varsity status beginning with the 1996-97 academic year. A women's club team also is expected to be sponsored, beginning with the 1996-97 academic year; the team would achieve varsity status a year later. Construction of the 76,000-square-foot arena is scheduled to begin in August, with completion scheduled in April 1996. The facility will contain two 85-by-200-foot ice pads, including a main rink seating 2,300 spectators and space for an additional 500 seats. The auxiliary rink will include seating for approximately 200. In addition, the arena will house 10 locker rooms, four meeting rooms, a concession stand and a pro shop.

California State University, Fresno, broke ground April 25 for a 1,700-seat softball stadium. The \$3.2 million project is expected to be completed in time for the school's 1996 women's softball opener February 24. The facility will include chair-back seating and lighting for night contests. Athletics department administrators said the school will submit bids as a potential host site for college softball tournaments, Division I Women's Softball Championship games, and Amateur Softball Association and Olympic events.

Northern Illinois University announced that work began April 24 on a \$4 million project to construct a new grandstand on the east side of Huskie Stadium. The addition will increase to 31,000 the seating capacity of the stadium. The project is expected to be completed in time for the Huskies' September 9 home opener. The grandstand will feature 10,400 aluminum bleacher seats. The new grandstand also will feature a handicapped-seating deck between the 35 yard lines, and will include six restrooms and a concession area.

Catastrophic-injury insurance features enhanced

When the Association's catastrophic-injury insurance program is mentioned, individuals may have the impression that it deals only with permanently disabling head and spinal injuries.

That sort of coverage is a primary purpose of the program, but it also provides important supplementary major-medical protection for individuals involved in intercollegiate athletics at member institutions.

The NCAA Executive Committee approved at its May 24 meeting a new three-year contract with the current carrier, North American Specialty Insurance Company, at a cost of \$3.6 million per year. Several features in the existing contract were enhanced in the renegotiations, but among the most important elements agreed upon was the decision to maintain the current \$25,000 deductible.

That means that the insurance carrier for each member institution may

be obligated to pay only up to \$25,000 for each athletically related injury, regardless of the nature of the injury. The most common claim involves knee injuries.

In the 2½ years of the existing contract, North American Specialty Insurance has incurred similar claim totals for catastrophic injuries (five totaling \$4.005 million) and for major-medical injuries (203 totaling \$4.078 million). Because the major-medical portion has become such a large and expensive part of the program, the NCAA Budget Subcommittee examined whether the deductible should be increased to \$50,000 in the new contract. After reviewing the question in depth, however, it decided to keep the deductible at \$25,000.

Michael S. McNeely, NCAA director of operations, said that the deci-

Time to play fair with resources

The recent court decision mandating that Brown University allocate sports resources and scholarships to male and female athletes based on their proportion at the university again has raised the predictable argument that fully realized women's sports programs rob less high-profile men's sports of resources. That is not the case.

Recently, San Francisco State University made a very difficult decision — to drop its college football program. That action was a direct approach to bring cost containment to intercollegiate athletics and to assist in the effort to attain gender equity in its intercollegiate sports programs. The result: media attention and alumni uproar, even though the team has not had a winning season in 21 years.

In January, the NCAA put the National Collegiate Men's Gymnastics Championships on the chopping block because there were fewer than the required 40 schools sponsoring the sport. Dropping the national championship would have meant death for the entire sport of men's gymnastics. Yet there was barely a cry from anyone but a few gymnastics coaches. Why is it that a public outcry goes up for one football team and no one seems to care about the far-reaching impact for so many male gymnasts?

In 1972, Congress passed Title IX of the Educational Amendments, which prohibits discrimination based on gender in Federally funded educational programs — including athletics. Recent efforts by the American Football Coaches Association to amend Title IX and its application to equal education opportunities and to remove the law's proportionality standards are wrong and would further exacerbate the inequities in women's sports.

Sports participation provides significant health benefits to all young people. We cannot legislate that our sons who play football have more opportunities to play and receive those benefits than our daughters. By the same token, is it also right to say that it is more important for our sons to play football than gymnastics?

So many myths surround football and its sacred status. It is wrongly considered a

System has harmed women, not men

I read the guest editorial of the April 19 issue of The NCAA News with disbelief. Perhaps it had been printed for effect? The sense one had after reading Leo Kocher's piece is that a terrible injustice is about to be perpetrated on tens of thousands of men in America — and it needs to be stopped.

I would like to illustrate to Mr. Kocher that indeed there is and has been a terrible injustice perpetrated, but it has been on the women athletes in America. If the Office for Civil Rights was to perform rigorous analysis, it is predictable that not one institution would be in full compliance with Title IX. It is amazing that after 23 years, not one university in the nation has ever lost Federal funds due to Title IX noncompliance.

Proportionality is a compromise. The true test of athletics spending and equality should be dollar for dollar. As a multiple state champion in Ohio and national qualifier, I never had a "real" college career. I was on the swimming team and finished in the women's collegiate nationals at the time. I also sailed, fenced and threw the discus.

But there was no funding, poor coaching and equally poor equipment and facilities. (At Indiana University during Doc Counsilman's days, the women swimmers worked out in the pool under the library, which was a 20-yard, four-lane pool.) We even had car washes to raise funds. I never received my letter award, there was no publicity or sports information director for women, nor was there any recognition. Of course, there were no scholarships.

But worse than that, I was robbed of the ability to reach my potential. The "right" to be part of a close-knit, cohesive team and work toward a common goal along with the striving, the dedication and the camaraderie was a privilege for women in those pre-Title IX days but

the birthright of every male. A lost college career cannot be replaced.

The proportionality solution should be seen for what it is — a way to continue to let football reign supreme. If football were downsized to a roster of 47, similar to the size used by the professionals, that would save 38 full rides and allow the men's minor sports their fair share. What proportionality and the recent litigation have done is to pit men's minor sports against the women when instead they should be lobbying for an across-the-board downsizing of football. Since less than .3 of one percent of collegiate football players make the NFL, one needs to question whether the money that is placed in this one sport in an educational institution is a legitimate expense.

Mr. Kocher wishes to know where the vast majority of citizens are — those who are the mothers and fathers. I would like to ask where they were in the '50s, '60s and '70s when almost 100 percent of secondary schools' athletics budgets and 100 percent of the collegiate budget went toward male sports. Was there any justice then? It has only been since Title IX that there is some semblance of fairness — and equality is still a long way away!

More on Title IX

The article entitled "A fair hearing on Title IX" by Leo Kocher requires some clarification and another point of view.

Mr. Kocher discusses the lack of fairness that Title IX enforcement and its enforcement are bringing to male

opportunities in intercollegiate athletics. He speaks of "the destruction for tens of thousands of male opportunities." The lack of opportunities available to women over the past 10 decades seems to be forgotten by Mr. Kocher.

It is important in any discussion of Title IX and its impact on opportunities to begin with the fact that Title IX became law in 1972. The fact that thousands of institutions failed to recognize and enforce the law is the reason none of these same institutions have taken the initiative to develop a plan for creating more opportunities for women. A well-thought-out plan and a process of implementation would have allowed those institutions to make gradual changes and a smooth transition so that drastic measures, such as cutting opportunities, would not be necessary. Unfortunately, it took 20 years before administrators of those institutions finally took the law seriously. Now its impact is much greater and, of course, some feel those "proportionality/gender-quota advocates" are to blame.

I would like to point out that proportionality/gender quotas are not the only criteria an institution may meet to determine compliance. There are three criteria, any one of which may be met to ensure compliance (opportunities proportionate to enrollment, a history and continuing practice of program expansion for the underrepresented sex, or full and effective accommodation of the interest of the underrepresented sex).

It is unfortunate that Mr. Kocher does not mention all three. A school need only meet one of the criteria in order to be in compliance. That doesn't seem unreasonable. The proportionality quota may be the one an institution chooses because it may be easiest to achieve for that institution. However, had an

Football start date shouldn't change

"For as good an example of backsliding as you'll get outside of Washington, please turn to the NCAA Council. The ruling body of the NCAA voted recently to grant a waiver to schools that wish to move games up from Saturday, September 2, to Thursday, August 31.

"The schools that are interested, chiefly those in the Mid-American Conference, don't want to compete with Labor Day weekend for the entertainment dollar. Students don't stay on campus on the unofficial last weekend of summer. By playing Thursday night, the schools hope to sell more tickets. Iowa State already had moved its opener against Ohio University to August 31 before school officials realized doing so would constitute an NCAA violation. Western Michigan also plans to move its home opener against Weber State to that Thursday.

"No, it's not a big deal, except that the NCAA poobahs hide behind principle only when it suits them. The rule in the NCAA Manual says that no games may be played before September 1. (The Kickoff Classic and the Pigskin Classic have been granted exceptions because they fund scholarships and pension funds.) The reason the rule is there is to prevent the season from being too long and too hard on the student-athlete. That may sound familiar, because it was one of the main reasons cited for cutting short the debate on the I-A playoff last year.

"So players at those schools come in two days earlier for fall practice. No big deal? That could mean the loss of a weekend to student-athletes who won't have any free time before December. It would have been a small gesture. The Council had an easy opportunity to firm up its principle in support of the welfare of the student-athlete, which is the NCAA 'theme'

of the coming academic year. Instead, the Council chose to sell a couple of thousand more tickets. Too bad."

"Many people — and not just women — pose the example of the NFL, which works with 45 and 50 (players). What they forget about is that when an NFL team loses its third quarterback, it can go out and get one. Purdue's not going to give me their third quarterback.

"It's a high-injury sport. And unlike the NFL, we have time constraints. They can let their offense practice against their defense, then flip it around and let their defense prepare against their offense. We can't....

"Can I get 120 kids to come out with only 50 scholarships? Yes. But I'd have real trouble getting big people out. And I'd have real trouble doing the quality of things we're used to seeing. You're going to have a lot of wishbone offenses.

"And then you are going to drop decidedly the kind of product you have on the field. It would not look the same. When that happens, I go back to (University of Iowa coach) Hayden Fry's comment. A lot of people took exception to it, but basically what he said was that he's not very smart, but he knows this much: If he has a couple of cash crops and a lot of other crops that aren't bringing in any cash, he's not going to fertilize them 50-50.

"If football's bringing in 75 percent of the revenue, and you cut back the scholarship numbers and the quality that we have, don't expect that stadiums are going to be as full or that television is going to be as excited about the product."

Ice hockey takes tougher stand on unsportsmanlike acts

In keeping with its efforts to emphasize ethical conduct in intercollegiate ice hockey, the NCAA Men's Ice Hockey Rules Committee has voted to propose a rule that would penalize a team when a player commits an unsportsmanlike act.

In the past, a player who committed a misconduct penalty was removed from the game for 10 minutes; however, a substitute was allowed to replace the penalized player immediately.

If approved by the NCAA Executive Committee, the new rule would require that the penalized player go directly to the penalty box without substitution for two minutes.

Other highlights

In other actions at its May 10-13 meeting in Santa Fe, New Mexico, the Men's Ice Hockey Rules Committee:

■ Cited ethical behavior, hitting from behind, holding the stick and interference as points of emphasis for 1995-96.

■ Voted to allow the Hockey East Association to continue its experimentation with shoot-outs for the 1995-96 season.

■ Voted to allow the Central Collegiate Hockey Association to continue its experimentation with linesmen calling penalties behind the play in the defensive zone in a one-referee, two-linesmen officiating system.

■ Voted to increase from five to six the number of allowable nonuniformed team personnel on the bench (Rule 1-9-b).

■ Revised Rule 1-10-a so that only penalized players are allowed in the penalty box.

■ Voted to increase from 18 to 19 the number of players (other than goalkeepers) who are allowed to participate in the pregame warm-up. The rule is designed to help a coach determine if an injured student-athlete is ready to play. It is mandatory, however, that the official game-report form include only the 18 eligible players who will dress for the game.

■ Voted to revise Rule 4-2-c to read: "If the opposing team scores a goal while a team is

short-handed by one or more minor or bench minor penalties, the short-handed team shall be permitted to replace immediately on the ice the first player whose minor or bench minor penalty caused the team to be short-handed, except when a goal is scored on a penalty shot."

■ Added the following to the note after Rule 4-2-d: "No minor or bench minor penalty will terminate as a result of a penalty-shot goal."

■ Revised language in Rule 4-6-b so that only a goalkeeper or alternate goalkeeper may defend against a penalty shot.

■ Revised Rule 5-3-h to allow conferences and tournament directors to determine alternative policies for awarding assists.

It's time to stop placing blame and start working together to ensure equitable opportunities

institutional plan been in place for the past 20 years, a plan that had shown progress toward increased opportunities (criterion No. 2), the institution would not be threatened by noncompliance and "unfair" opportunities lost for males would not be an issue.

Mr. Kocher notes that male and female students do not participate "in equal numbers in music, engineering, elementary education, computer science....Will OCR attack the disproportionality in those areas like it has in intercollegiate athletics?"

His point is well-taken. The law reads that "no person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any education program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance," so technically speaking, if compliance in any of those areas of educational opportunity were legally challenged, the OCR would have to pay attention to the complaint.

OCR's responsibility is to protect the rights of all persons. It is not "indifferent to the destruction of athletics opportunities for males." It is interested in holding institutions accountable for providing equitable opportunities for all. If men's programs are hurt or "destroyed," they should look in their own front yards and presidential offices. It has been their misguided interpretation or, more

probably, ignorance of Title IX that has created the problems for today's administrators and men's teams.

Mr. Kocher states, "Perhaps most disappointingly, the male athletes have not received a fair hearing from the media." Women have been disappointed for decades (and still are) by the lack of appropriate media attention to all women's sports. They, too, have been "deemed unworthy of inclusion in the media coverage."

Maybe this is the vehicle we should all use to begin working together so that no student-athletes lose any additional opportunities. While civil rights and equal rights have been key concerns of our society for decades, and although nondiscrimination laws and policies exist in almost every institution in the country, laws do little to alter attitudes.

The media can. Institutions can. Institutions and organizations (the NCAA) that make millions of dollars per year off the business of college athletics need to reinvest some of those dollars into the promotion of all sports — men's "minor" sports, as well as women's sports at all levels.

Little girls need role models. One of the reasons girls don't continue to participate at higher levels is that there is a perception that the interest isn't there. Girls still do not see enough women in coaching positions, administrative roles, officiating jobs or media roles. It still is not "socially acceptable" enough for

women to hold careers in athletics.

It is still a struggle for women to maintain a high profile in athletics. Salaries often are not equitable. The support systems are not there. Maybe some of that money generated by big-time sports should be reinvested into those support systems. Systems such as assistant coaching staffs equivalent to male counterparts, sports information services specific to women's programs and home-game management teams that provide a secure and well-prepared game environment for both sexes should be available to all.

Sports promotion must be extended to women's sports. According to the media professionals, there is not enough interest in women's sports to cover them on TV, in the newspapers or on the radio. Isn't it partially the media's job to generate interest? How many Americans gave a hoot about soccer until the World Cup came to town? How did we become suddenly so interested in a sport that a huge part of the population knew next to nothing about? The media picked up on it, promoted it. McDonald's followed suit. J. C. Penney or Sears jumped on the bandwagon.

Well, let's put some of the business dollars generated by our big-time sports into promoting women's sports. Maybe at some point, many women's sports will be self-supporting, too. Look at the interest generated and received by the Women's Final Four in both basketball and volleyball over the past few

years. That wasn't accidental. Somebody believed in it, promoted it, invested in it and took a chance. And that chance paid off with sellout crowds.

Do we make any progress toward resolution of this situation by continuing to blame each other? By worrying about which "advocates" are most powerful? We should not be blaming women (or men) coaches who want what's best for their teams. We should not be blaming parents who want what's fair and equal for their daughters. We should not be blaming the "proportionality/gender quota extremists." We should stop blaming OCR for doing its job as enforcers of Title IX.

If we must place blame, look back to our ancestors who passed down stereotypical sex roles. And if blame must be more recent, blame athletics directors and administrators before us who ignored the law for so many years.

But placing blame gets us nowhere. Working together to resolve the problem is progress toward finding the answer to this complex issue. The only true fair way to ensure equitable opportunities is for all advocates of equal rights to work together and offer ideas, take action and support one another.

What do you say, Mr. Kocher?

cash cow that pays for men's and women's sports programs. But according to the NCAA, of 522 institutions that offered football, only 58 (11 percent) have football programs that generate enough revenue to cover costs.

Here are some more fallacies and facts surrounding college football:

Fallacy: Most colleges and universities are close to being in compliance with Title IX.

Fact: Women college athletes receive less than 24 percent of college sports operating budgets and less than 18 percent of college recruiting money and only 28 percent of athletics scholarships. Male athletes annually receive \$179 million more than female athletes in scholarship money, according to the 1992 NCAA Gender-Equity Study. Those inequities deny women not only the opportunity to benefit from sports but sometimes the opportunity to attend college — all because they are afforded fewer opportunities for athletics scholarships.

Fallacy: Football funds all other sports for men and women.

Fact: According to the 1993 version of "Revenues and Expenses of Intercollegiate Athletics," 62 percent of Division I-A and I-AA football programs on the average have annual deficits of \$1 million (I-A) and \$664,000 (I-AA).

Fallacy: Women's sports are destroying men's minor sports.

Fact: Some men's sports are being dropped because there is not a collective resolve among chief executive officers to eliminate the excesses of football and men's basketball programs. Expenditures in Division I-A show the following breakdown for men's sports:

Fallacy: Funding of women's sports will bankrupt men's sports.

Fact: Since the enactment of Title IX in 1972, for every new dollar spent on women's sports programs, two new dollars were spent on men's sports programs.

Fallacy: Men are losing a massive number of participation opportunities because of women's athletics.

Fact: According to the NCAA, the number of participants in women's sports increased between 1989 and 1993 by 10,000, but the number of participants in men's sports also increased by 10,000, giving them 65 percent of all opportunities.

The current Office for Civil Rights interpretation provides schools with many legitimate and reasonable ways to comply with Title IX. It is noted in the recent NCAA publication "Achieving Gender Equity: A Basic Guide to Title IX for Colleges and Universities" that the "policy interpretation allows institutions great flexibility in providing benefits and services to female and male athletes."

The current phenomenon of cutting men's minor sports is the result of institutions' past inaction, rather than yielding to Title IX interpretations. For 23 years, most institutions have chosen to address Title IX through rhetoric rather than action. Now, deteriorating economic conditions, along with pressure from Federal courts and a committed Office for

Civil Rights, are forcing institutions into long-overdue decisions.

Due to the lack of long-range planning and national and/or institutional cost-containment measures, some institutions are choosing to achieve gender equity by shifting funds from men's sports to new or upgraded women's sports while still fully protecting football and men's basketball.

Rigidity of compliance is not the culprit; institutional inaction over the past two decades and current institutional choices are the causes of problems. A lack of finances cannot be a reason for discrimination; additional financial resources must be directed to women's athletics and/or a redistribution of existing resources must be made for every campus. To do otherwise is to force the group that historically has been discriminated against to continue to bear the burden of discrimination.

II tennis features something old, something new

Inaugural team-only format produces familiar champion in men's division

The format may have changed team/individual to team-only, but one thing remains constant in the Division II Men's Tennis Championship: Lander is king.

Despite losing the top four singles players from its 1994 championship team, Lander successfully defended its team title by defeating North Florida, 4-2, May 14 at Sacramento, California.

Hosted by UC Davis, the championship featured for the first time a team-only format. It also featured a "3-6" match format in which three doubles matches using an eight-game, pro-set format were played for one team point, followed by six best-of-three-sets singles matches valued at one team point each.

Lander, which became an NCAA institution three years ago, has claimed three consecutive team titles. The Senators, who have claimed 49 consecutive victories dating back to the 1993 campaign, are only the third team in championship history to win three consecutive team titles. Southern Illinois-Edwardsville (1978 through 1984) and UC Irvine (1970 through 1973) are the other teams that have won at least three straight.

"Maybe tradition helped us a little bit," said Lander coach Joe Cabri, whose team finished the season at 19-0. "This team started out much below past teams, but these guys really wanted to prove they could do it, too. This is an amazing accomplishment."

Getting doubles victories from its No. 1 tandem of Claes Persson and Anders Nilsson and its No. 3 duo of Michael Aulit and Janne Vilhunen, the Senators claimed the sole doubles point against North Florida and then claimed three of the top four singles matches to post the victory.

Playing indoors because of rain, the Senators got singles victories from Jerome Moreau at No. 2, Nilsson at No. 3 and Vilhunen at No. 4. Vilhunen dropped only one game in his 6-0, 6-1 championship-match victory over Reggie Exum.

"It was crucial to win the doubles point, especially with playing the one, three and five singles first," said Cabri. "Our strengths are at two and four (Moreau and Vilhunen). They've been undefeated all year and having them wait was a disadvantage for us."

North Florida, playing in its first NCAA championship, got singles victories from Tom Jedlik at No. 1 and Roger Exum at No. 5. The Ospreys finished the season with a 20-8 record.

"They were better than us today," said North Florida coach Charley Jenks. "Jedlik made a good bid to be No. 1 in the nation. We'll be back next year. We've got great kids, and we played hard."

Armstrong State blanks Grand Canyon and captures its first women's crown

Entering the Division II Women's Tennis Championship, Armstrong State coach Mark Beyers felt the Pirates' title hopes centered on one goal: winning doubles.

Beyers' feeling was not based on intuition, but fact. In 18 matches before the championship, Armstrong State won the doubles point 15 times. The result was 15 victories.

That record improved to 19 victories as the Pirates won doubles in all four of their matches and claimed their first Division II team championship. Armstrong State clinched the crown May 14 in Sacramento, California, with a 4-0 victory over Grand Canyon in the championship final.

UC Davis served as host of the first team-only championship.

"The doubles point is so big," Beyers said. "We play so much more at ease when we're up 1-0. The three times this season we lost the doubles point, all three times we went on to lose. After getting the doubles point...we felt pretty confident when we got quick wins in three and five singles."

The doubles point — awarded to the team that wins at least two of three doubles matches — did not come easily against Grand Canyon.

After dropping the No. 1 doubles match, Regina Wieser and Monika Wisser rallied from a service break in No. 2 doubles to defeat April Yarmus and Tina Lopez, 8-4. Hiskia van der Leij and Ilka Mathiak then gave the Pirates the doubles point by defeating Harriet Cotton and Tanya Lopez, 8-4, at No. 3 doubles, 8-4.

Bolstered by its doubles play, the Pirates then got victories from Sandra van der Aa, Jeanine Christian and Wisser at Nos. 1, 3 and 5 singles, respectively, to win the team title. Christian dropped only one game in defeating Penny Statters, 6-0, 6-1, while Wisser defeated Harriet Cotton, 6-2, 6-2. Van der Aa clinched the title by beating Denise Valentin, 6-4, 6-1.

"The doubles point was big," said Grand Canyon coach Carol Sandvig, whose team finished third in 1994. "We got it yesterday (against Rollins in the semifinals), but lost it today."

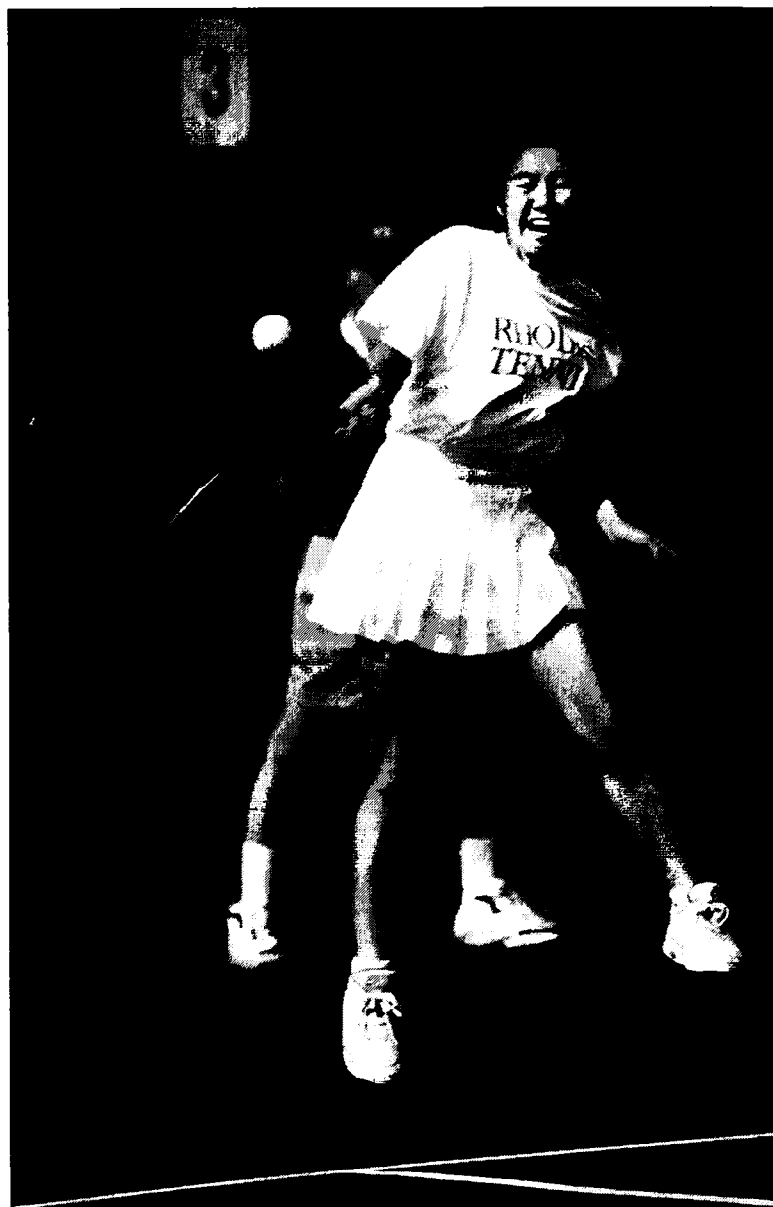

DOWN TO THE WIRE

Consistency from start to finish enables Kenyon to edge UC San Diego in III women's tennis final

Whoever said, "It's not how you start, but how you finish," got it only half right.

Proving that a good start is as important as a strong finish, Kenyon's women's tennis team jumped out to a 2-1 lead over defending champion UC San Diego after doubles play and went on to win its second Division III team title May 12 at Sweet Briar.

Kenyon, which claimed the 1993 title, outlasted the Tritons, 5-4. The Ladies' triumph prevented UC San Diego from becoming the first team to successfully defend a title in the championships' 14-year history.

Nao Kinoshita of Rhodes won the individual singles title, while Marilyn Baker and Natalia Garcia of Washington and Lee claimed the doubles crown.

Washington and Lee edged Trinity (Texas), 5-4, in the third-place match.

"The doubles were the key," said Kenyon coach Paul Wardlaw. "We came up big in the doubles."

"(Doubles play) was very crucial," said Ali St. Vincent, who teamed with Kim Schultz to form

Kenyon's No. 2 doubles team. "(UC) San Diego's very strong there...they've got great doubles."

The Ladies can thank Kenyon's No. 2 tandem of St. Vincent and Schultz and No. 3 team of Lori Mannheimer and Jamie Griffith for gaining the early edge.

St. Vincent and Schultz rolled to a 8-2 triumph over Michele Malephansakul and Yumi Takemoto, while Mannheimer and Griffith edged Morgan Gessford and Hilary Somers, 8-5.

"Those last two doubles matches were the key," said UC San Diego coach Liz La Plante. "We played very well and we could've beaten them, maybe, on a different day."

After doubles, freshman St. Vincent gave Kenyon a 3-1 lead by defeating Malephansakul, 6-2, 7-6 (7-1), at No. 1 singles.

Kenyon then clinched the title with victories from Amy Rowland and Mannheimer at Nos. 3 and 4 singles, respectively. Rowland defeated Somers in two sets, while Mannheimer rallied from a one-

set deficit to outlast Miki Kurokawa.

"It feels great," Rowland said of the Kenyon victory. "We worked hard for this. It was really key for us to win two doubles matches."

Kinoshita, the first Rhodes tennis player to win an individual championship, culminated an impressive tournament by defeating Amy Smith of Emory, 7-6, 6-0, in the final. Kinoshita did not lose a set and dropped only 21 games through five singles matches.

Baker and Garcia edged Gustavus Adolphus' duo of Alice Han and Tracy Erickson to win their school's first individual championship. Baker and Garcia posted a 6-4, 5-7, 6-2 triumph. The duo advanced to the final by knocking off defending doubles champion Becky Mallory and Julie Greenwood of Williams in semifinal play.

The Tigers set a school record for most victories in a season and are leading the Southeastern Conference's West Division. Eight starters are hitting over .300, including the SEC's all-time hit leader, Jay Waggoner. The senior first baseman is hitting .345 with six home runs and 51 runs batted in. Two pitchers, Ryan Halla and Finley Woodward, are among national leaders in wins and saves, respectively. Halla is 14-2 and tied for the Division I lead in wins, while Woodward leads the division with 17 saves....In what was supposed to be a rebuilding year, Cal State Fullerton (45-9) turned its question marks into exclamation points. The Titans won the Big West Conference regular-season championship with an 18-3 record after replacing their entire starting pitching rotation from a team that advanced deep into last year's College World Series. Ted Silva, a relief pitcher last season, is 13-1 as a starter with a 2.49 earned-run average. All-America candidate Mark Kotsay is one of the best two-way players in the country. The sophomore centerfielder/relief pitcher is hitting .426 with 16 home runs and 70 RBI, and is 2-1 with nine saves and a 0.44 ERA....After losing its first contest of the season, Clemson (45-7) won 25 consecutive games and never looked back. The Tigers lead the Atlantic Coast Conference with a 20-4 record despite losing a three-game set at Florida State in late April. Consensus all-American Shane Monahan leads the team with a .416 average; he also has 11 home runs, 48 RBI and 15 stolen bases. Junior lefthander Jason Dawsey leads a staff that has the fifth low-

est ERA in the country. He is 9-2 with a 2.61 ERA and 117 strikeouts in 96 $\frac{2}{3}$ innings....Other teams that will challenge for the national title include Florida State, LSU, Miami (Florida), defending champion Oklahoma, Oklahoma State and Wichita State.

Field: A maximum of 48 teams will be selected to compete in the championship — 18 through automatic qualification, six via play-in competition and 24 at large. The eight regional champions will advance to the College World Series.

Dates and sites: Regional competition will be May 25-29 at campus sites. For the 46th consecutive year, the College World Series (CWS) will be at Johnny Rosenblatt Stadium in Omaha, Nebraska; Creighton will serve as host. The CWS is set for June 2-10.

Television coverage: CBS-TV will provide live coverage of a preliminary College World Series game June 3 and of the championship game June 10. ESPN or ESPN2 will provide live coverage of all other College World Series games.

Results: Scores and pairings from regional competition will appear in the May 31 issue of The NCAA News. Championship results will be published June 14.

Championship notes: Oklahoma will try to become only the fourth school in Division I baseball history to repeat as champion. The only other repeaters are Southern California (1970 through 1974), Texas (1949 and 1950) and Stanford (1987 and 1988)....Southern California has won more championships (11) than any other institution....Texas holds the record for most appearances in the championship (40) and the most victories (154).

National Collegiate Women's Golf

Sun Devils return as the clear favorite

Event: 1995 National Collegiate Women's Golf Championships.

Overview: Arizona State captured last year's crown by 16 strokes and this year's top five Sun Devils have won eight events by an average of 28 strokes per tournament. Wendy Ward, second individually a year ago, heads the squad and is coming off her second Pacific-10 Conference championship in three years. Ward has captured nine titles during her career to become Arizona State's all-time leader. Ward has won four events this year, including the Fall Preview at Wilmington, North Carolina, and sports a 72.2 stroke average through 24 rounds of play. She also participated in the LPGA Tour's Standard Register Ping tournament March 16-19 at the Moon Valley Country Club in Phoenix, where she finished third — three strokes behind winner Laura Davies. In addition to Ward, sophomore Heather Bowie has won four events and freshman Kellee Booth has posted eight top-10 finishes in nine tries....San Jose State, Stanford and Tulsa may have the best chance of dethroning the Sun Devils. San Jose State returns Janice Moodie and Vibeke Stensrud, top-10 finishers in 1994. The Spartans have finished no worse than fifth in eight events, including victories at the Topy Cup in Japan and the Big West Conference Championships in Las Cruces, New Mexico....Stanford features all-Pac-10 performer Mhairi McKay, who won the Edean Ihlanfeldt Invitational in October, the Santa Clara Intercollegiate in February and the California Collegiate in April....Tulsa is paced by Sofie Eriksson, who was the medalist in the San Jose State Invitational and the Missouri Valley Conference championships.

Field: A total of 204 golfers representing five districts will participate in two regionals to determine the championships field of 102 individual competitors.

Dates and site: The championships will be May 24-27 at the Landfall Golf Club in Wilmington, North Carolina. North Carolina-Wilmington will serve as the host institution.

Television coverage: Prime Network will provide same-day, tape-delayed coverage of the third and final rounds from 9 to 11 p.m. (Eastern time) May 26 and 5 to 7 p.m. May 27.

Championships notes: Arizona State has finished first or second in 26 of 28 tournaments dating back to the 1992-93 season. In the other two, the Sun Devils finished third and fourth....The Sun Devils have won the team title in three of the last five years, including the last two. Another championship this year would move them out of a tie with San Jose State for the most titles in tournament history....This year marks the end of a single NCAA championships tournament in women's golf. The inaugural Division I women's championships will tee off next year, leaving Divisions II and III to compete in the National Collegiate Women's Golf Championships.

Division I Men's Golf

Stanford, Cowboys prepare to battle

Event: 1995 Division I Men's Golf Championships.

Overview: A battle looms between defending champion Stanford and perennial power Oklahoma State, currently ranked atop the Golf World top-20 poll. Stanford returns four of five golfers from last year's squad that took the team trophy by four shots over Texas, and adds freshman phenom and current U.S. amateur champion Tiger Woods to the lineup. But Oklahoma State, fifth a year ago, is poised to make a run at its first title since 1991 behind seniors Alan Bratton and Chris Tidland and junior Trip Kuehne, each of whom has won two individual crowns this year. Bratton finished second individually behind Justin Leonard of Texas at last year's championships and has finished no worse than fifth in seven events this season, including a win at the prestigious Golf Digest Collegiate and a co-championship at the Big Eight Conference championships. Tidland tied Kuehne for first at the Golf World Collegiate in November, then shared medalist honors with Bratton at the Big Eight tournament in April....Stanford has beaten the Cowboys head-to-head twice, both times as champions of an event. The Cardinal won the Ping Intercollegiate Golf Preview at Ohio State, site of this year's championships, then ran away from the field by 27 strokes at the Jerry Pate Invitational in Birmingham, Alabama, where Woods was the medalist. In addition to Woods, Stanford features William Yanagisawa and Notah Begay, top-five finishers in 1994, and fellow seniors Casey Martin and Steve Burdick....A host of challengers will push the two favorites, including Texas, Nevada-Las Vegas, Georgia Tech and Arizona State.

Field: A total of 156 golfers representing nine districts will compete for the team and individual championships.

Dates and site: The championships will be May 31-June 3 at Ohio State.

Results: Championships results will appear in the June 7 issue of The NCAA News.

Television coverage: ESPN will provide live second- and third-round coverage at 1 p.m. (Eastern time) June 1 and 11 a.m.

June 2. ESPN2 also will provide third-round coverage at 5:30 p.m. June 2. ESPN will televise the final round live at 2 p.m. June 3.

Championships notes: Oklahoma State and Stanford are tied with seven team championships apiece, but both trail Yale, which has 21 victories. The Elis' last crown, however, came in 1943....Oklahoma State's Big Eight title was its 35th in 38 years....Other top individuals in this year's field include Stewart Cink of Georgia Tech, Chris Riley of Nevada-Las Vegas, Todd Demsey of Arizona State and Texas' Harrison Frazier.

Division II Men's Track and Field

After close race in '94, favorites remain closely matched

Event: 1995 Division II Men's Outdoor Track and Field Championships.

Overview: One point is all that separated St. Augustine's and Abilene Christian at the 1994 championships. In fact, the team race wasn't decided until the final event, when St. Augustine's finished first in the 1,600-meter relay — a mere .21 seconds ahead of the Wildcats. Can it be as close this year? Abilene Christian coach Wes Kitley thinks it can. "It could be déjà vu," he said. "I think it will come down to a combination of quality and depth. I think what you'll see is that we'll both score close to 100 points"....Coach George Williams' St. Augustine's squad showcases standout sprints and field-events corps led by Derrick Sutherland (100-meter dash), Marlin Cannon (200- and 400-meter dashes), Otis Scott (400-meter dash), Ryan Hayden (400-meter dash and 400-meter hurdles), Rory Harris (110-meter hurdles) and Chris Coleman (triple jump)....The Wildcats counter with equally impressive middle-distance, distance and field-events corps showcasing Savieri Ngidhi (800-meter run), Peter Engelbrecht (800- and 1,500-meter runs), Thomas Korir (5,000-meter run), Eric Thomas (400-meter hurdles) and Mike Edwards (pole vault). As for the 1,600-meter relay, it should be noted that Abilene Christian has posted the

event's top qualifying time of 3:05.10 — a mere .08 seconds better than the Falcons' top mark.

Field: The NCAA Executive Committee has approved a qualifying procedure that allows for a maximum of 236 individual participants.

Dates and site: The championships will be May 25-27 at Emporia State.

Results: Championships results will appear in the May 31 issue of The NCAA News.

Championships notes: Robert Dilts of UC Davis, third a year ago in the hammer throw, is the only hammer-throw competitor this year to register a toss better than 200 feet. Dilts posted a mark of 206 feet, 4 inches, March 4....Barry Smith of Cal State Los Angeles has the top qualifying marks in both the 100- (10.23) and 200-meter dashes (20.59)....Otis Scott, Marlin Cannon and Ryan Hayden of St. Augustine's have the top three qualifying times in the 400-meter dash....Charles Mulinga of Lewis owns the top qualifying mark in the 10,000-meter run with a time of 28:00.33. Mulinga shattered the championships record last year with a time of 28:37.90.

Division II Women's Track and Field

Dominant Wildcats should win again

Event: 1995 Division II Women's Outdoor Track and Field Championships.

Overview: Abilene Christian won four of the championships' first seven titles, but has not claimed the team championship since 1988. The Wildcats' drought could end this year. After finishing second at the last two championships, the Wildcats return a number of talented and experienced competitors — including Hermin Joseph (defending champion in the 100-meter dash), Revoli Campbell (200- and 400-meter dashes), Mary Tombiri-Shiri (100- and 200-meter dashes), Amara Ezem (100- and 400-meter dashes), Donna Hinkson (400-meter dash), Kim Bartee-Neece (high jump) and Lindsay Welsh (triple jump). Cal State Los Angeles, vying for its first team championship, most certainly will challenge the Wildcats. The Golden Eagles, runners-up in 1992, boast a slew of sprints and distance competitors. Leading the way for coach Greg Ryan's squad are Marisol Cossio (3,000- and 10,000-meter runs), Marisa Avendano (3,000- and 5,000-meter runs), Angeleta Graham (400-meter dash) and Taunika Ogans (200- and 400-meter dashes). Alabama A&M blew away the field with a record 117 points for its third consecutive championship last year. It can tie a championships record with a fourth straight crown. Coach Joe Henderson's squad is led by Oluchi Elechi (defending long-jump and heptathlon champion), Georgia Harrison (400-meter dash) and Andreville Marcellin (400-meter dash). Norfolk State and Adams State also will be in the hunt. Norfolk State is led by Chandra Sturup, a three-event standout (100- and 200-meter dashes and long jump) who has claimed five individual championships.

Field: The NCAA Executive Committee has approved a qualifying procedure that allows for a maximum of 220 individual participants.

Dates and site: The championships will be May 25-27 at Emporia State.

Results: Championships results will appear in the May 31 issue of The NCAA News.

Championships notes: Chandra Sturup of Norfolk State has posted the nation's top qualifying mark in the 200-meter dash and the second-best mark in both the 100-meter dash and long jump. Only three teams — Cal Poly San Luis Obispo (six), Abilene Christian (four) and Alabama A&M (three) — have claimed team titles. Western State's Elva Dryer, two-time defending champion in the 3,000-meter run, posted a qualifying time of 9 minutes, 10.41 seconds in the event — more than 30 seconds better than the second-best qualifying time.

Division III Men's Track and Field

Indoor champions fond of sweeps

Event: 1995 Division III Men's Outdoor Track and Field Championships.

Overview: Lincoln (Pennsylvania) has not won a team title since 1990, the year it swept the indoor and outdoor championships. After winning the 1995 indoor team title, the Lions are looking for another title sweep. Boasting competitors such as Brandon Jones (100-meter dash), Jeff Taylor (400-meter dash), Mike

Taylor (800-meter run), William Robinson (800-meter run) and Willard Fairweather (400-meter hurdles), coach Cyrus Jones' squad certainly has the talent and depth to claim the team championship. So does North Central, the defending champion. Bolstered by a strong middle-distance and distance corps, the Cardinals most certainly will put up a strong title defense. North Central, which

edged Wisconsin-La Crosse by one point to win the 1994 team championship, is led by John Weigel (5,000- and 10,000-meter runs), Jim Dickerson (5,000- and 10,000-meter runs) and Brian Johnson (400-meter hurdles). Williams and Wisconsin-La Crosse are among a group of teams that also will be in the title hunt. Williams looks to Marzuki Stevens (3,000- and 5,000-meter runs), Jeremie Perry (5,000-meter run) and Ethan Brooks (discus throw), while the Eagles, winners of three of the last four team championships, showcase Mike Schnur (pole vault) and Saul Banashak (hammer throw).

Field: The NCAA Executive Committee has approved a qualifying procedure that allows for a maximum of 344 individual participants.

Dates and site: Carleton will serve as host of the championships May 24-27.

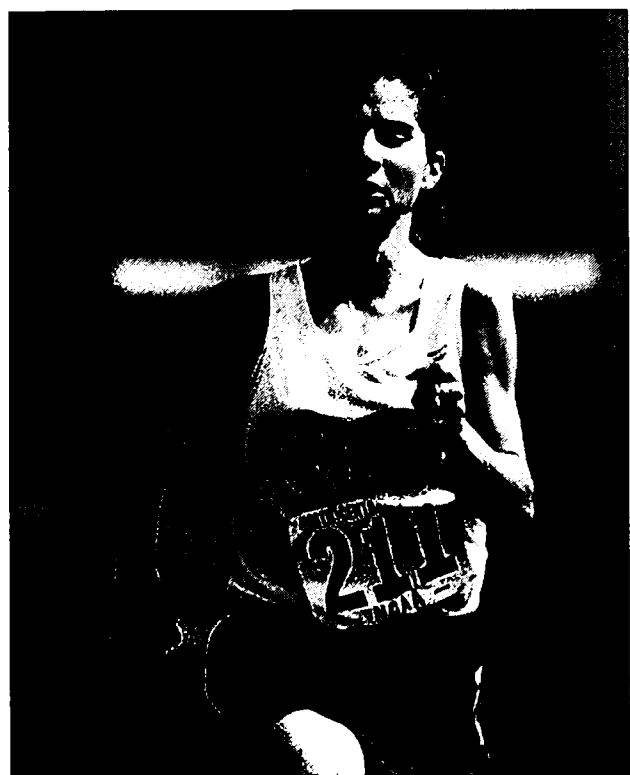
Results: Championships results will appear in the May 31 issue of The NCAA News.

Division III Women's Track and Field

This year, defending champions should have challengers

Event: 1995 Division III Women's Outdoor Track and Field Championships.

Overview: Christopher Newport blew away the field by 20 points to win last year's championship. This year's team race likely will be much closer. Contenders include Christopher Newport, Wisconsin-Oshkosh, Cortland State, Lincoln (Pennsylvania), Calvin and St. Thomas (Minnesota). Christopher Newport, winners of two of the last three team championships, is strongest in the sprints and relays. Led by Vandisha Wilder (100- and 200-meter dashes), Dominique McLaughlin (200-meter dash) and Bridgett Cochran (100-meter hurdles), the Lady Captains' strength clearly is in the sprints. Wisconsin-Oshkosh, runner-up last year, relies heavily on its middle-distance and field-events corps. Pacing the Titans' hopes are Brenda Biskobing (800-meter run) and Missy Oleson (shot put and discus throw). Cortland State boasts the championships' most formidable middle-distance and distance group. The Red Dragons, who are looking to end a nine-year drought, showcase Michelle LaFleur (3,000-, 5,000- and 10,000-meter runs), Dorothy Donnelly (5,000- and 10,000-meter runs), Heidi Swarts (3,000-meter run) and Heather Swarts (3,000-meter run). 1993 champion Lincoln (Pennsylvania), like Christopher Newport, will amass most of its points in the sprints. Lincoln is led by Shawna Hardy (100-meter dash),

Courtney Washington (400-meter dash) and Kellie Ross (100-meter hurdles). Calvin, third a year ago, hopes to improve two spots behind a strong distance group led by Renea Bluekamp (5,000-meter run), Betsy Haverkamp (5,000-meter run) and Amy Kuipers (10,000-meter run). St. Thomas showcases Kelly Copps, defending 5,000- and 10,000-meter run champion, as well as top 400- and 1,600-meter relay teams.

Field: The NCAA Executive Committee has approved a qualifying procedure that allows for a maximum of 315 individual participants.

Dates and site: Carleton will serve as host of the championships May 24-27.

Results: Championships results will appear in the May 31 issue of The NCAA News.

Championships notes: Cortland State's Michelle LaFleur has the top qualifying marks in both the 5,000- and 10,000-meter runs. St. Thomas has the top qualifying mark in the 1,600-meter relay and the second-best qualifying mark in the 400-meter relay. Brandeis' Eleena Zhelezov is vying for an unprecedented fourth consecutive title in the triple jump. Kim Oden of Nebraska Wesleyan is the only competitor to win four consecutive individual-event championships. Oden won the high jump from 1989 through 1992.

■ State legislation relating to college athletics

This report summarizes legislation currently pending before state legislatures that could affect, or is otherwise of interest to, the intercollegiate athletics programs and student-athletes of NCAA member institutions.

Set forth below is a list of 18 bills from 15 states. The report includes four bills that have been introduced, and 14 pending bills on which action has been taken, since the last report (May 3 issue of The NCAA News). The newly introduced bills are marked with an asterisk. Pending bills identified by previous reports on which no action has been taken do not appear in this report.

The State Legislation Report is based largely on data provided by the Information for Public Affairs on-line state legislation system as of May 11, 1995. The bills selected for inclusion in this report were drawn from a larger pool of measures that concern sports and therefore do not necessarily represent all of the bills that would be of interest to individual member institutions. Bills pending before the governing bodies of the District of Columbia and U.S. territories are not available on an on-line basis and are not included in this report.

The NCAA has not independently verified the accuracy or completeness of the information provided by Information for Public Affairs and is providing this summary as a service to members. For further information regarding a particular bill, members should contact the state legislature concerned.

Two bills relating to trainers have become law since the last report.

The legislatures of five states — Arkansas, Colorado,

Hawaii, Indiana and Iowa — have adjourned since the last report, bringing to 21 the number of state legislatures that have done so. In Hawaii and Iowa, pending bills will carry over to 1996. In Arkansas, Colorado and Indiana, pending bills died at the conclusion of the legislative session if they had not been cleared for the governor's signature.

***Arkansas H. 2074 (Author: Wagner)**

Establishes the State Athletic Trainers Committee and provides for the licensure of athletics trainers.

California S. 491 (Author: Solis)

Provides that anabolic steroid products not included in the Federal Controlled Substances Act shall be excluded from the list of Schedule III controlled substances.

Colorado H. 1002 (Author: Agler)

Allows athletics trainers to screen athletes for physical limitations that may pose a risk of injury.

Connecticut H. 5068 (Author: Villano)

Requires athlete agents to register with the Department of Consumer Protection; establishes standards for the conduct of athlete agents.

***Delaware S.C.R. 24 (Author: Still)**

Encourages the University of Delaware and Delaware State University to compete against each other in football.

Florida H. 1255/S. 6 (Authors: Hafner/Crist)

Exempt NCAA basketball tournament games from admissions tax.

Florida H. 1807 (Author: King)

Revises requirements for the licensure, bonding and regulation of athlete agents.

Florida H. 2413 (Author: Committee on Business)

Adopts the recommendations of the Athletic Training Regulatory Task Force.

Illinois S. 269 (Author: Geo-Karis)

Authorizes the issuance of undergraduate tuition waivers to female student-athletes at public universities.

Iowa S. 202 (Author: Committee on Human Resources)

Relates to the licensure of athletics trainers.

Louisiana H. 1943 (Author: Forster)

Authorizes tuition waivers for certain female student-athletes.

***Maine H. 1018 (Author: Gerry)**

Provides penalties for reselling tickets to an athletics event at inflated prices or without the authorization of the sponsor of the event.

Massachusetts S. 528 (Author: Lees)

Regulates the use of anabolic steroids.

Provides penalties for selling a student admission card or pass at a price in excess of its original cost.

Relates to student fees that support intercollegiate athletics at public institutions of higher education.

GTE Academic All-America Hall of Fame to induct four former student-athletes

Four former student-athletes will be inducted into the GTE Academic All-America Hall of Fame during ceremonies May 25 in Washington, D.C.

The inductees are:

■ Doug Collins, the former National Basketball Association star and new coach of the Detroit Pistons. He played at Illinois State University, where he was a secondary education major.

■ Bob Elliott, one of the University of Arizona's leading basketball scorers and rebounders. He majored in accounting at the school.

■ Michelle Johnson, the all-time women's basketball scoring leader at the U.S. Air Force Academy and Air Force's first woman Rhodes scholar. She majored in engineering at the academy.

■ Pat Richter, two-time football all-American and 1963 Rose Bowl most valuable player at the

University of Wisconsin, Madison, where he currently is director of athletics. He was a special-education major at the school.

The honorees were selected from among nominees whose classes graduated at least 10 years ago. Other criteria for consideration include selection as a GTE Academic All-America team member and a cumulative grade-point average of 3.000 (4.000 scale).

The four individuals were selected by a committee that reviewed nominees' career and community achievements since graduation from college. The hall of fame honors individuals who have attained high achievements in their chosen professions and have made substantial contributions to their communities.

The inductees join 32 other former student-athletes who are members of the hall of fame.

Possible I men's basketball misconduct reviewed

Potential acts of misconduct were reviewed by the NCAA Division I Men's Basketball Committee at its May 9 meeting in Atlanta, but no final decisions were made relating to those matters.

The committee generally uses its May meeting

to discuss possible misconduct violations that occurred during the most recently completed men's basketball championship, as well as to review the general administration of the championship.

Other highlights

In other actions at its May 9 meeting in Atlanta, the Division I Men's Basketball Committee:

■ Reviewed administration of the 1995 championship at each of the 13 sites.

■ Reviewed current projections for Division I conferences that will be eligible for automatic qualification for the 1996 Division I Men's Basketball Championship.

■ Agreed to recommend to the NCAA Executive Committee that Georgia Institute of Technology serve as the host institution for the 1996 East regional, replacing the Metropolitan Collegiate Athletic Conference, which will disband at the end of the 1994-95 academic year.

■ Reviewed a tentative agenda for the committee's summer meeting with the National Association of Basketball Coaches board of directors.

sion was reached after the Budget Subcommittee analyzed the difference between the extra money the NCAA would pay to leave the threshold at \$25,000 vs. what member institutions would pay collectively if they were forced to make up the difference.

"We asked the insurance market to assess what the impact would be on the membership if each institution were responsible for the extra insurance," McNeely said, "and it very conservatively estimated that it would increase each of their premiums up to 30 percent."

The NCAA was able to maintain the \$25,000 threshold for less than \$1,000 more per school — far less than each individual institution would have had to pay with a 30 percent increase in rates.

While the maintenance of the \$25,000 deductible will be a continuation of the status quo, a sig-

nificant change will be made in the subrogation provision of the contract. The new contract will exclude member institutions and the NCAA from the insurance company's right of subrogation in recoveries from third parties. The change was recommended by risk managers from member institu-

tions who met with the Budget Subcommittee last summer.

Apart from those changes, the program was enhanced in several ways. Among the most notable was the addition of a special assimilation/rehabilitation benefit of \$50,000 for student-athletes with spinal cord or closed-head injuries.

The benefit will provide student-athletes with the opportunity to participate in nontraditional research and rehabilitation programs such as The Miami Project for the Cure of Paralysis.

Other enhancements included increasing the home health-care

benefit from \$50,000 to \$100,000, increasing family adjustment expenses from \$30,000 to \$50,000, and increasing family travel from \$3,000 to \$6,000.

Other primary features of the program, such as lifetime/unlimited medical, dental and rehabilitation benefits for catastrophic injuries, will continue as in the current program.

Student-athletes at active member institutions in all divisions are covered during practice, competition and travel. Information on the benefits and claims protocol will be mailed this summer to the membership.

regardless of the intent. This includes posing, kneeling, shooting imaginary guns and turning away from teammates to seek individual attention from the crowd.

Removing the helmet after a play already was prohibited at the committee's February meeting.

The committee spent little time discussing dances or choreographed acts because they clearly are not spontaneous acts of team celebration.

"The purpose of the meeting, and of the videotape that will be sent to institutions, was to reduce the large gray area between what is obviously excessive and what is obviously within the bounds of enthusiastic good sportsmanship," Dooley said.

"We believe the tape will help coaches, players and officials have a clearer understanding of how specific acts should be ruled, and we hope the philosophy imparted in the tape will guide the interpretation of other actions that are not specifically addressed."

The committee developed this philosophy in discussions with a group of invited guests during the first day of the meeting.

Joe, president of the American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) and head football coach at Florida A&M University; R. C. Slocum, head football coach at Texas A&M University, College Station; and Grant Teaff, execu-

tive director of the AFCA. Frazier and Teaff also are members of the NCAA Presidents Commission Committee on Sportsmanship and Ethical Conduct in Intercollegiate Athletics.

"Their input was significant," Dooley said. "While the committee ended up being stricter than some wanted and not as strict as others wanted, the discussion helped the committee consider its path and formulate a consistent philosophy."

The group devoted considerable discussion to the effect that end-zone dances and other post-play antics of professional players have on collegiate and high-school athletes. The committee agreed that it needed to take a stand against this type of individual display, regardless of the entertainment value it holds for some fans.

"This committee represents nearly 600 educational institutions from across the country and at all levels of competition," Dooley said. "There is something more to our game than entertainment. The entertainment part is important, but we want to preserve the image and integrity of a game that is conducted by educational institutions to build character and develop teamwork."

In other action, the committee received a request from the AFCA and the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics to allow the "College Football USA" logo to be placed on helmets and playing fields, beginning next season. The committee approved the request in principle and forwarded the request to the NCAA Executive Committee for its review.

mittee, said the Football Rules Committee reviewed nearly 150 examples of celebratory behavior, which is divided into examples of what should be subject to penalty and what should not. Teaff noted that a video will be produced for the review of coaches and officials.

In a related matter, the NCAA Men's Ice Hockey Rules Committee took several actions on sportsmanship issues at its recent meeting (see story on page 5).

The committee also finished a review of its shared-values paper, which now will be submitted to the Commission and the Council. The shared-values paper describes a multifaceted approach from all lev-

■ Interpretations Committee minutes

Conference No. 4 April 20, 1995

Acting for the NCAA Council, the Interpretations Committee issued the following interpretations:

Agents

1. Referrals from the NCAA Professional Sports Liaison Committee Related to Activities Involving Agents.

a. The committee agreed that it would be necessary to sponsor legislation in order to preclude the employment of a prospect or a student-athlete by an agent under any circumstances.

b. The committee agreed not to recommend to the Council that it reverse a previous Interpretations Committee minute (reference: March 11, 1993, telephone conference, Item No. 2), which permits a corporation or business organization (e.g., Nike) that includes as one of its services the marketing of student-athletes' athletic ability or reputation to sponsor a summer basketball league (or a team participating in the league) without jeopardizing the eligibility of the participants in the league (or participants on the team), provided the division of the corporation or business associated with the representation of student-athletes is not involved in any way with the league (or team). The committee recommended that the Professional Sports Liaison Committee and/or the Special

Committee to Review the Relationship of Apparel Manufacturers to the Intercollegiate Athletics Community consider asking the Council to sponsor legislation to address their concerns.

(References: NCAA Bylaws 12.3.1 [use of agents (general rule)] and 12.3.1.2 [use of agents (benefits from prospective agents)] and IC 03/11/93, Item No. 2)

Employment/Individual Financial Aid Limits

2. Compensation for Creative Efforts (Divisions I, II and III). Compensation received during the academic year for creative efforts (e.g., artists, singers/entertainers) by a student-athlete with remaining eligibility is not included in the student-athlete's individual grant-in-aid limitations if the labor is performed and submitted for marketing during the institution's official vacation period. Under such circumstances, any compensation generated from the continuing sales of the product (e.g., album, book) during the academic year also is not included in the student-athlete's financial aid limitations. The committee noted that the student-athlete's name or picture may not appear on the commercial product or be used in any manner to promote the sale of the commercial product without jeopardizing the student-athlete's remaining eligibility. [References: 12.5.1.3 (continuation of modeling and other nonathletically related promotional activities after enrollment), 15.1.1(a) (types of aid included in limit — employment) and 15.2.6 (employment) and IC 9/13/90, Item No. 4]

Official Visit/Transportation

3. Issues Related to Air Transportation of Prospect To and From an Official Visit (Divisions I and III).

a. Effective August 1, 1995, an institution's coaching staff member may not accompany a prospect to and from an official visit if any air travel (commercial or institutional airplane) is used to transport the prospect to and from an official visit, except as permitted in 13.6.2.5. The committee expressed concern as to whether the legislation would effectively address concerns related to the extension of the 48-hour time limit for official visits, inasmuch as it continues to permit coaches to accompany prospects to and from official visits when automobile transportation occurs within the state in which the institution is located or, if outside the state, within 100 miles of the institution's main campus.

b. Effective August 1, 1995, except as permitted in 13.6.2.5, a Division I-AA institution's athletics department staff member may provide automobile transportation for a prospect between the prospect's home or educational institution only if the prospect's home or educational institution is within the state in which the institution is located or, if outside the state, within 100 miles of the institution's main campus. [References: 13.6.2.2.3 (coach accompanying prospect), 13.6.2.3 (air transportation), 13.6.2.4 (transportation by Division I-AA institutional staff members) and 13.6.2.5 (from airport)]

Evaluation/Tournament

4. Evaluation at Separate Event Con-

ducted on the Same Day as a Tournament (Divisions I and II). If an institution evaluates a prospect at an event conducted on the same day as a multiday tournament, the institution is charged only with a single evaluation of a prospect who participates in both the tournament and the event. [References: 13.1.9.3 (on the same day) and 13.1.9.7.1 (tournament observations)]

Transfer/One-Time Transfer Exception/Eligibility

5. Transferring Student's Eligibility at Previous Institution (Divisions I and II). The committee determined that the provisions of 14.5.5.3.11(c), which indicate that a transfer student must be one who would have been eligible had he or she remained at the institution from which the student transferred, relate only to the prospect's academic eligibility at the previous institution. The committee noted that the provisions of 14.5.1.4 remain applicable and, thus, a transfer student who has been disqualified or suspended from the previous institution for disciplinary reasons (as opposed to academic reasons) must complete one academic year of residence at the certifying institution. [References: 14.5.1.4 (disciplinary suspension) and 14.5.5.3.11(c) (one-time transfer exception)]

Seating/Official and Unofficial Visit

6. Special Seating to Observe On-Campus Intrasquad Scrimmages (Division I). An on-campus intrasquad scrimmage (e.g.,

spring football scrimmage, "midnight madness" basketball scrimmage) that is open to the general public is considered a campus athletics event, even if no admission is charged to attend the event. Thus, complimentary admissions provided to a prospect (or the prospect's parents or legal guardians or spouse) for such an event during an official or unofficial visit must be in the general seating area of the facility used for conducting the event. [References: 13.7.5.2 (complimentary admissions) and 13.8.2.1 (general restrictions)]

Recruiting Coordination Function/Telephone Calls/Compliance/Coordinator

7. Compliance Coordinators Making Telephone Calls to Football Prospects (Divisions I-A and I-AA). An institution's compliance coordinator may make telephone calls to football prospects related only to compliance issues (e.g., NCAA rules, academic or admissions issues), provided such calls occur subsequent to the prospect's signing of a National Letter of Intent (NLI) with that institution (or, for those institutions not subscribing to the NLI, subsequent to the prospect's signed acceptance of the institution's written offer of admission and/or financial aid). [References: 11.7.2.3 (Division I-A football — football recruiting coordination functions); 11.7.3.3 (Division I-AA football — football recruiting coordination functions) and 13.1.3.4.1.1 (academic advisors); and IC 12/15/93, Item No. 6, and IC 8/25/94, Item No. 8-b]

The committee, at its May 10-13 meeting in Santa Fe, New Mexico, cited five specific acts of unsportsmanlike conduct that will be penalized.

The acts are taunting; spitting at an opponent; spraying the goaltender with ice; shooting the puck

after the whistle; or kicking, throwing or knocking an opponent's stick for the purpose of keeping it away from the opponent.

"The rules committee is very concerned with the image of college hockey and promoting ethical behavior by student-athletes and coaches," said Sidney J. Watson, athletics director at Bowdoin Col-

lege and chair of the rules committee.

"We believe a two-minute minor penalty that penalizes the team as well as the player will decrease the taunting and other unsportsmanlike behavior in the game."

With the addition of an unsportsmanlike-conduct penalty, the committee also voted to revise the mis-

conduct penalty language. It will recommend that Rule 6-1-a be revised so that "a misconduct and/or game misconduct penalty shall be imposed on any player who uses obscene, profane or abusive language; obscene gestures; or ethnic or racial slurs before, during or after the game."

In another matter related to player conduct, the committee will pro-

pose a carry-over fight-rule penalty for players who participate in a fight during the last game of a season. The committee will recommend that student-athletes with remaining eligibility serve the applicable penalty — under the progressive game-disqualification penalty system used in college hockey — at the beginning of the next season.

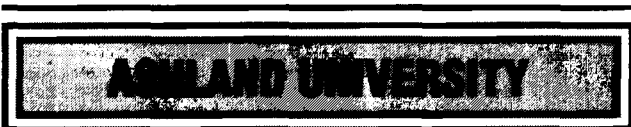

NCAA Bylaw 14.3.1.3

Core-course units — minimum hours of classroom instruction

Divisions I and II institutions should note that during its April 24-26 meeting, the NCAA Council reviewed a recommendation from the NCAA Academic Requirements Committee that a core-course unit should represent approximately 150 hours (as opposed to 180 hours) of classroom instructional hours, based on information supplied by the NCAA Initial-Eligibility Clearinghouse that the 180-hour standard is no longer realistic since few high-school class periods exceed 50 minutes in length. The Council agreed that a core-course unit represents approximately 150 hours (as opposed to 180 hours) of classroom instructional hours.

NCAA Bylaw 14.3.1.3.3

Independent study or correspondence courses

Divisions I and II institutions should note that in accordance with Bylaw 14.3.1.3.3, an independent-study or correspondence course may not be used to satisfy core-curriculum requirements. During its April 24-26 meeting, the Council reviewed the application of Bylaw 14.3.1.3.3 and determined that it was not intended to preclude the use of a legitimate

courses completed through individualized classroom instruction under the following conditions:

1. The course involves established and regularly conducted classroom sessions with qualified instructors;
2. The course contains approximately 150 hours of classroom instruction, although reasonable accommodations may be made for the more concentrated nature of classroom instructional hours completed through individualized instruction;
3. The high school's standard grading scale is used in the course; and
4. Absent information to the contrary, a rebuttal presumption exists that such a course was an independent-study course.

One-time transfer exception

Division I institutions should note that with the adoption of 1995 NCAA Convention Proposal No. 70 (14.5.5.3.11, effective immediately), a Division I-AA football student-athlete who transfers to a Division I-A institution may not use the one-time transfer exception to the transfer residence requirement. The Council, at its pre-Convention meeting, determined that a football student-athlete who transfers from a Division I-AA institution to a Division I-A institution during the spring 1995 term on or after the adjournment of the 1995

Convention (i.e., January 10, 1995) would not be permitted to use the one-time transfer exception to become eligible immediately at the Division I-A institution. During its April 24-26 meeting, the Council modified its interpretation to indicate that a Division I-AA football student-athlete who transferred to a Division I-A institution in the spring of 1995 and who clearly began the process of transfer prior to the adjournment of the 1995 Convention (i.e., January 10, 1995) may use the one-time transfer exception to the residence requirement to become eligible immediately, even though the actual transfer occurred subsequent to the conclusion of the 1995 Convention.

Figure 14-1, 1995-96 NCAA Manual

Figure 14-1, page 172, incorrectly indicates that effective August 1, 1995 (for the 1995-96 academic year), the required core-curriculum grade-point average necessary to satisfy the initial-eligibility requirements is 2.500. Figure 14-1 should indicate that 2.000 is the required core-curriculum grade-point average that is effective August 1, 1995 (for the 1995-96 academic year).

"I thought it was beneficial to hold the hearing," Neinas said. "I think this will be the first in a series (of congressional deliberations on Title IX)."

If the subcommittee decides, however, that all is well with Title IX, the gender-equity debate in Washington will not necessarily end. Rep. J. Dennis Hastert, R-Illinois — leader of the effort in Congress to examine Title IX on behalf of a coalition of nonrevenue sports coaches associations — could continue to represent that group's concerns if the subcommittee chooses to take no action.

Hastert said he does not advocate repeal of Title IX. But he plans to continue discussions with the subcommittee, which has congressional oversight over matters involving Title IX and is where any legislative changes or amendments affecting Title IX's interpretation by OCR would begin.

At a press conference after the May 9 hearing, Hastert alluded to certain legislative remedies and said he plans to "focus in on what (Title IX's) intent really is."

No need to continue

Meanwhile, those who support the current interpretation of Title IX see no need for the hearing process to continue.

Christine H. B. Grant, women's athletics director at the University of Iowa, said Title IX is getting scrutiny in Congress because some institutions choose to eliminate men's sports programs, instead of adding women's programs, to move toward compliance with the law.

"The overriding thought in my head is how sad it is that we are here talking about Title IX 23 years later," Grant said. "The hearing was called primarily because some people are concerned that men are losing opportunities. But what about the women who never have had an opportunity? (Males) have the lion's share of participation opportunities. The facts speak for themselves."

Grant said she proposes the appointment of cost-containment

committees, charged with seeking a reduction of expenses in the sports of football and men's basketball. Those potential savings, Grant contends, can help many institutions bridge the gap between men's and women's participation numbers and funds spent on men's and women's athletics programs.

T. J. Kerr, wrestling coach at California State University, Bakersfield, and president of the National Wrestling Coaches Association, agreed that forming cost-containment committees — particularly at the national level — might help extract more revenue from football and men's basketball for other sports programs on campuses.

But Kerr said it may be more important that the congressional subcommittee and other members of Congress hear from the NCAA membership that few people favor the elimination of men's programs in the name of gender equity. He said he plans to address what he labeled "misinformation and half-truths" provided in some testimony at the hearing.

Kerr said he is most disturbed that some people find cutting men's sports teams an acceptable solution to gender-equity imbalances.

"That kind of logic really irks me," said Kerr, who plans to send a 13-page document to the subcommittee outlining the inaccuracies he heard.

Kruczek receives NACDA's Corbett award

Elizabeth "Betty" Kruczek, director of athletics at Fitchburg State College and former secretary of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics, has been chosen by NACDA's honors and awards committee as the recipient of the 29th James J. Corbett Memorial Award.

Kruczek is the first woman to receive the award, which is the highest honor NACDA presents for athletics administration.

The award is presented annually to the athletics administrator who "through the years has most typified Corbett's devotion to intercollegiate athletics and has worked unceasingly for its betterment." Corbett, former athletics director at Louisiana State University, was NACDA's first president in 1965.

Kruczek was NACDA secretary from 1989 to 1994. She also served on NACDA's executive committee from 1982 to 1986.

She served from 1984 to 1986 as

NCAA Division III vice-president and was a member of the NCAA Council from 1980 to 1984. In 1979, she became the first woman to serve on the Division III Steering Committee.

Kruczek has been president and a member of the executive board of the New England Collegiate Athletic Conference and president, vice-president and a member of the executive board of the Massachusetts State College Athletic Conference.

She has been athletics director at Fitchburg State since 1978 and has served in various positions at the institution since 1966.

In 1994, Kruczek was inducted into the school's athletics hall of fame and received the institution's Centennial Administrator Award. She also has been an Eastern College Athletic Conference woman of the year.

Kruczek expressed surprise when

she was notified of her selection for the Corbett Award.

"I was overwhelmed and sent into a state of shock upon being notified by Bill Byrne, chair of the NACDA honors and awards committee, that I was to be the 1995 James J. Corbett Memorial Award recipient," she said. "To be so honored, being fully cognizant of the outstanding accomplishments, impact and service of the many prominent colleagues who have previously received the award, makes one ask, 'why me?'"

"It was the true friendships of these people — from Bill Flynn and John Toner, NCAA president and secretary, respectively, at my first NCAA Convention in 1979, to NACDA's Al Twitchell, Wiles Halllock, Bud Jack, Cecil Coleman, Mike Lude, Scotty Whitelaw, George King and Homer Rice — who fostered, encouraged and shaped my involvement in intercollegiate athletics administration."

Three schools win CFA academic award

Boston College, Wake Forest, Duke to share honor

For the first time in the history of the College Football Association's graduation rates survey, three institutions will share the CFA Academic Achievement Award.

Boston College, Duke University and Wake Forest University each had graduation rates of 95 percent in football for classes that entered in 1989. It is the seventh time in 15 years that Duke has achieved the honor and the second time for Boston College.

A record 63 institutions participated in the CFA survey, and results indicate that the graduation rates of football players at Division I-A institutions remain stable. The overall graduation rate of the reporting institutions was 58.6 percent — the second-highest rate ever reported in the

survey. The highest rate, 59.1 percent, was recorded in 1993. Last year, the rate was 57.9 percent.

CFA officials attributed the stability of graduation rates to "more demanding NCAA requirements for both initial and continuing eligibility."

The survey analyzed the fourth class recruited under Proposition 48, now known as NCAA Bylaw 14.3. The four CFA-member classes recruited under Proposition 48 yielded an overall graduation rate of 58.2 percent. The survey yielded an average rate of 50 percent among reporting institutions for the five years before adoption of Proposition 48, and 45 percent for the period from 1982 to 1986.

The three institutions receiving this year's Academic Achievement Award will be honored June 2 during the CFA's 19th annual meeting in Dallas. The award is presented by the Touchdown Club of Memphis,

Tennessee.

Sixteen other CFA members will receive honorable mention for achieving graduation rates of 70 percent or better. Those institutions are East Carolina University; Kansas State University; University of Miami (Florida); Mississippi State University; University of Missouri, Columbia; University of Nebraska, Lincoln; University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill; University of Notre Dame; Pennsylvania State University; Rice University; University of South Carolina, Columbia; Southern Methodist University; Texas Christian University; Tulane University; Vanderbilt University; and University of Virginia.

The academic advisors at Boston College, Duke and Wake Forest — Kevin Lyons, Chris Kennedy and Doug Bland, respectively — also will be honored in Dallas. It will be the fifth time that Kennedy has been honored and the second time for Lyons.
