On the rise

Following three years of decline, men's basketball again sees a gain in attendance

For the first time in three years, NCAA Division I men's basketball attendance is higher than the previous year, and the combined total attendance for all three divisions is up as well.

In games involving a Division I team, attendance was up 285,337, which is an increase of 70 fans a game. The 23,560,495 people who pushed through the turnstiles this season represent the fourth-highest turnout since record-keeping began in 1976. The record was set in 1992, when 23,893,993 people saw Division I action.

Across the nation, Division I games averaged 5,641 fans, which also is fourth all-time. The record was set in 1991, when an average of 5,735 fans attended all Division I games.

For all three NCAA divisions combined, 28,548,158 fans saw NCAA men's college basketball games in 1994-95. That figure is 157,667 more than during the year before, but average attendance for all games dropped slightly, down 23 people per game. The all-divisions-combined record also was set in 1992 with 29,378,161 spectators.

In 1995, the NCAA Division I men's basketball tournament averaged 16,858 spectators a game, the smallest average in six years. However, that figure is more a reflection of arena size for the 13 neutral sites of the tournament than the popularity of the championship. Not all the games of the tournament were sellouts; however 96.7 percent of the total capacity for the 34

sessions was reached.

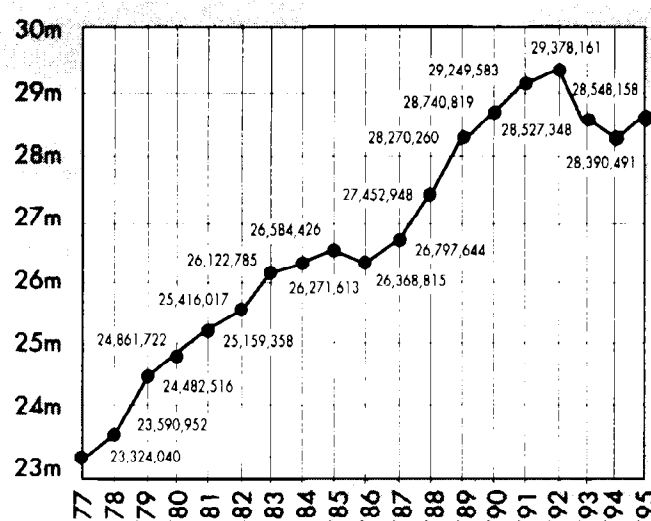
Still on top

The Big Ten Conference has been the conference leader in attendance since 1977, and did it again this season by averaging 12,708 per game. The 11 teams of the Big Ten brought in 2,058,763 spectators, down slightly from last year's 2,107,600. Two years ago, the Big Ten set the national conference record of 2,163,693.

The 12 teams of the Southeastern Conference slowly are closing the gap between the SEC and the Big Ten, as the league again finished second after jumping up from fifth place two years ago. The SEC recorded 2,002,761 fans in 174 sessions for an average of 11,510 spectators per game. That figure is up 189 fans per game from last year, while the Big Ten's increase was only 12 a game. So the SEC actually gained 177 fans per game on the Big Ten, although the Big Ten still holds an 1,198-fan-per-game advantage.

The third- through fifth-place conferences repeated, as the Great Midwest finished third, the Big East was fourth and the Atlantic Coast placed fifth. All three conferences had between 250 and 350 fans more per game than last year. Despite being one of the top attendance conferences in the nation since its inception in 1992,

the Great Midwest will be dissolved this summer. Six of its seven members are joining the newly formed Conference USA, which will have 11 members next season and 12 the following year. Dayton, the one Great Midwest member not to join Conference USA, will be a member of the Atlantic 10 for the 1995-96 season.

Kentucky gains on Syracuse

Perennial team champion Syracuse averaged 24,245 at home games to rank first for the 11th consecutive year, despite a slight drop from the previous season. The Orangemen dropped 404 fans per game, while second-place Kentucky

Kiesler joins Commission

Charles A. Kiesler, chancellor of the University of Missouri, Columbia, has been appointed to the NCAA Presidents Commission as the representative of the Big Eight Conference.

He replaces Graham B. Spanier, chancellor of the University of Nebraska, Lincoln, who will become president at Pennsylvania State University September 1.

Kiesler has been chancellor at Missouri since 1992.

He began his career in higher education as an assistant professor of psychology at Ohio State University, then served as associate professor at Yale University and as professor and chair of the psychology department at the University of Kansas.

After serving from 1975 to 1979 as executive director of the American Psychological Association, he joined the faculty of Carnegie-Mellon University, then in 1985 became provost of Vanderbilt University, where he served until his selection at Missouri.

Kiesler earned a bachelor's degree in psychology and Russian and a master's degree in psychology at Michigan State University, and a doctorate in social psychology at Stanford University.

He served in the U.S. Air Force as a Russian language specialist and intelligence analyst.

In 1994, he was appointed by the U.S. Secretary of Health and Human Services to a three-year term on the Center for Mental Health Services National Advisory Council of the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration. The 12-member council designs national priorities for the prevention and treatment of mental illness and the promotion of mental health.

Woman of the Year banquet goin' to Kansas City

The NCAA Woman of the Year banquet has found a new home.

The banquet, which has been held in Washington, D.C., and Chicago the last four years, will be in Kansas City, Missouri, this year. It is scheduled for October 22.

But that isn't the only change for the banquet, which will feature the official announcement of the 1995 NCAA Woman of the Year. For the first time, the event will be on Sunday — instead of Monday — and all 51 state winners will be invited to Kansas City a full day before the banquet.

In past years, only the 10 finalists

have come to the event a day early. The remaining state winners arrived the afternoon of the banquet.

"They (the other state winners) saw the kind of bonding going on between the 10 finalists," said Kathryn M. Reith, NCAA director of public information. "They saw the chance to share in the fact that this

was a really impressive group of women."

Kansas City's proximity to all areas of the country also played a role in its selection, Reith said. Families of the state winners, who also are invited to attend, would have an easy time reaching Kansas City. Holding the event on Sunday

also made it less disruptive for participants.

"Most of the 51 state winners are graduates who hold jobs, or they're in graduate school, or they're in the last semester of college," Reith said. "Sunday made more sense."

The state winners and the 10 finalists, who will be selected by a special committee chaired by former NCAA President Judith M. Sweet, director of athletics at the University of California, San Diego, will be announced in September. The 1995 Woman of the Year will be chosen by the NCAA Committee on Women's Athletics.

Nominations

July 14 deadline approaching for committee nominations

Nominations for vacancies on the NCAA Executive Committee, general committees appointed by the NCAA Council and sports committees must be submitted to the national office by July 14.

Administrative personnel at NCAA member institutions also are invited to submit nominations for upcoming vacancies on the NCAA Council. Those nominations are due August 25.

Nominations must be submitted to Fannie B. Vaughan, executive assistant, at the NCAA national office (fax 913/339-0035).

Under the terms of a new policy adopted by the Council, committees may not add to the nominations received from the membership. If the members of a committee want to consider certain individuals, they should make certain that someone in the membership sends a nomination letter to Vaughan by the appropriate deadline.

The NCAA Nominating Committee will review nominations and make recommendations to fill the Council positions, as well as vacancies for NCAA officers.

Title IX

NCAA sends recommended language to subcommittee

The NCAA has provided language to the Labor/Health and Human Services/Education and Related Agencies Subcommittee of the House Appropriations Committee for possible use in a committee report that will accompany the fiscal year 1996 funding bill.

The language would direct the U.S. Department of Education to work with postsecondary athletics associations to develop guidance on the three-prong test for Title IX compliance. In particular, the Office for Civil Rights would be directed to examine measures for prong three (the interests and abilities test).

The subcommittee, which will consider the bill July 10, requested the language in case its members choose to address the Title IX issue.

In a related matter, Brown University was joined June 26 by national education groups in filing appeal briefs against a Federal court decision it said creates athletics quotas for females.

The university filed a 50-page brief de-

the 1994-95 NCAA revenue-distribution plan will be mailed to Division I institutions July 28.

The most recent distribution involved the academic-enhancement fund, for which checks for \$40,000 were mailed June 23 to each Division I institution.

The NCAA Executive Committee has not established specific guidelines regarding permissible uses of the academic-enhancement funds. However, it has specified that the funds may not be used for scholarships for fifth-year student-athletes who have exhausted eligibility, for summer-school tuition or for the purchase of course books. Institutions can use the funds for new or existing programs and services.

Restructuring

Presidents modify proposal; Council to consider in August

The NCAA Council will consider a membership restructuring proposal developed by the Oversight Committee on the NCAA Membership Structure and three division task forces at its August 7-9 meeting.

The proposed structure would create a body of presidents in charge of each of the three NCAA divisions. In each division, a council of athletics administrators would report to the presidents. Each division would operate separately, although an executive committee would have overall responsibility to ensure that all three divisions operated within the general principles of the NCAA.

The NCAA Presidents Commission at its June meeting accepted the primary parts of the proposal set forth by the oversight committee and the division task forces, although it did offer some recommendations and clarifications, including one that would permit funding for programs that currently are under consideration but have not been approved, such as athletics certification in Division II.

The legislative package will appear in the Second Publication of Convention legislation, which will be mailed in September.



Briefly in the News

Team cures what ails it

There may not be a doctor in the house, but on the court it is another story.

A remarkable four of the top six players on the Abilene Christian University men's tennis team are premedicine majors. And two — doubles partners **John Cole** and **Robby Scott** — aced almost as many tests in the classroom as they did serves on the court.

Scott, a biology major who just finished his senior year, had a 3.970 grade-point average going into the spring semester. Cole, who will be a junior this fall, maintained a 3.940 GPA in organic chemistry.

Cole and Scott also were the first Abilene Christian doubles players to be ranked No. 1 in the nation for the entire season. Scott also was ranked third in singles, and Abilene Christian, a participant in the NCAA Division II Men's Tennis Championships this spring, was ranked fourth.

"Robby leads by example, and his whole attitude of putting others first makes everyone, including opponents and their coaches, have a tremendous amount of respect for him," head men's tennis coach **Ron Elston** told Abilene Christian Today alumni magazine.

"John is cut out of the same mold. You think you have one in a million with Robby, but then John comes along and reinforces the perception that we're, in a sense, breeding that type of servant-leader in our program."

This spring marked the first time that Cole and Scott competed together in doubles. It seemed a natural transition for two guys who not only were roommates but who participated in many of the same activities and groups on the Abilene Christian campus.

"Our games complement each other," Scott said. "He's probably more aggressive and he's stronger hitting his backhand. I'm better with my forehand. Also, we're used to each other."

So much, in fact, that both received the first "B" of their college careers at the same time last fall.

"He got his (B), so I thought I should get mine," Cole joked.

Giving in return

Former University of Cincinnati star basketball player **Nick Van Exel**, who helped lead the Bearcats to the 1992 Final Four, recently contributed \$25,000 toward endowing a basketball scholarship at his alma

mater.

Now a point guard for the Los Angeles Lakers, Van Exel presented the check at half time of a recent exhibition game between members of that Cincinnati Final Four team and the touring Russian national team.

"UC and coach (**Bob**) Huggins, in particular, were important to my development as the player and person I am today," Van Exel told The Associated Press. "This is a small way in which I can repay the university for what it has done for me and to guarantee support for the future of the basketball program."

Van Exel said he will make other contributions to the endowment, ultimately totaling \$100,000.

Huskies ink TV deal

Beginning next season, Connecticut residents will have an easier time watching the defending NCAA Division I women's basketball champions on TV.

The University of Connecticut athletics

department and Connecticut Public Television (CPTV) recently signed a three-year contract in which CPTV will televise live 51 Connecticut women's basketball games during the next three years (17 each season). CPTV also will produce and air 12 coach's shows featuring Connecticut head coach **Geno Auriemma**.

But Connecticut's women's basketball squad isn't the only team that will benefit from the deal. CPTV also will produce and air a minimum of one Connecticut away football game each of the next three seasons and three football coach's shows featuring head coach **Skip Holtz**. Four sports shows highlighting activities involving a variety of Connecticut athletics programs also will be televised each year.

The three-year contract will generate a minimum of \$780,000 in cash (\$260,000 annually) for the university. In addition, various other programming opportunities and joint multimedia marketing projects are valued at \$1.5 million (\$500,000 annually).

Looking back

5 years ago: The NCAA Special Committee on Cost Reduction, meeting July 12, 1990, completes a package of proposals for consideration by the NCAA Council. Some of the proposals are similar or identical to proposals made earlier in the summer by Division I conference commissioners. The recommendations focus primarily on limiting recruiting, personnel and financial aid. (The NCAA News, July 18, 1990)

10 years ago: An NCAA-sponsored study of freshman-year course-taking patterns indicates that a majority of student-athletes surveyed are carrying course loads that would allow them to graduate in four to five years. Of students reporting a declared major, the largest percentage (22 percent) were business and general studies majors. (The NCAA News, July 31, 1985)

20 years ago: National Collegiate Sports Services, the NCAA's New York City-based statistical bureau, moves July 1 to the Association's national office building in Mission, Kansas, and is renamed NCAA Statistics Service. ("NCAA: The Voice of College Sports")

25 years ago: The NCAA Special Committee on Intercollegiate Athletics Costs releases a study July 1, 1970, of intercollegiate athletics costs. The study was conducted and compiled by Mitchell H. Raiborn of the University of Missouri, Columbia. ("NCAA: The Voice of College Sports")

Fact file

The 1995 NCAA Convention was the first since a new legislative calendar was adopted five years ago at which the intended objective of lessening the number of proposals was achieved. The 160 proposals for the Convention was the lowest total since the 1986 Convention. The number of proposals sponsored at the first four Conventions after adoption of the new calendar ranged from 176 to 197 — higher in each case than the number of proposals sponsored at the two Conventions preceding adoption of the calendar (170 and 167).

A second chance to succeed in life

RAINBOW COMMISSION FOR FAIRNESS IN ATHLETICS

The odyssey of Richie Parker is an American tragedy.

Parker, for the uninitiated, is the New York schoolboy who lured a schoolmate into a stairwell and forced her to commit a sexual act. He pleaded guilty to sexual assault and was sentenced to five years probation. But his troubles did not end there.

Seton Hall University reneged on a basketball scholarship offered to the student-athlete. The University of Utah picked up pursuit but abandoned Parker, as did George Washington University, after public criticism became too great. Many now condemn him to junior college or prep school, demanding he spend time in purgatory for his sins.

While no one can or should condone Parker's actions, what is happening to him is what is happening to too many young black males today. Mistakes are leading them to be cast aside like driftwood flooding in a sea of despair. The question becomes whether to redeem our children or reject them, reclaim our youth rather than abandon them?

Currently, there are more than 600,000 black males between the ages of 18 and 29 who are caught up in the criminal justice system — either in jail, on parole or probation, or awaiting sentencing. Contrast that with the fact that there are only about 450,000 black males of all ages in colleges.

Add to that the fact that murder has become the leading cause of death among young Blacks and the situation becomes crystal clear. The black male is an endangered species. More go to the state pen than Penn State, more never have a chance to even grow up.

But it has long been known that education provides opportunity and increases life's options. Education has been the salvation for so many black youths. It has literally meant the difference between life and death for so many who have been able to escape the mean streets for a better life.

For so many black youths, it is an athletics scholarship that has provided the opportunity to pursue a college degree. Rightly or wrongly, black kids are taught from an early age that the ability to dribble a basketball or tote a football will take them down the Yellow

Pro opportunities a secondary concern

This response is to Nolan Richardson's comments on initial-eligibility standards in the June 14 issue of The NCAA News.

Coach Richardson misses the point (or perhaps makes it eloquently!) when he comments on the matter of eligibility standards for athletes' admission to college. Universities were not designed as farm teams for the NBA or NFL. They are institutions of higher learning. If a student can succeed academically and compete as an athlete, that's great! But the academic expectation comes first. That's not a "holier than thou" statement, as coach Richardson said; it is rather what colleges athletics is meant to be about.

That's the point he misses, as do many who perceive college athletics as the pathway to professional sports with aca-

Put Americans first

As a parent who had a son and daughter compete in athletics while getting their degrees, John Mitchell's comments on foreign athletes (Opinions, The NCAA News, June 7) rubbed me wrong.

The difference whether you were born in Detroit or Reykjavik is age, physical development and maturity. My son had graduated and was in medical school at the same age as foreign fresh-

men and sophomores he competed against. Some of the foreign seniors he competed against were his age when medical school was completed.

U.S. students aren't allowed to work/train/mature after high school and before entering college without losing eligibility for Division I. Yet, when Mr. Mitchell wants an athlete so he can have a better chance of winning, he goes with a prospect with the advantages.

A local sportswriter saw no difference in Bob Sura leaving classes after the Atlantic Coast Conference tournament and Tanya Harding coming to the United States just to pitch softball and not completing her class work. I do.

So much for the student-athlete — U.S. born — for coach Mitchell.

Court's drug-testing ruling is flawed

Discussing the recent U.S. Supreme Court decision on drug testing for high-school student-athletes:

"A random drug-testing plan might be acceptable if its target was steroids. Some student-athletes feel compelled to use steroids in order to keep up with their competitors who are using the drugs. A school district or a college athletics association or even the International Olympic Committee can make a case that random testing ends the escalating arms race and protects all athletes.

"[The school district's] policy, however, had nothing to do with steroids. Instead, general drug and alcohol abuse is the target. Athletes were singled out not because they were prone to steroid abuse but because they were role models more able to lead others astray.

"Does Antonin Scalia's opinion extend to the general student body? He wrote that his decision should not be read to support an extension of suspicionless searches for other groups. But there is little in Scalia's opinion to explain why athletes should be singled out.

"Drugs in school damage the learning environment for all. All students are potential abusers. Non-athletes are role models, too. Athletes shower with others, but so do all students after gym classes. Impaired athletes could be injured, but so could impaired dance students. Or impaired drivers. Drug abusers who don't want to get caught can stop turning out for athletics teams, yet their negative effect on the school remains.

"We are at a point in America where two compelling yet conflicting fears are driving public policy. The first is the fear of crime. The second is the fear of an increasingly powerful and intrusive government.

"These fears collide when we grant government more and more power under the guise of safety. At some point, we'll decide that the fear of an intrusive government has become greater than the fear of being a victim of crime.

"In the meantime, we should demand that the expanded authority some want to give government be the least needed to achieve the desired result. The Vernonia School District drug policy fails that test."

Football rules

"College football fans have seen it many times: a player scores a touchdown or makes a great play and then doffs his helmet and shows off for the cameras and fans. It is sometimes celebratory, other times showboating.

"Now the NCAA has banished nearly all celebrations. Starting this coming season, ceremonial rituals such as taking off a helmet on the field or high-fiving fans in the end zone after a score will result in an unsportsmanlike conduct penalty. The NCAA will distribute videos of this now improper behavior to all of its member schools lest there be any confusion about what is now banned.

"With all of the things that the NCAA should be concerned about — low graduation rates of athletes at many schools, gender equity, commercialization of amateurism and tight budgets — one would think that the organization could find something else to legislate other than player celebrations.

"The new rules are remarkably similar to the banning of the slam dunk in college basketball from 1967 to 1976. The rule even outlawed dunking during warm-ups. Soaring into the air and slamming the ball down through the hoop was seen as taking away from the game itself, according to the rule makers. The NCAA stubbornly held on to the dunk ban for nine years, stifling creativity and depriving fans of some great plays."

Baseball

"The American social infrastructure of the sport is crumbling. This is the vital factor often overlooked. The NFL and the NBA could disappear tomorrow and football and basketball would go on just swimmingly, thank you, at school levels. But, effectively, baseball is already only a regional college sport in the Sun Belt and, as colleges up north close earlier in the spring, the college season is squeezed to a point where, cutbacks being what they are, baseball is now a prime candidate for collegiate and neighborhood elimination. Kids not going to see Major League? How about kids not playing Little League?

"The game is played at an interminable pace and, by the way, considerably slower than it was when baseball really ruled our hearts. Baseball has gotten by on nostalgia, but now even the sacred baseball card market appears oversold. Soon the good old days will be the strikes nobody wants to remember and the midnight World Series games that nobody can remember.

"And the future? Well, the impending addition of two new expansion franchises means mostly that there are fewer places left to move failing teams. How soon before the franchise Ponzi scheme must collapse? Fans who still do attend baseball games appear to go to enjoy the stadium rather than the game and, ultimately, that's stop-gap marketing, like when the movies used to depend on air-conditioning.

"And finally, there just aren't any pitchers left. Baseball is simply no longer even capable of reproducing itself."

NYSP, USA Volleyball join forces to inspire girls' participation

The National Youth Sports Program (NYSP) has entered into a partnership with the United States Volleyball Association (USA Volleyball) that it hopes will mirror the success of arrangements with the United States Tennis Association and the Professional Golfers Association.

The partnership works much the same as with the other sports. USA Volleyball provides expert instructors for the 19 pilot sites, while NYSP provides the pupils and necessary equipment. The USA Volleyball instructors teach the NYSP staff the best methods for teaching volleyball.

This program and others like it are part of NYSP's response to the NCAA Presidents Commission's stated initiative to encourage participation by girls in nontraditional sports.

The objectives of the "Memorandum of Understanding" between NYSP and USA Volleyball are two-fold. One is to promote interest, participation and enjoyment in the game by introducing the coaches of youth to USA Volleyball curricula through the NYSP/NCAA network of universities. The other is to provide "postprogram" opportunities for youth to continue developing volleyball skills.

The partnership works, says John



Thanks to a partnership between the National Youth Sports Program and the United States Volleyball Association, girls who might not otherwise have the chance will gain exposure to the sport of volleyball at 19 pilot sites.

Torres, NYSP program director at the University of New Mexico, one of the pilot schools that has hosted the program this summer. Torres said that volleyball always had been

a part of NYSP at New Mexico, but because of the expert instruction of Matt McShane, assistant women's volleyball coach at the school, it rose to a higher level this year.

McShane participated as a representative of USA Volleyball.

"He helped immensely," Torres said. "He introduced some methods to our staff they had never seen before and helped them teach the sport more effectively."

Deborah J. Hunter, director of education, development and services at USA Volleyball, said the organization's hopes for the partnership are similar to those behind the Presidents Commission's initiative.

She said that in fall 1991, USA Volleyball identified and trained a group of people with ethnic-minority backgrounds to provide more appropriate role models in educational environments similar to NYSP.

Although New Mexico's McShane is white, Torres said the response of ethnic minorities to his instruction was positive.

"We have a cross-section as diverse as anyone's, and most were interested," Torres said. "It's their first exposure to the game. Some may have tried it in physical education classes, but this shows them more of what the game is really like."

Hunter said the biggest challenge the program faces in the early stages is that the ratio of students to in-

structors is relatively high. She said as the NYSP partnership grows, additional instructors would be available at the local level through USA Volleyball's 35 regions across the country.

Once participants have expressed an interest, both NYSP and USA Volleyball hope to steer them toward additional opportunities to play after NYSP ends.

"We want them to know what they can do to improve and continue to enjoy volleyball once they have left the structured NYSP environment," Hunter said. "Providing resources to these valuable participants to continue to play is another primary goal of our partnership."

Other NYSP-sponsoring institutions included in the volleyball pilot program include Bronx Community College; the University of California, Los Angeles; Canisius College; Coppin State College; University of District of Columbia; Harris-Stowe State College; University of Illinois, Chicago; Lehman College; Los Angeles Southwest College; Morehouse College; North Carolina A & T State University; North Carolina Central University; University of Pennsylvania; St. Louis Community College, Forest Park; San Diego City College; Temple University; Tennessee State University; and Texas Southern University.

Brick Road to success. And that road includes a trip through college sports.

True, the overwhelming majority will never earn a dime off their athletics prowess, but they do have a chance to pursue an education. Half of the Division I basketball and football players are black. And while graduation rates for black student-athletes are dismally low and getting lower, 43 percent do graduate, obviously taking advantage of the opportunity given them.

Yet there are those who would deny the Richie Parkers of the world an opportunity, a second chance to get his life in order. And this is a youth who has publicly acknowledged the seriousness of his mistake, asked for and received forgiveness from his victim, and has pleaded to get on with the rest of his life. But his punishment goes on and is likely to continue.

The alternatives for Richie Parker and the thousands of other youths shortchanged on opportunity are frightening. What looms are drugs and guns and jail and death. That is not exaggeration; that is reality.

Society must summon the courage to uplift our youth, rescue the downtrodden. Athletics already plays a role in that and can do more.

What the Rainbow Commission for Fairness in Athletics has proposed to the NCAA is the establishment of "empowerment zones," designated urban and rural areas where the goal is to reclaim troubled youths, to intervene in the lives of young Richie Parkers before they go astray.

Included in these zones would be the relaxing of current rules that severely limit the ability of coaches to interact with youth in the communities where the drugs and guns and death thrive. Coaches literally have to turn their backs on kids for fear of violating recruiting rules while the drug pushers and the gang bangers have unlimited access to them. That's stupid.

Imagine if such icons as John Thompson and Dean Smith were permitted to interact in the lives of seventh, eighth and ninth graders, running clinics not on how to play the game of basketball but the game of life. Teaching them at a young age about what it takes to be successful beyond the playing field. The future Patrick Ewings and Michael Jordans listen to these men because of the status they hold in the sports world; even those who won't reach Jordanian heights revere the men who have coached the pros.

And it is not just men. Women coaches like Cheryl Miller, Marian Washington, Vivian Stringer, Pat Summitt and the Yow sisters have influenced and inspired several gener-

Administrative Committee minutes

Conference No. 11
June 28, 1995

1. Acting for the NCAA Council:

a. At the request of the Council, reviewed an Interpretations Committee interpretation of NCAA Bylaws 20.5.1 and 20.5.2 that an institution that sponsors either the sport of football or basketball (or both) is not required to participate in the minimum number of contests for that division if the institution is not using the sport in meeting the division sports-sponsorship or four-sport/three-season requirements; expressed disagreement with that interpretation but agreed to refer the topic to the Council (and particularly the Divisions II and III steering committees) for consideration at its August meeting; and noted that in the interim, no membership applications or reclassifications should be processed under that interpretation.

b. Using its authority under NCAA Constitution 5.3.1.1.1 to adopt "noncontroversial legislation," approved the recommendation of the Recruiting Committee to amend Bylaw 30.10.5 (Division I football recruiting calendar) to clarify that seven in-person, off-campus contacts per prospective student-athlete are permitted during the contact period of December 1 through the Saturday prior to the initial signing date for the National Letter of Intent, regardless of the number of whole or partial weeks; that no more than one contact per week is permissible; and that each institution may choose the seven weeks (or partial weeks) to have contact at its discretion.

c. Directed the staff to compile a comprehensive compilation of all issues related to apparel manufacturers that have been considered by various committees and special committees over a period of time, so that all related issues may be dealt with in a more ordered manner; agreed that as such, the Professional Sports Liaison Committee was no longer responsible for submitting a report to the Council in this regard.

d. Using its authority under Constitution 5.3.1.1.1 to adopt "noncontroversial legislation," approved the recommendation of the Committee on Athletics Certification to amend Bylaw 33.6.6 to indicate that possible violations of NCAA rules discovered during evaluation visits that relate only to specific operating principles (as contained in Bylaw 23.2) shall be communicated to the committee, the institution and the conference in the peer-review team's report; and amended Bylaw 33.3.1.2 to delete the examples of special-need circumstances that may warrant a modification of an institution's place in the certification schedule.

e. Denied an institution's request for a waiver per Bylaw 11.7.1.1.1.2 to permit its restricted-earnings coach to temporarily replace the head men's basketball coach during the July evaluation period, inasmuch as the circumstance was not considered to be beyond the control of the head coach.

f. Deferred action until the July 11 conference on an institution's request for a waiver per Bylaw 14.5.5.1 of the residence requirement for a men's ice hockey student-athlete, pending receipt of additional information.

g. Appointed Joel T. Speckhard, director of financial aid/associate dean of admissions and financial planning, Elon College, to the Committee on Financial Aid and Amateurism, replacing Thomas E. Prather, no longer at an NCAA member institution.

h. Appointed Gene A. Bleymaier, director of athletics, Boise State University, to the Men's Committee on Committees, replacing William H. Moos, no longer at an institution in District 7.

2. Acting for the Executive Committee:

a. Approved the recommendation of the Women's Lacrosse Committee that Lehigh University be designated as the host institution for the 1996 National Collegiate and Division III Women's Lacrosse Championships May 18-19, replacing Harvard University, due to hotel and other logistical

problems.

b. Approved the recommendation of the Men's and Women's Swimming Committee that the qualifying period for the 1996 Division I Men's and Women's Swimming and Diving Championships be changed to end Tuesday, March 12, rather than Sunday, March 10, in order to coincide with the U.S. Olympic trials.

3. Acting for the Council and Executive Committee, confirmed the following schedule of Administrative Committee telephone conferences and/or meetings through December 1995: Tuesday, July 11 (meeting in conjunction with the Budget Subcommittee); Tuesday, August 1 (meeting in conjunction with the Executive Committee); Wednesday, August 16; Wednesday, August 30; Wednesday, September 13; Wednesday, September 27 (meeting in conjunction with the Presidents Commission); Sunday, October 8 (meeting in conjunction with the Council); Wednesday, October 18; Wednesday, November 1; Wednesday, November 15; Wednesday, November 29; Wednesday, December 6 (meeting in conjunction with the Executive Committee); Wednesday, December 20.

4. Report of actions taken by the executive director per Constitution 4.3.2.

a. Acting for the Council:

(1) Granted requests by the following institutions to replace coaches on a temporary basis per Bylaw 11.7.1.1.1.2: Western Kentucky University (women's basketball) and the U.S. Air Force Academy (football).

(2) Approved 140 summer basketball leagues (49 for men, 24 for women and 67 for both) per Bylaw 14.7.5.2 and 30.14 as reported in issues of The NCAA News.

(3) Granted waivers per Bylaw 14.7.6.1-(c) to permit student-athletes from various institutions to participate in competition involving national teams in basketball, golf, soccer, and track and field.

(4) Granted waivers per Bylaws 14.7.6.1-(d) and 14.7.6.2-(b) to permit student-athletes from various institutions to participate in all-star foreign tours to Japan, Belgium, Holland and Germany, and in tryouts for the U.S. Olympic Festival in various sports.

(5) Granted waivers per Bylaw 16.13.1 to permit institutions to provide incidental expenses in these situations:

(a) To student-athletes to attend funerals of members of the student-athletes' families.

(b) To student-athletes to attend banquets where they will be honored in various sports.

(c) To student-athletes to replace equipment and medals that were stolen from them.

(d) To student-athletes to compete in an all-star softball game.

b. Acting for the Executive Committee:

(1) Granted honorariums per Bylaw 31.4.4.1 to institutions for hosting championships at off-campus facilities.

(2) Approved a recommendation by the Division I men's golf subcommittee that the Stanford University golf course serve as the predetermined site for the West regional of the 1996 NCAA Division I Men's Golf Championship, with Stanford as host.

(3) Approved a recommendation by the Division I Men's Ice Hockey Committee that Grand Rapids Arena serve as the predetermined site for the West regional of the 1997 NCAA Division I Men's Ice Hockey Championship, with Western Michigan University as host.

(4) Approved the following regional sites for the 1995 NCAA Division II Men's and Women's Cross Country Championships: West, University of Redlands; East, College of St. Rose; Great Lakes, Lewis University; North Central, University of North Dakota; South Central, Adams State College; Southeast, University of South Carolina at Spartanburg.

(5) Approved a recommendation by the Men's and Women's Track and Field Committee that Smith College serve as the host of the 1996 NCAA Division III Men's and Women's Indoor Track Championships.

Competitive-safeguards committee focuses on health, safety issues

Committee creates three groups to help it develop plan for Council review in 1997

The NCAA Committee on Competitive Safeguards and Medical Aspects of Sports recently discussed its charge — resulting from the work last year of the NCAA Special Committee on Student-Athlete Welfare, Access and Equity — to heighten awareness of student-athlete health and safety issues.

The special committee asked that the competitive-safeguards committee consult with professional sports medicine associations and the NCAA Student-Athlete Advisory Committee and then present the NCAA Council with a comprehensive plan before the 1997 NCAA

Convention.

The competitive-safeguards committee, meeting June 21-23 in Santa Fe, New Mexico, responded by dividing into three working groups to address three topics listed by the special committee: education, equitable medical treatment, and adequate medical care at practices and competitions.

Education

The education group will investigate methods of educating student-athletes and coaches on various health and safety issues. Among

Other highlights

In other actions at its June 21-23 meeting in Santa Fe, New Mexico, the Committee on Competitive Safeguards and Medical Aspects of Sports:

■ Recommended to the NCAA Research Committee that the \$30,000 expected to be made available for sports-sciences research be devoted to assisting a working-group investigation of insurance issues, financing anterior-cruciate injury research, and evaluating overuse injuries.

■ Endorsed a recommendation from the American College of Sports Medicine (ACSM) that the committee work jointly with that organization to produce monthly releases for news wire services titled "Current Comments." The releases would cover a variety of sports medicine issues. The first "Comments" installment would come directly from the NCAA Sports Medicine Handbook. Once that supply is exhausted, ACSM would produce some of the releases.

■ Responded to a request from the National Mental Illness Screening Project to help promote the National Eating Disorders Screening Program during Eating Disorders Awareness Week February 5-11, 1996. The committee agreed to publish infor-

mation on the event in the Sports Sciences Education Newsletter but declined to be involved further, since the program is geared toward the general student body and not student-athletes.

■ Noted that there will be no new guidelines in the NCAA Sports Medicine Handbook this year. Concerns about certain elements of Guideline 2-C, "Prevention of Heat Illness," will be addressed on an individual basis, but no significant change will be made in the handbook.

■ Noted that the committee will be involved in sports-sciences meetings associated with the 1996 Olympic Games this September and next June.

■ Endorsed committee involvement in recent national meetings of ACSM, the National Athletic Trainers' Association and the American Medical Society for Sports Medicine.

■ Noted that a study on anterior-cruciate injuries that used data from the NCAA Injury Surveillance System will be published in the American Journal of Sports Medicine this summer.

■ Renamed its research subcommittee the sports science and safety subcommittee to better emphasize the scope of the subcommittee's work.

Men's lacrosse toughens penalty procedures for 1995-96 year

The NCAA Men's Lacrosse Committee, meeting June 18-22 at Coronado, California, voted to strengthen some of the game's penalty procedures.

Next year, offending players, "in-homes" or designees will serve full penalty time for "releasable penalties." Such players still will be released when a goal is scored by the offended team. Nonreleasable penalties remain full time served.

Releasable penalties, which are of a lesser nature than "nonreleasable penalties," result in the offending team having a player or players sit out from competition in the penalty area, thus forcing that team to play "man down" for a designated time. Previously, penalty-serving players were released when their team gained possession in their attack area.

The committee's rationale for the change is that, while they are less serious than fouls that draw non-

releasable penalties, infractions that draw releasable penalties (such as cross-checks, illegal body checks, slashing or unnecessary roughness) are sufficiently aggressive to warrant a full-time-served penalty.

The committee also noted that before the change, such penalties (except a late hit after a goal) could have been released quickly before a slow-whistle situation, perhaps resulting in a goal if the offending team had a dominant face-off man.

In addition to strengthening the penalty, the change could create exciting play, as the penalized team battles to "kill" the penalty or regain possession. The change also simplifies the officials' and table-area mechanics and eliminates confusion in determining when a time-serving player should be released from the penalty area. The committee also hopes the change makes the game easier for spectators to understand.

In order to eliminate some po-

tential confusion, the committee also made time-served technical fouls full time served.

In another effort to penalize excessively rough play, the committee also voted to expand the definition of slashing penalties to include "striking an offensive player across the back or on the shoulders." The current definition covers only contact of the defensive player's crosse with any part of the face, neck or head, with the stipulation that "mere contact" does not constitute a "strike."

To be a "strike" and result in a slashing penalty, the contact must be a definite blow and not merely a "brush." The same "strike" stipulation also applies to slashing on the back and shoulders.

The committee's rationale is that "strikes" to the back and shoulders can be just as painful and destructive as those actions prohibited under the previous definition of

slashing, and therefore should be penalized.

Championships issues

Anticipating the beginning of Division I championship preliminary-round play off campuses in 1996, the committee selected Cornell University (North) and the United States Naval Academy (South) as first-round sites. Quarterfinal hosts will be Rutgers University, New Brunswick (North), and Johns Hopkins University (South). The North games will be on a Saturday; South games on a Sunday.

The 1997 first-round sites will be the United States Military Academy (North) and Towson State University (South). The North quarterfinals will be at Hofstra University. The South site has not yet been determined.

After a review of the annual live television announcement of championship pairings, the committee will recommend to the NCAA

Executive Committee that the committee be permitted to conduct an in-person selection meeting in the city in which the television announcement show originates, rather than continuing to make tournament selections via conference call.

The committee also responded to the NCAA Division III Championships Committee's request that all Division III sports committees make recommendations for possible adjustment of their championships structure to provide for a one-to-eight ratio of berths.

The committee proposed that the tournament field be expanded from eight to 12 teams. First-round games would be held the Wednesday after the Sunday on which the committee selects participating teams. The remaining rounds would be played according to the current format.

The committee also proposed that if sponsorship from Colorado to the West Coast expands to at least eight institutions, that region should receive a berth. However, none of these changes would be enacted until after restructuring is completed by the NCAA membership.

In another action, the committee declined to recommend that the Division II championship be played at the Division I site. The committee discussed whether that one-game championship might benefit from a move from the traditional on-campus site, similar to the arrangement for the Division III championship game since 1992. That move was so successful that Division III, whose tournament has an eight-team field, has set annual attendance records at its championship game since.

In deciding not to recommend a change for Division II, the committee reasoned that a three-week gap between the last regular-season game and the Division II championship game would be detrimental to the event's overall success. Such a delay also could be a financial burden to the participating institutions, many of which are not in session during that time and would therefore incur additional expense housing players on campus.

Other highlights

In other actions concerning rules at its June 18-22 meeting in Coronado, California, the Men's Lacrosse Committee:

■ Emphasized that it recommends three officials be used to control the game (a referee, an umpire and a field judge). A fourth official, who would be designated as the chief bench official, also can be used but a minimum of two officials must be used. Previous language in the rules book gave the impression that two officials were recommended.

■ Strengthened its penalty for fighting by adding that both the count of occurrences and the resulting suspensions carry over to the next season.

■ Eliminated requiring the timekeeper to join the nearest official on the field to count down the last two minutes of each period (and two minutes and 10 seconds before the end of the fourth period or overtime periods) at sites where there is no accurate visible game clock. Instead, the timekeeper merely shall notify the nearest official 20 seconds before the end of the first three periods and sound an air horn to signify the end of the period. Similar to the old rule, the timekeeper shall notify the nearest official two minutes and 10 seconds before the end of the fourth and overtime periods and sound an air horn to signify the end of the period. The rationale for the change is that placing an unofficial-looking, unprotected person on the playing field during play is dangerous and bad for the game's image.

■ Strengthened the penalty for "team penalties," which are called against a team when no definite player is involved or when the penalty is against someone other than a player in the game, such as a coach.

Under the change, additional attack players serve penalty time for each occurrence. Previously, the player designated in the scorebook as the "in-home" at the beginning of the game served the additional time, even though he was already in the penalty area. Under the change, offending teams would be forced to play with more than one man down during the penalty. Previously, multiple offenses resulted in the offending team continuing to play one man down for a longer time.

■ Added "calling undue attention to oneself" to the definition of unsportsmanlike conduct.

In other actions regarding championships, the committee:

■ Agreed that for purposes of determining the strength-of-schedule index, teams will be rated in preseason and midseason and during the last week of the regular season. Also, when the committee is calculating the index, only the 10 top-rated games on any institution's schedule will be included.

■ Increased the number of advisory committee members in Divisions I and III in order to enhance the accuracy of the strength-of-schedule rating and power index this group produces.

■ Discussed the NCAA Division III Championships Committee's decision not to increase fees for game officials. The fees in Divisions I and II will increase from \$150 to \$220, effective in 1996.

■ Requested that Brine, Inc., develop an optic yellow ball similar to that used in tennis to enhance visibility for televised games. The committee also recommended that the NCAA provide practice and game balls during the Divisions I and III championship weekend.

Track committee requests increase in men's grant limits

Members say competitiveness is threatened

Expressing concern over the competitive future of men's track and field, the Division I subcommittee of the NCAA Men's and Women's Track and Field Committee is requesting that the current grant limits for Divisions I and II men's cross country and track and field be increased.

At its annual meeting June 20-23 in Whitefish, Montana, the subcommittee reviewed an April 1995 recommendation by the NCAA Committee on Financial Aid and Amateurism to not increase grants limits for Divisions I and II men's sports and is requesting that the committee reconsider its position, specifically with regard to cross country and track and field.

The track and field committee agreed with a recommendation to increase grants in women's sports.

Currently, men's cross country and track and field are permitted a maximum of 12.6 grants.

"We're deeply concerned about the impact of limiting the opportunity for schools to adequately support their men's track programs, since many schools base their level of funding on that cap," said Lauren E. Anderson, associate director of athletics at the University of Rhode Island and chair of the Men's and Women's Track and Field Committee.

"Track and field is three sports with a myriad of events. The ability of an institution to field truly representative teams for cross country, indoor track and outdoor track is severely hampered by the existing grant limit," Anderson said.

"We suggest that the NCAA Council consider the grant limitations more from a truly appropriate number for the sport and then allow institutions to self-limit regarding how they use their dollars while meeting their equity and minority-participation concerns."

In requesting that the Committee on Financial Aid and Amateurism reconsider its position, the track and field committee stated

Track and field rules

During its June 20-23 meeting in Whitefish, Montana, the Men's and Women's Track and Field Committee took the following actions pertaining to rules:

■ Revised women's hammer specifications to state that the minimum and maximum lengths be 116.0 and 119.5 centimeters, respectively (Rule 2-10-5).

■ Determined that competitors who conduct themselves in an unsporting manner or who are offensive by action or language shall be disqualified by the referee from the event and from the remainder of the meet (Rule 4-1-1).

■ Determined that outgoing relay runners may place two separate pieces of tape on the track. These pieces of tape may be no longer than the width of the lane nor wider than 2 inches, and may be placed anywhere within the outgoing runner's lane (Rule 5-8-4).

■ Determined that in all field events except the pole vault, a competitor shall be charged with an unsuccessful attempt if the competitor does not initiate a trial within one minute after being called by the event judge. The time limit in the pole vault shall be 1½ minutes (Rule 6-1-1).

■ Determined that in the vertical jumps, competition must continue in an excused competitor's absence and that athlete will compete at the existing height upon return. The head judge of the event may allow the competitor to take attempts out of the official order, which may or may not be in succession (Rule 6-1-2).

■ Determined that in the field events, competitors may be arranged in flights no larger than 12 (nine) and no smaller than five (Rule 6-3-1).

■ Determined that in the high jump and pole vault, when there are two or three competitors remaining in the competition, the high jumpers will have two minutes and the pole vaulters will have three minutes to initiate an attempt. Further, if only one competitor remains, that competitor will be allowed four minutes for the high jump and five minutes for the pole vault to initiate an attempt (Rule 6-3-3).

■ Determined that in the pole vault and long and triple jumps, shoes as a marker are not acceptable (Rules 6-5-4 and 6-6-2).

■ Determined that all championships meets shall use the method of scoring currently listed as Rule 7-1-1. Also, the committee deter-

mined that the number of entries per event will be determined by meet management and that all individual entries will have the ability to score in the competition. The committee noted that one relay entry per institution will score (Rule 7-1-1).

■ Determined that scoring in dual, triangular and quadrangular meets may be recorded as follows (Rule 7-1-2):

The number of entries per event will be determined by meet management. Only two scorers will be allowed per institution. One relay entry will score per institution.

■ Determined that multiple-events competitors will be allowed two minutes between consecutive attempts in the high jump (Rule 9-2-2).

■ Determined that when possible and practical, all competitors in the 800-, 1,000- and 1,500-meter runs should run in one section. However, when the field is larger than 15 (instead of nine), it is recommended that the number of competitors be placed into two groups (Rule 9-2-5-b).

■ Determined that for indoor tracks where the inside edge of the track is bordered with a white line, it shall be marked additionally with cones. The cones shall be at least 20 centimeters high. The cones shall be placed on the track so that the outward face of the cone coincides with the edge of the white line closest to the track. The cones shall be placed at distances not exceeding two meters on the curves and 10 meters on the straightaways (Rule 10-2-3).

■ Determined that the weight throw implement shall not be less than 35 pounds for men and 20 pounds for women (Rule 10-9-3).

■ Determined that championships qualifying marks will not be acceptable if they are set in meets or events where men and women compete together in a running event (except the 10,000-meter run) (1996 NCAA Qualifying).

that grant limitations are not a directive to individual institutions to issue maximum grants for a particular sport. The committee believes increasing the maximum limits simply provides institutions with a choice of where they may spend their money.

The committee cited the uniqueness of a sport in which student-athletes can compete in three sports (cross country, indoor track and outdoor track and field), the large minority participation rate and the large number of events in track and field (21) as a few reasons why an increase is necessary.

field sizes for the men's and women's cross country championships be increased from 184 to 200. The additional competitors would be selected at large, with each of eight regions receiving two additional berths.

ations of young females, females who are by no means immune to the pitfalls of life.

President Clinton has called for the hiring of 100,000 more police officers to address the violence that

undermines our society. Hiring 25,000 more coaches makes more sense. Young people run from the police; they embrace coaches.

Imagine athletics departments, even whole institutions embracing the concept of reclaiming our children, reaching out to help them rather than reject them. Helping to put young people on track to go to college rather than watching them

derail and go to jail — or worse yet, to the morgue. That is what college sports should be about, that is what higher education should be about.

The Rev. Jesse Jackson and the Rainbow Commission for Fairness in Athletics have held a series of discussions with top NCAA officials about empowerment zones, and the concept is being vigorously explored. The basic agreement has been that

such zones are not about NCAA rules and regulations, or who will have a recruiting advantage. Rather, they are about saving lives. Intervening in the lives of our youth is of paramount importance because failure to do so has such clear and deadly results.

What Richie Parker did is unforgettable, but it should not be unforgivable. A child so young is not above redemption. To give him an athlet-

ics scholarship is not a reward for misdeeds; it is simply a second chance to succeed in life. And, like so many others, it may be his last chance.

added 486 spectators a game. Syracuse's average of 24,245 persons per game is 439 fans ahead of the charging Wildcats' 23,806 per game.

North Carolina again finished third and Arkansas repeated at the fourth spot. For the second consecutive year, those four schools were the only programs to average more than 20,000 fans a game. Brigham Young moved up to fifth as Louisville slipped to sixth.

St. Louis and its rejuvenated program had the highest increase in the nation with 4,706 more fans per game than last year, climbing into seventh place among all Division I teams.

In an oddity, the Big Ten placed a team at every even-numbered spot from eighth place to 20th, without holding any of the odd-numbered positions. Those teams are Indiana (eighth), Illinois (10th), Iowa (12th), Michigan State (14th), Purdue (16th), Minnesota (18th) and Michigan (20th).

The national-champion UCLA Bruins attracted 11,419 fans per game to rank 32nd overall.

Defending Division I champion Arkansas was seen by the most people this season, as 695,026 spectators watched Nolan Richardson's squad at home in Fayetteville, on the road or at neutral sites. Kentucky and North Carolina were the only other two teams to be seen in person by more than 600,000 fans this season.

The top conference in Division II for the 15th consecutive year was the North Central Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, with 382,042 spectators and a 2,497 average.

The Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic Association topped all Division III conferences with a 1,183 average.

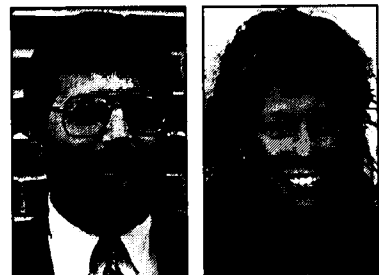

the topics to be addressed are addictive behaviors, nutrition/eating disorders, performance-enhancing drugs, self-esteem, risky behavior, sexual behavior/responsibility, weight control, psychological health and well-being, communication with injured student-athletes, and equipment safety.

The group began its work by further dividing its focus into three areas: legislation, student-athletes and coaches.

The group requested that the national official staff evaluate relevant NCAA legislation, then report its findings at the competitive-safeguards committee's February meeting. The group then will recommend revisions or, if necessary, propose new legislation.

Regarding student-athletes, the group has asked Emily R. Ward, NCAA program coordinator for education resources, to attend that meeting and discuss what role the NCAA Life Skills Program can play in meeting the charge.

Other options include production of brochures specific to selected sports medicine issues and expansion of the NCAA Sports Medicine Handbook for a student-athlete audience.

The working group emphasized that throughout this process, the competitive-safeguards committee should work closely with the Student-

Mark Kotsay, baseball player at Cal State Fullerton, was awarded the R. E. "Bob" Smith Award as college baseball player of the year. The sophomore centerfielder and pitcher set College World Series marks for career batting average at .529 and grand-slam home runs with two, and helped his team win the 1995 Division I Baseball Championship.

Bill Foster, associate commissioner of the Southwest Conference, selected as chairman of the board of the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame. Irwin "Moe" Fassinger, former basketball coach at Carnegie Mellon, died June 15 in Dormont, Pennsylvania. He was 80.

CoSIDA honors ex-Massachusetts SID

Howard Davis, who served as sports information director at the University of Massachusetts, Amherst, from 1980 to 1993, recently was honored with the Arch Ward Award, the highest honor presented by the College Sports Information Directors of America (CoSIDA).

Davis received his award June 29 at the annual CoSIDA Workshop in Denver. The award is given each year to a CoSIDA member who has made an outstanding contribution in the field of college sports information.

Davis was inducted into the CoSIDA Hall of Fame in 1989. He began his career at Kenyon College in 1966 before joining Springfield College, where he served for 12 years. He is the author of the first textbook on the field of sports information, "Basic Concepts in Sports Information," published in 1978.

Davis served as a United States Olympic Committee press officer at the National Sports Festival in 1981 and 1987. He won one of only 24 citations awarded by the Football Writers Association of America for "outstanding press box working services."

Now retired from sports information, Davis currently serves as assistant director of internships for the sports studies department at Massachusetts.

Hall of Fame: Mary Jo Haverbeck, Mike Mahon and Al Shrier were inducted into the organization's hall of fame.

Haverbeck, the first woman elected to the CoSIDA Hall of Fame, has been associate sports information director at Pennsylvania State University since 1974.

Mahon began his sports information career at his alma mater, the University of South Dakota, in 1977. He became SID at Drake University in 1988, and currently serves as media coordinator for the Drake Relays.

Shrier, who served as sports information director at Temple since 1953, retired in June. A member of the Temple and Philadelphia Big 5 Halls of Fame, Shrier won the Irving T. March Award from the Eastern College Athletic Conference in 1981. He is a former officer of ECAC-SIDA and won many publications awards from CoSIDA.

Jake Wade Award: Bill Brill, who has covered Atlantic Coast Conference athletics since 1953, won the Jake Wade Award, which is presented to a person in the communications field who has made an outstanding contribution to college athletics.

Brill worked as a sportswriter and sports editor at the Roanoke (Virginia) Times from 1956 to 1991. Upon his retirement there, he served as a columnist at the Durham (North Carolina) Herald-Sun from 1992

until this year.

CoSIDA/Kodak Good Person Award: Wylie Smith, former sports information director at Northern Arizona University, was honored posthumously with the Good Person Award, which is given annually to an SID for civic involvement and accomplishments outside the field of intercollegiate athletics.

Smith, who served as SID at Northern Arizona from 1973 until his death in 1994, worked as a sports-writer until 1966, when he joined Northern Arizona as a publicity assistant.

Warren Berg Award: Ron "Foggy" Lenz, sports information director at South Dakota State University, was honored as the winner of the Warren Berg Award, presented annually to the college-division member of CoSIDA who has made an outstanding contribution to the field and who has brought honor to the organization.

Lenz began in sports publicity at the University of South Dakota in 1972 and served there until he joined South Dakota State as SID in 1977.

NCAA Bylaw 13.1.1.3 Four-year college prospects

NCAA institutions should note that in accordance with Bylaw 13.1.1.3, an athletics department staff member or other representative of an institution's athletics interests may not make contact with a student-athlete of another four-year college, directly or indirectly, without first obtaining written permission of the first institution's athletics director (or an athletics administrator designated by the athletics director) to do so, regardless of who makes the initial contact. If permission is not granted, the second institution may not encourage the transfer and, in Divisions I and II, may not provide financial assistance to the student-athlete until the student-athlete has attended the second institution for one academic year. If permission is granted to contact the student-ath-

lete, all applicable NCAA recruiting rules apply. During its May 25, 1995, telephone conference, the NCAA Interpretations Committee determined that once an institution grants permission to a student-athlete to contact another four-year institution regarding a possible transfer, it is not permissible for the institution to revoke such permission. The committee determined that such permission, however, expires at the time the student-athlete reenrolls at his or her original institution as a full-time student during the subsequent academic year.

Figure 15-1 — 1995-96 NCAA Manual

NCAA institutions should note that in accordance with Bylaw 15.02.4.1-(a), institutional financial aid includes on-campus employment (including work-study program assistance) in the athletics department and on-campus employment outside the athletics department for which athletics interests of the institution intercede on behalf of the student-athlete (other than institutional staff members responsible

for assisting all students in securing on-campus employment, including work study, in the same manner).

Please note that Figure 15-1 (page 205) in the 1995-96 Manual incorrectly indicates that work-study assistance is included in the institutional sport limitations if a student-athlete is considered a counter pursuant to Bylaw 15.5. Work-study assistance that is outside the athletics department and for which athletics interests do not intercede on behalf of the student-athlete to secure such employment is not considered institutional aid and, thus, is not included in the institution's financial aid limits in the applicable sport. Accordingly, the "Institutional Sport Limitation" column for work-study assistance should read, "Yes, if athletics interests intercede."

committee's long-range goals.

Equitable medical treatment

This working group focusing on equitable medical treatment noted that cost is the major constraint in providing such treatment. The group's focus in the coming months will be on how student-athletes are insured.

Adequate medical care/supervision

The working group on adequate medical care and supervision focused on whether the membership provides adequate medical care and supervision by athletics trainers and other health-care providers at practices and competitions. Ultimately, the group hopes to provide a report that will set minimum standards for this coverage.

Drug testing and education

No major decisions or changes were made in policy, but the NCAA Committee on Competitive Safeguards and Medical Aspects of Sports took the following actions regarding drug testing and education during its June 21-23 meeting in Santa Fe, New Mexico:

- Asked the national office staff to gather information on whether conferences apply sanctions to game personnel who use tobacco during practices and/or competition.

- Reviewed correspondence from two Division II institutions asking for review of the selection process for year-round drug testing in football, which was done for the first time in that division this year. The institutions asked that testing be targeted toward athletes in positions at which student-athletes may be most likely to take a banned substance to enhance performance. Citing the program's infancy, the committee declined to make a change and will wait another year to assess its effectiveness.

- Noted a five-year plan for funding laboratory research in cooperation with the National Football League and the United States Olympic Committee.

- Noted that the Atlanta Committee on the Olympic Games has asked for NCAA drug-testing crew chiefs' assistance during the 1996 Olympic Games.

- Reviewed a draft of the semiannual drug-education survey to be distributed this fall and agreed to increase the number of questions measur-

ing the extent of institutions' drug-education efforts.

- Continued discussion of methods to gather current information regarding changes in student-athletes' use of banned drugs and implications for the drug-testing program.

- Agreed to instruct laboratories conducting drug testing for the NCAA to report cases of the use of the asthma medicine Salbutamol (albuterol). The national office staff will gather information on whether the drug was taken orally or inhaled. That information will be used for committee research purposes.

- Asked drug-testing laboratories for additional information on the stimulant methcathinone, but agreed not to add phenylpropanolamine and pseudo ephedrine (and similar compounds) to the list of banned drugs.

- Asked drug-testing laboratories for additional information on possible interfering compounds. The committee will use that information to determine whether it is again necessary or advisable to ask student-athletes at the time of drug testing about recent histories of drug use, as was done during the first few years of the NCAA drug-testing program.

- Asked drug-testing laboratories to report relevant ratios of the steroid dihydrotestosterone in urine specimens.

- Agreed to meet annually (during its winter meeting) with directors of laboratories conducting drug testing for the NCAA.

Sports committees

The NCAA Committee on Competitive Safeguards and Medical Aspects of Sports, meeting June 21-23 in Santa Fe, New Mexico, reviewed recent dialogues with the American Football Coaches Association and College Football Association regarding its concerns about a high injury rate in spring football practice compared to fall practice.

The committee anticipates those dialogues will continue in an effort to remedy the problem. If necessary, the committee could propose legislation dealing with the problem for consideration at the 1997 NCAA Convention as part of its charge to evaluate health and safety issues.

The dialogues with the AFCA and CFA follow a recommendation last year by the competitive-safeguards committee that the NCAA Council sponsor legislation to either eliminate or greatly modify spring football practice.

Wrestling issues

Various issues involving the sport of wrestling also were addressed by the competitive-safeguards committee.

The committee endorsed an NCAA Wrestling Committee recommendation that examinations for skin infections be mandatory for all dual meets and tournaments. Such examinations previously have been only recommended.

In a related matter, the committee answered the wrestling committee's request for a workable definition of the phrase "adequately protected," which is used in the competitive-safeguards committee's list of communicable-skin-disease procedures in the championships handbook for wrestling. The committee said the term means a "securely attached bandage made of nonpermeable material that will endure the rigors of competition."

The wrestling committee also had requested information on why some skin diseases require more specific steps for prevention of transmission to other competitors than others. The competitive-safeguards committee cited varying morbidity rates of different diseases as the reason.

Weight loss

The competitive-safeguards committee also continues to

deal with issues surrounding weight loss in wrestling.

The committee noted that the wrestling committee will return to a weight-allowance system used during the 1993-94 season. Under that system, wrestlers are allowed to be varying degrees heavier than the weight class in which they wrestle until the end of the season, when they must wrestle at "flat" weight or under.

That rule, however, will only be in effect for the 1995-96 season. Meanwhile, the competitive-safeguards committee will complete a study on the subject and will be prepared to make a recommendation to the wrestling committee on a system for subsequent years.

As part of that study, the competitive-safeguards committee has reviewed a draft of a report on the subject by the American College of Sports Medicine (ACSM). The committee plans to work with the wrestling committee to address health concerns surrounding weight-cutting and weighing-in processes.

The competitive-safeguards committee identified three areas for discussion. One is maintaining a consistent weight class throughout the season. Another is avoiding significant drops in weight for the NCAA championships and qualifying tournaments. The third is evaluating the significance of the weigh-in process. The committee noted that during competition, the weights of wrestlers in the same weight class often are dissimilar, and some are significantly higher than the weights registered at the time of the weigh-in.

The committee hopes to discuss the subject with the wrestling committee at the National Wrestling Coaches Association's annual convention in August. After those discussions and others with the ACSM, the competitive-safeguards committee plans to make a recommendation to the Council on the subject in 1997.

Other actions

In other actions involving sports committees, the competi-

itive-safeguards committee:

- Approved a joint request by the NCAA Men's and Women's Basketball Rules Committees that players be permitted to use pliable plastic to cover injuries.

- Responded to an inquiry by the Women's Basketball Rules Committee by reporting that there do not appear to be sufficient injury data to warrant requiring the wearing of mouth guards.

- Recommended to the NCAA Executive Committee that women's lacrosse and field hockey players be given the option of wearing protective helmets during NCAA championship play. (Regular-season play is governed by international rules, which ban the use of helmets.) The recommendation is based upon advice from the NCAA's legal counsel. Current rules prohibit the use of helmets by players other than the goalkeeper.

- Expressed concern about a report submitted by the NCAA Men's and Women's Soccer Rules Committee involving a woman soccer player who informed a referee about allergy problems that might cause her to suffer health problems during the game. According to the report, the student-athlete collapsed during the game and the referee failed to stop play. The committee encouraged all game officials to err on the side of safety in similar situations.

- Expressed concern about an increase in concussions in the sport of ice hockey. To help quantify the problem more accurately, the committee recommended a more prominent display of the definition of the injury on Injury Surveillance System data-collection forms. The committee also requested help from the NCAA Men's Ice Hockey Rules Committee in devising other ways to address the issue.

- Determined, based on information gathered from NCAA rules committee staff liaisons and the National Athletic Trainers Association, that it is not necessary to have athletics trainers represented on sports committees.
